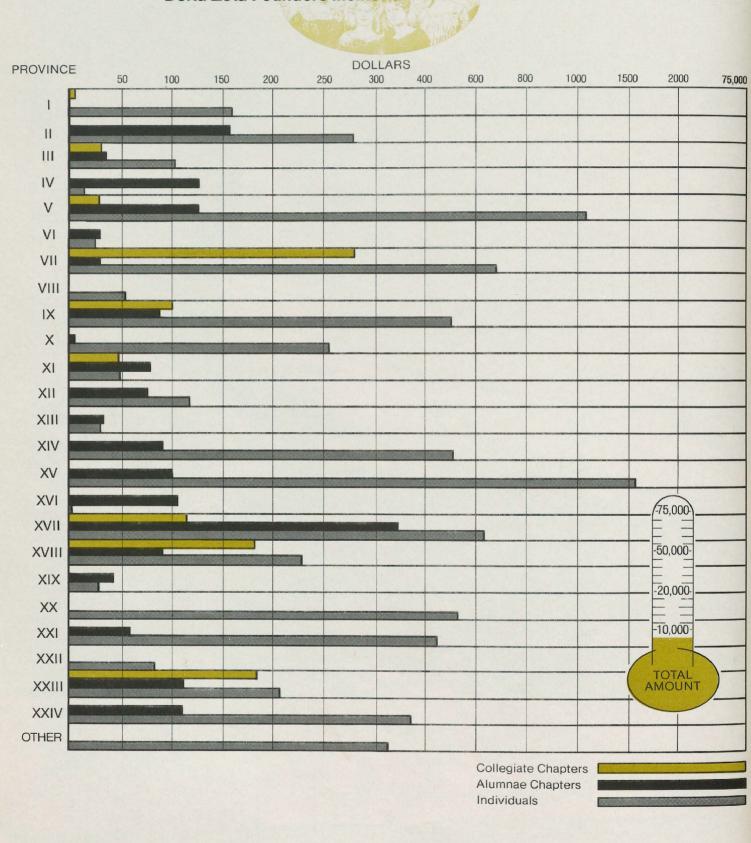

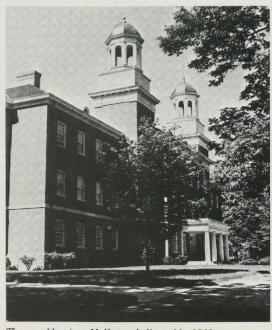

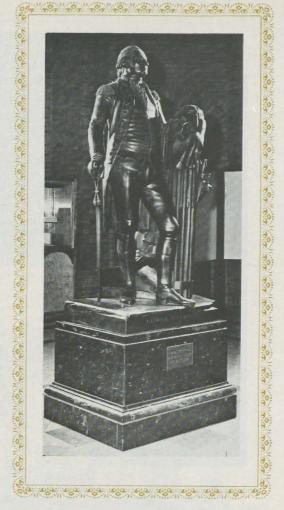

This bicentennial year has renewed interest for many of us in historic buildings and events. Oxford, Ohio, has an unusual number of such buildings for a small community. It has been written that there were nine colleges for men founded before the Revolution in America and by 1800 there were twenty-one with Miami University considered one of the oldest with the founding date of 1809. However, for many years women had little opportunity for a higher education and so it is surprising to note that in the middle 1850s three female institutions were founded in Oxford.

Oxford College, founded as Oxford Female Institute in 1849 by John Scott, was the oldest Protestant school for women in the United States to confer the B.A. degree. Caroline Scott Harrison, wife of Benjamin Harrison, 23rd President of the United States, graduated from Oxford College in 1852 and became the first President General of the D.A.R. Oxford College merged into Miami in 1928.

Oxford Female College, chartered by the State Legislature in 1854, was also established by John Scott after breaking away from Oxford Female Institute. However, by 1867 because of financial difficulties, these two colleges merged, first residing in the Female Oxford College building (Fisher Hall) until it was sold to the Oxford Retreat Company in 1882, and then returning to the first or original building which had become an hotel in the interim. Miami University entered into a contract with the Oxford Retreat Company in 1923 and Fisher Hall became a part of the campus in 1926. This building is one of the most elaborate college buildings constructed during the Civil War antebellum period in Ohio. It is named in honor of Judge Elam Fisher, honor graduate of Miami, a member of the Board of Trustees for 36 years, and a member of the Ohio House of Representatives.

The Western Female Seminary, although organized in 1853, began offering the A.B. degree in 1903 when it changed its name to Western College for Women and then finally to Western College. The first president was Helen Peabody who was an 1848 graduate of Mt. Holyoke. Before coming to Western for 33 years, she taught at Mt. Holyoke for five years. Western has often been called the Mt. Holyoke of the West. Western became a part of Miami in 1974.

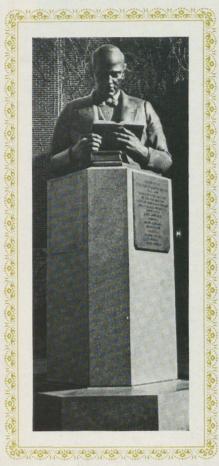


Bronze of the statue of George Washington done by Jean Antoine Houdon which stands in Hall Auditorium.

All three of the original female college buildings are now on the Miami campus and all are listed in the National Register of Historic Places.

Miami University opened its doors to women in 1902, primarily for education in teaching, shortly after Dr. Guy Potter Benton became President. Since Beta Theta Pi (1839), Phi Delta Theta (1848), and Sigma Chi (1855) had already been founded at Miami, Dr. Benton was most sympathetic and helpful to our six courageous founders of Delta Zeta when they sought his guidance in establishing a national sorority. The current Hall Auditorium was the original administration building, built in 1908 and eventually named for Dr. Benton. However, with the completion of the new Behavorial Science Building, it was dedicated in 1968 to the 12th President of Miami University 1902-1911, Dr. Guy Potter Benton.

"Old Main" was first occupied as a classroom building in 1824. In 1931 the Board of Trustees renamed the building Harrison Hall in honor of Benjamin Harrison, the 23rd President of the United States 1889-1893, and a graduate in the class of 1852. He was also a United States Senator and a Civil War Commander. Delta Zeta was officially founded in "Old Main" and a bronze plaque was placed in the hall in recognition of the event. It was later placed in the main hall of the "new" Harrison Hall which was dedicated in 1960.

Elliott Hall(1828) and Stoddard Hall(1835) were the first residence halls for men. The first residence hall for women was built in 1905 and named for a President of Miami(1871-73) who ironically was opposed to women at the University. At the time Hepburn Hall was torn down in 1972 to provide land for the new library, the corner stone was opened. Among the articles was a scroll tied with faded rose and green ribbons, noting that Delta Zeta was founded in 1902 and the initiates for the year 1902-3-4 were: Julia Bishop, Mary Collins, Anna Keen, Alfa Lloyd, Mabelle Minton, Anne Simmons, Elizabeth Coulter, Lillian Minton, Luella Crugar, Noble Miller, Edith Dininger, Mary Belle Martin, Mary Estelle Coulter, Jessie C. Denman, Marie Helen Hirst, Silla T. Stanton, Elizabeth Aleen Barnett, Maude Fitzgerald, Mary Fitzgerald and Helen Gaskill. This scroll is now in the archives of the University, but a replica hangs on the wall in National Headquarters.

McGuffey is a name not easily ignored at Miami. With three buildings—McGuffey Hall which houses the School of Education, McGuffey Laboratory School and McGuffey Museum bearing his name, he continues to retain some measure of the national fame he acquired in the last half of the nineteenth century. While he was a renowned preacher and lecturer, the 122 million copies of the McGuffey Eclectic Readers had the most influence nationwide.

William Holmes McGuffey was a professor of Philosophy at Miami from 1823-36. The McGuffey Museum is the original house in which he lived in 1833 and where he wrote four of his Readers as well as conducting an experimental school for children. Here can be located the most complete collection of McGuffey Readers in existence. The bronze statue of William Holmes McGuffey is in the courtyard of the School of Education and is largely the result of Dean Minnich's endeavors who was one of the founders of the Federated McGuffey Societies of America and a former Dean of the School of Education.

As new residence halls for women were built, beginning with Hamilton Hall in 1940, named for the first Dean of Women, sorority suites were included in the plans. Shortly after the completion of Hamilton Hall, Delta Zeta presented a portrait of Dean Elizabeth Hamilton to the University where it now hangs in the foyer of the residence hall. Alpha chapter resided in Hamilton Hall until the dining rooms at adjacent Richard Hall were remodeled in 1974 to provide larger accommodations. Since Delta Zeta was the first national sorority on the campus, Alpha chapter was given the first choice of the new suites.

Two more buildings should be mentioned, namely the University Center, built in 1957 and financed by student fees, and the Murstein Alumni Center (1968) bearing the name of a Hamilton and Cincinnati benefactor. The Climers, class of 1917, gave the guest wing. Many of the furnishings in the Alumni Center have been contributed by alumni.

In the Hall Auditorium stands a statue of George Washington which is the sixth of 22 bronze copies cast from the marble original by the French sculptor Jean Antoine Houdon. Thomas Jefferson and Benjamin Franklin made the arrangements in France and eventually Houdon came to America in 1785. He went to Mt. Vernon and took measurements and a face mask of Washington and, because of these factors, this is generally considered to be the most accurate sculptural representation of George Washington. Lafayette said, "That is the man himself. I can almost realize he is going to move." The statue was given to Miami in 1920 by Samuel Spahr Laws, 1848 Miami graduate, who at the time was the oldest living alumnus at the age of 96.

From 1776 to the 1809 founding date of Miami University is a very short span of thirty-three years. Indeed Miami can be proud of its heritage and tradition, and Delta Zeta can be assured that it has a firm foundation upon which to continue building.



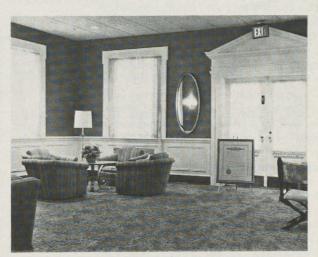

Whether on the job in her capacity as Regional Manager of Public Relations for Eastern Airlines or announcing an anonymous donation of \$25,000 helping make the Atlanta Alumnae Chapter's "Evening at the Fox" a stunning success, Delta Zeta's 1976 Woman of the Year, Carolyn Lee Wills, Delta Delta chapter at Georgia State University, typifies many women today holding executive management positions in industry. Carolyn's present position as Regional Manager of Public Relations in the Southern Division covers the area from Atlanta west to Los Angeles as far south as Pensacola and north to Memphis and San Francisco.

Carolyn's responsibilities include the areas of radio, television and print media in community and public relations, special promotion and editing of an Eastern paper "Peachline." She joined Eastern Airlines in 1965 as the first representative of women's activities and then held positions as senior sales representative and public relations representative before assuming her present position. In addition, during a four month leave from the airline, Carolyn was hostess of the "Today in Georgia" television program aired on WSB-TV Atlanta.

Prior to joining Eastern, Carolyn spent a year traveling around the world and has since visited over 40 countries from the Far East to the Middle East across eastern and western Europe through South America and home! The purpose of the trip was to broaden her education by seeing, learning and doing as much as possible. The knowledge of people and their customs gained from her experiences has been a decided asset in her chosen field of public relations.

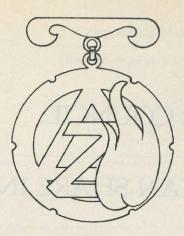
Carolyn Lee Wills 1976 Woman of the Year

At Georgia State University, Carolyn studied journalism but she says she majored in "activities" serving as President of the Panhellenic Council, President of Delta Delta chapter, editor of the yearbook, listed for two years in Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges, Dean's List, Mortar Board and sweetheart of Pi Kappa Phi Fraternity. During this time, she also did fashion shows for Atlanta department stores and daily television shows on two Atlanta stations as well as teaching visual poise and fencing at a charm school. She was the valedictorian graduate of Fulton High School in Atlanta.

But Delta Zeta's Woman of the Year for 1976 has never stopped working for or promoting Delta Zeta wherever and whenever she travels since her graduation from Georgia State University. For more than four years Carolyn was a Delta Zeta field representative traveling to colleges and universities throughout the United States as a "good will ambassador," training officers, supervising rush programs and calling on Deans of Women and other college officials. She is presently secretary of the Delta Delta House Corporation, chairman of the evening group of the Atlanta Alumnae Chapter and recently been elected as president of that alumnae chapter. She has served as Vice-President and President of the Atlanta Panhellenic.

Serving as the Publicity Chairman of the Atlanta Alumnae Chapter's recent "Evening at the Fox," Carolyn's many contacts and knowledge of public relations were instrumental in assuring the successful event of a lifetime for the Atlanta Alumnae Chapter. What began as a simple men's fashion show with expected attendance of 600, developed into a glittering social event filled with celebrities from the sports and entertainment fields with an attendance of over 2000 Georgians. Carolyn's article in the September issue of The Lamp featured the alumnae and highlights of the evening. Proceeds were donated to a special fund to save and preserve Atlanta's famous Fox Theater. Over \$70,000 was raised and Delta Zeta can be proud of the efforts made to help preserve the famous landmark. All this could not have been possible without the public relations talents and know-how of our Woman of the Year.



Carolyn served on the Board of Directors of the Imperial Life Insurance Company for nine years. She served nine years on the Board of Directors of the Georgia State University Alumnae Association and the Board of Trustees of the Georgia State University Foundation. She created the Speakers Bureau for the Atlanta Dogwood Festival. She has served as Vice-President and Recording Secretary of the Young Matrons Circle for the Tallulah Falls School, an organization of young women supporting a school in North Georgia's mountains. In 1974-75 Carolyn served as the Second Vice-President for Membership.

She is presently on the Executive Board of The Fashion Group and its treasurer for 1976-78. She is a member of American Women in Radio and Television and a member of Eastern Airline's Management Council. She was Vice-President of the National Association of Media Women and was appointed by the Atlanta mayor to serve on the Atlanta Region Commission's Emergency Medical Service sub-committee. She also serves on the Air Transport Association Public Relations Committee and served on the ATA Airline Editors Association. In addition, Carolyn was a member of the Atlanta Chamber of Commerce International Council in 1972-74. She is a member of the Mortar Board Alumnae Association.

Carolyn was nominated for Atlanta Woman of the Year in business in 1965, the youngest person ever nominated. She is listed in "Outstanding Young Women in America" 1972-73, "Foremost Women in Communications" 1972, "25 Best Dressed Women in Atlanta" 1972, "Personalities in the South" 1973-74, "World Who's Who of Women" 1973-74, "Ten Leading Ladies of Atlanta" 1973-74, was the Brookwood Business and Professional Women's Club Woman of the Year for 1973. Her latest honor has been being named to "Who's Who of American Women" 1977.

Carolyn is married to Charles H. Wills who is in private law practice in Atlanta. He received the first Master of Laws Degree granted by Emory University and holds a Doctorate Degree from Emory as well as a Bachelor of Science Degree from the University of Kentucky. Chuck was Delta Zeta man of the year at Kentucky, and says the first thing that impressed him about his wife was that she was a Delta Zeta.

Delta Zeta is proud that our 1976 Woman of the Year has combined her professional accomplishments with continued interest in the activities of Delta Zeta.

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The plaque in the Phi Beta Kappa Memorial Hall at the College of William and Mary in Williamsburg lists the fifty members elected to Phi Beta Kappa during the first four years of the Society's history. At the top are the names of the five young men who organized the Society, and below these are listed the forty-five who joined their ranks before war-time emergency forced them to suspend Phi Beta Kappa activities in Virginia, according to the early Minutes, "in the sure and certain hope that the Fraternity will one day rise to life everlasting and Glory immortal."

On January 6, 1781 British troops were so near that a meeting was called "for the Purpose of Securing the Papers of the Society during the Confusion of the Times, and the present Dissolution which threatens the University." This, as it turned out, was the last meeting held by the Virginia Alpha for seventy years. The future of the Society would have been dim indeed if the Virginia members had not, in the preceding year, sent charters to the "universities of Cambridge and New Haven." The branch at Yale was formally organized on November 13, 1780, less than two months before the last meeting of the parent branch in Williamsburg.

The originator of the idea of Phi Beta Kappa and the Society's first president was John Heath, Jr., who was eighteen years old at the time, and a prize Greek scholar at the College of William and Mary. He is credited with forming the Greek phrase that gave the Society its name.

The first man to conceive of extending Phi Beta Kappa to colleges in other areas, as a means of binding together men of like mind at a critical time in the history of the young nation, was Samuel Hardy. Many years later William Short wrote of him, "He was a man of a most comprehensive mind, but as he was what was termed an irregular student, that is, not entitled to wear a cap and gown, he was not held in estimation by the pedantic and often thickheaded cap-and-gown students. I remember yet my surprise when he communicated to me his plan for extending branches of our Society to the different States. He expatiated on the great advantages that would attend it in binding together the several States.

"I happened at that time to be acquainted with a gentleman from the Eastward who was a private tutor in the family of one of my friends, and as I knew he then contemplated returning to his native state, I suggested to Mr. Hardy the propriety of bringing forward his plan before the society, so that the charter might be ready to be sent by this gentleman."

Elisha Parmele, the "gentleman from the Eastward," had studied at Yale but received his A.B. from Harvard in 1777, and in 1779 was tutoring in a Virginia family. Elected to Phi Beta Kappa in July of that year, he applied for a charter for Harvard on December 4, and five days later for a charter for Yale. These he carried north in 1780.

This bronze tablet included, in addition to the names of a Chief Justice and of an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, those of two members of the Continental Congress, five members of the U.S. Congress, two U.S. Senators, the first Librarian of Congress, eighteen men who served in the Virginia House of Delegates and three Virginia Senators.

SORORITY MATURES IN WAR YEARS

n the morning of December 7, 1941, the shocking attack on the U.S. Naval Base at Pearl Harbor killed many Americans in a two-hour air and submarine assault. The United States responded by entering into a full-scale commitment with our Allies in the European War which would not end until 1945.

fter World War II, Americans continued to suffer from a severe case of the jitters... the fear of Communism, the fear of subversion, the fear of another war, even the fear of annihilation from the H-bomb. The nation's concern about aggression was sharply realized on June 25, 1950 when a massive invasion force from North Korea rolled into South Korea. President Truman ordered military forces into Korea; the U.S. 7th Fleet was sent to protect Formosa; and for the second time in five years, the United States was at war.

hen Eisenhower was elected President in 1952, he declared that a Korean settlement should be one of his first tasks, and after seemingly endless negotiations, a ceasefire was arranged in July 1953. The Korean struggle had been a frustrating and costly era for the United States.

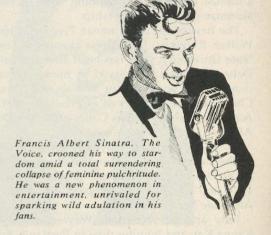
he great demand for labor during World War II drew millions of women into industry. By the end of the '50s, so many women workers continued to hold jobs, they composed more than a third of the country's labor force. With more working mothers, there developed a clear-cut change in the role of the male as wage earner and the female as homemaker. More and more husbands helped wash the dishes, put the children to bed and learned to cook. In the professions, women found new opportunities in many careers formerly open only to men.



As the war in Korea tapered off to a stalemate, Americans began closing their backyard bomb shelters and setting up barbecue pits. People settled down in front of their TV sets to watch GUNSMOKE, a type of detached violence they could better understand.



The woman of the '40s seemed never to go anywhere without a hat. Whether she was shopping in the daytime or attending the theater at night, she almost invariably had something on her head.



n this era, Delta Zeta proudly hailed such outstanding members as Ivy Baker Priest, Alpha Chi Chapter, who, among other outstanding honors, served as Treasurer of the United States from 1953 to 1961; Edith Head, Mu Chapter, who won Oscars for costume design from the National Academy of Motion Pictures in 1949, '50, '51, '52, '54 and '60; and lovely motion picture actress Gail Patrick, Alpha Pi Chapter, who served as Trustee of the Academy of Television, Arts and Sciences from 1959 to 1963 and as its national vice-president from 1960 to 1962.

y September 1957, more than three million veterans of World War II and Korea (many of them women and some of them Delta Zetas) had gone to college under the GI Bill. In general, the GIs were the most serious, mature and industrious students that had ever attended American colleges. The uncertainty of the future had its effect on the moral climate of the college campus as well as the country. Hope for the future — without blind illusion — became a more caustic attitude among collegians. The desire for fraternal ties deepened for thousands who entered college in the '50s, and by the end of the decade, Delta Zeta's collegiate chapters had grown to 128 with 175 alumnae chapters and approximately 39,000 members.

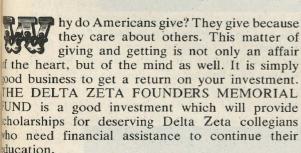

Teaching the Pre-Academic Child, by Mary Mott. Published by Charles C. Thomas. A review from Early Years magazine calls this book "for you if you happen to teach preschool children, or if you happen to teach deaf, hard of hearing, visually impaired, emotionally disturbed, mentally retarded or learning disabled children."

Since the author was Mary Parry Mott of Gamma Rho chapter at Northern Illinois University and so well written, your editor was of course very curious as to WHY this book was written as it somehow had an underlying subjective feeling. In answer to this question we have Mary's answer in her article. Her publisher is urging her to write her next book on the story of Alice.

In the early 1960's, knowledge of learning disabilities was not known to most teachers. When we discovered that our second daughter, Alice, was bright but having great difficulties with her school work, I began to correspond with authors of books or articles on the subject.

Although we live in an area where the academic level is high, the information was not yet locally available, nor was special help or understanding for Alice. Many, now well known authors, took time to answer my questions and provided me with some advice. Some of it was good, some not so good, but their advice was valuable to me in trying to help Alice.

We bought a larger house so she would not have to share a room with her sister two years older, nor with her sister ten years younger. We kept the room plain and free from distractions. We bought her a typewriter, a tape recorder and a "poor spellers dictionary" to help work with her fleeting memory. I also seriously considered not sending her to high school as we had been told by a physician in a well known university hospital that a trade school would probably be better due to the fact that she would probably level off academically. She wanted very much to go on to high school with her friends. My husband agreed with Alice and my Mother said to me, "Don't ever give Alice the chance to say to you that you didn't even let her try."

The turning point, I believe, began when Alice discovered a local park district drama club. She was motivated and determined to memorize play scripts. For the first two years of high school, I wrote each teacher describing her difficulties and they were very understanding, sometimes allowing her to take a test on a different day or under less distracting circumstances. The last two years of high school, Alice discussed her problems with her teachers herself. She graduated from high school with good average grades and the Drama award. She took her college entrance examinations in a room with only a few students and completed college with honors. While in graduate school, she earned membership in the honor society of Phi Kappa Phi.

I had been trained as a high school Home Economics teacher, but our first child Lynn was on the way when I graduated from Northern Illinois University, and I had never taught. When Alice was a high school junior, Lyn was in college and our bonus baby Grace was in first grade, so I decided to try substituting in the grade schools. While

substituting, I realized that I could spot a child with learning difficulties and began to question as to whether the child was receiving any help.

To my great pleasure, I discovered that many were, and many more teachers were now aware of learning difficulties. I met the Special Education Director who told me of seminars that I could attend and urged me to go back to school and take some special education courses.

Before I made that decision, he called and asked me to teach a class in a regular school consisting of pre-school physically handicapped children. He said it was a pilot class for the state and that because I had been a Home Economics major and had classes in child care and nutrition, I qualified to be a teacher of pre-school children.

I was very excited and very apprehensive about this venture, but took the step and have never been sorry. I was provided with a former nursery school teacher as an aide and a physical therapist and a speech therapist available.

There we were with nine physically handicapped children of normal intelligence and really didn't know just how to go about creating a program. I returned to school at nights for certification to teach the physically handicapped, and finally for a Master's Degree.

During the first few years, I kept a collection of activities that we did in the classroom, and later learned to analyze them according to modes of learning. Eventually I learned that many of the children in my classroom had learning difficulties and that I could not expect them all to learn just one way. Sometimes a child couldn't learn if I just talked to him, but needed a picture presented to him. Sometimes a child might not learn from a picture, but could learn from an experience or manipulated objects. There were many situations and it was a thrill when I found the way.

The book was my Master's project. It explains processing systems, hints for classroom management, sample weekly planning, a sample teacher-made diagnostic test, and my collection of activities. Each activity lists the teaching objective and is organized according to materials and methods of use. This is the book I wish I had possessed when I started teaching my class.

Of course, I was thrilled when Charles C. Thomas of Springfield accepted it for publication. I hope it is helping teachers and many pre-academic children whether handicapped or not.

I feel very humble about this whole list of events that has happened to me, all because I had a little girl-Alice.

Friends Help

"With a little help from my friends" are lyrics from a song popular with young people a few years back. Now it's the way Rosanne Coher, ΘZ , describes how she completed her college degree at Akron University in minimum time with a B average, even though a vision problem makes it impossible for her to read from books.

Deciding to go into food service management because she "cooks all the time anyway," Rosanne received help from those friends—including her mother, Eloise, and sister, Donna—when they read study assignments to her.

Merely hearing, rather than seeing, words, sentences and paragraphs makes comprehension difficult enough, but being tested on words seen only in the mind's eye is a different story. Again, that little bit of help was all that Rosanne required in her determined effort to become a food service professional.

"In some courses, the teacher would allow another student to read the test to me as he or she was doing it," Rosanne explained. "This way it didn't slow the person down because he had to read the test at that speed anyway, and I would have an equal chance at the questions along with the rest of the class. It was just up to me to listen carefully to understand the questions the first time around." On

other occasions, her teacher or an assistant would read the test to Rosanne.

For one course last fall, Dr. A. E. Misko's Personnel Practices, Rosanne listened to tapes of employment and personnel "situations," then responded with her answers.

However, the course Rosanne termed "most important" in her studies, Quantity Food Service, did not present any examination problems because the test of her ability as a cook and kitchen manager was in the actual preparation and serving of gourmet meals to more than 40 persons.

"Rosanne handled her responsibilities as a restaurant manager very well when she supervised her meal," explained Ron Usiewicz, food service instructor for the course. "Each week we have a different meal manager with the other students switching off in various positions as chef, salad chef, dessert chef, host or hostess and waiters and waitresses. The manager is responsible for the staff's performance, purchasing of the food and its preparation, and serving it in a restaurant atmosphere."

Food service students are not the only ones who benefit from the gourmet meals because the entire university is invited to the meals at a modest price. "This way we have a public to tell us what it liked and what it didn't." Usiewicz said.

As Manager of Medical Development Services for Schering Corporation, Dr. Sarah Ruth Norred, AII-Samford, is currently directing two research projects involving a group of orthopedic surgeons at various medical centers throughout the country. They are removing the hip joint in patients with severe arthritis and replacing it with an artificial joint made of metal and plastic.

The purpose of one project is to evaluate a particular acrylic plastic which is being used for the first time in this country as a bone cement to hold the two parts of the prothesis in place: the plastic socket in the hip and the metal ball with a stem in the leg bone. The second project is to study the use of an antibiotic in the bone cement to determine if a patient who has an infection in the hip can have it successfully treated and the joint replaced.

A Registered Pharmacist in the state of Florida, Sarah holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Pharmacy from Samford University and a Master of Science degree in Pharmacology from the University of Florida. She completed predoctoral studies at the Medical College of Alabama, Birmingham, and majoring in both pharmacology and biochemistry received her Doctor of Pharmacy degree from the University after she had served as Assistant Professor of Pharmacy at Samford University, and Graduate Assistant, then Hospital Pharmacist at the University of Florida Infirmary at Gainesville.

In 1954 Sarah's first assignment at Schering was that of Medical Advertising Copywriter. (As an undergraduate she had served as associate editor of the pharmacy magazine.) From this she advanced to Medical Education Coordinator acting as liaison between professional film producers and participants on technical films used to teach physicians. She wrote the scripts and, after studying film production at New York University, she filmed highlights of the American Medical Association technical exhibits for five years. Following this, Sarah advanced to Medical Education Manager and then Associate Director of Medical Education before assuming her current position.

A member of the American Pharmaceutical and American Medical Writer's Associations, Sarah has been elected to membership in Kappa Epsilon, the national women's professional pharmaceutical society which she serves as national publicity chairman, Rho Chi, pharmacy honorary, Alpha Epsilon Delta, premedical honorary, and Gamma Sigma Epsilon, chemistry honorary. For the Federation International Pharmaceutique she has been a delegate to the 1958 meeting in Brussels, moderated a career panel at the national convention, installed chapters at the University of Mississippi and Georgetown University, and been elected a delegate to the Pan American Pharmaceutical Congress in Washington, D.C.

A member of the Bloomfield, N.J. Presbyterian Church Choir, Sarah has just completed a documentary film on the life of composer Charles Ives who was organist at the church in 1899. The film is being shown periodically on educational TV during the American Bicentennial.

Because Schering is an international company, Sarah continues learning French and German. The bone cement with which she is working is manufactured in Germany and most of the original publications concerning it are written in German. She uses a short wave radio to hear the "Voice of Germany" (Deutsche Welle) broadcasts from Cologne to improve her speech. She also reads the German weekly magazines, Stern, and Der Spiegel, to improve her reading ability.



Josephine Lawless Reed, BN — Miami, and Esther Cassity Reid, $\Gamma\Gamma$ — Missouri Valley were both chosen by their chapters of Beta Sigma Phi in Marshall, Missouri, as their candidates for Woman-of-the-Year. Both have been active in community affairs and have served Delta Zeta in several capacities.

Seletha Brown-Historian

Seletha Marrs Brown, $B\Sigma$ -Colorado, would be a very appropriate speaker in honor of the nation's Bicentennial and International Women's Year. She has successfully combined being a writer of history, a teacher, a wife and a mother.

An extensive newspaper article revealed much about Seletha. She is a member of the Colorado Press Women, the Colorado Authors' League, the Longmont Writers' Club, the Bicentennial-Centennial Committee for the Colorado Council of Churches, chairman of the State PEO History Committee, National Librarian for League of American Pen Women, and a charter member of the State Home Economics Association.

Her "hobby of scribbling" and lifelong interest in people resulted in her publishing three books about local history, numerous magazine articles, and byline stories in area papers.

One of her books, *They Came To Stay*, was published by the St. Vrain Historical Society for Longmont's centennial celebration. As editor and chief author, she headed a project which took eighteen months. Despite the pressure to meet the centennial date, it was included in the National Library of the DAR—a testimony to its historical accuracy. The St. Vrain Historical Society formally honored

her in 1972 for her work.

Another book, used widely in local schools and now in its third edition, is *Rivalry at the River*, an account of life in the area during the 1830's. The third book, *Servants in the Service of Men*, covers the history of Longmont's Congregational Church. This book took one year to compile.

Her travel to Africa, Europe and trips around the United States are background for travel articles she has published. Her articles and stories have appeared in Home; Christian Science Monitor; Highlights, a children's magazine; and a variety of church magazines and local newspapers.

Explaining her love of history, she said, "I came from a large family of pioneers that visited back and forth. I can still remember listening to the folktales." While raising her children—"In those days, women didn't work unless they had to"—she still found time for her "hobbies." She was honored in 1970 as a nominee for State Mother of Colorado.

These hobbies have given her and her community a rewarding written history that might have just faded away with the passing of time. (Excerpted from a story by Margaret Coel for *The Daily Camera*).

The many Delta Zetas who have carried *The Delta Zeta Creed* in their memories and hearts, as an inspiration and a life pattern, will feel a personal loss upon learning of the death of Dorothy Mumford Williams, who gave this Creed to her sorority.

Dorothy was a member of Alpha Zeta chapter, at Adelphi, class of 1929; and had her M.A. from the University of North Carolina, was for a time on the English faculty of Adelphi College.

From high school days on through her whole life, her gift for using words to express her ideals and vision of the beauty of nature, was the most natural outlet for her deep sense of beauty and poetry. She had had many poems published, especially in Journals of the Friends Society of which she and her family were lifelong workers. In later life she discovered a talent for painting, and this added outlet for her artistic and idealistic gifts has left many pieces of artistic distinction. In her enthusiasm for life and the elements that make it rich, she was active in the local Historical Society, a docent of the Hyde Art Collection of Glenns Falls.

Dorothy and her husband Waldo, created a home of unusual happiness and achievement, and their five children were the living evidence. To Waldo, and to the children, Kay Felt, Carol Hartman, Jesse, Christopher and Jon, all Delta Zetas will extend loving sympathy, but equally loving gratitude for what Dorothy Williams has given to many thousands of Delta Zeta sisters, in whose lives her words live on.

We are reprinting some of her poems from previous Lamps. Dorothy served Delta Zeta as Ritual chairman and Province Collegiate Director. At the National Council meeting in Cincinnati in 1939, Dorothy presented her creed written especially for Delta Zeta, Delta Zeta Creed

To the world,

To those whom my life may touch in slight measure,

May I give graciously Of what is mine;

To my friends, Understanding and appreciation;

which was immediately accepted and is now an integral part of all Delta Zeta literature. It was reproduced as you see on this page, in color in two sizes, as a bookmark and the larger suitable for framing. These were introduced decades ago and are still available at National Headquarters.

The poem "If There Should not be Love" was written especially at the request of Florence Hood, then Alumnae Vice-President, to be read at State Days. The quotation from Dorothy in a 1940 Lamp could well be written about her: "Life is a Lamp flaming in the darkness before dawn."
