MARINE VETERAN FINDS FRIENDSHIP IN THE IOTA CHAPTER



LEADERSHIP - 1902

Delta Zeta's Founders were leaders ahead of their time.

Among the first 70 female full-time students ever to attend Miami University in Oxford, Ohio were six women who would found the first sorority at Miami University—Delta Zeta: Julia Bishop, Anne Simmons, Anna Keen, Alfa Lloyd, Mary Collins, and Mabelle Minton. Miami was chartered as a school for men only in 1809. With the enactment by the General Assembly of a bill authorizing Miami and Ohio universities to establish new divisions for the professional preparation of teachers, 70 women had enrolled at Miami in the fall of 1902.¹

Imagine, if you can, the trepidation with which these young women entered Miami's halls of learning, finding their way to their dorms, making friends (Julia's roommate was Anne Simmons, and the two became fast friends), learning the routine of classes and studies, and taking part in the social and athletic life at the university.

Not only were the Founders leaders on their campus (some were members of Miami's first women's basketball team), but their leadership extended to the Greek world when they came together to found Delta Zeta Sorority. Despite setbacks and discouragement, these women refused to give up their dream of a social sorority that would "unite its members in the bonds of sincere and lasting friendship, to promote the moral and social culture of its members, and to develop plans for guidance and unity in action; objects worthy of the highest aim and purpose of associated effort."² of our members who live the Delta Zeta experience. Through Leadership Academies for our alumnae and collegiate members to Standards programming that draws upon the founding values of the Sorority and applies them in today's world, Delta Zeta is the embodiment of our Founders' vision—a living, breathing entity made up of the women who are her members—all of whom are leaders or potential leaders.

It is these last words, "to develop plans for guidance and unity in action; objects worthy of the highest aim and purpose of associated effort," that demonstrate the vision of the Founders, for in these words they are defining the ultimate meaning of leadership. In a world where women still could not vote and were just beginning to venture outside the home, it is amazing that six college-age women in 1902 had the foresight to recognize the foundation of true leadership from a global perspective, which they incorporated into Delta Zeta's *Constitution*.

LEADERSHIP – 2007

Today's leaders must be multifaceted individuals with the knowledge, skills, motivation, and charisma to make positive changes and to inspire others to do the same. Delta Zeta recognizes the importance of leadership—and not just any leadership style, but leadership born of a love of the Sorority that carries through to caring and nurturing Delta Zeta members and potential leaders who take that leadership into the Sorority and beyond.

It is in this vein that Delta Zeta is advancing to excel as the premier sorority for leadership development. Insightful leadership not only makes Delta Zeta a leader in the Greek world, but it enriches the lives

The Alumnae Leadership Academy

In November of 2007, Delta Zeta brought a premier training and education program to its alumnae volunteers. A training weekend in Dallas, Texas for Area Alumnae Directors (AADs) and their Area Teams and for the Regional Collegiate Coordinators (RCCs) included an energetic presentation by Steve Dealph, Leadership Development Consultant. Steve, the former director of leadership education for the North-American Interfraternity Conference (NIC), has also served as the associate director for Greek affairs at Northwestern University and on the executive board of both the Association of Fraternity Advisers and the Mid-American Greek Council Association.

The sessions provided a new, exciting approach to leadership for Delta Zeta as volunteers examined the power of their own energy, born from their love of Delta Zeta, to encourage and excite the members they support. As each member understands her importance to the Sorority and that she *is* the value within the organization, Delta Zeta is better and stronger for that realization, enabling our leaders and our Sorority to make a difference in women's lives and the world community.

Collegiate Members Lead the Way

In February of 2008, Delta Zeta will bring its collegiate leaders together for another exciting Leadership Academy. Collegiate officers will be exposed to new ideas about leadership and learn how their values, nurtured in Delta Zeta, will inspire their chapters' members to commit to and pursue goals that will result in individual and collective success.

Delta Zeta Values in Action

The 2007 Norma Minch Andrisek Leadership Conference, held at Purdue University on June 22-24, is another example in which Delta Zeta Sorority continues to cultivate inspired leadership. The conference focused on putting "Delta Zeta Values in Action," a theme that goes to the heart of what Delta Zeta stands for: justice, courage, generosity, growth, and compassion. All leaders have many strengths that, when in the right combination, produce something spectacular. The conference and its team of talented and dynamic faculty and speakers motivated Delta Zetas of all ages to put these values into action in their chapters and in their lives. Overall, the conference sessions and activities provided Delta Zetas with the ingredients that make great leaders.

A Recipe for Leading with Values – Key Moments from the 2007 Norma Minch Andrisek Leadership Conference

Start with a base of strong Delta Zeta values.

The values enumerated in the Creed are the foundation any potential leader can use to become a great leader. Keynote speaker Mari Ann Callais, National President of Theta Phi Alpha, inspired conferencegoers with her vivacious program, "From Ritual to Reality," on incorporating values and ritual into chapter members' everyday lives, as well as encouraging Delta Zetas to live up to the responsibilities that come with being a member of the Greek community.

Pour in service and philanthropy.

An outstanding leader gives back to her sisters, her peers, and her community. Service is an integral part of Delta Zeta and has been since the Sorority's founding. Participants learned about not only laying the groundwork to fundraise for philanthropies, but on promoting, providing and encouraging service within local communities to improve the world outside of the campus "bubble."

3. Add inspiration, empowerment, and motivation.

Any potential leader will fail without the essential ingredients of inspiration, empowerment, and motivation. In order to inspire others, a leader must motivate and empower. Sessions focused on how to inspire chapter members by living the Delta Zeta Creed as a leader, as well as developing strategies to motivate apathetic members. One session also dealt specifically with the power that women hold, and how that power can not only empower us, but those around us.

Stir in knowledge and planning.

Knowledge and planning may not be the most glamorous ingredients on the list, but without them the leadership recipe falls flat. "Planning to Succeed" focused on devoting resources to retreats and other programs to help facilitate officer transitions, goal setting, and chapter communication. The session was a great venue for Delta Zeta leaders from all over to come together and share practical ideas about what makes their chapter successful. Leaders also need to expand their knowledge through scholarship and learning by taking advantage of the rich academic environment of the college campus.

5. Sprinkle with conflict resolution and communication skills.

Being a leader means working with other people who often have different ideas and opinions than you. Working with such a variety of people demands adept and positive communication skills, especially when a leader needs to confront, resolve conflict or delegate tasks.

6. Mix ingredients well.

The Delta Zeta collegiate leaders who attended the conference were challenged to take what they learned and put it into the mix of their individual chapters. The closing session, "Taking It Home," discussed ways to integrate the new knowledge acquired into existing chapter operations as well as how to start new chapter programs and generate excitement for them.

7. Bake until done . . . and share!

In order for today's leaders in Delta Zeta to make a difference in today's college chapter and in tomorrow's world, they must incorporate Delta Zeta values into their leadership skills now. Only in this way can they inspire members, ensure chapter success, exemplify leadership on their campuses, give to their communities, and make a difference for tomorrow's world. The Norma Minch Andrisek Leadership Conference gave them the tools and knowledge to implement these values into their everyday lives while strengthening their leadership style.

By taking these innovative approaches to cultivating and inspiring leaders, Delta Zeta Sorority is ensuring that today's sorority leader is the catalyst to transform chapters from average to truly great. This is the leader who will make a difference in Delta Zeta. This is the leader who will make a difference in the world.

Shelley Levine Berkley $I\Phi$ '70 (University of Nevada/Las Vegas); (D-NV) is currently in her fifth term as a Member of the U.S. House of Representatives. She works to increase access to affordable, highquality health care for America's families; encourages the development of alternative energy sources; and to provide the resources needed to meet the needs of U.S. veterans and military families. She was Delta Zeta's 1991 Woman of the Year.



Jean Haley Harper Y '74, (University of North Dakota) was one of the first women airline captains for United Airlines, She is a contributor to Chicken Soup for the Women's Soul and a public speaker and was the 1998 Woman of the Year.



Edith Head* M '60, attended the University of California/Berkeley and was the first female head of a movie studio costume design department, a winner of eight Academy Awards for costume design including The Sting with Paul Newman and Robert Redford, and was also named one of ten outstanding Greeks during the 1976 Bicentennial. Edith Head was Delta Zeta's Woman of the Year in 1968.



Crown Princess Martha of Norway* Y. became an initiated alumna member of Delta Zeta in 1939 after visiting North Dakota University and becoming interested in the role the sorority played in the lives of college women. During World War II, she led the Delta Zeta's Foreign Friendships service program to aid her country's children.







Senator Jane Gray Nelson IY '70 (University of Texas/Arlington); (R-TX) was made Governor for a Day in 2004 in the state of Texas and has served as President Pro Tempore of the Texas Senate. She actively lobbies for domestic violence laws and successfully put a cap on non-economic

The Delta Zeta Woman of the Year Award recognizes a Delta Zeta who has achieved national recognition in her professional or volunteer work. The recipient receives the Gail Patrick honorarium of \$5,000, which provides undergraduate and graduate scholarships for qualified Delta Zeta members and a Woman of Distinction honorarium for the Delta Zeta Woman of the Year, the Sorority's highest honor.

Jane is a highly successful professional speaker, consultant, and author, with more than 20 years of experience in the field of customer service and retention. She is the author of two acclaimed self-help books, *Getting Unstuck* and *Why Women Worry*, and has appeared as a guest on over 200 radio and television programs, including *Regis and Kathie Lee*, *The Home Show* with Gary Collins, and Dr. Robert Schuller's Hour of Power.

Her work has been the subject of articles in prestigious publications such as *Business Week*, *Money Magazine*, *Ladies Home Journal*, and *USA Today*.

Jane was elected to serve on the Board of Directors of the National Speaker's Association, and holds the CPAE (Council of Peers Award of Excellence) and the CSP (Certified Speaking Professional) titles from NSA. She was also inducted into the NSA Speaker's Hall of Fame in 1992. She produced a movie for National Public Television entitled *For the Love of Learning*, which explored the challenges of racially integrating public school systems and looked at how to individualize instruction for students of all academic levels.

She received a degree in theater from Lenoir-Rhyne College located in Hickory, North Carolina in 1967. Jane was initiated into the Zeta Xi Chapter at Lenoir-Rhyne in 1965. As an undergraduate member of Zeta Xi, she wrote a poem entitled *I am a Delta Zeta, I Belong*, which was later published in the Sorority's national magazine, *The LAMP*. In 1964, she was Miss Winston-Salem. Later, she received her master's degree in communication from Wake Forest University.

Drawing on her impressive background in the business field, Jane has inspired thousands with her dynamic seminars on customer service, client retention, leadership, and employee empowerment. She owned her Dallas-based marketing research company and reported on face-to-face encounters with more than half a million customer-contact employees. Her impressive list of clients includes various Fortune 500 companies such as Verizon, American Airlines, AT&T, State Farm, and Bristol Myers Squibb, among others.



In addition to her successful career, Jane finds time to use her public speaking and business savvy skills to give back to her community. She served as a volunteer and keynote speaker for the Alzheimer's Association's Remembrance Day, as a member of the Planning Committee for the Memory Walk, and as the Communication Chairman for the Department of Human Services for the state of Texas.

Strategic Planning Initiative for the 2006-2008 Biennium by Karly K. Burns ZA, Past National President

The Strategic Planning Initiative had its beginnings at the 47th National Convention in June 2006. The Convention delegates approved the biennial budget with monies allocated for conducting a Strategic Plan during the biennium. The following August, the National Council approved the formation of the Strategic Planning Committee with Karly K. Burns $Z\Lambda$, Past National President, as Chairman. National Council recognized that strategic planning would bring precision, yet simplicity, to all operations for the Sorority, identify Delta Zeta's strengths, and establish commitment at all levels of membership.

The Natonal Council then started a search for the ideal facilitator for this project. The Sorority hired Karyn Nishimura-Sneath, an educator and consultant with over 20 years of experience, and CEO of Npower, a leadership consulting organization which guides facilitators, strategists, consultants, and speakers throughout the strategic planning process. Karyn conducted focus studies with various segments of Delta Zeta membership, including College Chapter Directors at the February 2007 CCD Conference, Regional Collegiate Coordinators, Alumnae Leadership team members, Foundation Trustees, and Delta Zetas serving as Greek advisors. In addition, focus group discussions were held at Indiana and Ohio Region events. The focus studies provided critical feedback which was given to the committee for use in its discussions and planning during the strategic planning process.

In putting the Committee together, we looked for members who are deeply committed to the well-being of Delta Zeta, have a wide variety of Sorority experience, and represent different chapter sizes and varying geographic areas.

The Committee met at National Headquarters in Oxford, Ohio in July and again in September of 2007. Comprehensive discussions were held on what comprises an excellent Delta Zeta experience, trends affecting associations, trends in higher education, trends in young women's development, and all the feedback from our alumnae and collegiate members.

The meetings resulted in developing a Mission Statement which is our reason for being; a Vision Statement which describes our ideal future, and six Key Result Areas. The Strategic Plan is designed to guide Delta Zeta for the next five years and will take that time to implement all facets of the Plan.

In October 2007, the Strategic Plan was presented to the National Council, which enthusiastically adopted the recommendations.

The Committee is honored to have assisted in charting a future for Delta Zeta which is meaningful and relevant to each of our members.

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The Painted Turtle Volunteer Spotlight

"I really didn't believe there was a place this amazing and I just had to see it!" Volunteer Jenna Arcari ΞH surely echoes many children's sentiments about The Painted Turtle camp.

Delta Zeta's philanthropic partnership with The Painted Turtle camp was announced at the 47th National Convention, Joining Delta Zeta's other national philanthropy, speech and hearing, the camp is a wonderful addition to the Sorority's already diligent philanthropic efforts. Delta Zeta's hands-on work with the children of the Painted Turtle illustrates the Sorority's dedication to service and the vital role that philanthropy plays in Delta Zeta tradition.

The Painted Turtle is an innovative medical specialty camp and family care center for children with chronic and lifethreatening illnesses. Campers and their families are given this incredible opportunity free of charge because of generous contributions from organizations such as Delta Zeta. The camp, which is a part of actor Paul Newman's Association of Hole in the Wall Camps, is considered to be one of the finest multi-disease medical camps and family care centers in the world. Delta Zeta is proud to be a part of an organization that makes such a difference in the world, and is also proud of the Delta Zetas who volunteer their time and energy at the camp to change children's lives for the better!



JENNA ARCARI, a member of the Xi Eta Chapter at Northwood University, overcame her fear of flying just to spend a week with the kids at The Painted Turtle. "I knew in my heart that I wanted to be there, so I got on the plane by myself to do this," she said.

Jenna volunteered during the Liver Transplant session from July 5 - 11, 2007. Her main job was to make sure her campers, little boys ages 7-10, had the best week of their lives. She kept the boys busy with a wide variety of activities such as swimming, dancing, horseback riding, basketball, fishing, canoeing, and arts and crafts.

She recalls that one of her most rewarding moments at camp was helping one of her campers conquer his fear of swimming. "He confided in me that he had a fear of swimming. The day we went to the pool he was hesitant to even go near the water. I decided to sit with him until he was comfortable, and by the end of the swimming session, he was in the water. It was such an inspiring moment!"

JADE PALAZZOLA EA (Concord University) had an extended stay at The Painted Turtle; she worked as a summer employee from June until August. She was the Entertainment Assistant and was in charge of planning and carrying out the evening activities for the camp. Each day, lade would plan evening activities, like a campfire or carnival party, while spending as much time as she could with the campers.

Jade admitted that while one of the most challenging aspects of camp was hearing about pain and suffering that the campers had to endure on a daily basis, the way the children related to each other was uplifting. "Everyone understood everyone else's pains and pills, and it was in this sense that the campers' illnesses made them normal here," she said.

She credits Delta Zeta for allowing the children to have a week to feel like normal kids. "Delta Zeta is part of what makes it possible for these campers to come to camp at no expense to their families," she said. "The camp provides these children with the opportunity of a lifetime!"

The National Panhellenic Conference (www.npcwomen.org) has partnered with Merck & Co. to build disease awareness of HPV and its link to cervical cancer. Maybe you've seen the TV ads that encourage people to "Tell someone," in which women are spreading the word about the virus and its possible connection with cancer. This is the campaign NPC is helping to promote.

In September, all College Panhellenics, Alumnae Panhellenics and advisors received a "Tell a sister" kit full of brochures and post cards to distribute to the Panhellenic chapters on campus—in other words, to "tell someone."

In 2006, the first year of NPC's partnership with Merck, these materials made a huge hit and continue to create quite the talk on campuses.

Cervical cancer is caused by certain types of a common virus called human papillomavirus (HPV). For most women, HPV clears on its own. But for some, cervical cancer can develop. It can be devastating to you or the people you care about.

That's why Pap tests are so important. A Pap test looks for abnormal cells in the lining of the cervix before they have a chance to become precancers or cervical cancer.

While some HPV infections may lead to cervical cancer, other types of HPV can have different consequences, such as genital warts.

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FLORENCE HOOD MINER AB '27, NATIONAL HISTORIAN EMERITUS

Uluminating Delta Zeta History

The National Council of Delta Zeta announced in August 2007 that Florence Hood Miner AB '27 (University of Illinois), Delta Zeta's National Historian since 1981, was named National Historian Emeritus. In light of this honor, it is fitting to look back at this extraordinary woman's own history, and the considerable time and talent she has devoted to her Sorority.

Mrs. Miner, affectionately and fittingly nicknamed the "Living Legend," has witnessed Delta Zeta's progress and metamorphosis over an impressive span of some 80 years. Through her involvement with Delta Zeta, the Sorority gained an invaluable sense of history, benefited from her professional talents, and through her generosity and wisdom has reinforced its future.

Mrs. Miner was initiated into the Alpha Beta Chapter at the University of Illinois in 1927, although her parents wanted her to go to the local junior college. At the last minute her parents were persuaded by a friend's family to allow her to attend the university and she enrolled that fall. She quickly forged a friendship with two Delta Zetas in her gym class and was introduced to the rest of the sisters in the house. The women invited her to informally rush and Mrs. Miner was initiated into the Sorority that spring. She later became Social Chairman and was responsible for planning the dances that were so popular among all the students.

"I can remember going to classes in a silk dress and high-heeled shoes. Imagine walking along the campus in high-heeled shoes and a hat!" Mrs. Miner reminisced in an oral history for the University of Illinois years later.

During her sophomore year, Mrs. Miner took a position on the staff of her school newspaper, the *Daily Illini*. It was in this position that she developed her passion for journalism and fashion that would later be valuable in her career endeavors and to Delta Zeta Sorority. Subjects that fell under Mrs. Miner's jurisdiction as the women's editor included society and church news, women's activities, and fashion. She quickly made a name for herself around campus with her spirited, coquettish pieces. Mrs. Miner thought of one such piece after realizing how many attractive men that the university seemed to draw. She constructed a questionnaire for all the sororities to fill out that asked who their dream man was, who was the most handsome man on campus, etc. and published the results to the delight (and some disappointment) of the university's men.

After earning her Bachelor of Science degree in journalism, Mrs. Miner began her long and successful professional career. She followed her love of fashion and worked as a fashion coordinator and buyer at Saks 5th Avenue in Detroit. She also taught fashion classes at Wayne State University in Detroit and spent over 30 years writing for the Nevada, Iowa *Evening Journal*. Mrs. Miner expanded the small *Evening Journal*, adding a bridge column and food column to her original feature, a society news column.



Mrs. Miner has also devoted her considerable professional talents to Delta Zeta Sorority. She wrote a history book celebrating Delta Zeta's 80-year anniversary entitled *Delta Zeta Sorority, 1902-1982.* During Mrs. Miner's time as Editor of *The LAMP* from 1936 -1940 and again from 1969 -1981, she oversaw the publication in a period of

change and modernization. In light of continuously rising costs of publication, she implemented innovative ideas such as using less expensive grades of paper, updating the printing and reproduction techniques, and transitioning from a heavy cover to a wrap-around eight page format. Readers enjoyed Mrs. Miner's own column, "The Lampost," a regular feature that always provided entertainment and interesting facts about Delta Zeta, its members, and its history. Mrs. Miner is also a Past National Officer.

One of her most interesting positions in Delta Zeta was as the Editor of the Delta Zeta convention newsletter, *The Lampkin*, long before the days of computer technology. In Delta Zeta's 1982 *History*, Mrs. Miner wrote, "Since 1924 each convention has enjoyed a newsy on-the-spot publication handed out to the delegates and visitors, and mailed on request. In 1928, the *Conventioneer* [as the newsletter was then called], had to go by boat to the mainland from the rustic setting of Bigwin Inn. [The convention was held at Lake-of-Bays, Canada that year.] Two of its volunteers were Gertrude Houk Fariss [future National President] and Florence Hood who toiled all hours to meet the early morning boat. (There had to be a moral here someplace, they both agreed, as subsequent years of still toiling for the lodge attest.)"

Mrs. Miner is not only an important figure in Delta Zeta's past, but also an inspiring contributor to its future. She is a well-known figure at Delta Zeta conventions and proudly holds the record for most conventions ever attended, where she is known for her "Fireside Chats," stories and intimate conversations told in the presence of rapt collegians and alumnae alike.

Today Mrs. Miner lives in Castle Rock, Colorado with her daughter, Juliet Miner I (University of Iowa). Mrs. Miner's grand-daughter, Stephanie Miner BK '03, past President of the Beta Kappa Chapter, is finishing her engineering degree at Iowa State University.

With the Florence Hood Miner Standards Programming Fund, she established an endowment to embellish and upgrade continuing educational programs and for seed money to develop new programs for collegians. She is also the namesake of the Florence Hood Miner Award, given annually to Delta Zeta members who are in their junior year and have made significant contributions to their college chapter and Delta Zeta through outstanding leadership on campus while maintaining a good academic record. Her generosity reflects her commitment to advancing Delta Zeta's values and furthering its purpose.

Florence Hood Miner is truly an enduring link from Delta Zeta's rich past to its promising future. Through her own impressive history, Mrs. Miner will continue to leave her mark on Delta Zeta for years to come.




