Love . . . The Spirit of Delta Zeta

The Sunshine State stretched welcoming arms to 500 alumnae and collegians as delegates from 48 states reached the 1,000 acre resort near Tarpon Springs called Innisbrook.

Located on wooded rolling hills, Innisbrook is composed of a multitude of lodges and a convention center, and offers 63 holes of championship golf courses, 17 tennis courts, 5 swimming pools and a variety of other recreational activities. Trams provide constant transportation.

Florida flora including hibiscus, azaleas, citrus groves and pine trees hanging with Spanish moss were everywhere. Nature loving delegates observed peacocks, mallards, trout, turtles, lizards and squirrels. 'Twas also rumored alligators were around, but no one saw any. Did anyone look?

THE SPIRIT OF DELTA ZETA

LOVE . . . The Spirit of Delta Zeta, the *intangible* theme for this, the 38th National Convention, became most *tangible* during the five long days and short nights at Innisbrook. The pale green convention program, which at all previous conventions has been known simply as the *program* soon became known as *The Love Book*.

And thus our convention story begins.

JUNE 25, 1987. LOVE REJOICES.

Convention formally opened with the processional of National Council and Past National Council members. Each officer and her escort were introduced by Merry Westbrook Adamcik, Houston-ΔΘ, Province Collegiate Director for XVII-South.

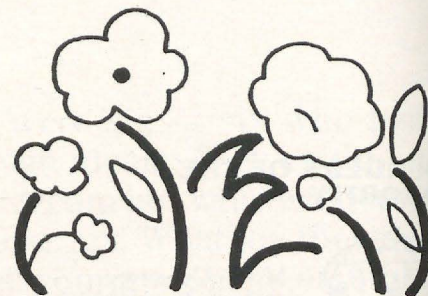
Presiding at the opening banquet was National President Mary Margaret Calhoun Fore, SMU-AΨ. She

introduced special guests and the keynote speaker, the Honorable Beverly Baldwin Burnsed, Florida State University-AΣ. A member of the Florida State Legislature since 1975, Bev is a former national officer and was 1985 Woman of the Year.

Beverly spoke on the convention theme, *Love . . . The Spirit of Delta Zeta*. She cited humorous examples and personal experiences and then asked thought-provoking questions. One such was "I'll bet there's one of you out there who lost your luggage and the love and spirit of Delta Zeta came to your rescue." And of course, the answer was "yes."

Two awards were given at the opening banquet. One, the Alice Huenefeld award for outstanding college chapter director was presented to Louise Parker Bingham, Northwestern Oklahoma State-ΔO, CCD at Stephen F. Austin-ZΨ.

Nebraska Wesleyan University-BT, who "retired" the Genevieve Schmitt Memorial Plaque for top scholarship



at the 1985 Convention, received the plaque again to make it the fourth consecutive convention for the honor.

A reception for National Council and Past National Officers concluded the evening.

JUNE 26, 1987. LOVE GIVES.

The Founders Memorial Foundation breakfast with Foundation President Arlene Newman Marshall, Houston-ΔΘ presiding, opened Friday activities. Gallaudet Vice President Louis Markwith and the Gallaudet dancers highlighted the breakfast which also included Foundation awards and scholarships. A complete story will follow in the winter issue of *The LAMP*.

The first business session opened with the introduction and seating of collegiate and alumnae chapters char-

tered during the biennium. Collegiate chapters officially seated were Clarkson University-EP; East Tennessee State University-ΔH; Eureka College-II; University of Georgia-ZII; Loyola Marymount University-ΞO; University of Oregon-Ω and Temple University-ΔT.

Officially seated were alumnae representatives from Metro Boston (Massachusetts), Tyler Area (Texas), Southeast Wisconsin, Northern Kentucky and Eastern Illinois.

Fifteen other alumnae chapters were chartered during the last biennium. These include Greater Pensacola Area (Florida), Youngstown (Ohio), Platinum Coast (Florida), Tri Cities (Tennessee), Augusta (Georgia), Central Arkansas, Ruston (Louisiana), Arkansas River Valley, North Central Indianapolis (Indiana), Columbia (South Carolina), Palm Beach Area (Florida), Stephenville (Texas), East Texas, Chicago North Shore, Chicago Northwest Suburban and Chicago Loop.

MUSEUM LUNCHEON

The National Historical Museum luncheon with Board of Trustees President Elizabeth Baker Devereaux, Ohio State University-Θ presiding carried a theme of "Memories" with a quote, "Butterflies, like memories, are beautiful and fragile."

The Heritage Cup was presented to Texas A & M University-ΞΑ and Tulsa (Oklahoma) alumnae chapter.

President Emeritus Lucile Crowell Cooks, Miami-A, then revealed a well-kept secret. The Maltby House adjacent to the Museum in Oxford has been purchased for expansion purposes. The house, which was built around 1852 for the Rev. Henry Maltby, is Oxford's finest example of a Greek Revival residence. It is listed on the National Register of Historical Places.

National Historian Florence Hood Miner, Illinois-AB, described convention history through fashion at the luncheon. Memories from past conventions, dating as far back as 1910, came alive as 38 collegians and alumnae modeled formal, casual and meeting attire from a sorority collection acquired across the miles and through the years.

WORKSHOPS

Afternoon workshops included the *Delta Zeta Image* by Beverly Burnsed. Collegiate delegates could select from *philanthropy, activities-enrichment-social, sorority education and ways and means*.

College Chapter Directors benefited from a new CCD/PCD workshop on *audits, budgets and finances*. *Effective Use of Power* was the topic discussed by Dr. J. R. Andrisek. Province Collegiate Directors and College Chapter Directors also selected among *judicial procedures, relationship statements and academics*.

Province Alumnae Directors and alumnae workshops were geared to *relationship statements, ways and means, philanthropy and alumnae membership/programs*. Certificate presentations were also made.

All delegates attended a Financial Seminar conducted by National Treasurer Patricia Canady Rosser, Georgia Southern-IN and representatives of Coopers & Lybrand.

UNDER THE BIG TOP

"ΔZ . . . The Greatest Show on Earth" was the theme of the awards banquet with National Secretary Phyllis Snape Favorite, Cincinnati-Ξ presiding. It featured a bright green and white striped big top tent with ceramic clown faces and colored helium balloons festively rising from the center of each table.

Scores of chapters received silver

and certificates. Winners from thousands of miles apart became friends while patiently waiting to have pictures made.

JUNE 27. LOVE IS JOY . . .

House Corporation meetings, music and parliamentary pointer sessions preceded the call to order by National President Mary Margaret Fore for the morning business session. A buffet luncheon was served at noon and the polls opened for the election of National Council.

It was a free afternoon for the delegates and special trams took many to the beach. Others visited the Greek sponge market village of Tarpon Springs where they watched sponge divers at work or browsed through quiet streets lined with shops displaying lace, shells, collectibles and piles of sponges.

BEACH MOVES INDOORS

The evening beach party with Cynthia L. Winslow, Miami-A and Carol Carson Konet, Baldwin Wallace-ΓΑ presiding, lost no enthusiasm as it was moved indoors because of threatening weather. Innisbrook's Harstan Hall was appropriately decorated as Cinnamon Bay of Orlando entertained convention goers with beach music, good times and nostalgic tunes. JUNE 28.

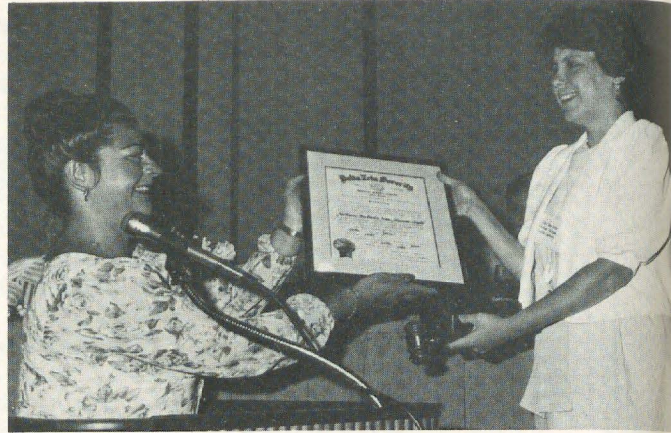
LOVE NEVER FAILS.

Sunday's workshops included seminars on *ethics* and *rush* by Indiana State Senator Edward Pease, Pi Kappa Alpha fraternity. College chapter delegates attended workshops on *legal liabilities*, *judicial procedures*, *newsletters*, *controlled substances* and *history*. Senator Pease led a seminar on *role of the chapter advisor* for CCDs and the *New CCD/PCD* workshop followed. Selections among *references*, *history*, *rush/how to*, *philanthropy* and *ways and means* were offered the CCDs.

Province Collegiate Directors also attended the Ed Pease seminars and then selected between *legal liabilities* and *philanthropy*. Newcomers attended the *New CCD/PCD* workshop.

Province Alumnae Directors and alumnae delegates heard from Past National President Norma Andrisek on *extension* and Ed Pease on *the role of the chapter advisor*. Other topics offered included *NH services*, *ways*

STEPS TO THE GOLDEN LAMP

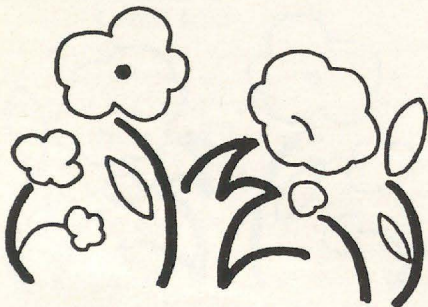

JUNE 29. LOVE ONE ANOTHER.

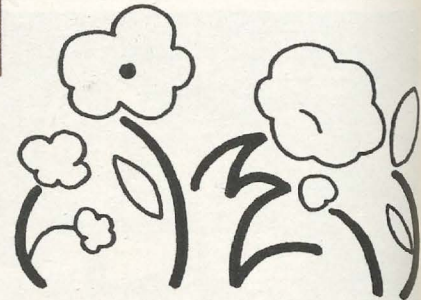

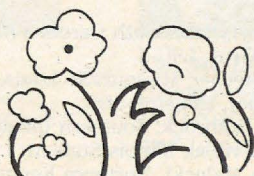
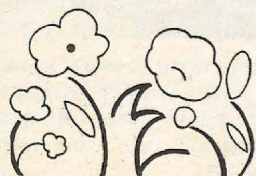

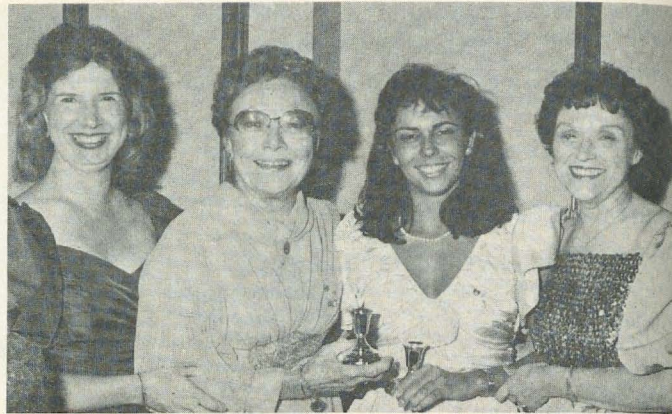

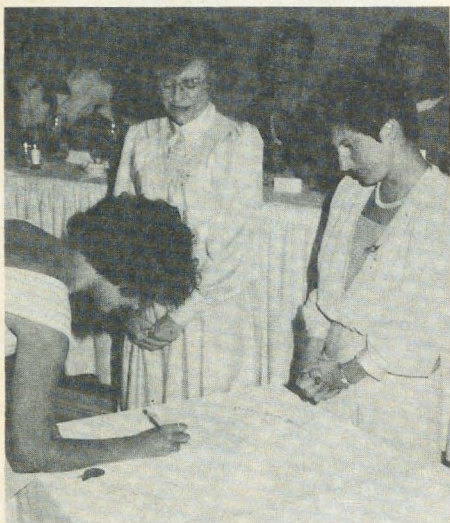

University of Georgia Welcomes Delta Zeta

"How 'bout them dawgs" is a typical comment heard during a University of Georgia football season. But after the recolonization of the Zeta Pi chapter of Delta Zeta that phrase soon changed to "How 'bout them Delta Zetas."

Delta Zeta was encouraged by the warm welcome received from the University's administration, Panhellenic, and the entire Greek system. During the week of membership selection, much support was received from the individual sororities. Banners were hung on virtually every sorority house welcoming Delta Zeta to Georgia.

At the beginning of the recolonization process, two informational presentations brought an overwhelming response of over 400 interviews. A team of eight national officers and

field representatives conducted the membership selection process, reaching Panhellenic's campus total of 120 founding members.

For weeks the campus was accented with rose and green and the local sportswear shops could not keep up with the demand. The "Delta Zeta Classic" t-shirts given to the colony were seen everywhere, a small indication of the pride this group possessed.

Delta Zeta wasted no time becoming involved on campus and participating in many events. Tau Kappa Epsilon's Yell-Like-Hell competition could be considered their campus debut. Clad in rose and green, this energetic group was a sneak preview of great things to come. Running on true Delta Zeta spirit, pride and enthusiasm, Zeta Pi claimed the trophies

Pledge lessons and nametags were an essential part of the early colony meetings. The election of officers in November designated Paige Sharp as the colony president. The new officers were excited to implement their many ideas, including plans for a spring philanthropy project. In April, Delta Zeta successfully raised money for the Athens Speech and Hearing Clinic with their "Delta Zeta M & M Challenge."

Field Representatives Shawn O'Halloran, Lee Ann DeReus and Sharon Rothrock worked with the colony from October through May. All three thoroughly enjoyed working with the colony and agreed that the most frequently asked question was "Do we have a house yet?"

"We don't know," was the response. However, Delta Zeta was fortunate to purchase a home on UGA's sorority row, and the group looks forward to moving into the house prior to the first rush in the fall.

In the absence of a sorority house, the field representatives' small two-room apartment served as a temporary Delta Zeta headquarters as well as a counseling office, t-shirt and party favor outlet, banner workshop, executive board room, interview suite and an occasional resting place for weary field reps!

Spring brought the anticipation of initiation and installation. One highlight of the lamplighting activities was a mass pizza party in the middle of campus. Needless to say, Domino's Pizza was rather skeptical when asked to deliver 20 large pizzas to central campus!

Installation weekend was the perfect ending to a successful recolonization. In eight short months the colony had grown from a group of 120 individuals into a sisterhood with endless potential. The months of fun and hard work not only provided them with memories as founding members but led them to the fulfillment of a long awaited initiation.

The initiation service held in Athens on May 2, 1987 was conducted by executive officers from Auburn-BE and Georgia State-ΔΔ chapters. Over 375 Delta Zetas and their families attended the installation banquet held the following day. Presiding at the

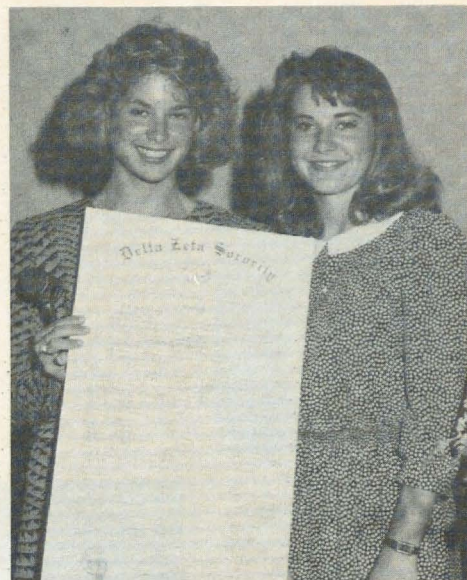
banquet was Past National President and Extension Director Norma Minch Addrisek. The invocation was given by Christa Burks, chaplain of Zeta Pi chapter.

National President Mary Margaret Calhoun Fore presided at the installation service, presenting the charter to the chapter and each new initiate with her certificate of membership.

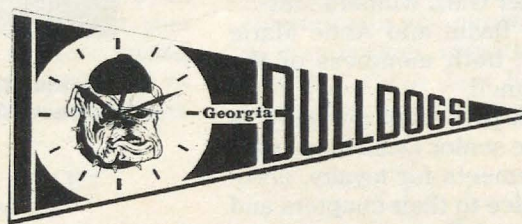

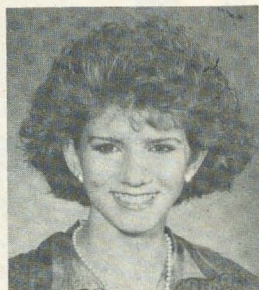

Kim was actually pledged and initiated at West Chester-IP chapter but transferred to the University of Houston when her parents moved to

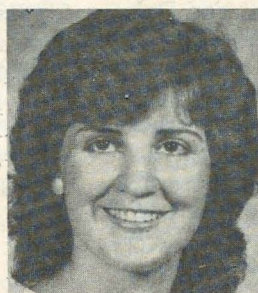

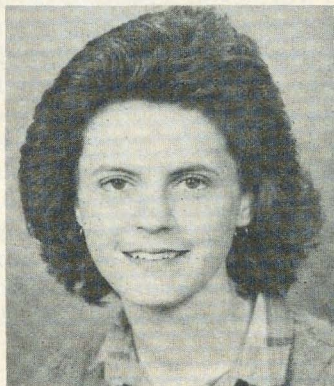

And the prized statement from Innisbrook personnel at the Beach Party: "Did you ever see 500 people have more fun . . . and not one drop of alcohol!"

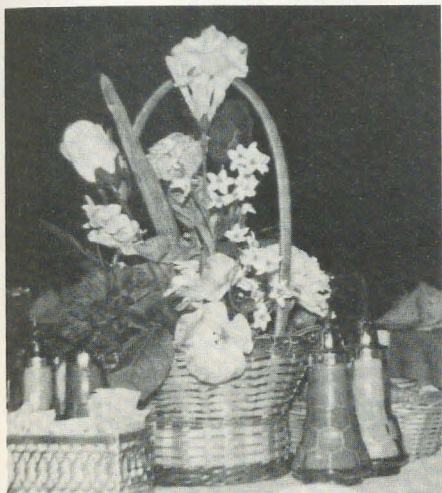
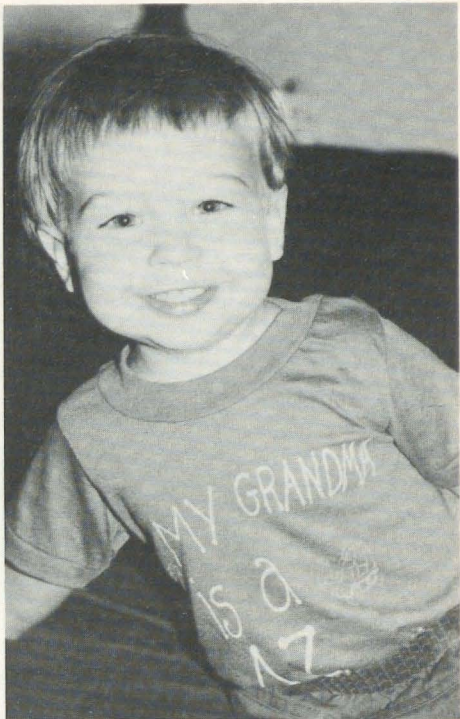

Delta Tau Returns to Temple

After an 18-year absence, Delta Tau chapter has returned to Temple University where it was originally chartered in 1921.

Founded in 1884, Temple is a large university in the heart of Philadelphia. It is noted for its medical college, communications and business departments and its performing arts programs. Greek-letter groups had been a part of campus life at Temple since 1909 but the turbulent times of the mid-sixties found them hard hit and most of the national groups left the campus, including Delta Zeta.

The Greek system remained dormant until about four years ago when a few groups started returning to campus. Delta Zeta's first contact with Temple students occurred in late August, 1985 when Field Representative Lynne Ciervo visited with an interest group of approximately 15 young women. This local group, Nu Zeta, had fashioned itself after Delta Zeta, from colors to philanthropic endeavors. Their purpose: to be recognized as Delta Tau chapter.

For nearly two years the women functioned as a local group, waiting for the Panhellenic extension process to open to national organizations. Finally in October, 1986 Ron Wilson, Temple's Greek Affairs Advisor, called Extension Director Norma Andrisek.

With Field Representative Barb Por-emba, Norma made the initial visit and presentation soon thereafter, and in February, 1987 Delta Tau was officially pledged. Epsilon Zeta chapter members from Drexel University performed the pledge service.

A goal was set to initiate and install the chapter in the late spring and so a hectic pace was set. Lynne had retired as a Field Representative, but she lived in the Philadelphia area and so continued to work with the chapter, providing guidance and direction. After two busy months of pledge lessons, fund raising events and two philanthropic projects, an installation date was set.

Big Sister chapter Epsilon Zeta performed the initiation service and Delta Tau was officially installed on May 9 with Norma Andrisek presiding at the installation banquet.

tor of House Corporations.

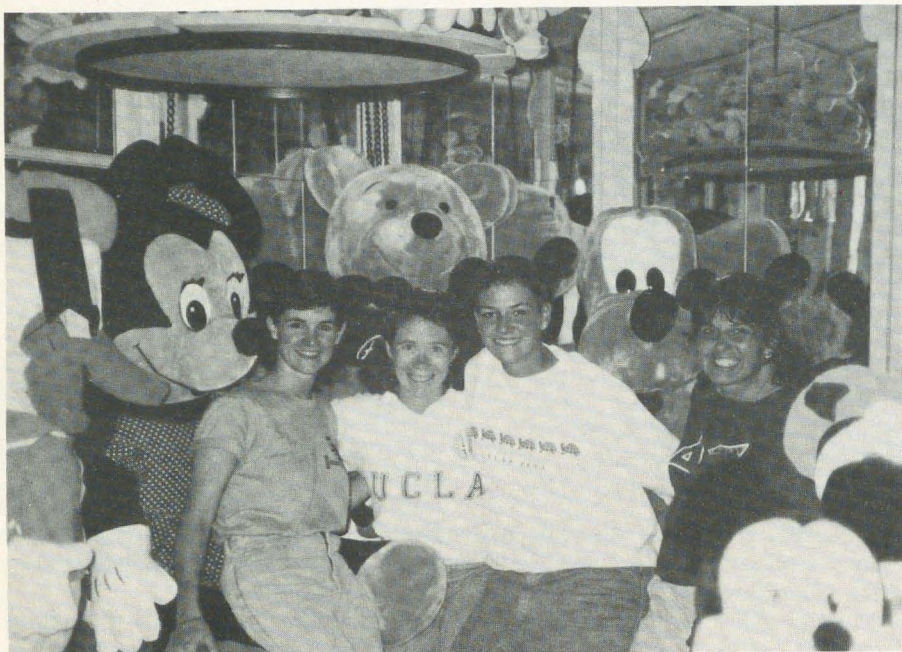

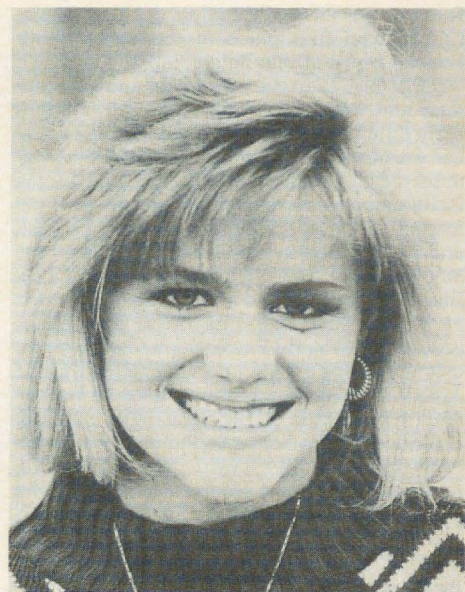

OHIO

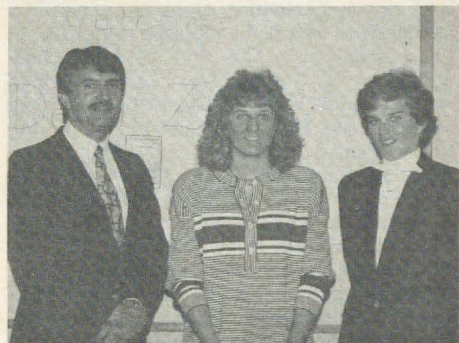

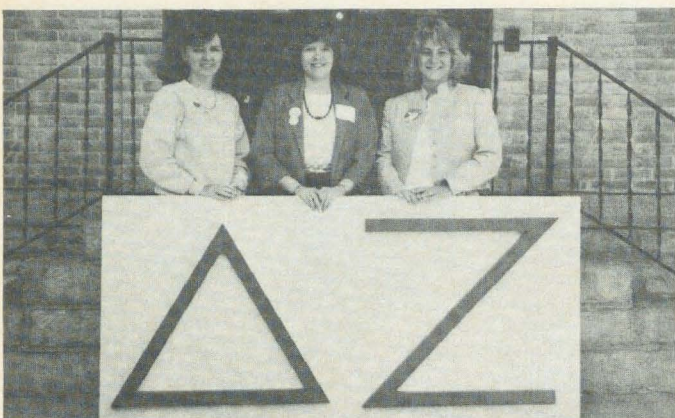

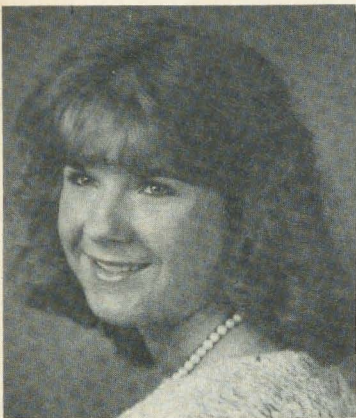

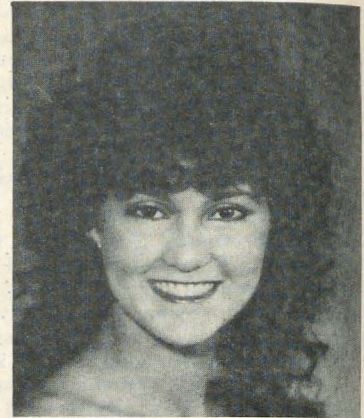

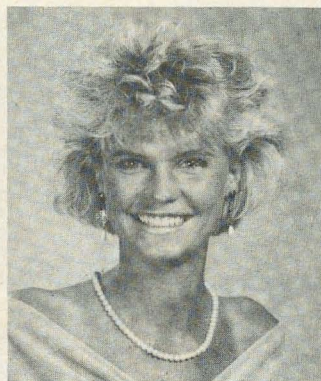

BEVERLY GEORGE EVERETT, Iowa State-BK has just received a Distinguished Citizen Citation from her alma mater, the highest honor recognized by the ISU Alumni Association. Beverly stands in the forefront when championing the causes of international exchanges, rural America, agriculture and women. She has served on the Executive Committee of the U.S. Commission on UNESCO, as U.S. commissioner for International Women's Year, as internal relations director of the American Association of University Women and with the International Federation of University Women. She is a member of the Iowa Women's Hall of Fame.



At the same time, **MARLENE INGRAHAM STRATHE**, ISU-BK received the Virgil S. Lagomarcino Laureate Award from the College of Education for prestigious service, educational leadership and personal commitment to the teaching profession. Marlene, associate dean in the University



of Northern Iowa's College of Education, is a well-known specialist in the area of research and evaluation. Her research projects are funded regularly by the U. S. Department of Education. A member of the Boards of Regents of Inter-institutional Committee on Educational Coordination and the Regents

Committee on Educational Relations, Marlene twice has been awarded the prestigious Iowa Education Research and Evaluation Association Award.

PROFESSOR EMERITUS MINNIE CADDELL

MILES, Alabama-A Γ received an honorary doctor of human letters degree in recognition of her contributions to her discipline, the university and social reform. Very ladylike and proper, Dr. Miles is a far cry from the stereotype of women's activists that emerged from the "consciousness-raising" women's liberation of the early 1960s and '70s. She was the first woman on the management faculty at Alabama and the only woman until another joined the faculty years later. In the 1940s she was appointed head of the College of Commerce and Business Administration placement program. A venture into the business world gave professional experience but her first love was teaching so she returned to the university and earned a Ph.D. She never regretted it.

Retired almost a decade, Minnie Miles is the newly elected president of the Tuscaloosa alumnae chapter.

Drake University in Des Moines, Iowa has presented its highest honor the Distinguished Service Award to **JO ANN HUNTER KRUEGER**, Drake-I Γ E a high school principal in Albuquerque, New Mexico. A former National Activities Chairman for Delta Zeta, Jo Ann was an early recipient of the Florence Hood Miner award. 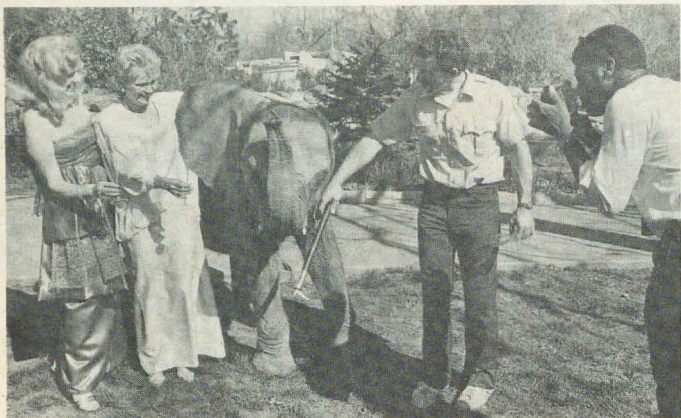

Since Gert was named to its board 20 years ago, People to People has grown to more than 50,000 members with chapters around the world. "There are so many things to do and ordinary people really can make something better in the world," she said. Gert's citations and plaques indicate her various involvements in civic and international organizations. Among them are those from the International YMCA on whose Board of Directors she served for twelve years. She received the highest award given by Chile, the Marion Mills Preminger Medallion from the Committee for the Handicapped in Washington, D. C. and she is an "honorary citizen" of Winnipeg, to name a few.

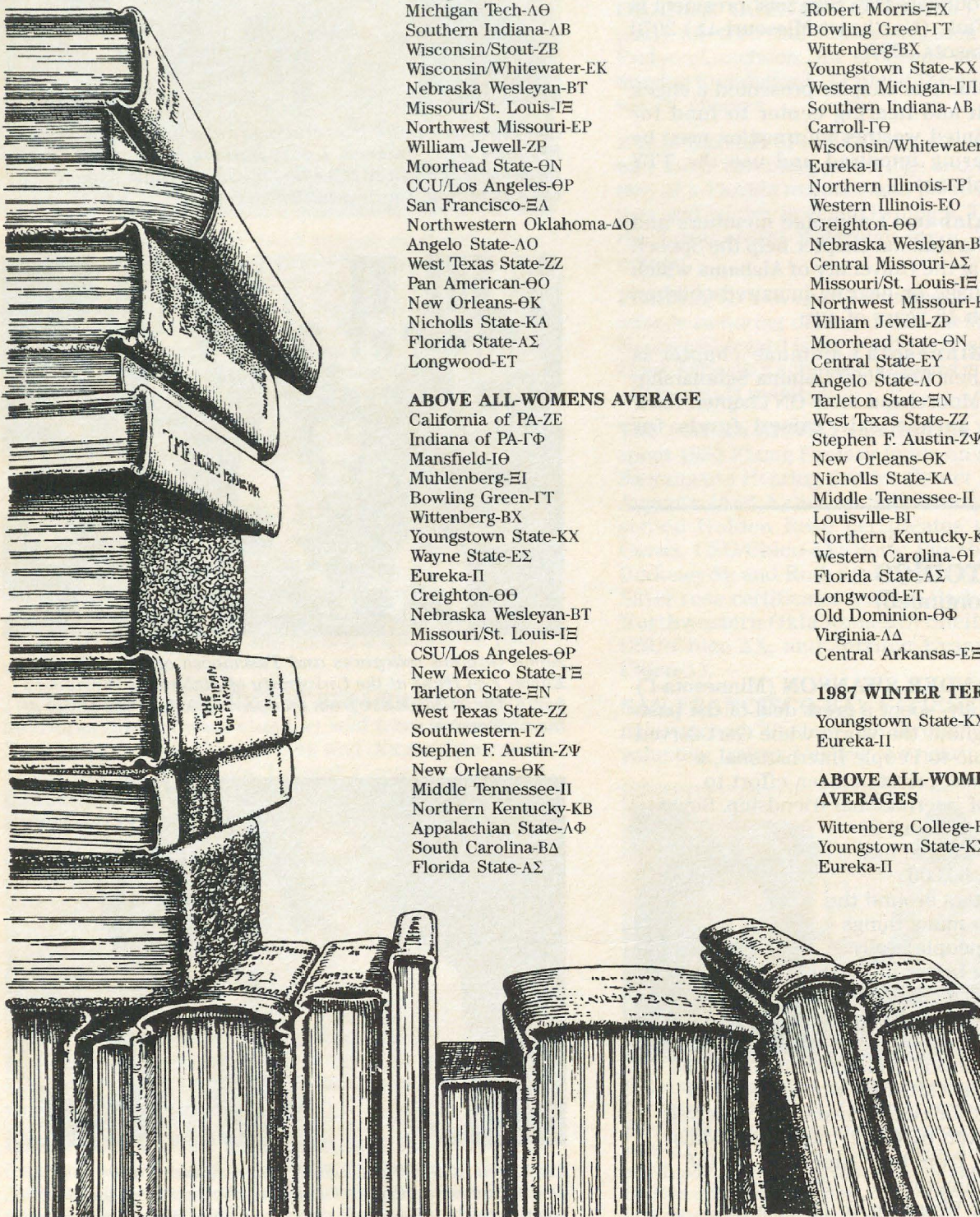

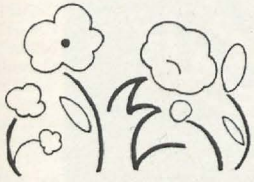
