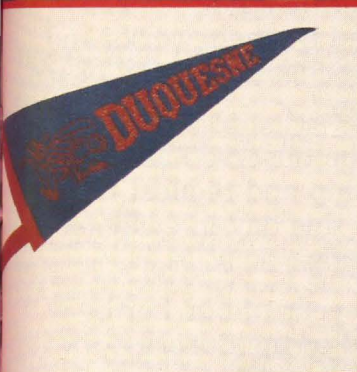

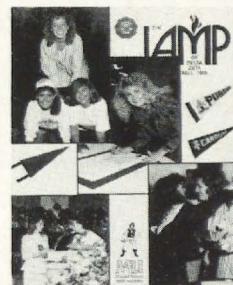

Delta Zeta once again joins 25 sororities and 52 fraternities at the largest Greek system in the country. The University of Illinois' Alpha Beta chapter, recently re-organized with 130 dedicated young women, is already proving to be an outstanding force on campus.

Having pledged October 4, 1987, the colony enjoyed a long but fun-filled pledgship before initiation in April of 1988. Brought together by chance through Delta Zeta, they were just friends or acquaintances at first. But with the guidance of Field Representative Kim Saari and the support of National Council, they began to establish a bond of sisterhood unmatched by any other house on campus.

Eager to become closer friends, the colony held two lock-ins at the house

where they made up chants and skits, signed each other's "turtle books," and stayed up late eating tons of pizza. The pledges were also assigned "turtle buddies" with whom they had lunch or studied each week. Just as they learned more of the many faces and names, the colony members started the tradition of pledge moms and daughters within their pledge class. Thirty of the pledges also relinquished previous housing contracts in order to move into the newly redecorated house on Ohio Street. Meanwhile, the remaining hundred rotated spending two nights at the house, where they bunked with the in-house pledges and felt stronger ties to the sorority.

While the colony focused on internal closeness, their friendships were also strengthened through par-

ticipation in Greek and other campus events. Late in the fall, the new Delta Zetas held an all-Greek open house to "show off" their beautiful 55-year-old home. Each pledge was given a Panhellenic big sis, promoting good relations among the entire sorority system. The group serenaded and had exchanges with various fraternities on campus, enjoyed a St. Valentine's Formal, held an impromptu "Dash for a Date" party, and met lots of fraternity men through a very successful "pledge dad" party. Winning the basketball tournament and placing in several other events, the Alpha Betas made an excellent showing in Greek Week.

The Delta Zeta name continued to spread across campus as various individuals were honored for their achievements: Lorrie Butcher made

the Sigma Nu poster and placed fourth in Pike's Miss Greek U. of I. contest; Mary Hance was a semi-finalist in Sig Ep's Miss Knock Out contest; Lisa Goelz qualified for the prestigious Ma-Wan-Da senior honorary; Becky Rusch was initiated into the Order of Omega leadership honorary; Mary Vest made Greek Council, and Cynthia Skow was elected Treasurer of the Student Government Association.

The colony placed third in the annual Anchor Splash contest, with their entry for Mr. Bathing Beauty capturing first place. Finally, the group was especially honored to be recognized at the coveted Borelli (all-Panhellenic) Awards. Not only did they place third in both Best Pledge Class and Best Out-of-House Program, but also their essay for *Most Unique Sorority* was read before the audience of Greek women.

The Alpha Betas eagerly awaited their initiation and official installation as a chapter. Sisters from both Illinois State University (Lambda Rho) and Eastern Illinois University (Gamma Nu) conducted the initiation ceremony on April 16. Everyone enjoyed the initiation picnic held at a nearby park, where fun awards were given out for Top Turtle, Scooter Queen, Soap Opera Queen and Best 4Z Family. However, probably the most rewarding and sentimental part of the initiation weekend was still to come — the installation luncheon.

Held at the Chancellor Hotel, the luncheon and installation program was led by Toastmistress Carolyn Barnes Gullatt, who introduced the other national visitors: National President Norma Minch Andrisek; National Director Lynnnda Wolf Hoefler; Past National Officer and National Historian Florence Hood Miner; PCD for Illinois South Cathy Nott Otto; PAD for Illinois South Gail Easley McKee, and National Field Representatives Barb Poremba, Kathi Bray, Cynthia Anderson and Kim Saari. Representing the University of Illinois were Assistant Dean of Students Adlon Jorgensen and Panhellenic President Jane Brouwer. Other special guests included Marcia Schular Johnson, House Corporation President; Janita Robinson, newly appointed CCD, and Florence Harding, original charter member of Alpha

"I thought my job here would be one of mainly a live-in advisor," Kim Saari began as she spoke to her girls. "But I found myself becoming more of a friend and sister to all of you." Kim presented the Margaret Osborne President's Badge, along with an Alpha Beta guard donated by Florence Harding, to new Chapter President Becky Rusch. Margaret Osborne, who was initiated in 1927, recently passed away and left her

badge to be passed down through Alpha Beta presidents. Kim presented several other awards as well: Most Outstanding Pledge, Becky Rusch; Scholarship, Joan Perkins, and Commitment to Excellence, Carol Coyle. In appreciation of her hard work, loyalty and friendship, Becky presented Kim with a gold bracelet engraved with the message "To Kim — In our hearts you'll always be an Alpha Beta. Love, The Colony."

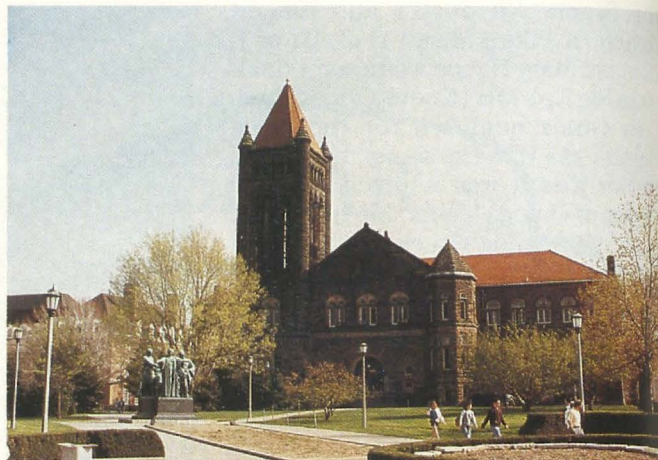
Norma Andrisek presented the

have the years of wonderful friendships and fun that we have had, and the comfort that no matter where you go, there's always a sister you can tell your troubles to and who will hold your hand when you need her."

Duquesne University-KΞ

In the spring of 1986, a group of women students at Duquesne University, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, decided to start a new group. When they researched sorority background, they discovered Delta Zeta had once had a chapter at Duquesne.

This prompted a closer look, and they decided to model their group after Delta Zeta in hopes that one day they could become a part.

Delta Zeta Phi was officially recognized on campus March 31, 1986. That fall, they immediately became involved in campus activities, including the annual Dance Marathon where they placed second. In January of 1987 they planned for and carried out their first formal rush which was a quota-filled success. Delta Zeta Phi joined the Greeks at Duquesne by singing and dancing to songs from "A

Chorus Line" at the 1987 Greek Sing. In the fall, ΔΖΦ came back from summer vacation excited about participation in Campus Carnival.

Finally, in October of 1987 their dream of dropping the "Phi" came true when they were pledged as a Delta Zeta colony. Between October 9 and March 12, 1988, the colony placed first in Dance Marathon, reached quota and passed total in formal rush and attended their first Province Day.

On March 12, 1988, the colony began its history as the Kappa Xi chapter of Delta Zeta. Installation day began at 8 a.m. with the initiation held in the Duquesne Student Union. Members from Omicron chapter at Pittsburgh, assisted by members of Xi Chi chapter from Robert Morris College conducted the initiation.

National Vice President of Colle-

giate Affairs Phyllis Snape Favorite presided at the luncheon at the Le-Mont (which is located atop Mt. Washington, overlooking the three rivers point). The invocation was given by Fr. Sean Hogan C.C. Sp. PCD III-E Maria Blair extended greetings received from Delta Zetas everywhere welcoming the new chapter and Field Representative Sheila Judge responded. Colony President Kathy DiVita spoke on the experiences leading to this day.

Director of Development J. Patrick Boyle extended the University's best wishes and support.

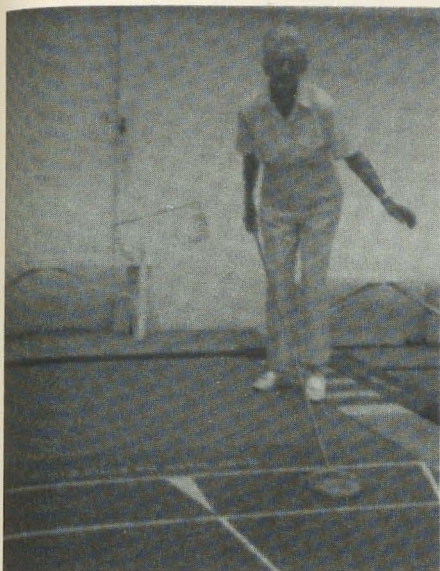

It was nice to see all of the National Presidents' pictures hanging in the front staircase. It was fun to see the small brass "Lamp" andirons my Chi Omega friend Bunny Hyatt had given in my honor. They are in the fireplace in Headquarters Administrator Cindy Winslow's office.

In the library, one lighted display cabinet contains publications by Delta Zeta authors. If any of you have not sent copies of your works to add to this growing collection, I urge you to do so. You'd be in good company!

Nettie Wills Shugart's hand-painted china loving cups grace another cabinet along with other early-day memorabilia. The apartment in the Maltby House assigned to the Curatorial Committee was definitely a working area. One cabinet contained trophies and awards from the Gail Patrick Velde estate, still in the process of being recorded. On a work table were odds and ends of china, jewelry, Delta Zeta favors, etc., all awaiting their turn to be accessioned.

Back in the Museum we toured the upstairs, noting the addition of Evelyn Costello's portrait in the Michigan bedroom. Stained glass transoms over the California Suite doors were also an addition. In the third floor conference room there were four early chapter charters, two of



which were issued by Alpha Chapter, which is the way it was in those early days. Tucked into a niche was a turn-of-the-century sculpture of "John and Priscilla" by artist John Rogers. This had come from the Julia Bishop Coleman family.

Back downstairs and another quick look around. In the parlor the 1985 convention gift of Jean Coleman Lisle and Myrtle Graeter Hinkly, the portrait of our founders, hangs over the mantle. Pictures of Texas Past and Present National Officers grace a side table. (This room was given by Province XVII.) In a glass-topped table the beautifully bound Charter Book, listing all contributions to the Museum, lies in a place of honor.

In the Florida room, the library, just across the hall, is the beautiful needlepoint firescreen, a work of Past National President Lisbeth Innis Francis. Lisbeth also did all the needlepoint luggage rack bands for the bedrooms upstairs.

And, there was much, much more. But you'll just have to go see for yourself!

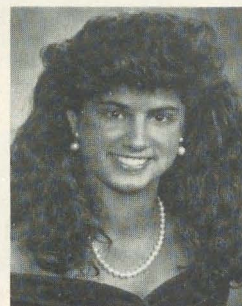

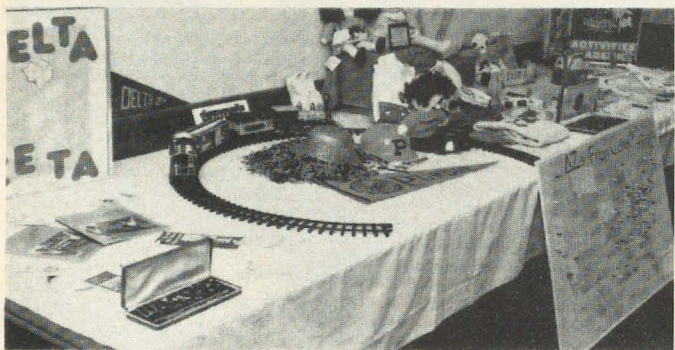

NEW MEXICO

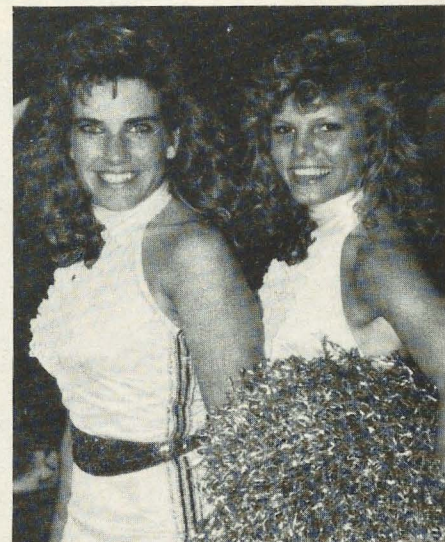

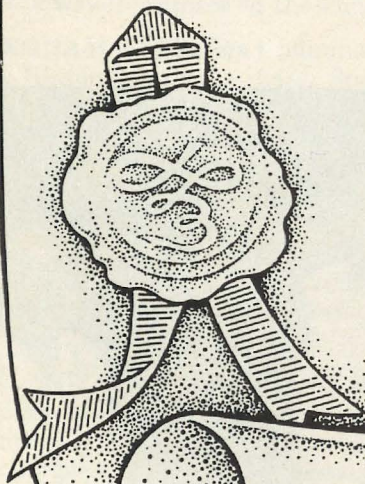

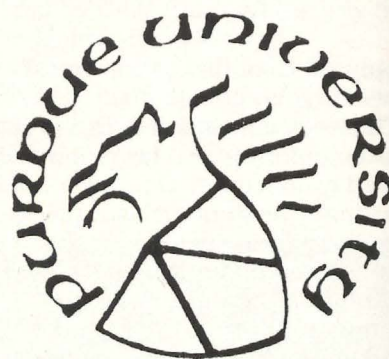
Past National President Carolyn Barnes Gullatt presided over the luncheon. The invocation was given
