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



Convention '91 . . . A tradition to build on

Sunshine, seashells and sister-hood did abound at Innisbrook Resort in Tarpon Springs, Florida, from June 27 to July 2. Occasional thunderstorms thrown in by Mother Nature from time to time failed to dampen the spirits of the more than 500 Delta Zetas registered for the 40th National Convention.

Harstan foyer came alive with energy on Thursday evening, June 27, as Delta Zeta sisters waited for the opening banquet. For some, it was an opportunity to meet new sisters from differents parts of the nation. For others, it was an opportunity to get reacquainted with sisters known from previous conventions.

The opening processional, composed of present and past National Officers, the Delta Zeta Foundation President and four Women of the Year, was introduced by Florida PCD Karly Klemp Burns, East Carolina-ZA.

Presiding at the "sea shell theme" banquet, National President Marvona Easley Tavlin introduced the keynote speaker, George W. Spasyk of Lambda Chi Alpha fraternity. Recently retired, George gave 40 years of service to his fraternity, including 22 years as Executive Director. He is currently a Balfour Distinguished Lecturer.

"Delta Zeta, Class of 1991," George said, "refers to the word class as meaning superior." He spoke of all the qualities and programs which make Delta

Zeta a Panhellenic leader, singling out *The LAMP* as a "very classy publication documenting how fun it is to be a ΔZ ."

In order for Delta Zeta to stay in the forefront of the sorority movement, George indicated that cooperation among the undergraduates, alumnae, universities and the national organization would be vital, especially when faced with declining enrollment predictions for our universities during the next decade.

The evening concluded with the presentation of the Alice Huenefeld CCD Award to Catherine Coker Goodwin, Auburn-BE, and the announcement by Florence Hood Miner of the nine recipients of the award in her honor.

An informal reception honored National Council and Past National Officers.

Opening Session

The opening session on June 28 introduced the delegates of new collegiate and alumnae chapters chartered during the biennium. These include Grand Valley State-ΞΨ, Allendale, Michigan; Southwest Missouri State University-EN, Springfield, Missouri; Stockton State College-ΟΔ, Pomona, New Jersey; Ohio University-ΟΓ, Athens, Ohio.

And Bryant College-OA, Smithfield, Rhode Island; University of Michigan-AH, Ann Arbor, Michigan; Arkansas State University-OE, Jonesboro, Arkansas; Mount Union College-OI,

Alliance, Ohio; State University of New York/Oswego-OΘ; State University of New York/Albany-OK, and Randolph-Macon College-OZ, Ashland, Virginia.

Alumnae chapters include Greater Hartford, Connecticut; Greater Shepherdstown Tri-County Area, West Virgina; Central Philadelphia, Pennsylvania; Granite State, New Hampshire; Cheaha Regional, Alabama; Jackson, Mississippi, and Pittsburgh-North Hills, Pennsylvania.

National President Marvona Tavlin's Biennial State of the Sorority report revealed interesting and provocative facts. Thirty-three chapters reached quota in formal rush and remained at or above total all year for both years of the biennium, marking a 43% increase from the previous biennium.

The initiation rate has increased from 80% in 1987-89 to 93% in 1989-91. Holdover pledges have been reduced by 34%.

Our membership includes 171 college chapters; 192 alumnae chapters and 58 clubs; an active membership of 124,190, and a total initiated membership of 146,945. As of February, 1991, initiates and pledges in our chapters totalled 10,898 for an 11% increase from 1989.

The Delta Zeta Foundation has experienced continued growth with revenues from chapters and individuals increasing by \$100,000 each of the past two years. These gifts have been


translated into scholarships, educational programs, grants, support for leadership training, the Gallaudet University dance studio and scholarships, speech and hearing helps, and the preservation of our National Historical Museum and Headquarters building.

The Rose Luncheon

"A rose is a rose is a rose" but at noon the rose was the theme of the luncheon honoring alumnae of Delta Zeta.

Deanna Alleman McKinnon, National Vice President of Alumnae Affairs was toastmistress of the luncheon where National Chairmen and Council members presented awards to individual alumnae and to chapters.

Six certificates and six tangible awards were given in the various categories and twelve Achoth awards were announced



Although there were no candidates present for the Golden Rose (50-year) ceremony, this convention witnessed the introduction of the Order of the Pearl ceremony honoring initiates of more than 65 years.

This new alumnae recognition found Lucile Crowell Cooks, Miami-A. Past National Officer. President Emeritus of the Historical Museum and 1973 Woman of the Year as the first recipient. She in turn conducted the ceremony for the six alumnae present: Elsie Kuck Bailey, Brenau-AO; Ethel Slicklen deVyver, NYU-BΩ; Jessalene Johns Lynch, St. Lawrence University-AM; Eleanor Wycoff Mc-Kinley, Oklahoma State-AE: Hazel Griffin Southard, Ohio State-O and Gladys Nelson Whitesell, North Dakota-Y.

Three alumnae were announced as 1991 inductees of the Order of the Diamond (75 years) including Past National President Grace Mason Lundy, Indiana-E '15.

A poem, "Sonnet to my Sisters" by Jean Haley Harper, North Dakota-Y closed the program.

Survive!

The Friday afternoon workshop, "SURVIVE! Personal Protection You can LIVE with . . ." included all delegates.

Debbie and Mike Gardner of Cincinnati, Ohio, the presentors, have developed the Survive Institute and have traveled extensively conducting seminars at conventions, for corporations and on college campuses. Debbie's vivid demonstrations entranced her audience. The primary thing to do in a crisis situation is to breathe. Then you can move and think and get control of your body. The second thing to do in a panic situation is to form your hands into fists and pump them. This will help keep the blood flowing to your hands. She stressed, "fight mentally." And, the final word if you are in an attack situation. "Hit first. Go for the windpipe hard and fast. If you cut off their air, they can't breathe - if they can't breathe, they can't fight to hurt you."

Delta Zeta Stars

A late afternoon Financial Seminar preceded the Collegiate Awards Banquet with Sandra McAllister Nesbitt, Vice President of Membership, presiding. Hollywood's Academy Awards provided the theme of "Delta Zeta Stars" and certificates and silver awards were presented for academics, activities, social, choices, sorority education, standards, ways and means, collegiate-alumnae relations, newsletters and membership programs.

Special Friends

On Saturday morning a Special Friends breakfast paid tribute to individuals and chapters who have donated \$100 or more to the Delta Zeta Foundation. Distinguished guests included Dr. Howard House and ΔZ's Janet Doak of the House Ear Institute in Los Angeles. Foundation President Joan Lowry thanked the donors and gave an update of the Foundation. Joan declared, "because of you, 32 million people with hearing losses are better off."

Medallion Luncheon

The Medallion luncheon at noon found National Director Patricia Canady Rosser presiding. Huge hot pink balloons (simulating hot air balloons) greeted Delta Zetas and their guests. Attendees drew numbers for seating to "meet nine new friends."

Foundation President Joan Lowry introduced Dr. House of the House Ear Institute who amused his audience with tales and descriptions of the history of the institute, including a description of the Delta Zeta sponsored children's facility. When it was learned that it was Dr. House's 83rd birthday, he received an appropriate song from

the audience. Joan presented the Institute with a \$12,000 check from the Foundation.

Many awards were presented for philanthropy with special recognition to Sarah Jane Shank Houston, Illinois-AB, and Lucille Bolstad May, North Dakota-Y for their decades of service on the Foundation.

ΔZ Fair

The Delta Zeta Fair opened the afternoon activities, alternating with workshops. The "county fair" booth idea originated at the 1989 Convention as a way of presenting information in a number of categories quickly and efficiently. This year it had expanded to 26 booths.

chairmen, chapter consultants and other ΔZ dignitaries were the "barkers" wearing distinctive rose printed cotton vests.

Booths offering special or unusual attractions were the Museum, where Florence Hood Miner conducted a contest with a print of the 1928 National Convention. The Housing booth contained scale models and plans of new houses at the University of Georgia, Purdue, Southwest Missouri, Kent State and Cal State at Los Angeles. At the Gallaudet booth delegates could sign up for a drawing with prizes.

Memorabilia in the Alfa Lloyd Hayes booth told of her life and times, a fitting tribute since this biennium has been dedicated to

our first president.

Other booths promoted the Foundation, House Ear Institute, philanthropy, grants, Better Hearing and Speech Institute, scholarships, pledge education, standards, choices, extension, NPC, networking, *The LAMP*, alumnae programming, Colonnade Club, affinity cards, magazine sales, rush, ways and means, social and sorority education.

Workshops

Afternoon workshops included the Senior Challenge and Foundation Goals.

Part of the Values program, the Senior Challenge was the focus of the workshop led by Cynthia Winslow Menges, Miami-A. Cindy said keeping the interest of junior and senior collegiate members and helping them with the pressures and concerns of the transition from college to career is the focus of Senior Challenge. This program features videos on various topics not taught in the classroom.

The first video previewed by attendees featured the concept of "wardrobing," dressing for success while staying within a budget. Future videos will focus on such areas as resume writing, interviewing and budgeting. A video on financial planning is ready for production, pending funding.

Foundation programs and benefits were explained by Joan Lowry and Pat Rosser. They talked of the Foundation's role

The initiation ceremony was in the charge of Karen Kind Veitch, Baldwin-Wallace-ΓΑ, National Ritual Chairman. Chapter presidents performing the ritual were from Miami-A; Florida State-ΑΣ; San Jose State-ΓΛ; Tampa-ΔΒ; Central Missouri-ΕΓ; Stephen F. Austin-ZΨ; Nicholls State-KA, and Northeastern-ΞΥ.

This year's convention initiate is Natalie Tresha Allen who is the great-great niece of Founder Mabelle Minton Hageman and the great-grandaughter of Mabelle's sister, Lillian Minton Krebs, Delta Zeta's first legacy pledge.

Sunday morning's commemorative service conducted by Phyllis Snape Favorite, Vice President of Collegiate Affairs, honored three special sisters who have joined Flame Eternal: Past National Vice President of Alumnae Cynthia Lundy McCarty, Indiana-E; Past National President Frances Westcott, Indiana-E, and Past National Secretary and Museum Trustee Emeritus Mary Lou Ragel Vineyard, Northwestern-AA.

Symposium and Panhellenic Featured speaker at the Carolyn Barnes Gullatt Symposium was immediate past National President of Kappa Delta, Corre Anding Stegall. Corre's enthusiasm and contageous charm enchanted her audience as she spoke of the Greek world and the challenges it faces.

Florida area alumnae representing 18 NPC groups honored Delta Zeta by attending the Panhellenic luncheon at noon on Sunday. National Secretary Merry Adamcik presided in the unexpected absence of NPC Delegate Carolyn Gullatt who was ill.

Thirteen chapter consultants, 12 collegiate chapter presidents and convention initiate Natalie Allen began the program with the processional of flags of the 26 member groups of NPC.

Corre Stegall spoke on Panhellenism, quoting several NPC leaders of the past and present. "Panhellenism means devoted, sustained, intelligent service. Panhellenic — where differences in opinions are respected."

She described changes in procedures and attitudes she had noted in her years of NPC involvement.



Kappa Delta's Order of the Diamond Presented to Gwen McKeeman



Kappa Delta Sorority's Order of the Diamond is given for outstanding contributions to the Greek world. It was a delighted Delta Zeta audience and a surprised Gwen Moss McKeeman when Kappa Delta's NPC Delegate and Past President Corre Anding Stegall bestowed this prestigious honor at the Panhellenic luncheon during Convention.

In her remarks before the presentation, Corre said: "Besides friendship and mutual trust, Panhellenism means service devoted, sustained, intelligent service. Within Delta Zeta's circle of sisterhood is one whose service to the world of fraternalism is known and respected by all the fraternal world.

"Gwen McKeeman is that rare individual who delights in service, in getting the job done. She doesn't relish the spotlight, but she finds great satisfaction in the end result of a worthy effort. Your beautiful magazine is cer-

tainly evidence of Gwen's continuing service to Delta Zeta, and I know how respected she is among the NPC editors.

"In 1985 the National Council of Kappa Delta Sorority established an award known as the Order of the Diamond. This award honors those distinguished persons who have contributed great service to the Panhellenic world and in the true spirit of Panhellenism have advanced the purposes and objectives of their individual sororities. Their wide and wise human service, mutual respect and helpfulness have marked these as women of eminence and distinction.

"It is my honor and pleasure to announce that the National Council of Kappa Delta has asked me to present the Order of the Diamond to Gwen McKeeman in grateful appreciation of her unselfish service to the cause of Panhellenism and in recognition of her many,

many contributions to the National Panhellenic Conference."

Gwen's Panhellenic service spans some 35 years, beginning at the local level in 1956 when she was elected Delta Zeta's representative to Tulsa Alumnae Panhellenic. She served as president in 1964-65.

In 1969, after five years on National Council as Vice President of Alumnae, Gwen was appointed Delta Zeta's National Panhellenic Conference Delegate. Delta Zeta's time to rotate onto the NPC Executive Board came in 1971 and Gwen served first as treasurer, then as secretary and was Chairman of the Conference from 1975 to 1977.

During that time she also served on the Board of Directors of the National Interfraternity Foundation and the Interfraternity Research and Advisory Council. For a two year period prior to the interfraternal bicentennial celebration in Williamsburg, Virginia, in 1976, Gwen was one of two women serving on the Bicentennial Commission for Fraternity in the Year 2000. As Chairman of NPC, she was responsible for the planning of the bicentennial celebration in conjunction with the National Interfraternity Conference, Professional Panhellenic Conference and Professional Interfraternity Conference.

Gwen has been editor of The LAMP since 1981 and is now concluding a two year term as Chairman of the National Panhellenic Editors Conference. She has also been an active member of the College Fraternity Editors Association. In 1987, Gwen received a Citation of Merit from her alma mater. Northeastern State University,

Tahlequah, Oklahoma.
















Minton legacy initiated

Brit Dietrichs Baldwin-Wallace College-ΓΑ






THE UPS FOUNDATION was established in 1975 by United Parcel Service. Since then it has provided more than \$9 million in support for independent colleges and universities.


CALIFORNIA



Well-seasoned conventioneers noted a face missing from the Pups 'n Hounds luncheon this year. Taylor Reese who had served as stenotpypist for 11 conventions and who came just to visit two years ago, had a conflict this year and so missed his turn to bark with the 13 year group. Taylor has been busy since his retirement enjoying contributing poetry and humor to various magazines. The following bit of humor appeared in the May 1991 issue of Christian Single magazine. "A cousin, a witty 85, asked a friend to handle her funeral arrangements and ex-

plained she wanted only women pallbearers." "Why only women pallbearers?" the gentleman asked. "Because," she replied, "men don't take me out now, so why should I let them take me out then." -Taylor Reese.

And now a dip into the mailbag. In early May I had another note from Melissa Klopfer, USC-BΔ, who has been teaching in Ankara. Turkey for six years. I understand that Missy is home on sabbatical now, but at that time she wrote of

frightening experiences.

"Our lives have been deeply affected by the Gulf War and particularly its aftermath. Our school schedules are erratic to throw off terrorists. School buses are gone (for our 400+ students) so they must taxi and carpool. We are forced to go through searches quite frequently. Threats and acts of terrorism have increased.

"Four weeks ago while waiting on the corner for a taxi, a Mercedes blew up. Luckily, no one was injured including the Iraqi diplomat who had seen the bomb and

moved quickly from the car. I was scared and scraped up from dropping to the ground. My hearing was restored 72 hours later.

"Four days after that incident, a personal friend who is a director for an American company working here in Turkey was assassinated by a revolutionary group. My friend John was murdered by two people dressed as Turkish police."

This just illustrates how many of our sisters have been involved

in world conflicts.

And, another letter from Lisa Ornoski who wrote of her Desert Storm experience in the spring issue of *The LAMP*. Lisa has been home since March 30 and is delighted to be reunited with her army husband at Fort Benning in Georgia.

She shared a couple of personal experiences with *The LAMP*.

"My unit began to move into Iraq a few days before the ground war officially started. The 24th Infantry Division actually cut a road through the desert of Iraq and straight into the Euphrates River Valley, which was our final destination. The weather was extremely cold and it rained constantly.

"At times it was so difficult to see that I could hardly distinguish the vehicles to my front and rear. My mission was to lead various supplies forward. This included spare parts for tanks and other ve-

hicles and supply items.

"I had about 41 vehicles following me, including an M1A1 tank which we picked up from one of the line units. The tank had blown an engine so we were towing it with one of our recovery vehicles until we could stop and fix it. The most critical trucks in my convoy were the fuel tankers.

"We received word at about 0300 that we had to move the tankers forward because the tanks were running low and they were engaging the Republican Guard. Well, we took off and got the refuel trucks there. As I'm driving down the road I see guns firing and rounds exploding. I looked at my

sergeant and said something you can't put into print, but I'm sure you get the idea.

"We accomplished our mission and successfully delivered what was needed. Soldiers in my unit were recognized and most of us received medals and some Bronze Stars were awarded. The real heros are the soldiers. Here was a bunch of 18-21 year old kids being shot at and they performed in an exemplary manner. These soldiers did an excellent job and I'm very proud to be a part of this unit."

Lisa added that they stayed in Iraq outside the town of Basra for about two weeks. During that time they saw the real victims of the war, the Iraqi children. They distributed juice and food to those wandering along the road. The locals also received basic medical care from the U. S. forces . . . and Lisa's unit gathered up extra clothing for them.

"The POWs we captured were happy to see us. Most were underfed and had very little clothing. We made them as comfortable as possible but since we captured over 1,000 prisoners we were running

out of room for them."

Lisa has visited some of the schools whose students had written to her and she added this statement: "I received letters from Delta Zetas who saw the article in *The LAMP* and wrote to me so I'd like to say thank-you to all of those people. Any words I write here cannot possibly express the grati-

tude I am feeling for all the support. I just hope it suffices to say that I am very lucky to live in this country and all the support from the people was noticed and appreciated. I was lucky and returned home to participate in victory parades and welcome-home formals, but for those who gave the ultimate sacrifice I know the country won't forget them or their sacrifice."

Delta Zeta presented to the Panhellenic and to the Interest Group in December, 1990, and was asked to colonize very soon thereafter because it seemed to be everything the Group was looking for in a national organization.

The colony quickly became a very active Greek group on campus, participating in several philanthropic and social events with other Greeks as well as holding its own fundraiser raffle and a dance marathon with a fraternity. Delta Zeta took second place in a fraternity's Greek Goddess competition held for charity.

After four months of hard work and sisterly dedication, the colony was installed as Omicron Theta of Delta Zeta on May 3, 1991. The colony was initiated by officers from University of Rochester-AI and Clarkson University-EP.

The installation banquet was held at the Hilton at Syracuse
