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

1993 Convention

Delta Zeta in Victory Lane

A flag-waving welcome and a call for "Delta Zetas — start your convention," a soft-mellow rendition of *Back Home Again in Indiana*, and a wide-screen filled with the colorful sights and sounds of Indiana opened Delta Zeta's 41st (and first International) Convention on June 26 in Indianapolis, Indiana.

Nearly 500 convention delegates and visitors, donning black and white sparkling attire, were gathered in the Grand Ballroom of the Westin for the black and white opening gala, orchestrated by International Treasurer Lynnda Wolf Hoefler and choreographed by Province V (Ohio).

A processional of Past National Officers, Women of the Year, the Foundation President and the International Council heralded the beginning of the evening activities. Lynnda reflected on Delta Zeta's Indiana tradition as members again gathered in the shadow of the Capitol Building. Shelley Tackett, Kent State-FK president, presented the musical interlude which included a bluesy rendition of *Indianapolis, Indeed.* She was accompanied by Music Chairman Julie Stewart Pride.

The keynote speaker for the event was Balfour Distinguished Lecturer Dr. Margaret E. Mohrman, Phi Mu Fraternity. The video was provided by ABC Sports of New York.

Delegates and visitors were seated by province and applauded Historian Florence Hood Miner as she announced the winners of the award named in her honor. One of the six was present to receive her award — Laura Alred, Northeastern (Oklahoma) State University- $\Delta\Phi$.

Honored with the Alice Huenefeld CCD Award was Catherine Lentz Fryer of CSU/Fullerton-IY.

Sunday morning's formal opening featured the seating of delegates from 17 new college and alumnae chapters, recognition of Delta Zeta's new international status by the singing of *Oh*, *Canada* in addition to the *Star Spangled Banner*, and the dedication of this biennium to Founder Julia Bishop Coleman.

International President Marvona Easley Tavlin's State of the Sorority address received a standing ovation. Statistics included the fact that we now have 174 college chapters, 3 colonies, 180 alumnae chapters, 44 alumnae clubs and a total living membership of 131,295.

Marvona's concluding remarks stressed "that Delta Zeta is not an hour — a day — a college term only organization. Delta Zeta is for life. Delta Zeta was here for you because those who went before you cared enough to make the kind of personal investment of both financial and human capital necessary to assure Delta Zeta's survival. We must never forget our lifetime commitment to Delta Zeta. 'We do not plant trees for ourselves; we plant trees for the next generation.'"



The financial seminar concluded the morning's program.

Collegiate 500

Collegians headed down Victory Lane in high gear at Sunday's Collegiate 500 Awards Luncheon with Vice President of Collegians Merry Westbrook Adamcik presiding. Paying heed to green and black racing flags, collegians took the runs with care then roared up for top honors in collegiate programning: activities, academics, sorority education, standards, ways and means, financial excellence, newsletter, risk management, social and alumnae-collegiate relations.

Long-time champions, Sigma chapter at Louisiana State University, held on to their 33-year record of quota in rush and new qualifiers finished to win coveted membership honors.

Workshops in the afternoons included sessions for college presidents, college chapter directors, province collegiate directors, alumnae presidents and province alumnae directors.

Lamplighting

Sunday evening's activities started with a most beautiful and moving initiation service conducted by Council members for Dawn Shriver, the president of Omicron Sigma chapter at Gallaudet University.

Later, the Grand Ballroom was aglow in gold and white with Director of Pledge Education Phyllis Berens Ross presiding over the festivities. Nineteen former Grace Mason Lundy award winners were introduced and former GML recipient, Ritual Chairman Karen Kind Veitch, presented the 1993 GML Awards to seven graduating seniors for their "evidence of loyalty, devotion and service to their chapters and to the Sorority as a whole."

Two of the recipients in the audience were Michelle Lamance, Wright State-KI, and Michelle Jones, Auburn/Montgomery-AN. The Caryatides statuettes were presented to six chapters for outstanding programs in pledge education.

Historian Florence Miner, assisted by Province Alumnae Director XV-C Catherine Clay Lassesen surprised the audience with a message of discovery. After a search of many years, Delta Zetas were pleased to hear that the elusive Killarney Rose is alive and well in California.

A final highlight of the banquet was a musical presentation with handbells performed by Karen Mast Hoskey, NW Missouri-EP.

Panhellenic Luncheon

Monday morning's business meetings introduced reports of various committees.

The Panhellenic luncheon followed at noon with Vice President of Membership and NPC Alternate Delegate Sandra McAlister Nesbitt presiding. Special guests included members of NPC member groups. The parade of sorority flags preceded the luncheon.

Guests at the head table included NPC Chairman-Elect Harriet Rodenberg, Sigma Delta Tau; Sherry Tilley, immediate Past National President of Zeta Tau Alpha and current NPC Delegate; Maureen Syring, a Past International President of Delta Gamma; Kay Powell Bales, Northern Kentucky-KB and Director of Student Activities at Ball State University, and Gwen Moss McKeeman, Past Chairman of National Panhellenic Conference.

The Gallaudet Dancers and Delta Zeta Singers provided the entertainment.

The Carolyn Barnes Gullatt Symposium which followed featured a panel composed of Mrs. Syring, Mrs. Rodenberg, Mrs. Tilley and Kay Bales. The topic for discussion was "The Challenges and Choices of the '90s leading us to the 21st Century."

Kennel Club

"Sit. Stay." With those commands, Karly Klemp Burns and Patricia Canady Rosser brought the International Kennel Club to "heel." Loud, unruly pups announced their presence at their first convention with assorted yips, growls, woofs and barks.

According to kennel club procedure, the barking continued with others adding their voices to the den. Seven-year barkers paused to scratch their fleas (seven year itch) and Carol Harper and Gwen McKeeman proved they are each a 10 (10+10=20). Lucille Cooks counted 22 conventions with assistance from Florida delegates. Our ILL (International Living Legend) Florence Miner mustered up enough energy for 30 woofs, assisted by collegians led by Kim Saari Johnston and Kathy Bray Heatherly.

the rich tradition of Delta Zeta when they traveled to Miami University on Tuesday for a day in Oxford. Delegates and visitors boarded 11 chartered buses (named after the Founders and early Delta Zeta leaders) for the two-hour drive to Oxford, Ohio, where the National Historical Museum and the founding site of Delta Zeta waited.

Tour bus leaders served as coordinators and distributed packets about Miami University and the day's upcoming events. Upon arriving, everyone enjoyed lunch at Shriver Center and Scott Dining Hall and then proceeded to Hall Auditorium for the presentation of Foundation awards and the commemorative service.

Free time enabled visitors to tour the Miami campus or stroll downtown for shopping. A short walk then took everyone to the National Historical Museum for tours of National Headquarters, the Museum and the recently purchased Cullen House, which adjoins Delta Zeta property.

At 5:00 the highlight of the day began as all moved to the west side of the Museum for a special ceremony. The large trees shaded the bright afternoon sun as special guests and Delta Zeta dignitaries began the program, which was coordinated by Past National President Norma Minch Andrisek. President Emeritus Phillip R. Shriver of Miami told anecdotes of the early women at Miami, of Dr. Guy Potter Benton and of the Founders. Architect Thomas Wayne Parker, Bryan, Texas, presented a chronology of expansion

plans. President Marvona Tavlin announced the completion of the long-awaited merger between the Delta Zeta Foundation and the Historical Museum.

Norma Andrisek explained to the audience that today "we will not turn" or "dedicate" the expansion building program. "In our Delta Zeta we break ground every day. Concrete stones are not necessary. Our foundation is firm and our building is never complete." She asked Delta Zetas to be mindful of our proud heritage and to "rededicate ourselves to Delta Zeta."

Chairman Emerita Lucile Crowell Cooks of the Historical Museum was surprised to find her daughters Connie Roberts and Mella Davies present at this ceremony and then it was announced that the recently purchased Cullen House would be named the Lucile Crowell Cooks Conference Center. The ceremony concluded with the hanging of the sign from a wrought iron post in the front yard.

A buffet dinner followed the bus trip back to Indianapolis.

The Rose Luncheon

Wednesday morning's business meeting was completed with final reports, selection of the 1995 nominating committee and the announcement of the election of the new International Council.

Golden Rose members and Order of the Pearl honorees were among those recognized at the Rose Luncheon on Wednesday.

Vice President of Alumnae Dianne Guild and Director of Chapter Finances Pamela McClure Cronenwett served as toastmistresses for the luncheon. Chapters were honored for excellence in province and national cooperation, programs, public relations, ways and means, newsletter, alumnae chapter achievement, outstanding chapter achievement, chapter excellence. Individuals were honored with Achoth Awards for continued involvement on the local level. Alumnae Programming Chairman Trudy Wheeler read Jean Haley Harper's (North Dakota-Y) poem, Sonnet to My Sisters.

Workshops continued throughout the afternoon.

Circle of Friendship

An evening "centered on the Delta Zeta circle of sisterhood and friendship" was the theme of the Installation Banquet. President Marvona Tavlin presided over the banquet and was assisted by all of the outgoing Council in presenting Delta Zeta's most coveted alumnae and collegiate chapter awards.

The installation of the 1993-1995 International Council followed, with Marvona conducting the candlelit ceremony. Newly installed president is Sandra McAlister Nesbitt, Auburn-BE. Vice President of Membership is Lynnda Wolf Hoefler, Kent State-**FK.** Vice Presidents of Alumnae and Collegians are Phyllis Berens Ross, Fort Hays State- $\Delta\Omega$, and Merry Westbrook Adamcik, Houston-ΔΘ. Charlotte Davis, Auburn-BE, is secretary and Pamela McClure Cronenwett, Northwestern-AA, is treasurer. The elected Directors are Karly Klemp Burns, East Carolina-ZA; Ruth Weider Patterson, Wittenberg-BX, and Jeanine Peterson Triplett, Louisville-BL.

And so the 41st Convention became history, concluded in an atmosphere of sisterhood and friendship. Delta Zeta is indeed in the winner's circle and in Victory Lane.



Three Honored Among Top All-Time Female Grads at University of Alabama

In recognition of the admittance of female students to the University of Alabama in 1893, a celebration of women at the Capstone was held to commemorate the contributions of women to the life of the campus. A week in September was designated by University President Dr. Roger Sayers for centennial activities.

The XXXI, a women's leadership honorary composed of junior and senior women leaders from the student body (including collegians Angie Pope, Whitney Mashburn and alumna Ginger Bobo), faculty and staff, as well as alumni and other Alabamians, has led the celebration by already hosting a weekend of activities to honor the university's top female students.

These 31 women honorees were chosen for outstanding achievement in one or all of three categories — professional achievement, character and community service. These graduates were honored the weekend of April 24-25 with a banquet at the University Club of Tuscaloosa, home of the University of Alabama.

The XXXI Club also erected a permanent marker on campus which lists the names of the 31 honorees and relates the events leading up to the admission of female students to the university. In addition 31 trees were planted at the Presidential Pavilion on campus as a tribute to these leaders.

Alpha Gamma chapter is proud to have three members of the 31 outstanding graduates of the last one hundred years, more than any other sorority on campus.

One graduate is Jenny J. Hudson, a resident of New York City. Jenny graduated in 1959 and is the Senior Producer of Reader's Digest Music/Home Entertainment division. She has earned four gold records through her work as a producer. She had produced records for CBS Records and Reader's Digest Music. Before her producing career, Jenny worked as a professional singer for 22 years.

The second Delta Zeta honoree is Jean Wickstrom Liles, 1961, of Birmingham, Alabama. Jean is the Senior Foods Editor for Southern Living magazine and has written 10 cookbooks and hundreds of food stories. She was named National Home Economist in Business in 1984 and Alabama's Outstanding Home Economist in 1985, also receiving the American Home Economics Association's Leaders Award in 1992.

Delta Zeta's third recipient is Dr. Minnie Caddell Miles who lives in Tuscaloosa and is semiretired after being the first female professor to teach at the University of Alabama School of Commerce and Business Administration in Management. Among her numerous achievements, she chaired President Kennedy's Advisory Committee on Women in the Service, which opened the door for military women to advance to th rank of admiral or general.



Phyllis Prater Porter: Girl Scout

Phyllis Prater Porter, Utah-BZ '29 has been an active member of Delta Zeta ever since that graduation date and has also distinguished herself as a 68-year member of Girl Scouting.

Phyllis became a member of Troop 4, in Salt Lake City, Utah, in 1925 while attending West High School. The meetings were held in the Lafayette School with Mrs. Cletting as leader of the troop. Phyllis worked constantly and very hard, earning all the merit badges offered at that time — 48 in all.

In 1930 along with three other young women, she was awarded her Golden Eagle Scout Badge at a special service hosted by then Governor of Utah, George Dern. The following summer Phyllis was a counselor at Camp Andre Clark, located in upstate New York, across the Hudson River from Sing Sing Prison. There she taught pioneering to 50 new girls every two weeks, some from as far away as Europe. Along with the fun, they were plagued with mosquitoes, poison ivy and fireflies.

Every summer after that until her marriage in 1935, Phyllis was a counselor at Camp Pinar, in Big Cottonwood Canyon just five miles below the famous ski resort of Brighton. Phyllis' Scout name was Breezy, and she still answers to that name. In addition to the counseling, she was a leader of two different troops in Salt Lake City.

The four young women who were awarded their Golden Eagle Badges in 1930 are all still alive and are called the Golden Eaglets. And of the group of counselors at old Camp Pinar, 12 are still alive and are called Pinarites. While raising her son and teaching school, Phyllis was only semiactive but did work with Tree-Foil, (older scouts) planning and working with all their activities.

Phyllis can still wear her origi-

nal khaki uniform adorned with her merit badges and various pins and identifying emblems. When she has no more use for it, it will be displayed at the new Scout Museum in Salt Lake City. To show that she is still a working Scout, in April Phyllis took charge of a Girl Scout Cookie Sale at her retirement home with cadettes from Troop 14 helping her with the sales.

Ruth Gaddis Jeffries


Delta Zeta's first editor of *The LAMP*, Ruth Gaddis Jeffries, Miami-A '08 has died in Tucson, Arizona.

Our pioneering editor, Ruth was an old hand at trail-blazing for Delta Zeta. She was one of those selected for the reviving of Alpha chapter in 1908; she assisted at the installations of Delta and Epsilon chapters. But, best of all, she was an enthusiastic and tireless worker.

Ruth was present at the 1910 convention when it was decided that Delta Zeta should have a magazine and she was everyone's choice for editor. She began her duties and in December of that year presented the sorority with Volume 1, Number 1. It is a slight little thing of 46 pages, with a brown cover completely lacking in eye appeal, but it was perused with delight by the Delta Zetas.

Subscription to the magazine had been made compulsory for college members at the 1910 convention but that was the sole financial arrangement made by the national organization for financing this venture. Ruth thus performed her work with the handicap of a treasury too much like Old Mother Hubbard's cupboard. The printer of that first issue was her uncle, a DePauw Sigma Chi. We suspect the cost was very modest, knowing Ruth and her persuasive ways. She later said she wanted a green cover but brown paper was all they had!

After marriage and moving to Arizona, Ruth became very involved with Republican politics. During the Eisenhower days she was Regional Director for the Southwest and then vice president of the National Federation of Republican Women. One of her nicest political stints was representing Arizona when Hawaii became a state. Ruth always kept in touch with Delta Zetas through her friends and her granddaughter Pat, who was initiated at Gamma Nu chapter at Eastern Illinois. Her last national convention appearance was in 1970 in Phoenix, where she was accompanied by Pat.





Delta Zeta on Campus

Today's writer writes for a sophisticated, diversified audience particularly sensitive to vocabulary. In our specialized world, there are numerous vocabularies and jargons - education, computer, legal, to name a few. There are gender-sensitive dictionaries and word lists for writing about the disabled. No Greek-sensitive lists are in print, but a Greek thesaurus could help today's alumna reader. Old terms, quota, ceiling, limitation, total, still hold true, but trendy "sensitive" words are emerging.

To remove the stigma of the word pledge (long gone is the true meaning of *promise*) new members will soon be called just that, *new members*. They are taught about the sorority by "*educators*" not "trainers." Getting together with sorority sisters for girl-fun means going to an SNO (Sisters Night Out) or a sisterhood. Chapter officers and "executive boards" have transformed into "E-Boards" or Exec Boards.

There have been some name changes in the official family since last convention. Two recent brides had such great pictures and good ΔZ stories to go with them, I couldn't resist.





Progress Through Education

Change, though vital to advancement, is often difficult to accept. The old ways and the traditional manner of operating are hard to give up. "It was good enough for me," is the objection heard. But good change is necessary at times, and then viewed as "progress." As Delta Zeta approaches its 100th anniversary, it has become increasingly apparent that we are ready for some "progress" in the area of pledge education.

During the past year a committee comprised of twenty-seven members from every level of Delta Zeta membership and leadership has dedicated itself to examining, evaluating and refining our approach to educating and incorporating our newest members.

This study began for a number of very valid reasons. Among them was a desire to provide both a more relevant and realistic program for the '90s pledge — a woman who's often self-supporting, who's very involved with campus and community activities, whose academic success we strongly advocate, whose interaction with her family, church, sorority and perhaps a boyfriend, demanded that she prioritize her time.

Too, Delta Zeta has always been committed to the elimination of hazing from our campuses. Any form of hazing is a deplorable and unproductive practice, and it sometimes stems from lengthy and/or poorly planned and executed pledge educational programs. We seek to eliminate all forms of hazing and to provide only worthwhile, supportive, and fun-filled educational activities for our women. University officials are mandating that fraternal organizations on their campuses develop more effective programs or face extinction. In response to that type of pronouncement Delta Zeta asserts that we plan to be around for a long time!

Seeing the successful examples set by other National Panhellenic Conference groups, it's apparent how effective a shortened and enhanced program can truly be. They cite improved academic success, better assimilation of members and a superior quality of membership for all. (Twelve of the NPC groups have already made changes to their membership's educational process while eight more, including Delta Zeta, are in the development stages of such change.) To remain competitive in rush situations we must offer women a similarly sound membership plan.

Additionally, the two-tiered status evident in some of our chapters where pledges may be deemed "less than" initiates demands reformation. Our newly pledged members are indeed **members** and this new program strives to make that status more equitable. With their responsibilities of membership should also come rights and privileges. This plan will stress the idea of CHAPTER UNITY rather than just pledge class unity.

SPECTRUM, the title we've chosen for our total membership plan, represents a multi-faceted unit, with each segment retaining individual characteristics, yet blended together to form a whole. Overall it seeks to offer programmatic advances to improve the quality of membership throughout each facet of the Delta Zeta experience.

Additional study and refinement of Delta Zeta's initiate and alumnae programming will continue in the next few years, but Phase I of SPECTRUM is our New Member Education Program. This nationally structured six week program (tied in with our six Founders) includes five actual weeks of education focusing on topics like Delta Zeta history and traditions; our organizational and operational structures; NPC/IFC Greek responsibilities, opportunities and interaction; FIPG (risk management), Delta Zeta antihazing and alcohol policies; leadership; a continued stress on academics; time management and communication skills.

Each chapter will be required to hold a retreat for all members, plus alumnae as invited guests, in the first two weeks of the program. Here, interaction among participants will be fostered by team- building exercises, introspective activities and one-to-one communication. It will provide an opportunity for members to get to know each other more fully in a relaxed, yet supportive, atmosphere.

The sixth and final week includes evaluation of the overall new member experience and three days of inspirational Lamplighting activities designed to prepare our candidates for initiation. It is immediately after this week that initiation for Delta Zeta women would be held.

In this program a woman would both pledge and initiate in Delta Zeta using the same grade point, which now will be a cumulative of 2.5 (for either high school or college work). She must be enrolled in ten (10) credit hours the term of pledging, unless otherwise dictated by campus full-time student policy. We have outlined five different methods by which these facts can be documented and anticipate the cooperation of the local Panhellenic, the Registrar's Office, the Dean of Students' Office, the Greek Affairs Coordinator and/or the woman herself in demonstrating her eligibility to us.

Realizing the high cost of education overall, our membership fees have been maintained at the same level and only the method and timing of payment have been restructured in an effort to assist each new member in meeting all her financial obligations. Each initiate will continue to order and wear the beautiful Delta Zeta badge which is is an outward sign of our membership.

The National Pledge Exam, which used to be given before initiation was allowed, has been eliminated. This new program allows more effective avenues for the women to demonstrate an understanding of our basic prin-


ciples and ideals than the reiteration of numerous facts learned simply for a test.

Not only does this new program aim to integrate our pledged women more quickly, we have redefined their role within the chapter. One way in which we hope to emphasize this component is a name change; our former "pledges" will now be called "new members," suggesting from the outset a more equitable level of membership involvement. Along with the responsibilities of membership given them, their rights and privileges have been increased. Among those are the right to attend general chapter meetings (which address all business of the chapter but include no ritual) and the right to exercise full voting privileges.

Coupled with our Big Sister/Pledge Mom system of familial guidance, we have provided for triads (Delta Sisters) comprised of a new member, initiate and senior member and/or alumna for continual interaction and participation during each term through academics, activities, philanthropy, etc. This will provide additional support for each new member and afford further opportunities for the women to work together in building chapter unity and in effecting lifetime commitment.

By endorsement of the International Council, the program was introduced at this summer's convention and begun as a pilot program with twelve of our 177 chapters this academic year. The chapters selected represent every area of the country, every type of campus and living situation and every size of chapter. We have contacted the administrators and Greek advisors on these campuses seeking their involvement and cooperation in executing this developmental program. With input from our pilot chapters during the 1993-94 year and with close supervision by the College Chapter Director, Province Collegiate Director, chapter advisors and the Director of New Member Education, we hope to fine tune the components of this program so that it may then be utilized with all our chapters. With more effective education and positive public relations we can strengthen the Greek system overall.

Delta Zeta invites you to join us on this journey into the future as we anticipate the successful implementation of Delta Zeta's **SPECTRUM** on campuses this fall. Let's make "progress" together!

elta Zetas across the country have dreamed of having a chapter at Gallaudet University. We have often thought how wonderful it would be to visit with Delta Zeta sisters during a road trip to Washington, D.C. We have watched the Gallaudet Dance Company and wondered if any of them would have been Delta Zetas. It only made sense to be represented on a campus that Delta Zeta had supported for nearly 40 years. Those thoughts and dreams came true when $O\Sigma$ was installed at Gallaudet University on April 24-25. 1993.

A chapter consultant was sent to Gallaudet to assist the interest group with their membership. These 16 women pulled together as they had in the past to do something they had never done before

... RUSH!! After a week of intense rushing a formal pledge class was selected. On February 28, 1993, Delta Zeta pledged 34 women at Gallaudet University.

February 28th was really just the beginning for these women. I remember their first pledge meeting when I handed out their

pledge books and the calendar as if it were yesterday. There was so much excitement and energy in that room that it reminded me of how proud it feels to be a Delta Zeta. he interest group of women at Mars Hill College, Mars Hill, North Carolina, had a vision to bring the first national sorority on campus. The campus already had four local sororities, but these women did not find what they were looking for in a Greek organization with these choices. So they formed their own local sorority in order to be recognized by the Greek Council. A few months later, in April, 1992, Omicron Mu chapter at University of South Carolina at Spartanburg pledged Omicron Xi colony into Delta Zeta.

However, Omicron Xi had many obstacles to overcome before they were initiated and installed. When Chapter Consultant Shellie Littrel arrived in September the Inter-Greek Council (IGC) was in chaos with Delta Zeta the cause of it. Due to the lack of a Panhellenic system and the IGC's inexperience with national sororities, Delta Zeta was being put on probation for a semester to "prove" themselves as a sisterhood to the IGC. This consisted of the inability to participate in fall rush.

For a semester, Omicron Xi completed their pledge education program, elected officers and were trained in their positions, participated and placed in events at Homecoming, publicized Delta Zeta by attending campus and community events as a sisterhood. They wore their letters or pledge pins, sponsored fund raising activities, and "bonded" through a variety of sisterhood, social and philanthropic events.

Delta Zeta was the leader in sponsoring a campus beautification project to "Light Up Mars Hill" during the holidays. During a visit to Lenoir-Rhyne College, the sisters of Zeta Xi adopted Omicron Xi members as their "little sisters." The visit to Zeta Xi brought renewed enthusiasm and motivation as Omicron Xi prepared for their first rush in January.

"Country Spree with Delta Zee" was Omicron Xi's rush theme. The week of rush proved to be successful as they doubled their numbers and pledged the largest pledge class that Mars Hill had ever seen. Delta Zeta, after only one rush, was the largest student organization on campus!

Because there were new pledges, there were also new activities; big and little sisters, different sisterhood events, a pledge retreat and new ideas. Chapter Consultant Andrea Cooper visited the colony for officer training and gave them new ideas to build a stronger sisterhood. While the pledges were learning about Delta Zeta, they were also anxiously awaiting their initiation and installation.

Finally, almost one year after the original members had been pledged into Delta Zeta, Zeta Xi chapter at Lenoir-Rhyne College initiated Omicron Xi colony. The installation was on April 18, 1993.

The installation luncheon was held at The Grove Park Inn and Country Club with Director of Extension Sandra Sebrell Bailey presiding as toastmistress and International President Marvona Easley Tavlin as the installing officer.

As Omicron Xi members were called forward to sign the charter, they were presented with their certificates of membership. Mar-

vona Tavlin presented the chapter to Dr. Fred Bentley, President of Mars Hill College. Robin Dillingham Cole, Assistant to the Vice President of Student Affairs and Omicron Xi's initiated CCD, served as the special guest speaker. The sisters of Omicron Xi entertained their guests by doing the Delta Zeta Creed in sign language. Chapter Consultants Andrea Cooper and Shellie Littrel assisted the chapter throughout the luncheon.

PCD-XXI-W Debra Wood Pressley, PCD-XXI-E Karen Thomas Shiels, and PAD-XXI Patricia Menendez Tector welcomed Omicron Xi and read greetings from Delta Zetas and chapters throughout the nation. Also in attendance were Chapter Consultant Coordinator Ruth Weider Patterson, representatives from Lambda Phi, Appalachian State; Zeta Xi, Lenoir-Rhyne College; Beta Delta, University of South Carolina; Omicron Mu, University of South Carolina at Spartanburg; Theta Iota, Western Carolina University, Lambda Sigma, Winthrop College, and representatives from other Greek organizations on campus.

Omicron Xi started as a small group of women interested in having a Greek experience unlike any other on the Mars Hill campus. They found that experience in Delta Zeta and are now interested in sharing Delta Zeta with more women at Mars Hill College. The sisters of Omicron Xi discovered that Delta Zeta is more than a group of women. Delta Zeta is a lifelong commitment to sisterhood and high standards and Omicron Xi will build their future upon that strong foundation.
