Real People.... The National Council

he decision by Council to postpone convention until 1996 created a number of changes, not the least of which is the changing of some Council positions for the remainder of this triennium.

Three members had indicated earlier that they were unable to continue past this summer's convention. The nominating committee had already met and selected a slate to present.

The Delta Zeta Constitution provides that any vacancy occurring in an office on the National Council in the interim between conventions shall be filled by a written ballot vote of the members of National Council.

Guided by direction of the Parliamentarian and the Constitution and Code Chairman, the Council met and accepted the slate of the nominating committee and the resignations of Vice President of Alumnae Phyllis Berens Ross; Vice President of Collegians Merry Westbrook Adamcik, and Secretary Charlotte Davis.

We introduce you now to your Council for this triennium including those who served for the first two years and those who will complete the triennium on the Council.

Continuing in their 1993 elective positions are National President Sandra McAlister Nesbitt and National Vice President of Membership Lynnda Wolf Hoefler. Moving into the position of Vice President of Alumnae is Pamela McClure Cronenwett, former Treasurer. Assuming the Treasurer's position is former Director Ruth Weider Patterson. The Secretary's position is filled by Director Jeanine Petersen Triplett. The Vice President of Collegians will be former Director Karly Klemp Burns. New Directors on the Council are Denise Williams McCullars and Debbie Raziano. Sandra Sebrell Bailey will continue as NPC Delegate and Marvona Easley Taylin as Past President (these are Council-appointed positions.)

Now to acquaint you with these "real people" who give so much of their time and talent to provide our leadership:

Sandra McAlister Nesbitt

Sandi Nesbitt's bachelor's degree is in elementary education. She graduated from Alabama Polytechnic Institute (now Auburn University) and taught elementary school while her husband finished school. They then moved from the area and she said her only contact with Delta Zeta was to write references and correspond with her own Beta Xi sisters.

Some 12 years later the Nesbitts moved back to Auburn and Sandi joined the alumnae chapter. Soon thereafter, she was asked to be College Chapter Director for Beta Xi, a job she held for seven years. Andrea started Troop 5 at Ashley Hall in 1992 when her young daughter was interested in Girl Scouting, but found there was no troop at her school. When it was chartered the troop had 11 members. Today it has grown to 32 members, serving girls in first through third grades. "Even with our assistant leader and lots of parental involvement, sometimes getting these Brownies to all do one activity simultaneously is like herding cats! Fortunately, their enthusiasm is contagious," comments Andrea.

The troop has participated in numerous service projects on their school campus and in the community. "We follow our Brownie Handbook to earn our Brownie 'try-its' but we try to incorporate service projects into the badge work," says Andrea. "My favorite part of Girl Scouting has been teaching my Brownies about their own capabilities while they help others."

With proceeds from the recent Girl Scout cookie sale, Ashley Hall's Troop 5 has purchased troop flags for their color guard and playground equipment for their lower school campus. This summer Troop 5 will fund two scholarships to send less fortunate scouts to local Girl Scout day camps.

Cammie Blevins. The Brownie Girl Scouts worked on the play, music and movers try-its. Approximately 30 first through third graders attended this event on April 8, 1995. On the following day, Cammie Blevins designed a Disability Awareness Day for Girl Scouts. This was in conjunction with a course requirement for community awareness of disabilities. The day focused on visual impairment.

The Girl Scouts of Nacogdoches and San Jacinto Council look forward to additional collaboration with Delta Zeta to serve the community.

The Delta Theta Chapter at the University of Houston coordinated a volunteer effort with the San

Jacinto Girl Scout Council in Houston. Leslie Bellfore, philanthropy chairman, worked with Jeanne Chaffee Tobin, Zeta Omicron '79, Director of Fund Development for the Girl Scout Council's gala "Urban Campout Goes on Safari." Urban Campout is an annual adult event and this year raised over \$177,000 for atrisk girls in the greater Houston community, thus allowing these young women to participate in the self-esteem and leadership building activities that Girl Scouting offers. Delta Theta members manned the registration desk, assisted guests with a scavenger hunt through the Museum of Natural Science's Serengeti Plain, helped with silent auction tables and distributed guest survival kits.

Needless to say Delta Zeta's assistance ensured an enjoyable evening and hopefully established a beginning to a longrunning philanthropic association between the San Jacinto Girl Scout Council and the Delta Theta chapter at the University of Houston.

Leading up to this event is the Kentucky Derby Festival. Millions of people watch the Derby on TV, but in Kentucky the Derby festivities start two weeks prior to the actual race.

Over 70 events, parties and functions take place during these two weeks. And, 1995 marked the 40th year for this two-week long extravaganza. Only the Rose Bowl Festival in California rivals this festival.

One of the grandest traditions of the festival is the crowning of the Queen. She is crowned at the Fillies Ball which is sponsored by Fillies, Inc., a group of more than 200 women who contribute their time.

energy and talent to the event. The first queen was crowned in 1957. The third queen, Martha Layne Hall, later served as the first woman governor of Kentucky.

The Queen's court is chosen by personal interviews through a selection committee and each candidate is chosen based on poise, dress and personality. Also taken into consideration are campus and com-

Once crowned, the Queen and her court attend over 40 festival events which include box seats on the finish line for the Kentucky Derby. The Queen and her court have their own float for the popular Pegasus Parade which precedes the running of the Derby. This year Willard Scott served as Grand Marshall for the parade and Tara and her court appeared on his Thursday morning show on NBC.

Tara and her court were provided wardrobes, and personal escorts were assigned to see that they made it to all the various events. A typical day included an early morning breakfast, a day of selected activities and ended with a dinner that evening.

Reflecting on the experience as queen, Tara stated: "It was quite an honor to represent such a wonderful city. I would have to say that some of the most memorable times were seeing the children's smiling faces. These children (as well as the public) had their eyes on the 'princesses' throughout the festival. I enjoyed meeting Tom Meeker, president of

Churchill Downs. I had never been to the track, so for me this was very exciting."

Young Women's Health Promotion Program

o lecturing, no scare tactics, just the facts. That was the concept in designing a unique yet entertaining health program specifically for college women that will be available to all chapters beginning this fall. Included in this program, designed by the Society for the Advancement of Women's Health Research and the Office on Women's Health of the U.S. Public Health Service (PHS), is a 27minute motivating video and a written guide to provide additional information on how to stay healthy and to answer any questions on important issues such as sexuality, osteoporosis and breast cancer.

The guide will also be a useful resource for a chapter president, a local health professional or a program coordinator in leading a discussion on issues raised during the program. All Delta Zeta collegians will receive a reprint of *Shape* magazine's September issue which is dedicating six pages to this program.

The Society and the PHS Office on Women's Health recognize that college women lead hectic lifestyles and are aware of the inconveniences involved in trying to juggle school work with jobs, extracurricular activities and social schedules. Achieving a balance between eating properly, staying active and still having time to concentrate can be quite difficult, but it's not impossible. For example, if running or aerobics aren't interesting, try taking long walks with a friend, or dancing, or doing yoga and reap excellent health benefits! One doesn't have to hate being active decide what works! The options are endless! Through the video, substantive information will be provided on the importance of developing a healthy self-image, receiving proper nutrition and sustaining an exercise routine that is unique to each individual, in addition to other issues in an easy-to-understand format that helps one take charge of mental and physical wellbeing. Despite the internal and external pressures that women this age experience, you have the power to make proper decisions regarding your health.

The impact that college women's day-today behaviors have on their health is staggering. Consider the following statistics:

- One out of every four women under the age of 25 smokes, and teenage women now smoke at higher rates than their male counterparts. Ninety percent of people who smoke began as adolescents. Smoking is the leading preventable cause of death in the United States. Smoking contributes to heart disease, osteoporosis and several cancers including those of the lung and maybe breast.
- Peak prevalence for alcohol abuse occurs for young women ages 18-25.
 Moreover, because women metabolize alcohol differently than men, women become intoxicated after drinking smaller quantities of alcohol. Alcohol abuse is linked to several diseases including osteoporosis, liver disease, several cancers and reproductive problems.
- About two percent of young women have an eating disorder including anorexia nervosa or bulimia. As many as five percent of all high school seniors have an eating disorder, and as many as 20 percent of girls and women display some signs of an eating disorder. Eating disorders are linked to many forms of premature death and disability including heart disease and osteoporosis.
- One out of every two women over the age of 45 will develop osteoporosis, a debilitating and deadly disease. Osteoporosis is preventable if women

take measures to attain peak bone density before the age of 35 through proper diet and exercise in addition to taking preventive measures throughout their lifespans.

• Breast cancer affects one in eight American women over their lifespan. Fifty to sixty percent of those who develop breast cancer have no known risk factor for the disease. Breast tissue may be most susceptible to carcinogens during the adolescent and early adult years. Recent scientific studies indicate that diet and exercise during this life stage may help to prevent breast cancer.

As is evident from these facts, it is imperative that college women receive reliable, up-to-date information regarding disease prevention and health promotion in order to make informed decisions regarding their health.

You have the capability today of designing your life for tomorrow. Even modifying relatively few behaviors and making slight changes in your lifestyle, you can reap great benefits that will stay with you for the rest of your life. Your well-being matters and only you can protect it. Through the distribution of the video, we hope to prove that to you.

Better Speech and Hearing Month

Former Delta Zeta Foundation President Joan Dondrea Lowry, honorary president for Better Hearing and Speech Month, and Miss America Heather Whitestone, honorary chairman, launched the 1995 Campaign Kick-off for Better Hearing and Speech Month in Washington, D. C., in early May. They attended a reception at the Capital Children's Museum, hosted a press conference and visited the Hill. Joan and Heather, joined by Child of the Year Christina Dayle Smith, talked with Congressional leaders and filmed public service announcements to increase awareness of hearing and speech disorders. Miss America produced a public service announcement for the Better Hearing Institute that will air on national television.

Both Joan, who serves as treasurer of the Better Hearing Institute, and Heather spoke during the kick-off event. Heather, who is hearing-impaired, presented her Miss America platform position of STARS, and motivated all young people who are deaf or hard-of-hearing to pursue broad range communications and educational options in their lives. She encouraged them to choose the options that will build selfesteem and reflect their goals. She pointed out that their lives are about their abilities — not disabilities.

Better Hearing and Speech Month is organized by the Council for Better Hearing and Speech, a consortium of 28 national and local organizations dedicated to increasing public awareness of speech and hearing disorders. American-Speech-Language-Hearing Association, a consortium member, chaired this year's event. Delta Zeta Sorority and the Delta Zeta Foundation are among the 28 consortium members.

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


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
