

rom its earliest beginnings as the settlement of the Agna Callente band of Cahulla Indians, Palm Springs has lured the rich, the famous and the nature lover.

Its desert location is a land of extremes — heat and cold, bright lights and deep shadows. There are soft sand dunes and deeply eroded cliffs, golden poppies and spiny cacti, creeping tortoises and soaring golden eagles — viewed against a background of jagged mountains.

Palm Springs and the Riviera Resort lured some 500 Delta Zetas from across the United States and Canada for the Sorority's 42nd National Convention starting on June 21. It took two airports to accommodate the arriving delegates and visitors. Luckier ones landed at Palm Springs, others were bussed from the Ontario airport some miles away. And of course, there was the usual lost luggage, but accommodating sisters loaned everything from opening banquet formals to white initiation clothing!

And finally, our long-awaited Convention was happening! The Grand Ballroom was aglow when the National Council, Past National Officers, Foundation Trustees and Delta Zeta Women of the Year were introduced and escorted to two tiers of head tables.

"From Dreams to Reality . . . Reach for the Stars" was indeed the theme of the evening as keynote speaker Barbara Meshad Dooley, Auburn-B Ξ , entertained her audience with humor, much food for thought and a deeply caring attitude.

Barbara, the wife of Vincent Dooley, the legendary football coach of the Georgia Bulldogs, hosts an informal radio talk show from Atlanta, Georgia, three times a week. One of the most popular banquet speakers in the South, she is author of the book, *Put Me in Coach* (Article in *The LAMP*, Fall 1992). Barbara did indeed set the tone for the days to come. Her appearance was made possible by a donation to the Foundation from her chapter, Beta Xi at Auburn.

This opening banquet with Vice President of Collegiate Affairs Karly Klemp Burns and National Treasurer Ruth Weider Patterson presiding included volunteer recognition of our "oh, so important"

college chapter directors. And there was the Alice Huenefeld Award for Delta Zeta's most outstanding CCD. This year's recipient was Christine Martin, CCD for Beta Tau chapter at Nebraska Wesleyan University.

Florence Hood Miner presented her FHM Award for outstanding juniors to five this year, and Julie Anderson of Beta Tau was there to receive her pendant from our Living Legend herself.

The actual formal opening of Convention was at 8 a.m. on Saturday with National President Sandra McAlister Nesbitt presiding. The meeting started with the introduction of the new college and alumnae chapters of this triennium. The college chapters are Alfred University-O Φ , Brock University-OT, Columbus College- $\Lambda\Psi$, and Western State (Colorado) College-EA. Columbus and Western are recolonizations of former chapters.

Alumnae chapters introduced include Atlanta-Stone Mountain (Georgia) Bay Area (Texas), Inland Empire (California), Plano-

Collin County (Texas), Wilson (North Carolina), Morehead Area (Kentucky) and Erie County (Pennsylvania).

Founder Mary Collins is the third founder to be recognized in biennium years before 2002. Reflections on her life and times were given by Florence Miner and Lucile Crowell Cooks.

The "State of the Sorority" address was delivered by Sandra Nesbitt and various committees reported. Among these was the long-awaited report of the Structure Committee, a report seven years in the making. This was presented to the Convention by Past National President Norma Minch Andrisek, assisted by other members of the committee.

That afternoon was devoted to break-out sessions for discussion of the structure report.

A financial seminar later in the afternoon was chaired by Treasurer Ruth Patterson with a representative from Coopers & Lybrand providing additional information.

Ritual Chairman Karen Kind Veitch and members of Iota Upsilon chapter at CSU/Fullerton performed a perfect initiation service for two very special Convention initiates, Missy Blunt Lohrey and Caren Metcalf Hansel, longtime staff members at National Headquarters.

The Initiation Banquet followed, with National Secretary and Director of New Member Education Jeanine Petersen Triplett presiding.

Presentation of the six 1996 Grace Mason Lundy Award winners was by two of our "GML girls" — Director of Membership

Services Deborah Raziano and Director of Extension Jamie Hammill Pyne.

Caryatides Awards for new member education programs were presented by Jeanine Triplett and our Convention initiates were introduced by Sandra Nesbitt. Jamie Pyne's delivery of *The Legend of the Loving Cup* concluded a traditionally special evening of ritual.

Sunday morning brought conventioneers to the tennis court bleachers for a panoramic picture taking session and then it was on to a moving memorial service led by NPC Delegate Sandra Sebrell Bailey and Past National Officer Charlotte Davis. Then it

was back to more business meeting followed by the Alumnae Rose Luncheon.

Vice President of Alumnae Affairs
Pamela McClure Cronenwett presided at
this luncheon where alumnae chapters
were recognized for achievement; Golden
Rose and Order of the Pearl members were
recognized and presentations made. The
13 new recipients of the ACHOTH Award
for long and dedicated service at the local
level were announced. Delta Zeta volunteers — Province Collegiate and Alumnae
Directors, National Committee Chairmen,
and *The LAMP* editor — were acknowledged as vital role players for Delta Zeta.

The afternoon was devoted to workshops, all titled *Power Reach I*.

The Kennel Club with Director Debbie Raziano and Director Denise Williams McCullars leading the *pack* played to a *packed* house audience. All conventioneers were recognized but only those with five or more were allowed to participate in platform woofing and howling. Awards were given in each class and, of course, there was a Best of Show.

And so it went ... and then on to poolside for a roaring fun night. The Riviera provided bountiful picnic buffet tables, a DJ provided music and the Delta Zetas did the entertaining. Debbie Raziano and Denise McCullars continued with the program which paused only long enough for Extension Director Jamie Pyne to announce a new colony at Santa Clara University, and Olan Mills' Jaime Davis presented a \$2,000 check to the Delta Zeta Foundation.

Later, National Historian Florence Miner entertained a number of delegates with her "Once Upon a Time in Delta Zeta" memories in a special fireside session.

Monday brought the Special Friends Breakfast hosted by the Delta Zeta Foundation for those special category donors present. Another business meeting included reports from the National Constitution

and Bylaws Committee and the Election and Tellers Committee.

Power Reach II workshops filled the afternoon hours and then it was time for the Collegiate Awards Banquet.

Vice President of Membership Lynnda Wolf Hoefler presided at the presentation of the collegiate program awards. This included recognition for activities, academics, social, sorority education, newsletter, financial

Foundation President Elsie Wheeler McTee presided at the Foundation luncheon where Trustees and former Trustees presented awards for alumnae and collegiate philanthropy, scholarships, Hearing Help Grants, collegiate and alumnae awards, the Mary Margaret Fore Philanthropy Award, the Joan Dondrea Lowry Public Relations Award and the Arlene Newman Marshall Tribute Award.

That afternoon NPC Delegate Sandra Bailey introduced the Carolyn Barnes Gullatt Symposium speaker, Mr. David Westol. His appearance was made possible through a gift to the Foundation in honor of Elsie McTee from Omicron Alpha chapter at St. Mary's University.

Past National President Marvona Easley Tavlin presided at the Installation Banquet and the presentation of the "biggies" — those coveted honors so cherished by the chapters. Assisting Marvona were members of the National Council.

Marvona also conducted the installation of the 1996-1998
National Council. In a moving candlelight service the following officers were installed: President Sandra McAlister Nesbitt, Vice President of Membership Lynnda Wolf Hoefler, Vice President of Alumnae Affairs Pamela McClure Cronenwett, Vice President of Collegiate Affairs Karly Klemp Burns, Secretary Jeanine Petersen Triplett, Treasurer Ruth Weider Patterson and Directors Deborah Raziano and Denise Williams McCullars.

As the Council moved around the ballroom floor lighting individual candles, *Delta Zeta Lamps are Burning* was on the lips of everyone.

Marvona Tavlin then pinned the President's Badge on Sandra Nesbitt and our two gavels, the ivory one the gift of Beta Phi Alpha so long ago, were given back to Sandi for her second term as President. 


Five Receive Florence Hood Miner Award


Jennifer Lee Franklin William Jewell College-ZP

Maeola Eastburn Beitzel, CSU/Chico-ΔX, for whom the school is named, commissioned the stained-glass windows depicting early California agricultural crops. These windows are placed in the library of the new school.

The Beitzel school is a 39,000-square-foot facility containing two kindergarten rooms, 10 permanent classrooms, six portables, a library, multi-purpose room, computer labs, special education room and a privately run child care center. Present enrollment is 656 students from kindergarten through sixth grade.

The news isn't surprising, though, since 100% of all public universities have Internet access, and nearly 98% of all private universities have the same. College students are the most frequent users of the World Wide Web, and often have free access to this global communication system. These Delta Zeta college women are creating "Web" or "home" pages that just may be the beginning of hundreds of thousands of Delta Zetas communicating with each other globally and electronically.

Each of the six college chapter sites is well worth an electronic visit, and several represent examples of excellent graphic sites. Turn on your modem and log onto the Internet (or ask your children to log on for you) and visit these Delta Zeta chapters online.

Omicron Sigma at Gallaudet University provides quick "links" (Internet connections) to the other Delta Zeta chapters. 

Substance-Free Housing: Saving the Greek System

To be consistent with the standards and purpose of Delta Zeta Sorority and to remain in compliance of federal, state or municipal laws or regulations, and rules of the colleges or university where Delta Zeta has chapter houses, the National Council is in strong support of and recommends substance-free housing.

al Christensen knew it was time for change if the fraternity system at Utah State University had any hope of surviving. Christensen, vice president for student services at USU, saw a dying fraternity system that was a mere shell of what he had experienced as a college undergraduate member of Pi Kappa Alpha.

"I was looking for an idea we could use — anything we could do to save the system," Christensen says of the seemingly insurmountable problems he faced in the spring of 1995. "We had tried everything — carding at the door, requiring invitations. Nothing worked. Alcohol abuse was killing us." The once-proud Greek system at USU had deteriorated to the brink of extinction. USU was experiencing incident after incident, and alcohol was involved in almost every case.

"We simply weren't getting the best students," Christensen says. "The best ones don't want to live in an unsafe place where they cannot study. They weren't joining fraternities."

Christensen wasn't the first to recognize the problem. Nor was Utah State the first campus to experience it. Leaders of the National Interfraternity Conference had seen the same pattern repeated nationwide, and a major turnaround had caught their eye. The Sigma Chi chapter at the University of Maine had been on the brink of extinction, and in desperation alumni there imposed a substance-free living environment. It was a last-chance effort to save the chapter. To their delight, it worked. The chapter rebounded, and three years later it is quite successful. A Sigma Chi now heads the Interfraternity Council at Maine.

In an effort to stem the deterioration of the Greek system nationwide, NIC offered a trial program based on some of the concepts used at Maine. The result was a substance-free living program, and NIC floated the idea in one of its publications in the spring of 1995.

"I'd looked for years for an idea we could use," says Christensen. "When I saw that newsletter, I called NIC and asked if I could implement the program. They agreed, and we imposed it as our policy, word for word, for the fall of 1995. Needless to say, I wasn't a very popular guy around here."

At first, undergraduate men balked at the idea of ridding fraternity houses of alcohol. So did members of women's groups, who were accustomed to using the fraternity houses as convenient places to drink.

Today, many in the Utah State system have become converts.

"Things have gone really well," says David Dyer, president of USU's Delta Sigma Phi chapter. "Oh sure, we had some things to struggle with, like alumni who didn't understand what we had done. And as far as activities go, you have to be creative."

"Still, on balance it's been good. The problems we used to have with the surrounding community have disappeared, and we have a much better atmosphere in the house."

One year later, Christensen considers the program a resounding success. So does the NIC, which has partnered with the National Panhellenic Conference to create a Joint Task Force on Substance-Free Housing. Together, NIC and NPC intend to implement the program on several test campuses for the 1996-97 academic year.

"Men's groups cannot solve this problem by themselves," says Jean Scott of Pi Beta Phi, who chairs NPC. "On campuses where there is a system-wide effort to pursue substance-free housing, members of women's fraternities should work with fraternity men to help them successfully reach this meaningful goal."

Christensen agrees. "We had only one bad incident last year in which a fraternity decided to violate our policy," he says. "They brought alcohol into the house. The women not only refused to participate, they turned them in." It hasn't happened again.

"Participation of the women's groups is essential," Christensen says. "We have to change the drinking culture on campus, and without the women's participation, it won't happen."

Christensen hastens to add that the situation at Utah State is far from perfect. Still, last year there wasn't a single arrest on Greek Row: There were no police raids on fraternity houses. Negative incidents of all types dropped dramatically.

Christensen also says that retention rates (the percentage of pledges actually initiated) are up and that members of Greek organizations are more visible in community and campus affairs. Volunteerism has increased sharply.

"It's definitely possible to change the culture," says Christensen, "but it takes support from every alumni group as well as the undergraduates. We're recruiting higher-quality members who are more academically oriented. Those people didn't join before."

Those very attributes are the things that persuaded Brad Dove to join the reborn Alpha Tau Omega chapter at Purdue University. After closing its chapter two years ago, ATO recolonized at Purdue last year and enlisted 36 new members. Dove was one of them.

"I had looked at other fraternities on campus," he says. "Some of the images I didn't care for. I thought that with a substance-free house, there would be more brotherhood. The chapter would be more committed to academics."

Fraternities have succeeded as part of the college scene for more than 200 years, largely due to the members' ability to adapt to the changing needs of students and society. Today, it is clear that campuses and communities will no longer tolerate underage drinking as acceptable behavior. Can fraternities adapt to this changing expectation?

"Sure, they can adapt," says Christensen. "But it takes a lot of work from every group, undergraduates and alumni, men and women. Everyone said it couldn't be done, but we've done it. I've been here a long time, and this is our best year ever."

How to Do It

Step 1. Develop a coalition that includes the administration, national men's and women's fraternities with chapters on the campus, IFC and Panhellenic officers, chapter advisors and house corporation boards, local alumni and alumnae, and key community representatives, especially local government and law enforcement.

Step 2. Presidents of men's and women's fraternity chapters and IFC and panhellenic officers spend a weekend on retreat talking through their reactions to the substance-free decision, accepting the decision and making plans to move forward with it.

Step 3. Host a convocation for all undergraduate fraternity men and women. All coalition members will be represented and will present the substance-free guidelines, with special emphasis on the benefits to members, chapters and the Greek system as a whole.

Step 4. Following the general convocation, national officers and staff will meet with their own collegiate and alumni members to discuss implementation of the plan.

Step 5. Each national organization will send a mailing to all living alumni/ae of the chapter to explain the substance-free guidelines.

Step 6. A panel of representatives from the coalition will serve as an oversight board and resource team to ensure compliance, provide encouragement and reward success.

Step 7. The campus and local media will be invited to general meetings and will be kept informed about the progress of the initiative.

UTAH STATE ISN'T ALONE

Several campuses in addition to Utah State have implemented substance-free environments. The largest so far is the University of Colorado, where the Interfraternity Council decided to go substance-free in a response to heavy criticism of the Greek community at what has been described as one of America's top party schools. There, too, the program has been successful, despite some early stumbles. Boulder, Colorado, police have been active participants in the program, and they now sing the praises of the revived Greek community.

Several national fraternities, including such large groups as Sigma Nu, have committed to becoming substance-free nationwide by the year 2000. Others have started requiring chapters to make the change following risk-management violations. Some are committing to substance-free housing as they rebuild or remodel. Still others have committed to cooperate with NIC and NPC and implement the program in all chapters located on target campuses.

"We are starting with a few college campuses," says Lissa Bradford of Kappa Alpha Theta and co-chair of the NIC-NPC Joint Task Force on Substance-Free Housing. "Then, we will use these experiences to refine the process and expand to other locations."

"We want to see hundreds of campuses doing this in the next couple of years," says Carlton Bennett of Theta Chi, who co-chairs the task force with Bradford. "It could be what sayes the Greek system."


