

Delta Zeta's National Council will be elected by the delegates at the 2004 Convention held at Saddlebrook Resort, in Tampa, Florida, as provided in the Constitution of Delta Zeta.

As a member of Delta Zeta, you have the privilege of sharing in this democratic procedure by making recommendations to the Nominating Committee. Recommendations for candidates may be submitted by an individual, an alumnae chapter or chapter association, or a collegiate chapter to the Nominating Committee. Nominations may also be made from the floor by official delegates at the Convention. The Nominating Committee invites you to assist in this very important process, and will give careful consideration to all recommendations received.

The Nominating Committee is made up of a Chairman who is a Past National Officer appointed by National Council, and eight delegates from the following groups: Regional Collegiate Coordinators, Area Alumnae Directors and designated Area Alumnae Chairmen, National Standing Committee Chairmen, College Chapter Directors, College Chapters, and Alumnae Chapters.

Hazel Bentley Eubanks ZII '61 Delta Zeta's 1971 Woman of the Year, passed away in September of 2003 in Atlanta, Georgia at the age of 83. Mrs. Eubanks was the national president of the Girls Clubs of America from 1968-1970, having served on the board since 1956. She was recognized as a leader in promoting individual and group development in girls from childhood through high school. She and her late husband Bob were world travelers, and visited many missionary outposts during their travels. She was the first woman in Georgia to be named to the Southern Baptist Convention's executive board.

Delta Zeta lost Mary Ann Gallatin French AE '46 in June of 2003. Mrs. French served as a National Colonnade Clubs Chairman, PCD for Province XVI (Oklahoma), President of her collegiate chapter at Oklahoma State University, Alpha Epsilon, and President of the Oklahoma City and Long Island Alumnae Chapters. An Achoth Award winner, Mrs. French was the 1975 Oklahoma City Panhellenic Woman of the Year.

Dear Delta Zeta Sisters and Friends,

When I make a contribution to a charity, I'm thinking of the ways other people will be helped by my gift and not that my donation will somehow come back to benefit me. At a recent national Foundations Seminar I attended, the speaker challenged the audience to think of ways our gifts to our sorority's Foundation had helped people we knew or even ourselves. At first I couldn't think of any examples, but then I began to realize that cliché "what goes around, comes around" is really true.

My daughter, Betsy, was the recipient of a graduate scholarship from the Delta Zeta Foundation. She decided to do her master's level work at the University of South Carolina, where she was a member of the Beta Delta Chapter, and she served as the chapter's College Chapter Director (CCD) until she finished her degree. She received a second Delta Zeta graduate scholarship while doing doctoral work at Johns Hopkins. A few years later she was living in Washington, D.C., when the Omicron Sigma Chapter at Gallaudet University was installed, and she was appointed as its first CCD.

Almost all of the women who receive scholarships comment in their thank you notes to the Foundation that they one day hope to give back to the Sorority in service and funds. They may receive other and larger scholarships, but it is the scholarship from Delta Zeta that seems to mean the most to them.

A close friend from my high school days has a daughter who is profoundly deaf. When her daughter was ready for college, she chose to go to Gallaudet University. My friend knew that I am a Delta Zeta, so she wrote to thank me for all the support Delta Zeta provided to Gallaudet. Knowing her daughter puts a personal "face" on my gifts to our speech and hearing projects, I know for sure that my gifts help!

My parents' home was in Springfield, Ohio, so when I had to be at our National Headquarters in Oxford, Ohio for a Foundation meeting, I would often add in a visit to my mom and dad. My father always wanted to know if I was still doing "all that work for no pay" for Delta Zeta. I'd show him a copy of the latest issue of The LAMP so he could read my President's message in the Foundation Focus section. He would then say, "Well, you must be doing some good, so keep it up." Dad died in March this year, and the outpouring of love, support and notes from my Delta Zeta sisters and the contributions to the Foundation in his memory were a great source of comfort to my mother, my family, and me.

I imagine that all of us have similar stories of Delta Zeta benefits received as well as given. No matter how hard any of us work for Delta Zeta, the rewards are so much greater that they are simply priceless. Our gifts to the Foundation ensure not only that "others" benefit, but also that our own memories always have a Delta Zeta home.



From the Director of Development

Just now, my wife and I are in the midst of rewriting our wills. We both have put off this obligation much too long, and our attorney gave us a wonderful checklist of things we need to ponder in the process. When we complete our drafts, we'll visit with him to authenticate what we've done, and to be assured that what we've written is legal.

Do we anticipate that our demise is imminent? Of course not!

But you know, over the years, I've known many people who seriously believed that to write a will hastens their death. (I've always threatened to write an estate-planning brochure titled "If I Write a Will, Will I Die?"). Just stating the proposition carries its own answer, I suppose, yet it's really surprising how many people dread making a will, let alone revising it from time to time.

Revising one's will as the years pass can be almost therapeutic! For one thing, the exercise gives you the opportunity to re-think how you want to be remembered, what charities and organizations have meant the most to you, and how your assets will benefit those persons and organizations you have cherished in vour lifetime.

Segue to Delta Zeta!

In the normal course of its work, our Foundation staff often receives word of the passing of an alumna, and that she had made provisions in her estate plans to remember Delta Zeta. What might be surprising to LAMP readers is that the attorney's letter is very often the first time we have known of her plans. And while we are always saddened to learn of the death of a member, we are grateful to know she wanted to help preserve the future of Delta Zeta by using her will to tell us her final wishes.

But we didn't know her wishes in her lifetime! That, too, is sad. We weren't aware she thought enough about her Delta Zeta experience to help make sure other women, whom she would never know, would benefit from her thoughtful gesture. Had we known, had she told us of her plans, we could have thanked her in person, possibly at her own chapter or an alumnae function or Convention or Leadership Conference.

We simply missed the chance to thank a most special lady.

All of this assumes our LAMP readers actually have a will. The sad fact is that most people die without one. And when there's no will, ...

- the state determines the distribution of your property
- the court appoints an administrator (not you);
- your heirs benefit equally by class, not necessarily in proportions you would have intended;
- you cannot provide for minors (the court appoints a guardian, and the guardian makes decisions about a child's care which you should have made);
- your estate likely will lose thousands of dollars in needless taxes because you didn't take advantage of tax-saving opportunities available to you;
- you cannot support a charitable cause (your Delta Zeta experience goes unrecognized, and with it the opportunity for others to benefit).

Delta Zeta's Oxford Society, created in 1995, honors and recognizes those who have made provisions in their estate plans for future generations of student members, for the continuation of educational programming, and for the preservation of our heritage. Your opportunity to become a member of our Oxford Society is as close as a phone call or letter (or e-mail).

It's not the amount you give that earns you a place in our Oxford Society! It's the excellence of your commitment to the future of Delta Zeta, and it offers your Sorority the wonderful opportunity to recognize and thank you in your lifetime.

Delta Zeta loves doing that!

SPOTLIGHT ON SCHOLARSHIPS

Delta Zeta's scholarship program is an essential part of the Delta Zeta Foundation. The scholarships Delta Zeta awards annually to worthy recipients are made possible by donations from members and friends. Founders Memorial Scholarship

The Founders Memorial Scholarship Fund was established in 1977, the year of Delta Zeta's 75th anniversary. 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

U.S. HOUSE PASSES CHARITABLE GIVING ACT

In the Summer 2003 issue of The LAMP, we reported on Greek fraternity and sorority leaders' visit to Congress to build support for H.R. 1523, The Collegiate Housing and Infrastructure Act, and the rider to this referendum, H.R. 7. Delta Zeta Sorority was among the representatives from the NPC groups who attended this important event.

On September 17, 38 fraternity and sorority leaders and Foundation presidents/executives lobbied members of the House of Representatives in support of House bill H.R. 7. The group also met with senators to urge them to include section 109 of H.R. 7 into the final version of the Senate's bill S. 476 that had been passed earlier this year. H.R. 7 and S. 476 are the two versions of the "Care Act of 2003."

Past National President Sandra McAlister Nesbitt BE and Foundation President Ruth Weider Patterson BX represented Delta Zeta. Senator Richard Shelby (R-Alabama) and Delta Zeta alumna Congresswoman Shelley Levine Berkley IΦ '70 (D-Nevada) were among those that they visited. Congresswoman Berkley informed Mrs. Nesbitt and Mrs. Patterson that she had voted for H.R. 7 and asked that they let her know of any future initiatives that were of importance to Greeks.

By midday on September 17, the House had debated and passed H.R. 7. The Greek representatives continued their visits, thanking House members for voting for the bill. If the visit was to a senator, they urged him/her to support a final version to include House Provision 109. This provision allows not-for-profit organizations to accept tax-deductible gifts for bricks and mortar. This would mean that the Delta Zeta Foundation would be able to accept taxdeductible gifts from alumnae to renovate and maintain current housing, as well as for the construction of new houses. All parts of the construction would be covered, not just the current "percentage for educational purposes."

Ruth Patterson was on a special delegation that met Senator Trent Lott (R-Mississippi), one of the highest-ranking members of the Senate Finance Committee. Members of this group will meet with House committee members to determine what the final version of the "Care Act of 2003" will include. Senator Lott will serve on the committee and said he would contact several other finance committee members to urge them to serve on the conferee committee and/or support the inclusion of section 109 of H.R. 7.





Ear Specialist to the Stars

HOUSE EAR INSTITUTE

Howard Payne House, M.D., aged 95, founder of the House Ear Institute and pioneering ear specialist died on August 1, 2003 of heart failure at St. Vincent Medical Center. Dr. House practiced otology at the House Ear Clinic in Los Angeles for 64 years and treated Hollywood's brightest stars, including Howard Hughes, Bob and Dolores Hope, Nanette Fabray EO, Phyllis Diller, Florence Henderson AX, and former President Ronald Reagan. Under his leadership, the House Ear Institute was the first medical organization to adapt movie cameras and accessories for use with a surgical microscope to create professional, medical training films.

Among his many achievements, Dr. House was appointed Chairman of the Subcommittee on Noise in 1947 and directed the national study on industrial noise that set the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) hearing conservation standards in use today. Dr. House was Head of the Department of Otolaryngology at University of Southern California School of Medicine from 1952 to 1961 and served on the faculty as Clinical Professor of Otology. Teaching was a passion for Dr. House, who established a successful continuing education program for physicians and researchers at the House Ear Institute.


In 1944, Dr. House opened his own office where he concentrated on the ears and throat (otolaryngology) and a procedure which restored hearing to people with otosclerosis. This led to the establishment of the Los Angeles Foundation of Otology in 1945 (renamed the House Ear Institute in 1981.)

Dr. House is internationally recognized for his contributions to hearing science and received numerous honorary degrees and Lifetime Achievement Awards, and served as president of numerous professional associations. He received USC's Outstanding Career Service Award and "Physician of the Year" awards from both the President's Committee and California Governor's Committee for Employment of the Handicapped.

The Delta Zeta Foundation has partnered with the House Ear Institute since 1985 to support the important work done at this facility. Dr. House was a special friend of Delta Zeta, and his presence will be deeply missed.

Dr. House is survived by sons Kenneth M. House, M.D., John W. House, M.D., and daughter Carolyn Helmuth; his brothers William F. House, M.D., a pioneer of neurotology, and James House, D.D.S., and nine grandchildren.



with Delta Zeta Sorority in 1956 represented the second charm. The third charm is represented by the installation of the Delta Omicron Chapter as it returns to the NWOSU campus.

The Alpha Chapter of Delta Sigma Epsilon Sorority was organized at Miami University in Oxford, Ohio in 1914. By 1917, Delta Sigma Epsilon had installed her fifth chapter and was admitted into the National Panhellenic for Education sororities (later renamed the Association of Educational Sororities). The sorority played a leading role in the policies that were adopted by the national association.

In 1940, Pi Delta Theta petitioned Delta Sigma Epsilon for membership, and this merger was first in the history of the Association of Educational Sororities. In 1947, Delta Sigma Epsilon became a member of the National Panhellenic Conference (NPC).

At the 1956 Convention of Delta Zeta Sorority, it was announced that Delta Sigma Epsilon had merged with Delta Zeta. With this union, Delta Zeta became one of the largest of the Panhellenic sororities. Members of Delta Sigma Epsilon's Grand Council would later serve on Delta Zeta's National Council.

The Delta Chapter of Delta Sigma Epsilon began in 1916. At the time of the merger with Delta Zeta, that chapter became the Delta Omicron Chapter at Northwestern Oklahoma State University.
