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



SOUND BEGINNINGS:

A National Philanthropic Project is Unveiled



The *Sound Beginnings* national philanthropic program was unveiled at Convention by Chris Kolodgie Kern IE, National Collegiate Philanthropy Chairman and Dr. Karl White, Director of the National Center for Hearing Assessment and Management (NCHAM). This important program raises awareness of the need for newborn hearing screenings and the importance of early intervention by six months of age when a hearing loss is identified.

Delta Zeta Sorority is partnering with the National Center for Hearing Assessment and Management on the program. Delta Zeta collegians and alumnae are providing videos and informational brochures, which emphasize the importance of infant hearing screening, to local organizations who work with mothers and infants.

Chris explained, "The technology to identify a hearing loss in babies just a few days old is used in many hospitals and is painless for the baby. Identifying the hearing loss is only the first step. Once a hearing loss is identified, it is important for parents to begin an intervention program that works for their family. There are many options for children today, but early intervention—especially when begun by six months of age—makes a tremendous

impact on how that child will learn and socialize."

Delta Zeta also proudly announced that the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) approved the use of the Academy's logo on the Delta Zeta Sorority Sound Beginnings brochure that was developed for this program. "The Academy's approval gives such credibility to our project, as the AAP is the authority in pediatrics. The AAP overwhelmingly endorsed our brochure and we are certain that hospitals and WIC

centers will be more willing to use this information because of the AAP's approval," Chris said.

Gail Patrick Velde Charitable Trust

The Gail Patrick Velde Charitable Trust

"The Delta Zeta Foundation can at last share with you some incredible news. It is a first ever for Delta Zeta, and it is all made possible by the generosity of a very special Delta Zeta sister," Ruth Patterson announced.

The charitable trust of television producer and motion picture actress Gail Patrick Velde AII '29, bequeathed a gift of \$1 million to the Delta Zeta Foundation, the largest gift that the Foundation has ever received since its inception in 1961.

The endowment will establish The Woman of
Distinction Program, which will provide undergraduate
and graduate scholarships for qualified Delta Zeta
members and a Woman of Distinction honorarium for
the Delta Zeta Woman of the Year.

Guy Potter Benton Grand Patron Of Delta Zeta



Dr. Benton was President of Miami University at the time of Delta Zeta's founding in 1902 and was instrumental in working with our Founders in the early development of the Sorority. He was a member of Phi Delta Theta Fraternity (Ohio Wesleyan '86) and one-time National President of the Fraternity. For his great and continued interest in the Sorority, Dr. Benton was made Grand Patron, a position of honor he held for the remainder of his life. He was the only man ever permitted to wear the Delta Zeta badge.

Gail Patrick Velde (née Margaret Fitzpatrick) was a member of the Alpha Pi Chapter at Howard College in Birmingham, Alabama (now Samford University), where she majored in business and graduated with honors. Gail won a trip to Hollywood in 1932 through a newspaper contest and was offered a movie contract. She was a popular movie actress during the 1930s and 1940s. In the 1950s and 1960s, she was one of the few female producers in the television industry, producing the "Perry Mason" television series. In 1962, Gail was named Delta Zeta's Woman of the Year. She was very active in charitable and civic projects, and served as a member of the first Board of Trustees for the Delta Zeta Foundation in 1961.



"Gail Patrick's bequest epitomizes the love she had for Delta Zeta, and her estate trustees are dedicated to ensuring that her love lives on in The Woman of Distinction Program. Sisters who weren't even born when Gail Patrick was alive will have the opportunity to achieve and excel as she did because of her foresight and generosity."

Alcohol Edu:

Does Prevention Make a Difference?



AlcoholEdu, an innovative approach to alcohol prevention for collegians, was introduced at Convention. Mandi Wise Γ X, Chapter Services Director, introduced Dr. Richard Keeling, Vice President of Prevention Programs for Outside the Classroom,

Inc., and chief executive officer for Keeling and Associates, an independent higher education consulting firm. Dr. Keeling discussed the importance of the program, an online, interactive course that is highly personalized, educationally engaging, and includes a number of measurement tools.

All Delta Zeta new members will take the AlcoholEdu course as a requirement for initiation as of the 2004 – 2005 school year.





Make a difference for that special collegian!

Fast-forward to July 8-10, 2005. The scene is Purdue University. The event is the Norma Minch Andrisek Leadership Conference. Attendees include some 400 to 450 Delta Zeta collegians from chapters all over the country. So much for the scene, the event, and the attendees. What about the purpose?

Learning and leadership! And now comes the opportunity for alumnae to participate too, because the Delta Zeta Foundation is again inviting alumnae and friends to "sponsor" a student from their chapter (or a chapter other than their own) to attend the 2005 Leadership Conference. In a campus atmosphere conducive to educational pursuits, students will learn what makes Delta Zeta tick, and where their own personal values fit in.

The Dow Jones' averages may be flip-flopping, but a sponsorship for a student to attend the Leadership Conference is a very special blue-chip investment in some very special blue-chip students. In fact, a tax-deductible gift of \$250 to the Foundation, designated for the Chapter Leadership Fund, will pay for one student's Leadership Conference registration, educational materials, lodging, and meals. Travel expenses are not covered. Sponsorship gifts may be designated as "restricted" (for a specific chapter) or "unrestricted" for use where needed most. Sponsorships can be split, allowing two or more alumnae to share in a sponsorship. Gifts will be credited to the chapter's Chapter Leadership Fund, permitting the monies to be used for educational purposes.

Our goal for the 2005 Leadership Conference is to have sponsor-ships for at least *half* the collegiate attendees. 

The Campaign provides community awareness about teen pregnancy and coordination of countywide programs that result in reduced teen pregnancies. In the past year as director, Jennifer has conducted prevention programs with over 1,300 teens and parents, established two newsletters (one for service professionals and one for teens), and implemented a volunteera-thon that allows high school students to learn about different career paths by conducting internships at local businesses.

Jennifer is a 2003 graduate of Leadership Tuscaloosa and serves on the steering committee for Tuscaloosa's Promise, the Regional Perinatal Advisory Council, and the Tuscaloosa County Children's Policy Council. She is a member of the Tuscaloosa Alumnae Chapter, serving as Recruitment Advisor and House Corporation Secretary. Jennifer is a 2004 provisional for the Junior League of Tuscaloosa.

After graduating from college in 2000, Jennifer worked as a Family Support Specialist with the Tuscaloosa Family Resource Center. The program offered daily tutoring and character education, while also addressing family issues through quarterly parent conferences/home visits. In addition to directing the tutoring program, Jennifer also taught parenting classes and established a youth summer camp.

Yvonne Kauger EA '56, Delta Zeta's Woman of the Year for 1988, was named Notable Woman of Oklahoma for 2004 by the Oklahoma City Orchestra League. Recently, she also gave the keynote address at the National Women Law Students Association's national convention at the Oklahoma City University School of Law, which also featured former Attorney General Janet Reno. Justice Kauger was appointed to the Oklahoma Supreme Court in 1984 and served as Chief Justice of the Oklahoma Supreme Court from 1997 – 1998. She has acted as symposium coordinator for the Sovereignty Symposium, a seminar on Native American law sponsored by the Oklahoma Supreme Court since its inception in 1987.

She received an honorary doctorate from Oklahoma City University in 1991, and in 1999 was awarded the Herbert Harley Award by the American Judicature Society in recognition of her outstanding efforts to improve the administration of justice, making her only one of four Oklahomans to have ever received the award. She also received the Judicial Excellence Award from the Oklahoma Bar Association and was inducted into the Oklahoma Women's Hall of Fame in 2001.

Susan Patterson Perry-Lindle E Ω '68 received the Alumni Distinguished Achievement Award from the University of Wisconsin/Eau Claire. Susan graduated from the university in 1971 with a degree in social work. Commissioned as a second lieutenant, she completed basic training in the Women's Army Corps, then became the first female officer assigned to a combat brigade of an infantry division in Europe. Her career included a term at NATO's Headquarters in Izmir, Turkey and assignments with the Army staff at the Pentagon. She was promoted to the rank of colonel in 1994 when there were only 25 female colonels in the Military Intelligence Corps.

During her military career, "she was paving the way for women to assume greater positions of responsibility than ever before," says her colleague, retired Lt. Col. Amelia Nutt Armstrong. "Colonel Perry was the epitome of any Army officer, and she set the standard for many women."

Susan received numerous military awards and decorations during her years of service. Now retired, she serves on the advisory team for the Kappa Beta Chapter at Northern Kentucky University near her home in Edgewood, Kentucky.
