From the Vest Community Center, established in 1922, which brought education and medical care to the children of Appalachia and their families, to Delta Zeta's tireless work for speech and hearing and other causes, philanthropy and service are as integral to the Sorority as the Founders themselves.

At the 47th National Convention, Delta Zeta's partnerships with The Painted Turtle and The Starkey Hearing Foundation were announced. The Painted Turtle was adopted as a national philanthropy. This is in addition to the national philanthropy for speech and hearing, of which The Starkey Hearing Foundation becomes an important part. Both programs will provide Delta Zeta alumnae and collegians more nationwide opportunities to help others. Justin Osmond, nephew of Donny Osmond of The Osmond Brothers fame, was also introduced at Convention. Born with a hearing disorder, he is spokesperson for The Starkey Hearing Foundation.

The Painted Turtle is an innovative medical specialty camp and family care center for children who have chronic and life-threatening illnesses. Campers and their families attend free of charge because of the contributions from organizations such as Delta Zeta. The Painted Turtle is a member of the Association of Hole in the Wall Camps co-founded by actor Paul Newman. The camps are considered to be the finest multi-disease medical camps and family care centers in the world, and Delta Zeta is proud to become a strong support network for this cause—one that changes lives for the better. Not only do we want to help, but we find ways to help and make a difference in the lives of others. That difference, no matter how small, inspires others to give, whether or not they are a part of Delta Zeta. And that is Delta Zeta's legacy.

We continue to seek "work worthy of her united effort." Where we see a need, we put forth "organized effort, all working together" to ensure that our work benefits those we assist and is meaningful to the Delta Zetas who give in the effort.

Many alumnae and collegians are involved individually in volunteering in their communities. Alumnae and collegiate chapters around the country organize, sponsor, and work for philanthropic projects and causes all year long, every year.

Delta Zeta knows the power of women to effect positive change, and has proven it from our earliest volunteer work during World War I to the Sound Beginnings infant hearing screening program launched in 2005. Even before women had the right to vote, Delta Zeta members were taking change into their own hands by volunteering wherever they saw a need and whenever someone reached out for help.

Not only are we women, but we are Greeks. Recent research done by the Research Initiative of the National Panhellenic Conference (NPC) and the North American Interfraternity Conference (NIC) indicates that members of Greek organizations:

- tend to make larger gifts when donating to various causes. are more likely to volunteer in their communities.
- to be active in civic affairs.
 - to be civically responsible citizens during adulthood.

Collegiate chapters on campuses in the U.S. and Canada sponsor and participate in countless charitable events to benefit many causes. Because giving "back . . . more than we have received" is integral to Delta Zeta's core values, philanthropy is a part of the Sorority's recruitment process. New members learn about Delta Zeta's commitment to service by undertaking a philanthropic project of their own before they become initiated members.



Today's Millennial generation (those born between 1977 – 1998, totaling 75 million today) has experienced service as a part of their middle and high school life, and because they believe they can make a real difference in the world, they look for those same characteristics in any organization they may consider becoming a part of. Delta Zeta has value for them, offering many opportunities for community service and philanthropic involvement.



NATIONAL CONVENTION PHOENIX 2006

Delta Zeta Shining Bright

The 47th National Convention was held at the historic Arizona Biltmore Resort and Spa in Phoenix, Arizona. An architectural masterpiece inspired by Frank Lloyd Wright's designs, the resort is nestled amid the splendor of the Arizona desert.

The National Convention marks a milestone in Delta Zeta history as it is the governing body of the Sorority while in session every biennium. The National Council and the delegates in attendance vote on issues which affect the future direction of the Sorority.

National Convention provides a time to reunite with sisters, to recognize outstanding chapter and individual achievements, and to participate in educational leadership development programs which are funded by the Delta Zeta Foundation.

Life Skills for the Modern World

Delta Zeta realizes the importance of programs which provide collegiate members with valuable skills that will serve them well after graduation and into their alumnae years. Each member is a representative of Delta Zeta outside of the Sorority, and her good manners and attention to detail speak not only about her personal caliber, but of her commitment to making a difference in today's fast-paced and impersonal world.

"Mom" Nonnie Cameron Owens is the president of Etiquette Plus (www.momnonnie.com), which provides seminars and information to corporate, college/university, and youth audiences. Her materials are also part of Delta Zeta's collegiate programming for the fall of the 2006-2007 school year.

The Delta Zeta Foundation underwrites the Sorority's educational and philanthropic programs. It is through the generous gifts of members and friends, gifts which are so important no matter what the size, that this mission can be accomplished.

IRA Charitable Rollovers Have Arrived!

On August 17, 2006 the Pension Protection Act of 2006 was signed into law. This law is designed to stimulate and encourage increased financial support of charitable organizations in the United States from donors who are 701/2 years of age or older.

One provision of this new legislation allows traditional Individual Retirement Account (IRA) investors who are 701/2 or older, and who are otherwise required to take minimum distributions from their IRA accounts, to donate up to \$100,000 to a public charity, such as the Delta Zeta Foundation, in both tax years 2006 and 2007 (\$100,000 each year).

In many instances, retirees who do not need the money they are required to withdraw from their IRA each year will now be able to donate these monies directly to a charity of their choice (like the Delta Zeta Foundation). In so doing, they will not have to claim the withdrawal as income, or owe any tax on the funds withdrawn which are donated directly to a charity.

Prior to this new law being passed, a donor would have had to report any amount taken from her IRA as taxable income, and then take a charitable deduction for the gift (up to 50% of one's adjusted gross income). In fact, this would cause some donors to pay more in income tax than if they hadn't made a gift at all.

Benefits of the Pension Protection Act of 2006 include:

- The donor may transfer up to \$100,000 per year (2006 & 2007) from her IRA or Rollover IRA
- The donor's transfer may be made in addition to any other charitable giving she has planned
- Neither taxable income or a tax deduction are generated by the gift transfer and even those donors who do not itemize deductions receive the benefit
- The donor's charitable distribution counts toward required minimum distributions (rmd)

If you are a Delta Zeta alumna or friend of Delta Zeta who is 70 1/2 or older and are looking for a way to make additional cash contributions to the Delta Zeta Foundation, have an income level that causes exemption phase-outs or deduction limitations, who doesn't itemize deductions, or fears that an increased Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) will cause more of your Social Security income to be taxed, the IRA Rollover option just may be right for you! And for Delta Zeta!

Note: Because Federal and state tax laws may differ, one's personal tax and financial advisors should be consulted before making such a gift.







As part of the National Panhellenic Conference (NPC), Delta Zeta partners with the Conference and its 26 member organizations on many programs and initiatives, including support of two bills in Congress (H.R. 1548 and S.R. 713) which will make a change in the tax code that will allow tax deductible donations to be used for improvements to the infrastructure of chapter houses, increasing the safety of our collegiate members.

Other programs include Day of Dialogue, when campus Panhellenics organize a meaningful program on alcohol use involving key stakeholders within the campus and community, and Something of Value, a values-based approach to risk management education for collegians.
