Delta Zeta is friendship, over the years, across the miles, but it is also sadness when a dear friend leaves us. As the final pages of this Spring issue were being written, came the unexpected news of the passing on January twenty-seventh of our thirteenth national president, Bernice Hutchison Gale, after an illness of only a few days. She was buried beside her husband Guy in Arlington National cemetery, Washington D.C.

Despite the miles and the years, a friendship with Bunny never ceased. With her you exchanged news of your family, your home, your garden, as well as news of what was happening to Delta Zetas everywhere. Only in print was she ever called anything other than Bunny. Petite, pretty, with curly hair, soft voice and a delightful smile, wherever she visited a collegiate chapter they adored her. This small package was truly precious, and yet great fun. Who could ever forget her rendition of "Only a Bird in a Gilded Cage" during a convention skit?

As an Army wife, she found Delta Zeta friends and Delta Zeta work to be done wherever she lived—Honolulu, Texas, both Washingtons, Indianapolis. When Guy retired they chose a home in San Anselmo, California, where she could entertain her son Harrison, her three Delta Zeta daughters, Pat Thompson, Jane Prall, and Nancy Empie, and all of their families. Her garden was her delight, and the pictures in color of her roses are unsurpassed.

She came to her first convention as president of the Indianapolis alumnae chapter, then next as Province Collegiate Director for Indiana and Michigan. During Myrtle Hinkly's term as National President two new committees were appointed with Bunny doing Rushing and this writer Pledge Training. Instead of a dull report for the Mackinac convention, these two co-authored, cast and produced a two act play (by mail) titled "Neath Moon and Sun," showing the way a perfect chapter named Gamma Gamma performed. At that point in time a Gamma Gamma chapter seemed a fantasy of the future. No imagination could have stretched the Delta Zeta chapter roll to the newly installed Lambda Pi chapter.

As a result of this stellar production, or despite as Bunny always insisted, the co-authors were elected to National Council as Vice-Presidents. As Membership Vice President Bunny started many of our collegiate programs which continue today. At a later convention she was chosen for Extension Vice President and then served as National Panhellenic Delegate, to return again to the office of Membership Vice President. The Golden Anniversary Convention in New Orleans elected her to the presidency.

Her loyalty, love, and continuing excellence in every job she did for Delta Zeta, all started in Mu chapter as an undergraduate at the University of California at Berkeley where she was active on many campus publications and was a member of Phi Beta Kappa. One of her later delights was that all three of her daughters were members of different Delta Zeta chapters, and she was vigorous in rushing everyone's legacies.

It is completely appropriate that this Spring issue of the Lamp, stressing life on our college campuses, be dedicated to the memory of Bernice Hutchison Gale, who proved in her years of gracious living and dedicated awareness the joy of Delta Zeta friendship.

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MEASURING UP

Almost every segment of today's society is affected by changing values and standards. Delta Zeta is no exception. Current challenges to the home, health, community and self also affect sorority house living, chapter tone and individual growth.

The challenges presented by changes in values vitally concern Delta Zeta. Matters which affect Delta Zeta standards and ideals have always commanded the attention of its National Council. Charged with the supervision of the affairs of the sorority and committed to its growth and development, today's Council continues to reinforce Delta Zeta's dedication to the highest standards. Always there remains a determination to keep those ideals which have been Delta Zeta's since her beginning.

Guidance and direction are given to the sorority as a whole through National Policies. Many of these policies are set by the National Convention, others by the National Council. Province Directors, College Chapter Directors, National Chairmen, State Reference Chairmen, collegians and alumnae all have an effect on the determination of National Policies. The policies are a direct reflection of the concerns and considerations of the entire Delta Zeta membership.

Although we seem particularly threatened by the rapid pace of today's society, times do change and sometimes there are valid reasons to make necessary adjustments. Therefore, policies are constantly studied and evaluated.

Members of an earlier time will remember the Blue Book for Pledges. Included in that book was a discussion of smoking by women and the policy passed by the National Convention prohibiting smoking on Delta Zeta property or at Delta Zeta functions. Of course, that custom changed and the "rules" affecting smoking were out of date. While Delta Zetas continue to observe a no-smoking policy at Founders' Day celebrations out of respect for our Founders

A Look at Delta Zeta Policies

today it is difficult for us to imagine that such a problem existed. Years ago, however, this was a matter of great concern and one to which Delta Zeta addressed herself.

We've come a long way since that time. Perhaps the scope and complexity of our problems are greater now. Like those yesterdays, the National Council continues to reflect the concerns of Delta Zeta. Policies are set to provide guidelines that are in keeping with the times as well as the traditions of the past. Hopefully, there is always an effort to see that good sense and good taste prevail.

Today's challenges to our standards come through changes in manners and morals, dating patterns, dress, respect for others, educational values and traditions. National Council's attention to problems associated with these areas has resulted in the reaffirmation of certain existing policies.

Living together as members of a college chapter is a sensitive relationship and requires guidelines which consider the maximum dignity and comfort of the individual while promoting the best interests of the chapter as a whole. It brings together those of differing points of view and values who must reach a general understanding and acceptance of what is best for all.

Delta Zeta continues to maintain its chapter houses for the use and convenience of all its members and therefore limits guest privileges to the public areas of its houses. If and when conditions and circumstances warrant, chapters may request permission for a limited inter-visitation program. However, such programs must have the written approval of the National Council before they are implemented.

Alcohol and drugs are major concerns in today's society. Delta Zeta stands committed to all local, state, and national laws and regulations relating to the use of alcohol and other mood modifiers.

The need for continued guidance in the area of manners and social awareness as well as a committment to the growth of the individual is emphasized through Delta Zeta standards and social programs. Under the direction of the National Chairmen the importance of these traditional values is stressed.

Delta Zeta's emphasis on scholarship and high academic achievement remains constant. Delta Zeta requires a minimum of a C average for initiation. Local Panhellenic regulations may adjust pledging requirements in some circumstances.

Hazing is a destructive and meaningless activity. It is defined as any activity or attitude directed toward a pledge which ridicules, minimizes or embarasses the individual. It is any activity, mental or physical, which confuses or causes discomfort to a pledge or a pledge class. Hazing includes all forms of personal servitude, line-ups and refusal to allow full opportunity for good grooming. Delta Zeta's long standing policy eliminating any kind of hazing is reaffirmed. Delta Zeta recognizes the right of every person to be treated with respect and dignity.

Webster defines standards as "something established for us as a rule or basis of comparison in judging quality" Many of the Delta Zeta standards which were established at the time of our founding are still valid. Changes are made and we need our challenges but we hold our fundamental ideals constant. We live in a privileged time, a time of broader horizons and expanding opportunities. With the privileges of such a society come the additional responsibilities of assuring that we maintain the highest principles. Delta Zeta seeks to set before her members those values which reflect her heritage in the past, the reality of today, and the promise of the future. By so doing we assure her continued growth and strength.

"The home of Georgia College is on the fall line of the Oconee River, less than a dozen miles from the geographic center of Georgia. It is approximately one hundred miles from Augusta, Atlanta, Albany and Columbus, and thirty miles from Macon. The small city of Milledgeville, which has a population of about 20,000 is placed in an immediate setting of natural beauty and has long been known as a center of history and culture." The foregoing sentences, taken from the Georgia College handbook, were indeed provocative enough to charm Delta Zeta, and to whet interest in desiring to become a part of this treasure site of ante-bellum homes, leafy elms and oaks, and history!

And, in the spring of 1974, Alpha Pi Omega, the only local sorority on the Georgia College campus, petitioned Delta Zeta and subsequently became Lambda Pi Colony. A short six months later, on a lovely autumn weekend, November 9 and 10, Lambda Pi was officially installed as our newest chapter, our fifth in Province XXII.

The festive weekend began on Friday evening when the soon to be initiated pledges of Lambda Pi colony welcomed visitors at the historic Alumni House near the campus. Here they met their sisters from Delta Delta chapter at Georgia State College and Iota Nu chapter at Georgia Southern College. Here, too, they met their National visitors, Betty Heusch Agler, Past National President; Arlene Newman, National Secretary, Gwen Moss McKeeman, NPC Delegate, and Deborah Raziano, National Field Representative. "Razi" had worked with the chapter during rush, and they were also well acquainted

with Amaryllis Pickett Barnes and Leah Burgess Richards, province collegiate director and province alumnae director respectively, since they had been working with the chapter since it's inception as a colony.

November 9th dawned with a crispness in the air and the setting for initiation in the Parish House of the historic old, pre-Civil War St. Stephen's Episcopal church was indeed a lovely one. The initiation was conducted by members of Iota Nu chapter.

Arlene Newman served as toastmistress for the evening. Gwen Moss McKeeman extended National Council greetings and welcomed the guests. The keynote addresses were given by Dr. J. Whitney Bunting, President of Georgia College, and by Mrs. Carolyn C. Gettys, Dean of Students.

The installation service was conducted by Past National President Betty Heusch Agler with Beth Moore, Lambda Pi President, accepting the chapter charter. The evening closed with Delta Zeta's impressive Rose Ceremony, led by Georgia State Delta Zetas. All the guests joined the new initiates in their friendship circle.

On Sunday afternoon the chapter was officially presented to Milledgeville at a formal tea in the home

of another new alumna initiate, Mrs. George Carpenter, Jr., and Mr. Carpenter. Almost 500 guests were received between 2 and 5 p.m. Atlanta Alumnae assisted the hostess, and guests were welcomed by Beth Moore, chapter president; Tally S. Hodges, CCD, and the National officers. On display at this time were the many chapter gifts, including the silver punch bowl which is a traditional chapter gift from Delta Zeta chapters and National Council.

Lambda Pi chapter of Delta Zeta becomes the third sorority at Georgia College, joining Phi Mu and Alpha Delta Pi, who were installed within the last year.

Georgia College is the newest co-educational unit of the University System of Georgia, and it has undergone a complex evolution during its 85 year history. Founded as the Georgia Normal and Industrial College in 1889, the school that eventually became Georgia College was renamed the Georgia State College for Women in 1922. In 1961, the name was changed to Women's College of Georgia and six years later, when co-education entered the picture, the school became Georgia College at Milledgeville. In 1971, "at Milledgeville" was dropped and the name "Georgia College" was born.

With an enrollment of over 2,800 today, nearly 40 programs leading to 10 degrees are offered.

The traditional and the modern are blended on the campus, which comprises a twenty-three acre site. The oldest building on the campus is the Mansion, the home of Georgia's governors from 1839 to 1869, and it is now the home of College President and Mrs. Bunting.

This year's early mailing to collegiate chapters contained so much good information, and gives such a clear view of what is happening on campus, that we are including excerpts from the various officers for your information, education, and enjoyment.

The Collegiate Education Bulletin put out by Sandra Horton, quotes from the President's manual to remind chapters of the proper procedure for elections. Yes, even elections have changed, with December and January officer elections the rule rather than the exception. A nominating committee is still chosen but "members are reminded that names to be presented as candidates from the floor must be certified by the nominating committee at least 48 hours before the election is to take place."

Panhellenic Compact

Many times the question is asked as to what is the policy concerning duration of pledges, broken pledges and transfers. Gwen Moss McKeeman cites changes and quotes the Panhellenic Compact:

- 1. A student shall not be asked to join a sorority before the time designated by the College Panhellenic. In the event there is no College Panhellenic in existence, nor any other governing body with authority to designate such a time, then a student shall not be asked to join a sorority before she has started classes.
- 2. A Pledge Day at the conclusion of formal rush shall be fixed by the College Panhellenic. A Pledge Day is the scheduled time when the invitations to membership are issued.
- 3. A pledge is binding for one calendar year to the extent that a student may not be pledged to any other national sorority on the same campus during that calendar year.
- 4. A student who has had her pledge broken by a sorority, or who has broken her pledge to a sorority, may not be asked to join another sorority on the same campus for one calendar year from the date she was originally pledged. However, she may be repledged by the same sorority chapter at any time within that calendar year.
- 5. When a pledge transfers to another campus she shall be eligible to pledge the sorority of her choice at the earliest opportunity.
- 6. A person who is, or who has ever been, an initiated member of an existing NPC sorority shall not be eligible for membership in another NPC sorority.
- 7. Pledges of a chapter whose charter has been rescinded or relinquished shall be eligible to pledge another sorority immediately following the official release of the pledges by the sorority. Pledges of a colony which has been dissolved shall be eligible to pledge another sorority immediately following the official release of the pledges by the sorority.



Important Post Scripts

National President Florence Harvey sends Important Post Scripts:

BE WARY! Protect your chapter's philanthropic dollars and remember that charity begins at home. When the chapter establishes its philanthropic priorities, please put our Delta Zeta philanthropies at or near the top of your list. Now, as compared to the past, the country's present economic conditions require greater attention to wise giving. It has been brought to my attention that even though most charities are legitimate and financially sound, in too many instances some of the best known national charity organizations are not. To be certain that your chapter's hard earned philanthropy money is spent wisely where it will do the most good, please support our Delta Zeta philanthropies through your National Council at National Headquarters and/or through the Delta Zeta Foundation.

BEWARE of accepting an overnight guest who is "travelling through" and appears at the door of the Delta Zeta house or dorm, stating she is a sister from one of our chapters. For your own protection, check her Delta Zeta identification card. Female sneak thieves use this means to gain entry and gain your confidence.

WORDS OF WARNING. The widespread national publicity given to Monmouth College and the fraternity involved in the recent tragic result of a hazing "prank," prompts me to remind each of you that Delta Zeta has a definite policy against any and all forms or degrees of hazing (busting, servitude, or whatever your campus calls it). This policy is specifically defined and implemented with disciplinary procedure for violations and violators. Hazing is banned by NPC and by virtue of this, Delta Zeta is committed to discipline for any violations which deny the right of every person to be treated with courtesy, respect, and dignity. Any activity or attitude directed toward a prospective member or a pledge which humiliates or embarrasses is forbidden.

History and Ritual

And last, but by no means the least is an open letter from Grace Mason Lundy, National History and Ritual Chairman.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN,

which may turn out to be all Delta Zetas!

This letter will be about what has been called "The Etiquette of the Delta Zeta Pin," a topic which crops out from time to time in talking with Delta Zetas. And, although I have tried to answer most of the inquiries in occasional messages as Ritual Chairman, there seems a need for some current thinking, as changes become effective in college customs, or in certain social standards, or as our college generations succeed one another and may need some information.

(Please note that I shall use the word pin for this general discussion, because it is a term most familarly used. However, let me quote from the dictionary to bring to your attention the word badge, just as correct and a bit more formal.

BADGE: 1. mark, token or device worn as a sign of allegiance, membership, authority, achievement. 2. any emblem, token, or distinction mark. I think we agree that this definition does apply to our LAMP.

PIN: of several definitions, we would apply this one: a badge having a pointed bar or pin attached, by which it is fastened to the clothing. So, the only meaning for pin which fits us does require that it be first a badge.)

With this clearly in mind, let us now proceed!

First and always, our guiding principle is that the wearing of any pin, badge or symbol which is distinctly a sign of Delta Zeta membership, is that it be worn in good taste. From this standpoint grew the accepted policy that Delta Zeta pins or pledge pins not be worn on extremely casual attire. No good social custom demands that these be worn on clothing that is going to a very casual picnic or other funaffair. Certainly no swimming outfit needs sorority jewelry worn with it. There is also the very practical fact that losing a pin on a hike or other outdoor party is quite possible, while the chance of finding so small a piece of lost jewelry is almost nil.

In the case of occasional local customs which would be unknown or unused away from a particular area, we cannot offer a decision without some information. So, I repeat, consider what would be unquestionably good taste, to accept or reject this idea. And a follow-up maxim would be, "When indoubt, Don't!"

A more pertinent question arose when the wearing of pants became so general a custom for women. After considerable thought, and consultation with our college members, we took the stand that the pin should not be worn with a costume that was out-andout, plain and simple, jeans. Naturally, when dressier and more formal pant suits were big in the picture, came the question, "May the ΔZ pin be worn with these?" Delta Zeta tends to be a bit traditional, and took some time before making a decision on this. There has been a certain degree of relaxation, with a clear distinction between types of meetings discussed, and to a certain extent, whether collegians or alumnae. Yes, the ΔZ pin may be worn on an appropriate pants suit by both college and alumnae members.

The standing policy of not wearing the ΔZ pin on suit jackets, or coats that are outer wraps, is still observed. Again, this is partly for the practical reason that such wearing is very conducive to lost pins, pulling loose from the material. In the case of a two piece pants suit of which the top may be really a jacket, but is not worn over a blouse, then good sense indicates that such top is not a coat, and the pin may be worn on it because it is, in effect, the same as a dress.

Now that the temporary situation which discouraged the wearing of sorority pins on campus because of an anti-attitude, or professorial bias, is easing generally, some of you are wondering what to wear or use to indicate sorority membership, other than the pin. There are recognition pins, the little Lamp, the coat-of-arms, the monogram, which may go on a coat lapel. There is a variety of jewelry using ΔZ insignia to be had in rings, necklaces, bracelets, charms. There are attractive colored coat-of-arms patches available for use on sweaters, jackets, notebooks. It is easy enough to find and use some explicit, attractive, approved piece of accessorizing that will tell you are a Delta Zeta, without having to display the pin itself.

Perhaps this is a good place to make a suggestion about wearing the Golden Rose pin. There has been no official decision on this matter, but most thinking suggests that it is, and should be worn as, a piece of costume jewelry, which allows it to be worn in a way that is visible, with almost any costume. Please, it should not be worn beside or close to, your real initiated membership pin. Neither looks well in that placing, and the Golden Rose is really too large and too heavy to be worn over the heart.

Incidentally, but also emphatically, may I request that we take care to say, distinctly and carefully DELTA ZETA, not DeeZee. That we speak of Delta Zeta meetings, NOT an alum meeting. In other words we have a name, it is a proud name, which we are privileged to share. So let's speak it. It is an integral part of our identity after we are members. It is not putting on airs to use that name, and where, and as, it is appropriate, in good taste, a matter of information.

We have just observed Founders' Day. Most of us do take a little extra time and thought on this occasion, to feel afresh the sincere and loving appreciation for membership in so precious a relationship as this sorority. I offer the thought than an awareness and care in the wearing of our insignia, the use of our name, is one simple, natural, way in which we can make our membership known, our caring for that sisterhood known, and in even a very small way, keep the flame aglow, hold it before others, share it.


Indiana



Maintain the Bridge for a **Future Crossing**

"Don't burn any bridges" is an old adage that holds true, perhaps now more than ever, for all sorority-affiliated women. With the average American family and business woman relocating every five years, housewives and career women find themselves faced with the almost overwhelming task of selecting new homes, establishing new footholds, making decisions, and meeting new friends more often than ever before.

Unfortunately, many sorority chapters on the nation's campuses seem to instill in the collegian the attitude that once her education is completed, so is her sorority life. Many graduates who were very active in their collegiate chapters leave the campus with the feeling that their time will forever-more be consumed by career jobs, small children, new husbands, and budget-planning. They feel they will have no time for an alumnae group. Little do they realize that for the next few decades of their lives they may find themselves living in several different cities and searching for the very opportunities their college sorority offers them.

Any alumna officer who has worked with updating a chapter's membership file can vouch for the fact that at least 50 per cent of the newly-graduated or relocated alumnae take no initial steps to affiliate with their local alumnae groups. A better understanding of their reasons for sometimes "burning the bridge" and not becoming active immediately could benefit both the alumnae groups and the new alumnae.

I am no longer interested in what sorority has to

The advantages a Greek sorority offers after graduation, many women have learned, can outweigh those on the collegiate level. As individual interests mature, some women find their pleasures are no longer centered on the academic and social level, but begin to span into the fields of philanthropics, homemaking, community affairs, or simply an occasional challenging conversation outside the boundaries of the home. An alumnae chapter offers friends in a new city, opportunities to assist in the group's philanthropic work, older women from whose experiences a new member can gain much, social contacts through which her husband or date can meet men on all levels of business and experience, bridge clubs, craft groups, and ideas from women who are rearing children, pursuing careers, and enjoying a fulfilled way-of-life.

Alumnae who make this statement may well be burning a bridge they will want to use in the future for returning to an alumnae group.

My husband does not yet make enough money for me to compete with the more prosperous and successful members.

The common bond within an alumnae chapter is friendship and not financial success. One would have to look far to find an alumnae group where a woman's success is measured by the dollar-mark. The new member will soon discover that "success" is also achieved by the school teacher, social worker, military enlisted-personnel, and public servant as well as the doctor, lawyer, and executive. She will be accepted by her alumnae friends as who she is and how she offers her friendship-not by her paycheck.

I work.

Most of the nation's most active sorority alumnae DO work. Using one's job or career as an excuse for not participating in an alumnae chapter is robbing oneself of an association with one of the most fulfilling facets of American womanhood. An alumnae chapter in San Antonio, Texas, finding their membership saturated with career women and transient military personnel, solved the problem by asking members to designate those functions for which they wanted to be contacted: evenings only, daytime only, parties only, Founders' Day only, philanthropic projects only. They soon discovered that working women preferred nighttime meetings and parties while housewives liked daytime meetings and community involvement. By stating their interests at the first of the year, members were notified only as to the function they were free to attend—thus time was saved for both the caller and the working member.

A woman who avoids an alumnae group only because she works is narrowing her relationships to those individuals within her home and career and is missing out on what a national sorority affiliation offers.

I live in a apartment and cannot possibly accomodate the group in my home. I would feel strange about going into other women's homes and not having them into my own.

Every member contributes to a chapter in the way she can best serve. One way is through offering one's home for meetings, but there are many means other than acting as hostess. An apartment dweller can serve as co-hostess by providing refreshments, help clean up after a meeting, plan programs, distribute name tags and reading material, decorate for parties, work on calling committees, assist in philanthropic projects, type newsletters, work with collegians—simply apply her talents to the benefit of the group.

I have a new baby and cannot attend most of the functions held by the chapter.

True, small children hamper a young woman's activities, but once she enters the chapter, a new mother will soon discover she is not alone with her problem. Some alumnae groups hold occasional meetings in churches and use the nursery facilities at a minimal cost to young mothers. One chapter, perhaps many, circulates a sitter-list among members. Another chapter in Dayton, Ohio has a function annually which includes the members' children—a picnic on a farm with farm animals, hay-rides, games, and fun for all ages.

Most chapters have several daytime and several nighttime meetings in order to make attendance possible for mothers with small children. The problem of a young baby is not unique—most women encounter it—and it is not a valid reason for missing something worthwhile and stimulating.

All of the women are older than I am, and I feel uncomfortable at the meetings. Maybe in a few years I will be interested.

While the members were all the same age in her college chapter, a new alumna can no longer expect to be surrounded only by age-level peers for the remainder of her experiences. If a new graduate will attend one alumnae meeting and make every

effort to know and appreciate new friends of all ages, she will benefit for years to come. Sorority alumnae have found a friend can be any age within the realm of the chapter.

Large city chapters have solved this uncomfortable feeling for young members through the organization of junior groups—chapters which operate as any other group but strive to interest the lower age-

group. On the other hand, many chapters find that the relationship between their older and younger members is one of love and respect and is to be desired.

I never did graduate. Attending alumnae functions would be embarrassing for me.

Although graduation is the goal of every collegian, many do not achieve that goal for valid, personal reasons. The fact that a woman did not graduate does not mean she never will. "Alumna" means that one is no longer a "collegian." Graduation is not a pre-requisite of alumna membership. A new member will be welcomed with or without a degree. Some of the women who contribute most to their alumnae group do not hold the degree they started out to achieve. Again, it is friendship which is the common bond, not degree of success—either professional, financial, or academic.

I wanted to be an active alumna after graduation, but no one called me.

There are many ways to find one's alumnae group after graduation or relocation. A new alumna should inform her sorority's national office as to where she will be living, and, in most cases, the local chapter will be contacting her shortly. If she doesn't hear from the local group, she should take steps herself toward finding it. The local newspaper's woman's news editor can usually supply the name of a local sorority or Panhellenic officer. The nearest university can give a newcomer the same information. The prospective alumna can watch the local newspaper for announcements of upcoming meetings. National sorority publications regularly carry the names and addresses of chapter officers who will see that the new member is informed of functions.

The new alumna is well-advised to stay on the mailing list through the national office and keep them informed as to her address and name changes. Very often, she is not contacted because she can't be found in the local phone directory. She must, sometimes, take the first step herself toward becoming active on the alumna level. Most alumnae chapters are just as concerned as the newcomer or new graduate about finding, welcoming, and including her in their activities. In fact, they may be searching for her during the same time she is hesitant about making that first contact.

For alumnae chapters over the nation to continue to contribute to American womanhood and success

of the Greek system on the college campus, the bridges that span the narrow gulf between the collegiate chapter and the alumnae chapter must not be burned but rather strengthened through friendship, understanding, and encouragement from those on both sides of the crossing.





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
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
