



Gamma Xi Chapter Takes Its Place as First to be Installed in New Mexico

ELTA ZETA is the third sorority to install on the campus of New Mexico College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts, a college which first started in a rented, two-room building in 1888, 24 years before New Mexico was to become the 47th state in the United States.

Today the campus is the site of 38 permanent buildings and two temporary housing projects which provide homes for more than 200 married students. In all, between 1,500 and 1,700 young women and men enroll in one of A & M's three schools—engineering, arts and sciences, and agriculture.


The other two sororities on the campus are Zeta Tau Alpha, installing in 1928 and Chi Omega in 1939. Delta Zeta is very grateful for the sponsorship offered by Panhellenic and to Zeta Tau Alpha for constant encouragement and assistance. Pledging and initiation services were held in the new Z T A lodge and all were saddened when it burned in April after only one year of use. Seven fraternities are active on the campus.

The very gracious dean of women, Dr. Marion Payzant Hardman, a Delta Delta Delta from the University of Washington, was a constant source of inspiration and helpfulness.

In October 1947 the campus was first visited by Marguerite Wherry Havens, extension vice president and again in January 1948. Later it was



lege is almost international. The 109-acre irrigated campus, just three miles outside of Las Cruces (The Crosses), New Mexico, is less than fifty miles from spectacular Juarez, Chihuahua, colorful door to the interior of Mexico, and its across-the-Rio-Grande neighbor, El Paso, Texas.

Traditions Combine With Modern Ideas

While still retaining the easy-going flavor of the old southwest, New Mexico A & M ranks high among the most modern, progressive colleges and universities. The college is accredited by the North Central association of colleges and secondary schools. The school of engineering is further accredited by the Engineers' council for professional development for the curricula in civil, electrical, and mechanical engineering.

With an instructional staff of 150 in 46 departments and sub-departments the college offers bachelor degrees in 44 different fields. Master of arts or master of science degrees are obtainable in biology, English, mathematics, education and

psychology, physics and Spanish.

Part of New Mexico A & M's national and international reputation has been achieved by other divisions of the college. The physical science laboratory, working under governmental contract with the applied physics laboratory of Johns Hopkins university and the White Sands proving grounds, plays a major part in the nation's research and experimentation on rockets and guided missiles.

The extension service, staffed by more than 100 agricultural and marketing specialists and county extension agents, carries educational work in agriculture and home economics directly to the people of New Mexico and the southwest.

The experiment station, whose function is to improve through scientific study the economic and social opportunities of the state, utilizes one of the nation's largest (61,760 acres) experimental ranches and a 289-acre irrigated experimental farm and orchard.

Recently added to New Mexico A & M's many agricultural services is a \$185,000 cotton ginning laboratory, one of two such laboratories in the

United States.

Alpha Iota Wins High Recognition from Red Cross

Southern California were awarded a special trophy from the Los Angeles volunteer services of the Red Cross for outstanding work in production.

Mrs. O. C. Wellbourn, chairman of the volunteer services and Mrs. Betty McCabe, advisor of the SC unit, visited the chapter house on May 27

to present the cup.

The award was given for the number of afghan squares, to be used overseas, and hospital slipper soles that the Delta Zetas turned over to the Red Cross. This group turned in more than any campus organization in the Los Angeles area.

Installation of Gamma Rho, 7th Delta Zeta Chapter in Illinois, Makes History

HROUGH the installation of Gamma Rho chapter at Northern Illinois State college, De Kalb, Illinois, on May 20, Delta Zeta has seven chapters in the state of Illinois, the largest num-

ber of any state.

Carrying the number seven further, as it seems to have special significance for the chapter, according to Marguerite Wherry Havens, able extension vice president, the local group first consisted of 17 college members and two pledges. However, all were initiated plus two alumnæ members. And two weeks following the installation, three additional members were initiated.

The group which made up the new chapter was sponsored in their organization by Panhellenic which felt the need of an additional sorority on the campus. Marjorie Miller, president and Dorothy Dain were among the four founders.

Delta Zeta was invited to visit the college and local group and Mrs. Havens came to the campus February 1, 1950. From then on, she worked with Dean Helen S. Moor and the organization, so that the group actually became a colony of the sorority. A long forced vacation due to the Illinois coal shortage delayed plans, but after an April visit by Mrs. Havens, the group was

Campus Setting

As visitors enter the campus of Northern Illinois State Teachers college, the home of Gamma Rho chapter, they frequently stop to gaze at the beauty of the scene, the small lake in the foreground, bordered with flowers and shrubs, serving as stage for the splendid new Science building in the background.

Beyond the winding campus road, the Administration building looms up in its proper importance, while the women's dormitory for underclassmen, Williston hall, assures comfort within. The new Adams hall completed this year is a model for women's housing with all the advantages of snack rooms, attractive pictures and decorations throughout. A library is under construction and the new dormitory for men to house 374 will be completed in the next building project.

The college is located at De Kalb, 60 miles west of Chicago on the Chicago North Western railway. The Northern Illinois State Normal school was established by an act of the General Assembly in 1895 and began its work of training teachers in September, 1899. By legislative enactment June, 1921, the institution became the Northern Illinois State Teachers college, and since that time two-year and four-year curricula have been offered to prepare elementary school teachers and high school teachers.

The campus, consisting of 152 acres is located in the northwest part of De Kalb. The Kishwaukee river lies along its eastern border and adjacent to the river is a small lake. A part of the campus is wooded, and the rest of it has been improved by the planting of shrubbery and flower gardens. The campus of "Northern Illinois" is not only one of the beauty spots of the state, but one of the two or three most beautiful teachers college campuses in the country.

A Stairway to Success

WITH the coming of spring once again thoughts turn to rushing schools, the means adopted by Delta Zeta of planning for fall rushing. Preparations for rushing may be compared to college football teams and their spring training, when preparations are made for the fall season; it is a conditioning period for the coming year. We brush up on techniques and party plans and teach our new initiates, the pledges of last fall, the arts and techniques of rushing. We plan our fall parties; we assign our committees; we approve the plans and delegate to our members evenly the work of making favors, invitations, and decorations, so that the work can be done without undue stress on the part of anyone during the summer. We learn anew the rules and regulations of rushing as provided by our Panhellenics.

Rushing is the term most commonly applied to that period during the campus year when each sorority on the campus is permitted to replenish its membership. "Rushing" is what it used in actuality to be. Careful planning, changing times, and improved Panhellenic regulations more aptly make it now a membership selection period. We sorority women continue to strive for that Utopian situation in which every girl desiring to belong to a sorority is invited to join and every chapter on the campus has a sufficient number of girls to maintain a healthful economic condition and a membership satisfactorily distributed so as to insure future constructive development.

In order to be prepared for a personal selection season, we must first analyze our own chapters. To secure a satisfactory number of girls, the chapter must have something to offer more tangible than the privilege of belonging.

We must show an undivided loyalty to our college or university, individually and collectively. We must inspire loyalty. This we can do by actively participating as a group in proposed progressive movements advocated by the administration, by participating in inter-collegiate activities, and by acting as organized units of hospitality for visitors.

To justify our existence we must present a satisfactory scholastic record at all times. A student's primary purpose at college is to secure an education—one that is satisfactory to her parents, adequate to her needs, and commendable to the public. A chapter that meets this requirement

must encourage scholarship. A consistent record of high scholarship in a chapter proves a challenge to new members and inspires a desire to maintain such a record. Regular quiet hours, rigidly enforced; regular study habits; supervised study; courses in how to study; and a careful quarterly check of members' records are the means to this end.

Healthful living conditions, mutual fellowship, and lasting friendships are prime prerequisites of a good chapter. A potential member may be impressed momentarily by the new draperies or rug, but the member that is most desirable is the one that registers approval of the sincerity and the genuine harmony of the chapter. Quite comparable to home life is life in the sorority house. An outward appearance of harmony cannot long hide the turmoil of dissension in a home—nor can a group of members hide internal strife. A winning smile is lost on a guest, if she notes a coolness existing among members. A well ordered house, one conducive to hours for fellowship. hours for study, hours for entertainment, and hours for training, will win more of the right type of members than a house where individual members dash off on a date, while a few are left to carry the ball while chapter activities are in progress. Discipline can be more than a rule-ofthumb provided by the by-laws. It can be training, begun during pledgeship, in the fact that selfdiscipline and individual responsibility are as much a moral obligation as one's code of ethics.

A well balanced membership, both as to interest and class distribution, offers a healthful approach to rushing. There must be kindred spirits for congeniality, but talents and interests can be as varied as the college curriculum.

Sociability consists of those intangible qualities of grace, ease, and poise, whatever the situation. It isn't an inherent quality. It is a result of training that began in the home and continued during pledgeship. Personal cleanliness, perfect grooming, ease in any social situation, poise in contacts with young and old, ability to lead conversation and keep guests at ease, knowledge of the rights and wrongs of etiquette—the correctness that is natural—all are just traits of sociability.

We cannot attract if we are not attractive. We must maintain standards in our own lives which

will eliminate any possibility of criticism. Our code of moral conduct must be more rigid than that necessary for public acceptance. Our reputation among our contemporaries must be above reproach, so that there can never be any speculation as to behavior. There is no room in a sorority for loudness or compromising situations. An undisciplined life is a menace to a chapter and a curse to the person addicted to such a manner of living. We cannot live with disregard of what others think of us. As a sorority, we must offer the fun and sociability that are adventuresome but maintain standards that even the most critical will approve.

A sorority chapter must present a unified group that eagerly participates in campus activities. Only by supporting the college in the execution of its programs can we be assured that we are doing our part. Such participation is also a means of developing the abilities of each member of the chapter, while presenting to the campus a coordinated effort of group action. High honors and outstanding offices should be sought, but the greatest development comes to the members that

consistently attend meetings, participate in programs, and quietly support without seeking to usurp.

If we can analyze ourselves and meet these challenges, then we can approach rushing with the joy of having something to offer. You, as collegiate members, choose your chapter's future members, and on your judgment depends your sorority's future. Reason, intelligence, kindness, and tolerance in your choices are essential, for no one girl is going to fit all of our ideals; but we can look constantly for those members who show the greatest potentialities for loyalty to the college, scholastic achievement, personal development, and high standards of moral character.

By giving constant care to meeting rigid standards ourselves, we will set a pace—a standard by which we can select future members. The joy and privilege of keeping step with a growing, progressive chapter offer a challenging experience for any potential pledge. Select your members carefully, and let them carry on the traditions and ideals that are precious to you and to Delta Zeta.

ORD of nine Delta Zetas living in Tokyo, Japan, comes through correspondence between Mary Palmer Woods, N, now living there with her husband and four children, and Sara C. Vaughan, president Tampa alumnæ chapter. Mr. Woods is executive adviser in the Civil Transportation section in Tokyo.

This group has regular meetings in their homes; they have organized a Panhellenic association and have completed an important "Adventures in Friendship" project. Through their efforts, a truck load of used, good clothing was collected and turned over to the Japanese children at the leper colony at Kusatsu, Japan.

Other pathways lead to individuals, families and old people's institutions or children's institutions in Europe, Other pathways lead to those in need of attention from our National Hearing Aid project.

At Oslo university many students with no resources except determination for an education, with limited and worn-out clothing, meager diets and sometimes only a floor for a bed, prove their great desire for increased knowledge and opportunity.

College chapters not already participating in

the plan to help, are urged to "Adopt a Student." Names and addresses are available for students directly referred by Connie Hug, A I, who has been attending University of Oslo on a Delta Zeta scholarship. These students are in need of help and friendship, Connie says. They welcome contact with American students. For information and for a suggested name, write to Mrs. Reynolds, 3040 Kirkham Street, San Francisco 22, California. And to increase understanding, it is hoped that friendly letters will be sent to the student or to anyone the chapter may choose to help, for "the gift without the giver is bare."

Drammensvn 50B Oslo, Norway May 3, 1950

DEAR MRS. REYNOLDS,

Thank you so much for your letter about the friendship program in Norway and for all the work you have put into setting up the nationwide appeal for the students in Oslo, You may be sure that anything that is sent here will be more than appreciated.

I hope you will forgive this late reply but I have just seen my Norwegian family off for their visit to America, and am now finishing classes and endeavoring to gather material to send to convention. I also have spoken to the office of students which supplied the names, and they are most grateful for what is being done.

From living here, I have found that one of the most needed important foods missing in the long winter months is fruit—and also vegetables. The canned things are just coming in, but are very expensive, so this is the lack that should be filled in diets, for health's sake if for no other reason. Other items are becoming more available, tho expensive, but these two are blocked because of imports and the small amount of dollars to be used for this. The amount of land on which to grows things here is fantastically little, and we are all getting a "grand import" consciousness. Oh yes, please do excuse my English as I am speaking Norwegian now and tend to get things backward and always spelled wrong.

Because of my Delta Zeta scholarship I would like to show all DZs something of Norway as a country, old and new. However, tho there are many new and modern things here it has little to do with the problem of the students, the imports of food and clothing, and the life

of the more primitive valleys.

I hope to show the contrast and to stress the dependence on foreign help by the individual who is often forgotten in the search for heavy industry, water power development and balancing a budget that is hopelessly overtaxed. The country is progressing at the expense of individual comfort, which seems necessary now, for friends across the sea are so welcome. In fact now we are happy to have a box coming today from America, and my home here has been far more fortunate than other students could hope for.

Thanks again for considering all of us in Oslo worthy of help from "Adventures in Friendship" and be sure it

is well placed.

The happiest greetings from Norway. Even though I am half way around the world from you, and in another land and culture, it is impossible not to think of Delta Zeta more clearly as State Day draws near—

a day where we can meet together with other women of the same common ideals, aspirations, and beliefs.

But what does one receive of this by being away and gazing at the future empty of this frequent and stimulating contact with other sisters? First, the members and works of the sorority do not stop at the national boundary. Imagine seeing girls at lectures in Oslo wearing the golden LAMP, sharing experiences here with a new found sister from an American university, and seeing the fine results of the national philanthropies abroad helping needy students in many lands. The immediate willingness of our sorority to accept this large task is a genuine reflection of each of you in going beyond your own problems to help others. Each small effort seems to radiate outwards in a circle which eventually cannot help but cross oceans and man-made barriers. People in foreign lands are not different from us—and friendship is a wonderful key to their door.

So, it is difficult for me not to urge you to continue this effort you can't see but which I am sure you feel is right—for it is intangible to you—but a reality to someone eight thousand miles from your home. The complete help and cooperation given me by the students in selecting these names to send—the sweet smiles and thank-yous—and the graciousness shown in being the receiver and not the more fortunate giver—are the impressions which Delta Zeta has given me so far away from all of you. Perhaps it takes distance to sharply define—for our sorority has constantly stood out this year as shining as the flame of the LAMP we wear—its light must surely have been strong enough to follow one of you to the Far North, across many miles and seas, and to last a lifetime. For this I do want to send you my gratitude and thoughts on State Day, 1950.






