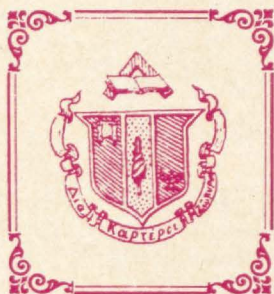

CONVENTION

Ohio welcomed the delegates and visitors to Delta Zeta's largest convention ever for their 32nd national meeting in the Sheraton-Columbus hotel in downtown Columbus. The weather outside was warm, exceeded only by the hospitality of Ohio alumnae and collegians.

Theta chapter members in their long rose and green plaid dresses were everywhere to greet and help. No one was allowed to be lost or unhappy for even a moment for the hostesses and convention chairman Betty Agler's assistants were ready every moment. And every moment was from early morning buffet breakfast, to very early morning get-togethers.

This convention even had an official Dad, Charles Arganbright, ΔTA, who was available for emergencies and help, extended to check cashing at the next door City National Bank, and where to have your car repaired.

The Promenade floor of the Sheraton was a buzz of activity throughout the week. Carole Welch Brown, Θ, and Jean Mc Clurg Southworth, Θ, kept continuous registration files, and were there to find and direct. Super-saleswoman Verne Duda spread the Rose Shop wares for delegates to see and buy.

The rosy editions of the Lampkin appeared miraculously, done by Norma Swepston McIntyre, Θ, with roving reporter Sue Ricketts Sayre, ZK.

Tours through National Headquarters were arranged for groups who could walk over and see where all the mail and phone calls originate. Most intriguing was the Rose Shop corner newly papered with pink roses on silver. Headquarters staff were in attendance to answer questions, and visitors had a chance to follow the processes at headquarters.

The convention was opened Monday evening, June 23, with a formal banquet at which the National Council and Past Presidents were escorted and introduced. Deep rose candles and satin roses made by the Texas province decorated the tables. National President, Florence Harvey, gave the invocation and addressed the delegates with her convention theme "Delta Zeta's Heritage and Horizon".

Gwen Moss McKeeman, NPC delegate, presented the Genevieve Schmitt Memorial Plaque to Iota Zeta chapter at St. John's University for the highest scholastic average for the past two years.

Shirlyn Chaffin, Foundation treasurer, announced grants for hearing and speech projects to five alumnae chapters, for their community, Saginaw Public Schools, the Central Florida Speech and Hearing Center, Huntsville Hospital High Risk Nursery, Children's Mercy Hospital preschool for Hearing Impaired of Kansas City and the Gallaudet school for the Deaf in St. Louis.

Lucile Crowell Cooks, convention parliamentarian, honored Jean Elizabeth Haley of Upsilon chapter at North Dakota with the Arelene Davis Aviation Scholarship.

In honor of her sister Alice Huenefeld, Margaret Hunenfeld Pease, Past National President, presented the gold bracelet given to an outstanding College Chapter Director to Lenna Parker of Zeta Zeta chapter at West Texas, with a miniature duplicate of the award for Amaryllis Barnes, last convention's winner.

A reception was held around the pool with the weather and the moon cooperating for everyone to greet the members of National Council. Hours later, under this same moon, the collegiate members changed to swim clothes and slacks for an informal splash-sing with the Field Representatives leading them in song.

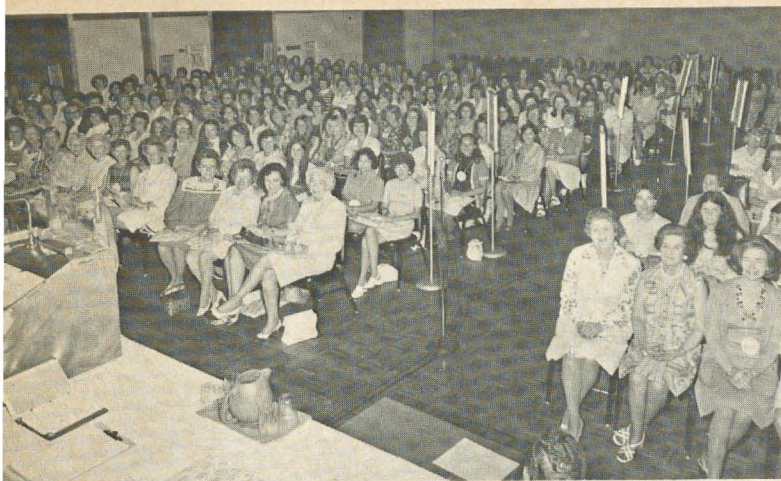

Florence Harvey officially opened the convention business sessions with the seating of the delegates from new college and alumnae chapters escorted by their installation chapters. Gwen McKeeman led the assembly in the pledge of allegiance and the Delta Zeta creed. At the conclusion of the opening meeting, everyone walked across the street to the Capitol building where the convention picture was taken on a bright sunshiny morning, a good omen for a good convention.

That afternoon, Lucile Cooks repeated her pointed drama called Mr. Robert's Gavel in which that gentleman's ghost counsels harried presidents as to the way to conduct a meeting.

Throughout the week, the mornings were devoted to a general business session, with workshops filling the afternoon.

These afternoon workshops were productive and sometimes very lively in their discussions as delegates and officers shared ideas and questions. Jane Prall conducted the alumnae sessions with Eleanor Fariss speaking on House Corporations, Gwen McKeeman on Membership, Jane Prall, Program Planning, Lucile Cooks, Bylaws, and Florence Miner, the Lamp and Newsletters. Later in the week, Betty Agler explained the processes of extension and colonization for new chapters, Jean Southworth and Norma McIntyre, National Headquarters procedures, and Mary Lou Barth, References. Fund raising and general idea sharing made for lively discussions.

Meanwhile the Province Directors, the College Chapter Directors, and the collegiate delegates were having their own workshops, with the leaders moving from one group to another in a well planned schedule. Pledge Training, Rush, Chapter Structure and History and Ritual, ending with a Turtle Talk session where reporting for the Lamp, Panhellenic, Headquarters procedure, and general questioning of the National officers leading the discussions.

For Tuesday's banquet, Norma Andrisek and the Berea, Cleveland, and Lake County alumnae chapters, had prepared an immense map of Delta Zetaland from patchwork pieces, with the centerpieces made of gingham posies, and the programs tied in rose and green checked ribbons. Norma likened the piecing together of Delta Zeta's quilt to those early days when Revolutionary wives stitched and talked politics and helped their husbands

put together these United States. Each program and province in Delta Zeta was put together to make a beautiful quilt which is Delta Zeta.

Awards for these many pieces were given by Jane Prall for alumnae achievement, Sondra Bass for philanthropies, Norma Andrisek for press, publicity and public relations, Jane Thompson for standards, Francis Cummins for activities, Joan Lowry for scholarship with Norma Andrisek, top membership.

The Ohio singers, under the direction of Kitty Fink, ΓA, presented a peppy program of Delta Zeta songs of many moods. These girls were chosen from the many Ohio chapters, Cathy Renkert, Debbie Jennings, Bowling Green, Debbie Patten, Wittenberg, Vickie Kurtz, Lynda Wolfe, Kent, Lee Ann Vogelberger, Youngstown, Veda Spicer, Kathy Pramer Wright State, Janni Liking and Joan Arnold, Ohio State, Kathy Bosel, Baldwin Wallace, and Barb Merkel and Jan LaCorte, Cincinnati.

Later that evening National Council entertained at an Open House in the Governor's Suite on the twentieth floor.

Wednesday's session began with a memorial service led by Eleanor Fariss with songs by Marvona Tavlin. Special tribute was paid to Bernice Hutchison Gale, Past National President, Katie Blanche Masters Stallworth, President of the Foundation, and to Ivy Baker Priest, former Treasurer of the United States and of the State of California.

At the close of the morning's session Nominating Chairman Margaret Huenefeld Pease reported that there had been no floor nominations submitted to her and re-read the report of her committee. Their nominees were: President, Florence Hohnbaum Harvey; Vice-President, Norma Minch Andrisek; Vice President Alumnae Affairs, Dianne Fellows Guild; Vice President, Collegiate Affairs, Marilou Lynch Gary; Secretary, Arlene Newman; Treasurer, Eleanor Strickler Fariss; Directors, Amaryllis Pickett Barnes, Mary Lou McConnaughey Barth, Sondra Golden Bass, Betty Schneider Fenton, and Carolyn Barnes Gullatt. The committee further recommended that Norma Andrisek be in charge of Membership and Rush and that Florence Miner be appointed Editor of THE LAMP and be requested to lend travel aid as needed.

The polls were open that afternoon and those officers and directors were so elected. At a later meeting of the new Council the two appointive members of National Council were chosen. Gwen Moss McKeeman will continue as Delta Zeta's National Panhellenic Conference delegate of which she is currently serving as Secretary. Betty Heusch Agler was named as the Past President on Council.

Grace Mason Lundy, with her usual warmth and love, presided at the Initiation banquet on Wednesday evening. She was assisted by her GML girls and introduced by Linda Agler Hobbs. Tall white pillars and flowing greenery set the mood for this special Delta Zeta occasion. The white and gold programs at each place were tied with rose and green ribbons.

With her usual wit and charm Grace delighted her audience with insights into Delta Zeta's bits of history and lore while introducing her program. Marvona Tavlin's magnificent voice, the presentation of the Caryatides awards and the 1975 Grace Mason Lundy award winners brought the program to its climax, the introduction of the convention initiate. Grace recalled that we have initiated Delta Zeta daughters and sisters, but this was the first Delta Zeta mother to be so honored. She then introduced Jackie Groza, mother of Delta Zeta Jill at Ashland College. Jackie is a stunning tall woman who before her marriage was a New York City designer's model. As a member of Theta Psi chapter she adds to the Greeks in her family as Husband Lou is an Alpha Tau Omega from Ohio State and sons Jeff and Jon are Sigma Nus from Ashland. Son Jud is a seventh grader. Much travelled Jackie is on the community library and hospital boards in their home town of Berea.

Singing and humming "Delta Zeta Lamps are Burning" everyone quietly moved to the room where the initiation of Jackie Groza was performed flawlessly by Province Directors under the direction of Norma Andrisek.

Thursday's luncheon in the French Pavilion was planned by Dorothy Best Rich, Ψ, assisted by her daughter Rachel Rich, BP. After the invocation by Grace Lundy, Lucile Cooks introduced the many mothers, fathers, daughters and granddaughters and sisters of Delta Zetas present. Youngest guest was three year old Amy, daughter of Sue Ricketts Sayre and granddaughter of Esther Emler Ricketts.

Florence Miner reminisced about past conventions when mothers were in the hoping stages that they would have Delta Zeta daughters, and then introduced Florence Harvey, who asked four of the daughters present to assist her in presenting her theme "Because You Care".

On Friday the Golden Rose members met for a special luncheon. Lucile Cooks presided with Amanda Thomas giving the invocation. Grace Lundy gave the history of the Golden Rose, and Florence Harvey honored Dorothy Boyd Haskins, who was initiated into Theta chapter at Ohio State in 1918, with the Golden Rose ceremony. Dorothy also was celebrating her 53rd wedding anniversary that week and recalled that she missed the 1922 convention when she was business manager of The Lamp because of her wedding.

A sparkling and happy ending for the convention was the Installation banquet with Betty Agler presiding and the Columbus alumnae chapter doing the arrangements.

Delegates and guests entered the ballroom thru a rose decorated trellis to find friendship trees sparkling from each table and twinkling lights making it a modern fairyland. After a week of unbelievably exciting and delicious meals, this one was topped off with the waiters bearing flaming Baked Alaskas to the podium.

Many surprises sparked the traditional final award giving. It was a sharing affair as husbands, wives, daughters, sons and beaus were guests, and were introduced. Everyone in Columbus who had helped Delta Zeta on the way was there and obviously enjoyed themselves.

Convention Lights

Not on the program was a song by Lee McFalls, EΞ, Central Arkansas, who will be one of next year's Field Representatives. She then accompanied Diane Hunt, Lamar, Texas, president who did *What Delta Zeta Means to Me* in sign language, tracing the ΔZ letters over her heart. These two beautiful sisters, one blonde, one brunette, gave new meaning to the music.

As a surprise gift to Delta Zeta, honoring Grace Lundy for her generous gift to the General Fund, an enterprising group of sisters had scurried around getting donations from everyone so that they could match Grace's gift of ten dollars for each year a Delta Zeta. They were most successful and almost doubled her gift, and a breathless Jane Grey, Debbie Raziano, and Janis Lumpkins presented this stack of bills and checks to Grace and Delta Zeta, "that our Lamp shall continue to shed its light."

As a prelude to her Award presentation Florence Hood Miner introduced former winners of her award, Barbara Cook, BX, Jane Gustafson Thompson, BN, Laura McQuaig Badeaux, Σ, and Jane Gale Prall, ΓZ. The winner of the 1975 Florence Hood Miner award to the outstanding junior collegian was Marcy Bumgarner, AB at University of Illinois, with Paula Jones, EB, Marcia Blackburn, KZ, Cathleen Morris, ET, Jean Poore, ZP and Charlotte Davis, BΞ as the Court of Honor.

The silver urn honoring Margaret Huenefeld Pease was given by her to the Canyon, Texas alumnae chapter, while the Myrtle Graeter Hinkly urn was won by the Huntsville, Alabama, alumnae and presented by Arlene Newman.

The Gertrude Houk Fariss silver punch bowl for alumnae-collegiate cooperation and achievement was won by the Berea alumnae and Gamma Alpha chapter, with Eleanor Fariss presenting. The See Loving Cup for great chapter improvement over the past two years was presented by Norma Andrisek to Delta Chi chapter at Chico, California.

Speaking for the province of Ohio, Norma Andrisek then said: "It is my great privilege to announce to this convention a new award to be presented for the first time. The Delta Zetas of Ohio have long been aware of the extraordinary contribution to Delta Zeta of Betty Heusch Agler. The offices she has held have been many, and to each she has given the fullest measure of devotion."

"There is a uniqueness to Betty's giving that sets her apart from others. Her good humor, her steady hand, her ability to reach out and extend a loving challenge to those around her make her a special friend to all of us. The award is to be presented at each National convention to a collegiate chapter of high achievement rendering loving service to Delta Zeta. On behalf of the Ohio Delta Zetas I am proud to present to the National Council the Betty Heusch Agler award."

The award itself is a large wood plaque with a raised bronze Delta Zeta crest. A very popular first winner of this award was Theta chapter at Ohio State. Their graciousness during the convention, and their assistance throughout the years to National Headquarters whenever extra help was needed, made them the unanimous choice of National Council.

Collegiate chapters are graded on all phases of campus and ΔZ programs and the top chapters are then recipients of the highest chapter awards, the Founders and Council award. Grace Mason Lundy, on behalf of the Founders, presented the six silver candlesticks for high achievement to Iota Delta chapter at Edinboro and Iota Nu chapter at Georgia Southern.

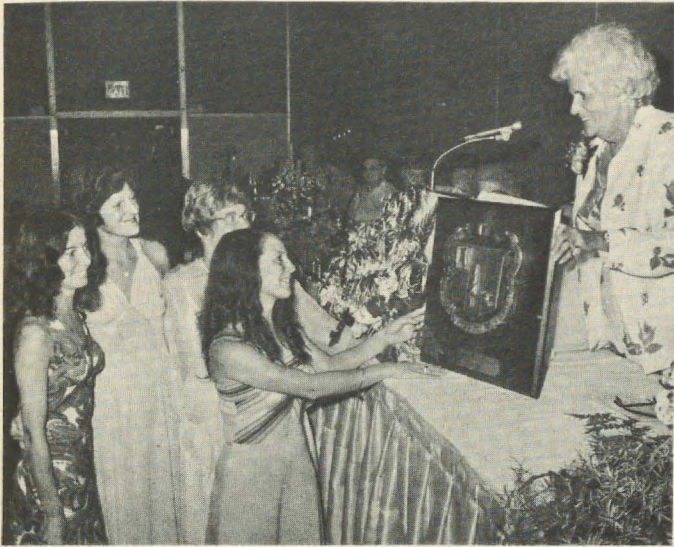
When a chapter has won the Founders' award and goes on to continued achievement they are then eligible for the Council silver tray, which can be won more than once. Florence Harvey announced these winners as Beta Tau, Nebraska Wesleyan, and Delta Delta at Georgia State.

As a Past National President Betty Heusch Agler conducted the Installation service for the elected Council and the convention was officially closed with the singing of *Convention Lights* and many tears.

But this was a happy ending and no one wanted to stop sharing. Provinces all over the hotel were holding open houses where college girls and their alumnae did impromptu skits and songs whenever guests arrived, with fun awards going to everyone. After a melange of pizza, cheeses, brownies, cakes, candy, nuts, lemonade and pop, with songs ringing in their ears, everyone declared it a fun convention, where new friends were added to old friends. As the banquet program proclaimed, "True friends are like diamonds costly, rich and rare." And many true friends were found that week in Delta Zeta.

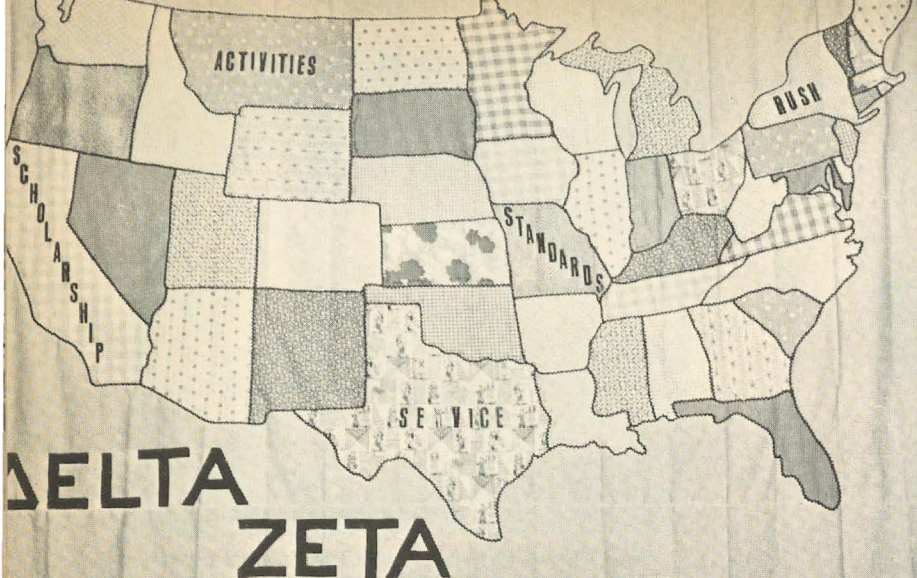

Convention banquets do not just happen. Months before the event, planning and creating begins.

Representatives from Berea, Cleveland Eastside, Cleveland Westside, and Lake County alumnae chapters met initially in March of this year to decide on a theme and decorations for the Tuesday night Awards Banquet since their Norma Andrisek, national vice president for collegiate affairs, was in charge. The Ohio singers had little rehearsal time—once at Ohio State Day in March, once at a pre-convention rehearsal in Columbus, and long tedious hours of polishing and practicing on the day of the event.

On Tuesday, June 24th, many members of the alumnae chapters met in Columbus to put the finishing touches on the evening's preparations. Centerpieces had to be assembled. Programs needed to be laced with rose or green gingham ribbon. A huge patchwork map of the United States made by Norma Andrisek with

the help of husband Dick and area DZs, had to be hung on the wall. As the dinner hour approached, Delta Zeta workers moved into the banquet hall to prepare each table with centerpieces, favors, and programs.

As delegates entered the room and saw the vast array of rose and green decorations, listened to the rationale that the patchwork of standards, membership, philanthropies, scholarship, activities, and alumnae affairs makes up the quilt of Delta Zeta Sorority, were entertained by the vivacious and clear-singing Ohio Singers, and received various awards, probably few realized the extent of work that had entered into the evening's success.

Now it's all a memory; a memory of hours of preparation, planning, fun, and working together. But, after all, isn't this what sisterhood is all about?

Heritage—

a Gift to Posterity

President's Address by Florence Hohnbaum Harvey

Heritage is a gift to posterity. A heritage remembered bestows a horizon to mold.

We, in the United States, have started to celebrate our nation's Bicentennial. Greek letter organizations, too, are on the verge of a bicentennial, and they are closely tied in with our country's history because they had their start in 1776 with the founding of Phi Beta Kappa. Even then there was a need among college students for closer friendships; and these were found in a fraternity.

For 199 years Greek letter societies have flourished, and the need for them still exists today—more than ever before. One's talent can be developed in solitude but one's character is created in society—with people. It is the result of friendship and fellowship.

We in Delta Zeta are bound together, seeking what no sister may learn for another, and what no sister can learn alone. It is a truth that no one of us is strong enough not to need companionship and ideals.

Along with the Bicentennial, our country is also experiencing a current wave of nostalgia and remembrance of the past. This gives each of us the opportunity to contemplate events of these years about which we often hear as "the good old days."

History has proven that there's no hope for the future unless we know about, treasure, and hold some reverence for our past. Our heritage helps us to follow an intelligent course.

We in Delta Zeta give support to the present with the wisdom of our own past, so that the continuity of our Founders' thoughts and the ideals which they established for us as a national sorority, will not be lost. Our Delta Zeta heritage serves as a framework to steer a successful course through college: scholastically, morally, and socially; to alumnae, a framework based upon faith in ourselves and our loyalty to purposes we respect and honor. Delta Zeta is a wonderful gift—a membership for a lifetime.

We try to teach and impress on the minds and in the hearts of our members

the outstanding record of the admirable achievements of our past, those significant events in our Delta Zeta history, our heritage, which serves today as an indication of putting our beliefs and convictions into practice. Over the years, our philanthropic and service programs, our many scholarships, loans, grants and awards have given and continue to give impetus to Delta Zeta's original aims and purposes. Thanks to our college and alumnae chapters, the Foundation, the Colonnade Clubs and National Councils, we can recall with pride the many gifts of love and service made over the years. The volunteer work of a multitude of Delta Zeta sisters has raised thousands upon thousands of dollars for our altruistic projects.

Another large part of our heritage is the substantial, cherished and shared memories of lovely, happy, meaningful occasions and experiences which we never would have known except for our membership in Delta Zeta—membership given us by sisters who believed so much in the Delta Zeta way of life that they not only shared it, but they cared enough to pass it on to us. Think of the scores of sisters who have repeated our beautiful creed; think, too, of the scores of sisters who will follow us and who will be saying the creed just as we will tomorrow morning.

There's a miracle in a way to think that our principles as expressed in our creed have been preserved for 73 years. The fundamentals are still with us and they will stay with us to continue on, if we as individuals fulfill our obligations. True, some of our sisters do not live up to their obligations. They take from Delta Zeta and give nothing in return. That is why so often it is pointed out that Delta Zeta is part of a tradition larger than ourselves; a tradition of strength from each sister as she has within her the will to give; to each sister as she has within her the need to receive. Each of us in her own way has helped to build Delta Zeta's heritage and we are responsible for her future. The strength that Delta Zeta

gives depends on what we are willing to make of our sorority not how we expect her to benefit us. Benefits derived are in proportion to our initiative, our adaptation, our participation, our appreciation. Delta Zeta gives us the opportunity. What a fantastic feeling it is to realize that when we were pledged each member of our chapter put the reputation, love and friendship of Delta Zeta in our hands and trusted us to make the most of it. Even though as individuals we are diverse in our interests, talents and abilities, we do share a unity of purpose which is profound in its faith and almost sacred in its intent.

We have crossed many bridges since our founding. There were times of discouragement but our established roots encouraged us to grow and develop even beyond the cherished dreams of our Founders. With guidance and patience we have met problems head-on, emerging stronger and better for having faced them as challenges put to us. Based on these experiences, Delta Zeta has helped us to develop qualities of character which will be useful to us throughout our lives—if we so wish. All of life's experiences are interrelated and Delta Zeta's influence cannot help but be reflected in our lives.

At every convention we set our goals. We have reached almost all of these as you will learn during this week that we are together. We have tried to develop meaningful chapter and alumnae programs, adjusting our procedures, policies, and voluntary leadership accordingly. Perhaps the awards given at this Convention will indicate our success because National Council considers each chapter and each individual sister on her own merits. Based upon all of these reports and awards, you delegates will decide how to preserve and strengthen Delta Zeta's future. You will indicate the direction in which we move, for Delta Zeta cannot survive on her past accomplishments alone. Our philosophy emphasizes that flexibility along with protected growth and renewal will be essential to the new goals we establish at this time to ensure our continued stability. This week, together we must plan carefully and think through these plans all the while maintaining our perspective—that what we do now in June 1975 must aim toward the tangible future on our Delta Zeta horizon. We should recognize and use all the resources available to us to make Delta Zeta more effective than she already is. There are unending resources in our sisters, resources which are ready to be marshalled toward unprecedented service, strength and growth. This potential should be nurtured and developed by all of us. We need our collective interests, enthusiasm and participation. Let us do more than talk and plan. Let us forge a link between thought and direct action. We, too, must leave a legacy.

Just think of six college girls in 1902 having the courage, the foresight and the determination to form a national sorority, continually promoting and preserving the national concept. In my travels for Delta Zeta the last two years—the depth, breadth and height—the entire scope of our sorority can be seen in its true perspective and it never ceases to amaze me. It is wonderful to be part of a national sorority; part of a bond between sisters all over the nation. My conception of this has sharpened considerably, for every place that I am with our sisters. I have found that Delta Zeta friendships mean so much in the lives of so many, many of us. It is not one college chapter or one alumnae chapter or one province or one state. Delta Zeta is all of her chapters, all of her provinces in almost all 50 states.

Thanks to our heritage, Delta Zeta has the largest number of college chapters and many, many alumnae chapters. Delta Zeta is willing to venture into new dimensions for all her chapters and for her individual alumnae. Delta Zeta's positive involvement on every level has enabled her to maintain the very high rating she holds in national strength among the 26 NPC groups.

We should grow in understanding each other. Heed the advice to talk with your sisters from pledge to golden rose, and don't just hear what they say. Listen when they talk to you. Develop the ability to make concessions and to compromise after discussion; then do what is best for Delta Zeta nationally. Our growth should be guided by carefully selecting and inviting into membership those who have and will accept our standards. Strive to make Delta Zeta Sorority the best on your campus. Wear your badges. Show how great it is to be a Delta Zeta. Pledge quota. Rush to total. Don't stop short of that goal, and then initiate 100% of your pledge class. Carry out the full responsibilities of your office. Also, let us keep our alumnae chapters strong, and, knowing the pleasure involved, realizing the rewarding results of working and being together as Delta Zetas, ready to help where needed.

As your National President, I do find inspiration expressed when we talk through the strong faith each of you, as an individual member, shows in your love for Delta Zeta. One senses this, in the many outstanding newsletters from college and alumnae chapters. The concern for others is evident as we use our resources, knowledge and our "sisterpower" in energy, time, talents and money earned for OUR National Philanthropy. "Our" is in capital letters and underlined because charity begins at home. Today there are endless demands for our time, talents and money. Unceasing requests are made by all kinds of organizations—local and national—legal and illegal—well known and never heard of—funds and associations which do not fully inform us as to how the monies they receive from us are spent.

To be certain that your hard-earned philanthropic dollars are spent where they will do the most good and where

an accounting will be given, support Delta Zeta philanthropies: Speech and Hard of Hearing, Foundation Awards and Grants, Gallaudet College, Delta Zeta Scholarship Funds. To take a page from the book of several well known, and prosperous national charities, one dollar in an envelope multiplied by our 75,000 members would realize the goal of our 75th Anniversary Diamond Jubilee Fund, which fund unofficially started last year with this corsage of \$75 donated by sisters in Province VII.

It is like climbing a mountain, all that I have said to you. It is done on the shoulders of others. Part of the way up we follow the path that others have made for us. Then we come to the horizon where no one has ever been, and we blaze the trail. We reach our limit, but someday others who follow us will go safely over the route we travelled and then they will continue on—ever toward the summit. But at least a part of the way will be the way we have marked. We cannot do this alone. We need to be reminded again that we hold in trust the work of others—sisters who have helped create the privileges we enjoy.

For those who walk truly in the light of the flame, it is heart warming to know that we have added a little of ourselves to Delta Zeta. We look forward to the many years ahead and know that together we can build our Delta Zeta and enable her to continue to serve college women for all the generations to come.

We do take justifiable pride in our heritage. As we shape Delta Zeta's future at this 1975 National Convention, we will see stretching across the Delta Zeta spectrum, our Diamond Jubilee—just over the horizon. As we look to this horizon, let us be faithful to the trust given to us.

"Just smile and be darling!" So spoke Betty Agler to the 1975 conventioners. And that is just what they did during the Pups 'n Hounds Fun Night. Delta Zetas filed into the dining room attired in 50's clothes with ponytails, bobby socks, and saddle shoes, and found Mickey Mouse balloons and 50's records decorating the dining tables. Hound ears were also on each table to be worn during the traditional barking contest.

As the evening began, pups and hounds' ears perked up, and their noses sniffed a scent of dignity as National Council strolled in to the tune "Rock Around the Clock." Even though some Council Members were hardly recognizable in their attire, the pups and hounds stood and clapped their paws with delight as the officers paraded through the audience.

The excitement stilled during dinner, but afterwards Margaret Pease told the history of the Pups 'n Hounds Dinner and commanded delegates to give a woof for each year they had attended convention. It was determined that Grace Lundy was of a special breed and "The Real Top Dog of the U.S." when she stood and delivered 24 resounding woofs. Getting back to the entertainment, Provinces I, IX, and XII attempted to set some soda shop deadbeats straight on sorority girls.

The local soda shop was also the scene for the skit by VII, XI, XIX, and XX. Everyone swooned over Frankie Frat. This skit won second place.

Taking first place of all the collegiate skits was the act done by Provinces V, XVI, and XXIII. The setting was a 1954 Delta Zeta Convention Business Meeting. A motion was made that all delegates vote with their pink credentials' cards. Florence Harvey (impersonated) was quick to amend the motion by reminding everyone that the cards were ROSE-colored, not pink.

More Delta Zeta history was brought to mind as IV, VIII, and XVII staged a ΔZ Council Beauty Contest.

The entire program was topped off by a Teen Queen Pageant with our Council Members as contestants. The bashful southern belle Arlene Newman appeared as Sadie Hawkins, and Dianne Guild appeared in a stunning costume highlighted by matching pledge paddles. Florence Miner was Sweet 16 and beautiful, as was last year's Teen Queen Betty Agler. Norma Andrisek in bangs maneuvered her hula hoop. Gwen McKeeman and Jane Prall were Mousketeers.

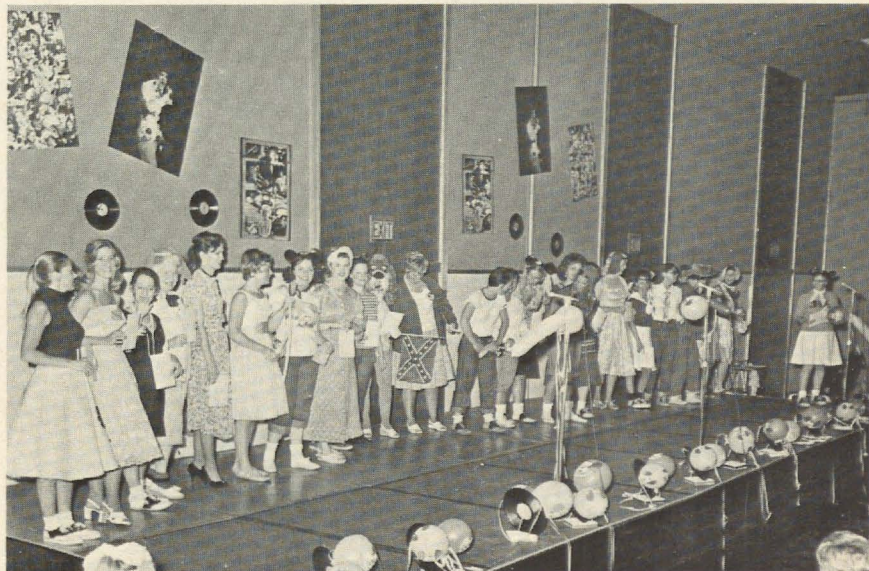
Since all Delta Zetas are winners, Betty Agler crowned them all with crowns reminiscent of a popular hamburger.

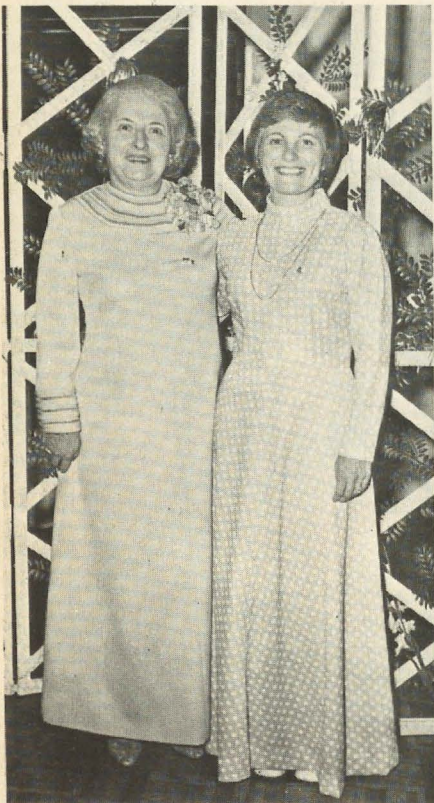

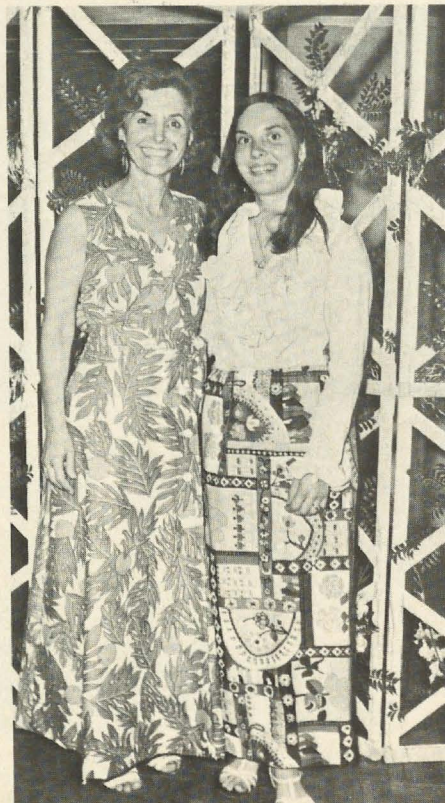

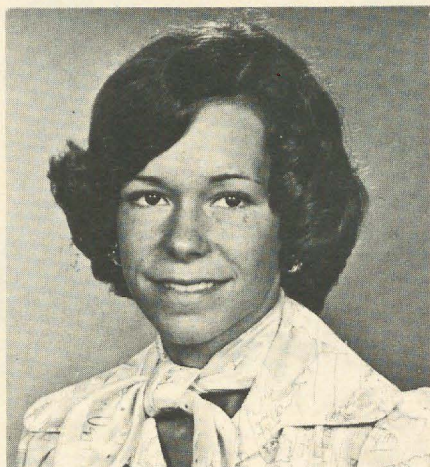

Lambda Omicron Installed at Angelo State

"Roses I give to thee" sang two girls from the Zeta Zeta chapter as Debbie Raziano presented each girl a rose and her congratulations. Thus ended the memorable installation of the Lambda Omicron chapter at Angelo State University. This ending marks only a beginning for each girl in the new sisterhood.

Angelo State College was established in 1928 as a Junior College. Since that time, it has grown from the first building in 1947 to its present status. In 1965, it became Angelo State University by an act of the 58th session of the Texas Legislature. The enrollment totals more than 5,000 and housing is available for 1,250 men and women.

Encouragement from the existing five social fraternities on ASU campus for the first social sorority gave way to the beginning of plans. On January 8, 1975, seven coeds appeared at the doorstep of the Dean of Women, Mrs. Willene Siler, asking her thoughts on the subject. With her gracious help, along with that of Dean Paul Horn and Dean Jack Nelson, these seven girls, Pam Birdwell, Linda Cary, Judith Duboise, Mary Haning, Julia Ivy, Debbie Maxson and Sherrie Stevens began preliminary plans for Angelo State's first sorority. By reading through information sent to ASU from many different sororities, it was unanimously decided to contact Delta Zeta as the first choice. Exactly two weeks later on Monday, February 3, was the first organizational meeting. It was held at the ASU lakehouse, with the school providing hot dogs and "trimmings". Debbie Raziano related the background and future of Delta Zeta. Each girl left excited and fired up and the next night, fifteen girls pledged the new sorority. By the end of the week, the group totaled twenty-seven.

The group continued growing until the present thirty-five were installed. Upon the return of Raz on March 10, the election of officers was held. Those elected to represent the new group were: President—Sandi Dennis, a sophomore from Lamesa, Texas; Vice-President, Pledge Training—Denise Williams, a junior from Winters, Texas; Vice-President, Rush—Judith Duboise, a sophomore from Jayton, Texas; Recording Secretary—Debbie Maxson, a sophomore from Midland, Texas; Corresponding Secretary—Sherrie Stevens, a sophomore from Lamesa, Texas; Treasurer—Linda Cary, a sophomore from Menard, Texas; Parliamentarian—Diane Ross, a freshman from San Angelo, Texas; Social Chairman—Pam Birdwell, a junior from Ft. Stockton, Texas; and Activities Chairman—Mary Haning, a sophomore from Dallas, Texas.

The first social was a mixer held on March 15 with the Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity. On April 6, the Lambda Chi Alpha fraternity hosted a softball game.

Money making projects were begun immediately after the colony was started. Bake sales were held three times but the largest amount of money was raised from Egg sales. Girls asked for a donation of an egg at one house and sold it for a donation at the next. The money raised was used toward the party after installation.

This newest chapter of Delta Zeta had the full support and backing of the administration and student body. The amount of help contributed by Deans Siler, Horn and Nelson was immeasurable. Also, the encouragement, suggestions and recognition from the fraternities made the national installation of Lambda Omicron come quicker and easier than could be expected.

On April 26, not even three months after the first fifteen girls pledged Delta Zeta, the dream became a reality. Angelo State now had its first sorority. A group of nine girls from the Zeta Zeta chapter at West Texas State University presented a memorable initiation for the thirty-five girls. Their visit on the ASU campus proved profitable in more ways than one. Their inspiring singing, helpful suggestions and uplifting moral support provided an even newer sense of unity for the Lambda Omicron Chapter. As a continuation of their help, they gave each girl a letter of congratulations from her adopted "big sister" of their chapter.

The installation reception began that night in the La' Quinta Motor Inn. Initiates, their dates and parents were greeted by Betty Agler, Past National President; Arlene Newman, National Secretary; Sandi Dennis, Chapter President; Debbie Raziano, Field Representative; and Mrs. Willene Siler, Dean of Women and CCD for the new chapter.

Arlene Newman served as Toastmistress and Mary Margaret Calhoun Fore, Province Alumnae Director, and Carolyn Barnes Gullatt, Province Collegiate Director, welcomed the large group. Sandi expressed the thanks of the group for the memorable night and to Raz for her big part in making it all possible. Also expressing congratulations were Velma Lockridge McKee, Past National Director, and Elizabeth Bray, San Angelo, Texas Alumnae.

Raz, rising to give her greetings and appreciations to the faculty received a standing ovation by the girls and their guests for the hours of hard work she had spent making the installation possible. A short address was then given by Dr. Lloyd D. Vincent, President of Angelo State University.

The Installation Service was conducted by Betty Heusch Agler. Sandi Dennis was presented the gavel, Denise Williams and Judith Duboise, the loving cup, and Debbie Maxson and Sherrie Stevens, the charter. Acceptance of the Chapter was by Willene Siler, Associate Dean of Student Life at ASU.

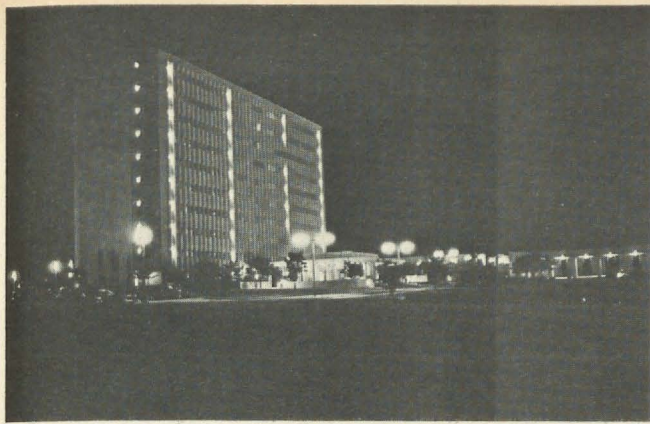

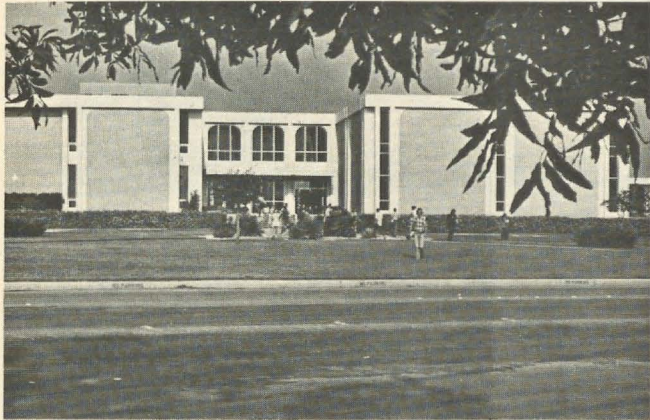

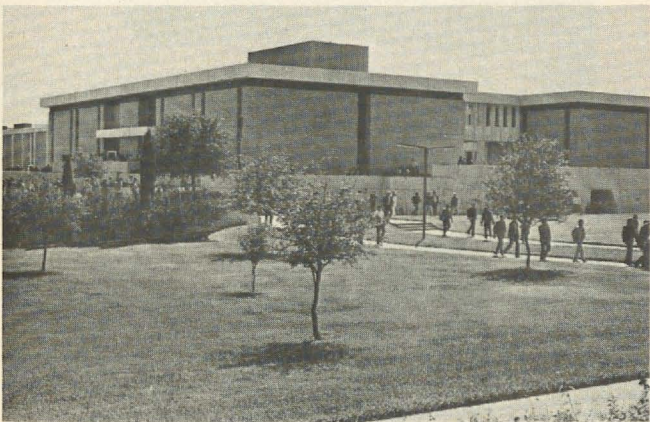

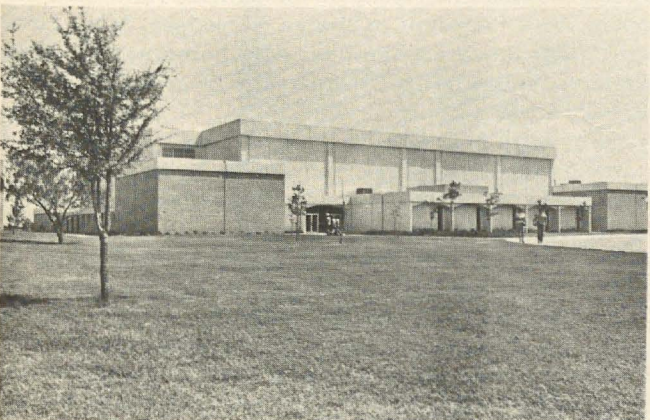
Night view of Women's Residence Hall at Angelo State.

Academic Building at Angelo State in Texas.



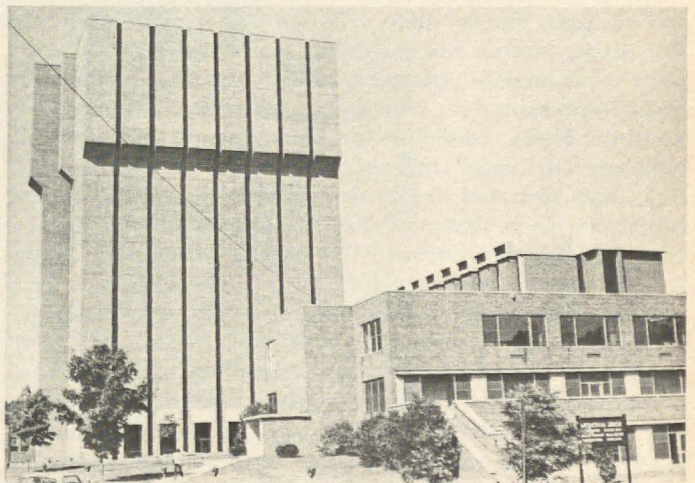
Physical Education Building, Angelo State University.

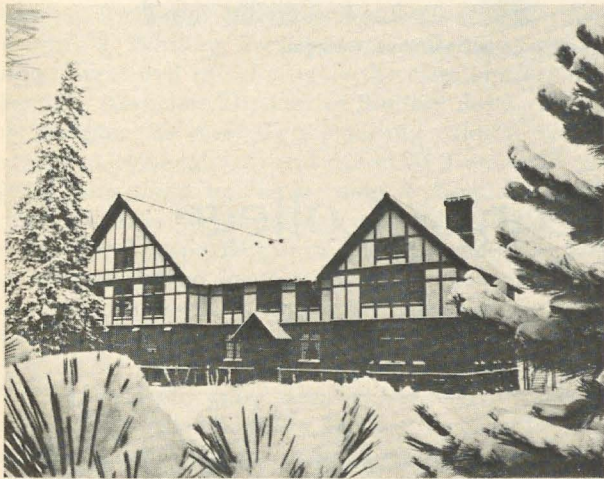

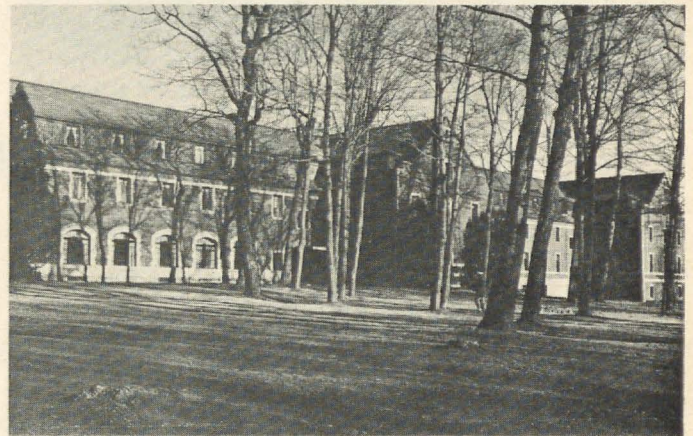
President Raymond L. Smith signs the guest book before the installation banquet for Lambda Theta chapter at Michigan Technological University.

Lambda Psi is First at Georgia College

"Sisters, sorority sisters; that's what Delta Zeta made us" on May 17, 1975, as twenty-one girls of the Lambda Psi colony signed the charter to become a full-fledged Delta Zeta chapter.

Lambda Psi of Delta Zeta is the first national Panhellenic sorority to be chartered on the Columbus College campus in Columbus, Georgia. The excitement of our installation was shared by members of other fraternities on campus which are still in colony status and are anticipating their own installations.

For years it had been thought that a sorority would never exist on this community college campus. Fortunately, two young women, Rosa Miller Mazeika and Catherine Anderson, felt differently. Missy (Rosa) contacted Betty Agler and expressed our interest in forming a sorority. It was not long, when in June, Debbie Raziano, Field Representative, was sent to Columbus to tell us what Delta Zeta was all about. Wanting to be sure that Delta Zeta really was the best, we looked at other sororities. By this time, we had added several new members to our group.

This small group of girls first formed as a local sorority, Zeta Pi Omega. Convinced that Delta Zeta is the only sorority, a petition was submitted to Mrs. Agler for approval by the National Council. On October 8, 1974, Mrs. Agler and Debbie Raziano (now known as Raz to the girls) flew to Columbus to talk with the administration of the college. At this time Delta Zeta

was granted permission to ribbon the petitioning women to show that they would be pledged as soon as the constitution and bylaws were directed through proper channels on campus.

On October 31st, permission was granted for colonization and once again Raz appeared on the scene. Sunday evening, November 3, 1974, the following women were inducted into the Lambda Psi colony of Delta Zeta: Catherine Anderson, Susan Jannelle Culpepper, Roxanne Elaine Daniel, Catherine Bernice Freeman, Shirley Jean Lancaster, Rosa Miller Mazeika, Deborah Faye McCrory, Jenny Lynn Mitchell, Margaret Cynthia Ross, Frances Bernice Sandefur, Cathy Frances Trigg, and Lynda Christine Willhardt.

As green jerseys bearing the Greek letters began to appear and the tiny diamond shaped pledge pins bearing a lamp were worn proudly, an aura of excitement was felt on campus and the Delta Zeta pledges were encouraged by the interest of fellow students and professors. There was overwhelming support in fund raising projects and the colony sisters participated with enthusiasm in campus activities.

As interest heightened, the colony almost doubled in size by the time chartering was to take place. Added to the group were Mary Jeannette Bowen, Rezondala Renee Dunn, Cathy Jean Goss, Mary Theresa Hall, Linda Burgin King, Ellen Leigh Kite, Margaret Ann Pue, Doris Mauldin Roe, and Robin Lea Wilkerson.

On Friday, May 16, Raz and Sue were joined by Mrs. Agler, Mrs. Sondra Bass, Mrs. Leah Richards, and Mrs. Amaryllis Barnes. These were entertained by the Lambda Psi girls that evening at an informal party in order for them to get to know us and us to get to know them.

At seven o'clock the next morning, not quite so bright-eyed and bushy-tailed, everyone met at the Holiday Inn for breakfast before initiation. The beauty of the ceremony left tears of happiness and pride, for everyone had worked long and hard for this moment. The initiation service, conducted by Delta Delta girls of Georgia State University, and Iota Nu girls of Georgia Southern College, was followed by singing and getting to know our visiting sisters.

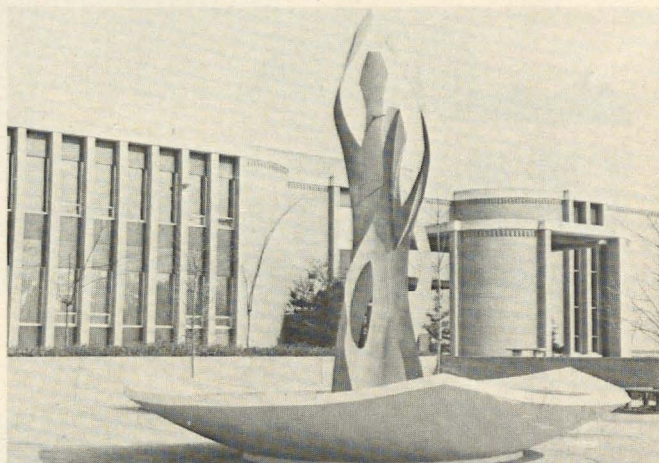
That evening following the reception, the formal installation banquet was held at the Columbus Country Club. One could not have asked for a more beautiful or more perfect evening. Carolyn Lee Wills, $\Delta\Delta$, acted as toastmistress for the evening. Following the introductions, Sondra Golden Bass, National Director, gave the welcome speech. Other participants on the program were Amaryllis Pickett Barnes, our Province Collegiate Director; Leah Burgess Richards, Province Alumnae Director; and Dr. Thomas Y. Mrs. Agler presented the charter to the chapter and when Dr. Bennett, Associate Director of Student Services, accepted the chapter, he received a standing ovation, for he had acted as a close advisor and friend. If it were not for him, Delta Zeta could not have come to Columbus College's campus. Gifts were presented to Mrs. Agler and Dr. Bennett and a special gift of love and gratitude was presented to Raz who deserves higher praise than anyone can imagine for her work with Dr. Bennett. Gifts were received by Lambda Psi with delight and admiration.

After the rose ceremony, as the friendship circle was formed, each girl knew deep in her heart that she was a part of Delta Zeta and Delta Zeta was a part of her. Following the installation, out of town sisters were invited to a party celebrating the installation of Lambda Psi.

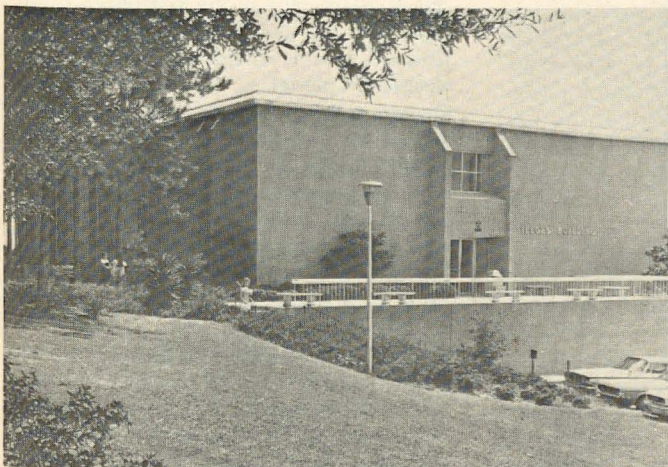

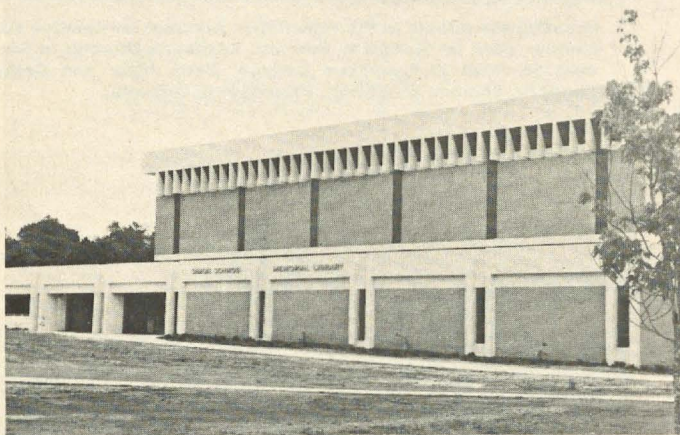

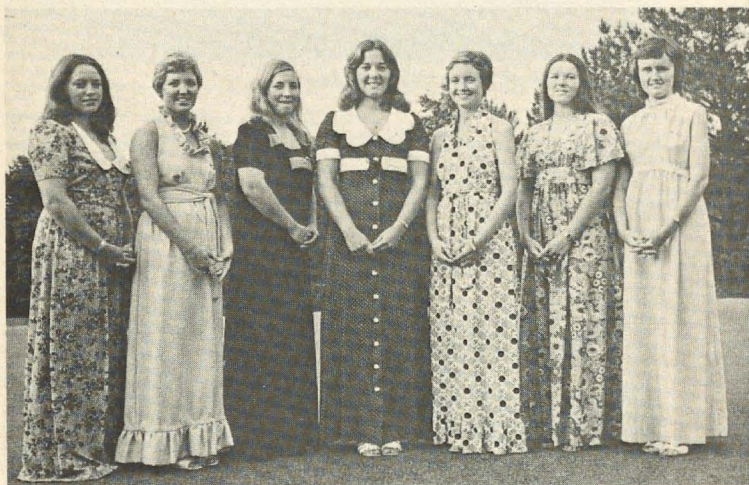

Campus Sights & Sounds

RETURN TO CAMPUS for short-term learning vacations are being offered alumni by a growing number of institutions in all parts of the country. After making course selections from a variety of offerings, the alumnus and family arrive on campus and move into dormitories reserved for this purpose. Supervised play, swimming lessons, basic sports and crafts instruction, or babysitting are available for the youngsters while mom and dad go to school.

VANDALISM has replaced thievery as chief among campus security problems. A Senate subcommittee has reported that the cost to colleges and universities runs to five hundred million dollars a year. One college spokesman says the "guilty many" who tolerate this sort of thing are as much to blame as the "crazy few" who perpetrate it on others.

GRADE INFLATION is a current point for discussion and concern across the continent, with supportive material to defend or deride according to the point of view. Since grades are reported rising at the same time standardized test scores are dropping, the one point on which all observers agree is that this year's student is neither smarter nor exerting more effort. The economic need to keep enrollments up may be contributing, some say, while others point to recruiting from varied socioeconomic backgrounds and intellectual abilities. While the *Wall Street Journal* summed it up as a lowering of standards, others weren't so sure that this was the whole story.

DECLINES are reported in many things these days, but one increase recorded in 1974-75 was in ROTC enrollments. Womanpower accounts for 80% of this increase according to Pentagon figures which show 8,800 female cadets.

THE METRIC SYSTEM is inching closer to becoming the standard for the world in the opinion of most mathematicians. With Canada already in the process of converting to the metric system, the United States is the only industrialized country in the world still using a non-metric system. Some predict that by 1976 all elementary math textbooks will be completely metric. It seems safe to say that it will take the parents a little longer.

CAREER CHANGE counseling is being made available to women by some institutions. Dissatisfaction with choice of career, with full or part-time employment, or even with volunteer work may be discussed, explored, and evaluated. Many of those seeking aid are from among the large numbers who chose teaching careers during the bonanza years in this field and who have found their own interest waning along with job potential.

DOLLAR SIGNS have replaced peace signs among campus marchers and protesters, but causes are localized and diversified. At Colorado students blockaded a busy street running through the campus, calling its traffic a hazard to their lives. Most other spring protests involved raises in tuition or other fees and in budget or faculty cuts. Two involved shortening of library hours. Minnesota students chartered buses for shuttling their lobbyists to support the governor's tuition freeze and were successful; tuition raise was lowered, and more scholarships were added.

GIFT CERTIFICATES for tuition are available at one community college in Michigan. The institution reports having sold about 40 so far in denominations averaging about \$50, usually graduation gifts from relatives.

THE MORE EDUCATION a husband has, the more willing he will be to share household duties. So says a study by Indiana University sociologist John H. Scanzoni. In fact, the scale of willingness can be measured with accuracy against the level of education — the higher the level, the most agreeable to sharing; the lower the level, the most likely to hold the traditional attitude toward "women's work."

A MALE PRESIDENT has been elected for the University of Kansas chapter of NOW (National Organization of Women).

CAFETERIA COUPONS worth \$24,300 were turned in, un-used, at the end of winter quarter by Kent State students. In return, they received coupons good for spring quarter, but with no refund at the end of spring quarter, many used accumulating coupons for cases of pop or other bulk items.

COURSE POPULARITY is often a fairly good reflection of the "real world" outside the campus. With economic problems on every front page, students are crowding economics and business-related courses, according to an Associated Press survey. Ohio State says its business enrollments are up 15 to 20 per cent over last year, and the University of Georgia reports its increase is close to 155 per cent with other schools falling somewhere in between.

FOREIGN STUDENTS are applying to American and Canadian institutions in growing numbers. Though the total is not certain, it is estimated that 151,000 foreign students were studying in the United States during 1973-74, a figure double that of a decade ago. It has been predicted that the largest increases are yet to come.

We are receiving more and more complaints about our stereotyped, sexist address forms. It is not our intention to offend any member by addressing her in such a manner as to minimize her identification as a person. Our address forms for the LAMP magazine on which we ask for both the maiden and married names are designed solely to help us identify our members.

The majority of our members are initiated into Delta Zeta as single women in college, and most of them do not send in their first address change until they are married. With hundreds of identical names (both married and single) in an address file of over 70,000 members, you can see the necessity of properly identifying a member before we change her address.

It is the member's option whether or not she wishes to be addressed as "Mrs" or whether she wishes to include her husband's first name on the address form. For the sake of identification, it is essential that both the member's maiden and married names be shown on the LAMP address label. If you are a meticulous reader, you will have noticed that our address information card which we include with each issue changes every so often to reflect the changing attitude toward women's names and status. It would be impossible time and money wise to change every plate in our files, but we will reflect the member's wishes when a change of address is made. Meanwhile we apologize to all of the married members to whom we address their LAMPS with their husband's name.

Another addressograph problem is with the collegiate members. Your issues of The LAMP are sent to your home addresses for two reasons. First, the summer issue does not reach you before school closes, and second, school addresses and the length of time spent on campus does change frequently. The cost to keep them up to date is prohibitive. Each member change costs Delta Zeta 75c. When and if you are out of school and have a permanent address other than your home address, please fill out a new address card and send to National Headquarters.
