What **TO DO** When

College Chapters

● September

President confers with individual officers, committee chairmen, CCD and Alumnae Boards, and presents goals for the school year, 1957-58, to chapter for approval.

Scholarship chairman will report the chapter scholarship grade and ranking as soon as released by the college, after each quarter or semester.

Rush Chairman's Report Form #1 (1957-58) pages 1 and 2, to be mailed immediately following formal rushing. Rush Chairman sends cards thanking alumnae for recommendations (forms obtained from National Headquarters). Rush Chairman sends weekly rush report until quota is met.

First vice-president send notification of pledging cards to State Chairman and Province Director. Typed history cards must be mailed to National Headquarters 2 weeks after pledging.

Mail good picture of pledge class to College Chapter Administrator within two weeks after pledging.

15—Officers should check supplies and order should be sent either to National Headquarters or to the National Projects Chairman. (See officer instructions.)

20—Corresponding Secretary mails Statistical Report to National Headquarters.

● October

1—A combined report from first vice-president, second vice-president and scholarship chairman concerning chapter membership.

1—President sends letter to Province Director.

1—Press chairman sends news clippings to Director of Public Relations.

1—Scholarship chairman will report the chapter scholarship grade and ranking as soon as released by the college, after each quarter or semester.

1—Rush Chairman's Report Form #1, pages 1 and 2 to be mailed immediately following formal rushing.

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1—Mail picture of pledge class to College Chapter Administrator by two weeks after pledging.

5—Treasurer mails report (Chapters using white materials).

12—Treasurer mails report (Chapters using yellow materials).

15—President mails her goals for 1957-58 to College Chapter Administrator. Scholarship chairman reports (deadline) as to spring quarter or semester grade or ranking.

15—LAMP Editor must have mailed LAMP letter to reach National Editor by this date. Please send interesting photographs of members and events so that your chapter can be represented.

20—Corresponding Secretary mails Statistical Report to National Headquarters.

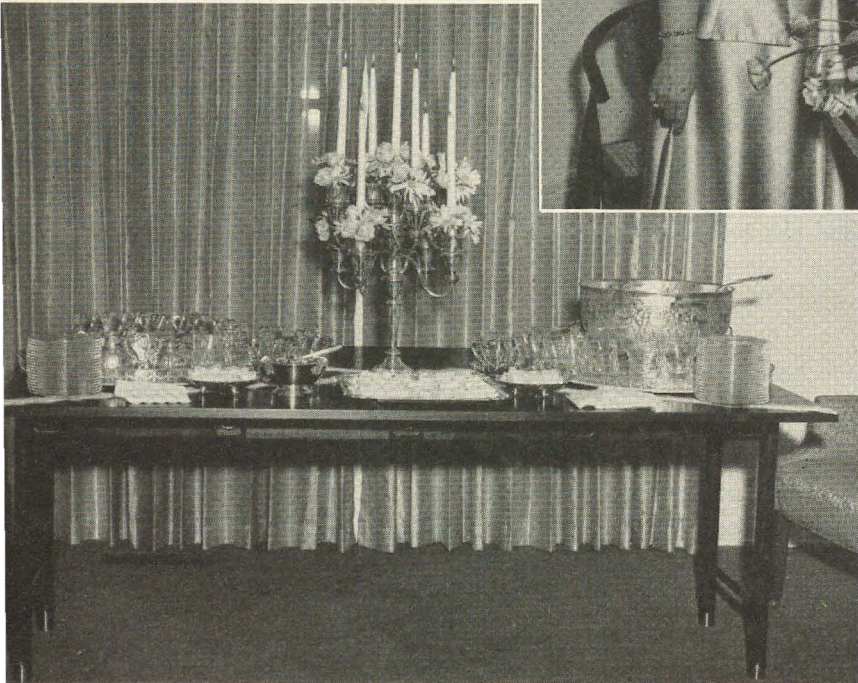

THE WALNUT CONFERENCE TABLE in the living room as it appeared in festive array at the formal opening.

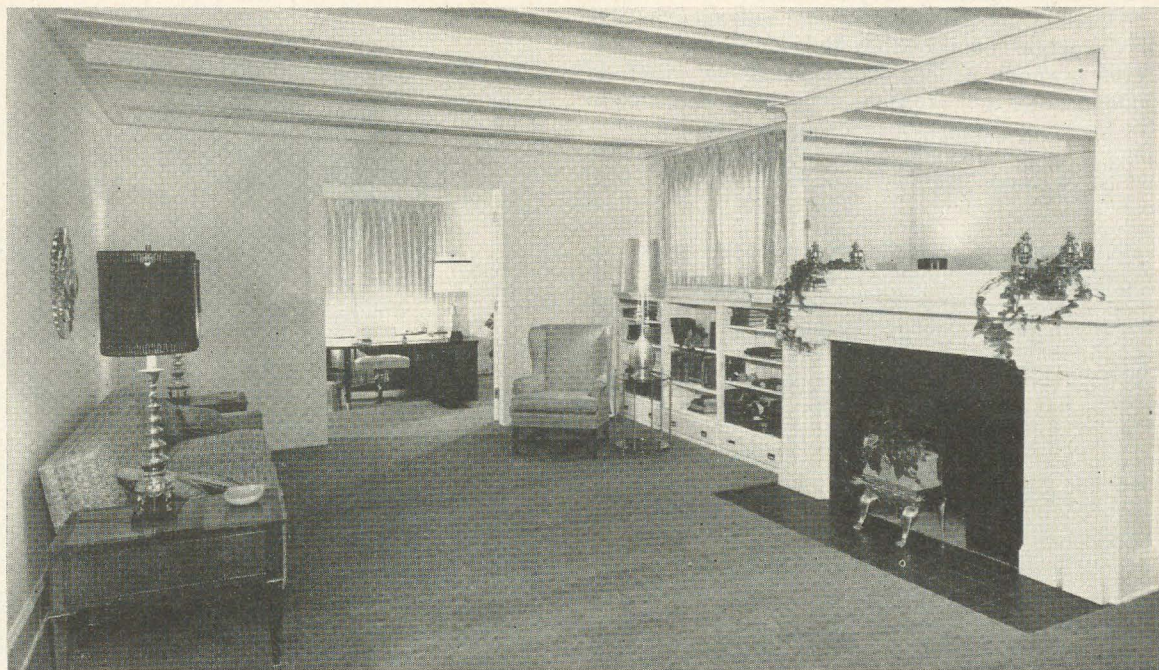
Delta Zeta "At Home" in New Headquarters

WELCOME to Delta Zeta's brand new national office and headquarters. The formal opening of the new office at 3561 North Pennsylvania Street, Indianapolis, was held on May 12, although the office had actually moved on December 28, 1956. Despite painters, decorators, selection of furniture, rugs and draperies, official reports, letters and other sorority business went on almost "as usual." The greatest and most appreciated improvement was the abundant space for the conducting of Delta Zeta's official business and the storage of the many necessary records and supplies.

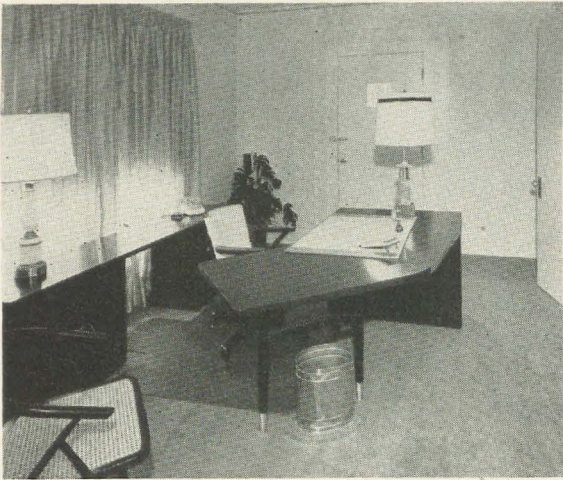
Situated on a corner lot in the north residential section of Indianapolis, the English manor style, three-story residence amid beautiful trees gives one the impression of a chapter house on a college campus. The lower story is of brick, while the upper stories are of cream stucco trimmed with brown stained timbers. Hedges of spirea and privet mark the lot boundaries, while a six-foot brick wall around the building gives a greater degree of privacy. Formerly the home of Congressman Charles Brownson, the building needed no structural changes to convert it to its present purpose.



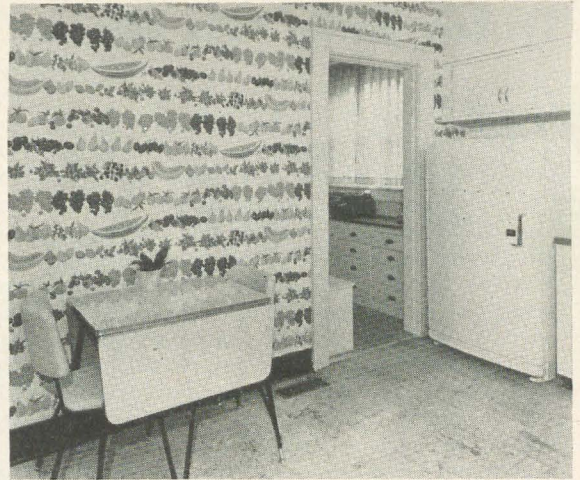
The impressive white and gold entry hall of the new headquarters. The conference-living room opens off to the right, while the general offices are at the left.

The gay informality of the wallpaper makes the kitchen a delightful spot for the luncheon break in the day's routine.

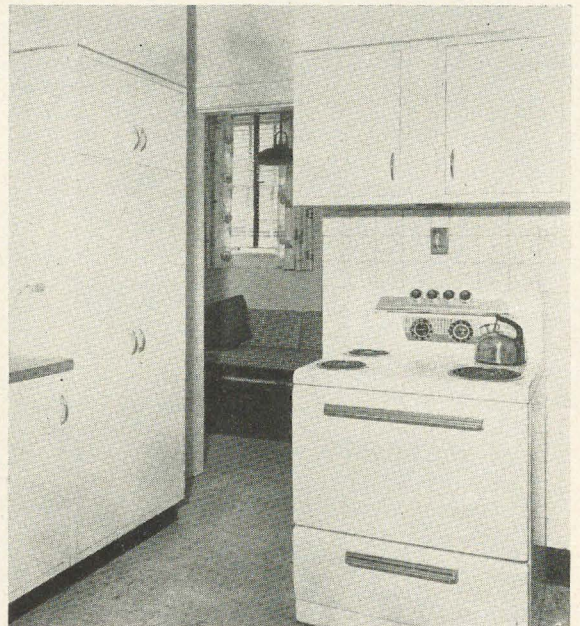
Introducing the general color scheme of the headquarters is the entrance hall with white tiled floor and gold-patterned white wallpaper. Repeating the motif overhead is a white and gold chandelier. Just inside the doorway has been placed Delta Zeta's Memory Book, its hand decorated pages adding to the richness of the entry. A marble and fruitwood table graces the wall beside the gold carpeted stairway.

Opening to the right of the entrance hall is the gracious combination living room and conference room with a fireplace above which is hung a large mirror. Moss green carpeting covers the floor. At the windows are gallooned draperies in gooseberry which complement the pineapple walls. A large walnut table with parquet top,

which can be opened out for conference use, is placed at the window end of the long room. A long sofa upholstered in gold and beige patterned linen bespeaks the room's air of gracious hospitality. At either side of the sofa are fruitwood end tables supporting matching brass lamps with black shades. On the wall above hangs a brass sunburst design clock. Three bittersweet occasional chairs add sparkle to the

color scheme. A modern note is given by the gold table lamp on a brass-trimmed glass table.

Built-in book shelves flank one side of the fireplace which has an antique brass trivet with a planter replacing the usual logs. Louis XIV andirons were converted to use as planters on the mantel.

The conference room opens onto the Executive Secretary's office which features a modern semicircular desk of ebony wood. Brass and china lamps and a white leather chair add to the comfort and efficiency of the office. A specially designed console piece combines file drawers, storage space and a typing table. It, too, is of ebony, matching the functional desk.

The general office for the staff is to the left of the entry. It now has white paneled walls with white and gold patterned paper above the dado. Ivory fiberglass curtains are at the windows, and gold carpeting on the floor. Here, at walnut desks, work the bookkeeper, stenographer and general clerk. Built-in storage cabinets fill a once blank wall beneath the windows. These cabinets were specially built and are most practical and useful. Four flush ceiling lights keep the room bright and furnish excellent light for the staff. All the equipment from the Circle Tower office has been utilized in the new location.

Behind the general office is a kitchen, gay with fruit patterned wallpaper, white cabinets and appliances. Here the staff may prepare and eat their lunches. The only purchases for the kitchen were a stove, refrigerator, table and



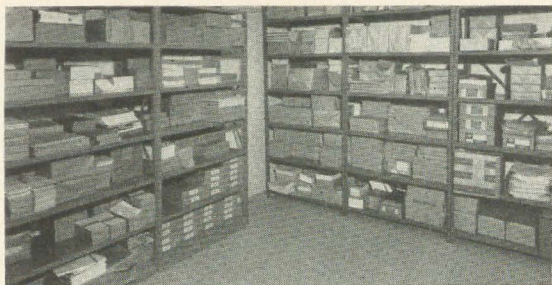
A corner of the membership records office in the basement, looking into the wrapping and mailing room.

chairs. From the kitchen can be seen the employees' room which features a black and white tweed upholstered lounge. Rich black and gold printed draperies and a red rug give the color note to the room which has a powder room adjoining.

Every inch of the basement has been utilized. In one room are the membership files, the addressograph and graphotype, files of addressograph plates, and the history record files. A second room houses the duplicator and mimeograph machines, along with wrapping and mailing sup-

plies. Two storage areas are available for supplies and the many reports and forms needed for Delta Zeta business. Also in the basement are the new oil heating and air conditioning unit, water heater, incinerator and storage for cleaning equipment. All the rooms have gay yellow walls and tile floors. An inter-com system has been installed between the first floor offices and the basement to facilitate business.

The second floor of the new headquarters, living room, two bedrooms, bath, kitchen and dining area, is being used as an apartment.

As yet nothing has been planned for the complete third floor of the building. It offers ample storage space for files, historical files and relics, and convention equipment. There is also a bedroom and bath which could be furnished for the use of official visitors.

A three-car garage at the rear of the house is easily accessible by a short driveway from Pennsylvania Street.

Greeting guests at the formal opening were Evelyn Adams Costello, national president; Violet Sharratt Whitfield, national secretary; and Irene C. Boughton, executive secretary.

Assisting hostesses were Marjorie Brown Overman, president of Indianapolis Alumnae; Jeanette Caudle Harding, national Memory Book chairman; Ruth Clausen Reasor, Indianapolis Panhellenic delegate; and Dorris Pike Silverthorn, director of Province IX. Dorothy Kretsch, president of Epsilon chapter (Indiana University) greeted guests at the door. Invitations to the formal opening were issued to representatives of national sororities and fraternities in Indianapolis and to all members of the Indianapolis Alumnae chapter.

The purchase of a national headquarters is a real milestone in the history of Delta Zeta. Going back in history, we find that in 1922 the first central office was established with a paid, full-time secretary in charge. In the fall of 1922 the central office was opened in Room 464, Johnson Building, Muncie, Indiana, with Grace Mason Lundy, E, as first executive secretary. In 1924 the office moved to Indianapolis where it remained for six years, first on Park Avenue and then in the Illinois Building.

In 1930 the office was moved to San Antonio, Texas, where it remained until 1934. In the summer of that year, Delta Zeta headquarters came back to the Middle West, being established in the Carew Tower in Cincinnati, Ohio. In 1940 the office returned to Indianapolis. There it remained in small quarters to which, in this period of 16 years, two small rooms were added. The additional space and ample working quarters of the new headquarters is indeed a forward step.

Indianapolis now houses the headquarters offices, in homes owned for this purpose, of Delta Tau Delta, Lambda Chi Alpha, Alpha Kappa Psi (commerce fraternity), and Sigma Kappa. The national office of Alpha Chi Omega is also located in the Hoosier capital.

- 7) In short, do we make the most of our opportunities to mature into superior citizens?

As Alumnae:

- 1) Do we exercise our great privilege of the franchise, thereby electing the best leaders?
- 2) Do we accept public office, even when it means personal sacrifice?

- 3) Do we study issues, so we can vote intelligently?
- 4) Do we participate willingly and enthusiastically in community affairs?
- 5) Do we take an active part in bettering our schools?
- 6) Do we work increasingly to improve our community and our nation—or do we only criticize?
- 7) Do we keep an ever-watchful guard against subversive activities?
- 8) Do we see that all our property is a real asset to our neighborhood?
- 9) Do we do all in our power to help young people—be they in our fraternity or outside?
- 10) Do we contribute to the higher spiritual tone of our community?
- 11) Do we actively support by our GIFTS such agencies as we feel improve the community and the world?
- 12) Do we give unselfish SERVICE to community betterment agencies?
- 13) Do we represent the United States well by our attitude and behavior when we travel abroad?
- 14) Do we at all times and in all ways show our gratitude that we have been fortunate enough to be citizens of the greatest democracy in the world?

These are just a few of the many criteria by which the outside world judges us as fraternity women. The artist who designed our beautiful Delta Zeta pin

IF I COULD rub our magic lamp, I would take every Delta Zeta to visit Arthur L. Bairnsfather in Birmingham, Alabama, the artist who designed our Delta Zeta pin.

Undoubtedly all of us could name a number of well known artists whose work we know, but possibly few of us could name this artist who has touched our lives so deeply because we, in common, wear a beautiful sorority pin which he designed.

A chain of interesting events led to my heart-warming meeting with Arthur Bairnsfather. My son Chuck, a Teke, a junior at the University of Illinois is majoring in Industrial Design. He is often pressed into service when Delta Zeta designs, posters and other public relations materials are being developed. Last year, he drew a large replica of our pin which I later reproduced in gold paper on the Panhellenic displays which are now available to our chapters from headquarters.

At that time my son said, "Mom, do you know anything about the artist who designed your pin? He must have been good because in reproducing the pin, every part must be in perfect proportion or it doesn't look right." We discussed the design of the pin at length, and also the apparent ability of the artist. I remembered hearing several years ago that a jewelers' convention had once judged our pin "The most artistic and most symbolic" of any Greek pin. Only an artist could have conceived a design so distinctive and individual. Filled with symbolism, it has a beauty truly its own.

So that experience touched off a chain of interesting contacts which finally led to my discovery of Mr. Bairnsfather. Alfa Lloyd Hayes knew him best and persuaded him to design the pin for Delta Zeta, first sorority on the Miami campus. A picture accompanying this article shows Alfa Lloyd (on the left) with Arthur Bairnsfather and another friend, Mayme Barger, as they attended a Street Fair in Oxford, Ohio.

Letters from Mrs. Hayes brought the information that Mr. Bairnsfather had left Miami at the end of his sophomore year at the University and had returned to the Cincinnati Academy of Art. All trace of him was lost at that time by Delta Zetas. A most helpful contributor to the search was Katherine Keating Denham, Ξ , president of the Cincinnati Alumnae chapter. After she reviewed my request, she looked in the Cincinnati

directory and found the Bairnsfathers' family listed there. They told Katherine that they felt sure that Arthur Bairnsfather was in Birmingham, Alabama. Katherine then made a trip to the public library where she found our artist's name in a Birmingham directory.

Her letter, with the address, reached me at the convention in Miami Beach. No more strategic time could have been planned, because it was possible for me to stop at Birmingham on my way home from the convention to arrange a personal interview with Mr. Bairnsfather.

After calling at 7:30 in the morning we were invited to come to their home at 1038 Sixteenth Avenue South at 8 o'clock that same morning. The Bairnsfathers live in a lovely two-story colonial home with a white-pillared porch. He had never seen us before and had no idea what our mission was, but he met us on the porch in a most hospitable manner. I lifted my pin on my dress and said, "Will this introduce us?" He laughed and said, "Sure, I knew all those girls who started your sorority!" He took us inside where we met his delightful wife Adelaide.

At that moment I wished that every Delta Zeta could have been there to share this memorable experience with me! It was my good fortune to renew our Delta Zeta friendship with this artist who had played such an important part in our history.

Appearing with this story is a reproduction of the various forms our pin has taken. Top left shows the original pin, and it is interesting to note how little the design has been changed. This would attest to its merit. The symbols which they

wished to incorporate in the pin were chosen by the six founders with the help of Dr. Guy Potter Benton, then president of the University, later national president of Phi Delta Theta, who assisted in writing our ritual and further advising the founders in selecting true Greek history as a basis for our sorority. Alfa then took the ideas to Arthur Bairnsfather, a young student on the campus who planned to be an artist, and he incorporated the ideas into several designs from which the six co-eds and their patron chose the design for the first Delta Zeta pin. The first pin was made by J. F. Newman, Jewelers.

After leaving Miami University, Mr. Bairnsfather went to the Cincinnati Academy of Art, then to New York for many years. While working in New York he met Adelaide who was a dancer. Throughout his years in New York, he did illustrations for *Saturday Evening Post*, *Harper's*, *McClure's*, *Red Book*, *Peoples Home Journal*, and many other well-known magazines published out of that city. Since moving to Birmingham, he has done industrials, murals, extensive work in portraiture, conducting some summer classes in painting, and was for a while affiliated with Birmingham Southern College.

Yes, Arthur Bairnsfather continued as an artist, and he is a superior craftsman today. We toured his home and enjoyed every beautiful painting on the walls. For many years he has specialized in portraiture, and the quality of the fine portraits we saw in his home cause me to wish that we could commission him now to paint the portraits of our living founders for our new headquarters. It would seem particularly significant that Alfa Lloyd Hayes would be one of the subjects.

As we talked, Adelaide was most helpful in remembering details of his career, and it was she who gave me the sketch of Mr. Bairnsfather for this story. This picture was done by William Oberhardt, an artist friend of Pelham, New York, who is well known as an illustrator and portrait artist for *Reader's Digest*, *Time* and other magazines. Before we left the Bairnsfathers, we took colored movies of them and of their home. The film will be added to the 50th anniversary, and convention scenes in New Orleans.

Portraiture has been the main direction of his endeavors.

The Bairnsfathers have two children. Robert is 26 and recently received his Masters' Degree from Massachusetts Institute of Technology in Electrical Engineering. Their daughter Ann is 22, is married and has a new daughter not quite one year old. She lives in Birmingham and conducts the Ann Lambert School of Ballet.

If I could "dream up" an artist for our pin, I could not have chosen a more colorful personality than Arthur Bairnsfather. He is over six feet tall, straight, and carries himself with dignity and great vigor. He has a shock of white hair and his sparkling eyes are alert and full of fun. He has a magnificent sense of humor and makes friends immediately.

As we concluded our interview I could not resist a final, controversial question. "Mr. Bairnsfather, what do you think of modern art?" His answer was immediate—"It lacks fundamentals!"

Princess Thiamoninet Present for Initiation Service

THE Richmond, Virginia, Alumnae Club of Delta Zeta was hostess on November 18, 1956, when the new chapter, Epsilon Tau, at Longwood College, initiated into Delta Zeta a number of alumnae members of Delta Sigma Epsilon.

This was a thrilling experience for both Delta Zeta and Delta Sigma Epsilon. Present for the initiation service was Princess Thiamoninet, 12th dynasty B.C. The princess was the first Egyptian mummy to be brought to the United States. It is quite likely that the impressive initiation service of Delta Zeta has been performed in many and varied atmospheres—but I daresay never before in a museum affiliated with a biology laboratory!

Visualize if you can a large room with each of its four walls lined with glass cases—each divided into many sections—and each containing an eye-catching exhibit. There were hundreds of stuffed birds, assorted owls staring at you with haunting eyes, an exquisite collection of butterflies, varied corals, arrowheads and other exhibits too numerous to include. But in the right hand corner of the museum lay the princess in all her glory, intently watching the proceedings of the Delta Zetas in 1956.

Not royally attired nor wrapped in fine linen bandages, Princess Thiamoninet nevertheless has a certain appeal. Her lips are virtually worn away and according to the story at the University of Richmond, this damage was done by pre-dental students that were required to kiss the princess good night when reporting on campus after curfew. The princess has had many visitors since taking up residence at the University. The maid of one of the professors frequently took

the children to the museum for an "outing"—after one of these visits the maid inquired of her mistress: "Mrs. Ryland, what kin is that thing in the museum to you'all? The chilluns all call it 'mummy'."

Through arrangements made by the Prince of Wales, the princess made her "debut" at the Centennial Exposition in Philadelphia in 1876. Following the Exposition the princess was presented by Dr. J. L. M. Curry to the University of Richmond. Dr. Jabez Lamar Monroe Curry (1825-1903) was professor of English and Public Law at Richmond College from 1868-1881. Dr. Curry established state normal schools and fostered better rural schools throughout the South. A native son of Georgia, he was a real benefactor to education in the South.

Following the initiation service the collegiate members from Longwood College and the new alumnae initiates were guests of the Richmond Alumnae Club at the home of Dr. and Mrs. Robert F. Smart, Liriobrook, Richmond. Those assisting Mrs. Smart (Eleanor Ferguson) included Mary Frances Weigel Blakeslee, Virginia State Chairman; Denyse Collette, president; Betty Brown Perham, Martha Smith McKee, Clara Eberly Sharpe, Mamie Stanley Lawrence, Grace Bunker Hutton and Anne Monroe Wintzer.

The Longwood chapter was presented with a large wooden ΔZ , handsomely made by Mr. Arthur Blakeslee, husband of our State Chairman. Another highlight of the evening was the announcement that Nancy Striplin and Margaret Beavers of Longwood were recently selected for inclusion in *Who's Who in American Universities and Colleges*.

"Those Delta Zetas, 'Plain and Fancy'"

HOUSTON alumnae sponsored a successful benefit performance of "Plain and Fancy" at Theatre Inc., in December. Not the least factor in their success was the publicity they received on their project. A feature article by Morris Frank appeared in the *Houston Chronicle* of December 18, 1956.

"Those Delta Zetas.

"And 'Plain and Fancy.'

"Now, that's not right, is it? Because the Delta Zetas, as I remember, may be fancy but they sure are not plain.

"Indeed, I recall the couple of hours or was it a half a day that I spent in college was mostly spent enthusing over the pretty sorority girls.

"Naturally, sororities, like book learning, were pretty well all Greek to me. However, when I would ask some of those big wheels . . . or whatever they called those poised racoon-coated college boys . . . who a pretty chick was, like as not he'd say: 'Why, she's a Delta Zeta.'

"Indeed, I think the nearest I came to crashing the big leagues socially in college was one night . . . being with a group of guys serenading the Delta Zeta Sorority House.

"But now the Delta Zeta's project is 'Plain and Fancy.' I still say those Deltas are not plain. Maybe I better quit saying it because there's always that danger of the war department seeing this column, may mix up holiday dressing on this page, you know.

"However, 'Plain and Fancy' in this instance is the play at the Theatre Inc. The Delta Zeta Alumnae is sponsoring the sale of tickets. . . . And it's for a grand cause, too.

"I appreciate a letter from Mrs. Alex S. Cox, Jr., president of the Delta Zeta Houston Alumnae regarding the work of the group.

"The Delta Zeta national philanthropy, Mrs. Cox explains, is to work with the deaf. The sorority has on a national level furnished the new library at Gallaudet College in Washington, D.C., a college for the deaf, with furniture, books, etc.

"The immediate goal locally of the sorority, Mrs. Cox points out, is to help supply the need of more trained teachers here to work with the little deaf children.

"The Delta Zeta Sorority is therefore sponsoring the sale of tickets . . . to raise money to set up a scholarship in the name of Delta Zeta Sorority at the University of Houston to help train a new teacher to do this highly specialized teaching in the Houston schools.

"It will be a scholarship in audiology.

"Mrs. Benton F. Hill is ticket chairman for

Pies Are a Blooming Success

LOOKING for something new in the way of refreshments for a special party or tea? Try this "flowery" idea of Shirley Ross of the Louisville alumnae. The picture of Mrs. Ross and accompanying article by Cissy Gregg appeared in the Louisville *Courier-Journal* last August, but her suggestions are good for any blooming season.

"Have you ever opened up the door to a refrigerator and found a flower garden in bloom? Well, that could happen to you most any time if you took a peek into the refrigerator of Mrs. Robert P. Ross.

"Quite by accident Mrs. Ross hit upon decorating parfait pies with real flowers. She found herself one day on the refreshment committee of her sorority, Delta Zeta.

"Mrs. Ross didn't have an idea in her head at

that moment about what to serve. Tea refreshments do not need to be so filling, but they do have to be pretty and unusual, if possible.

"As Mrs. Ross pondered her problem she looked out her kitchen window. There flowers were blooming in her garden. There bloomed a solution. What could be prettier than real flowers to top off parfait pies?

"Parfait pies, you know, are a combination of fruit-flavored gelatin and ice cream (folded in). Mrs. Ross lets the flavors of her pies guide her decorative color schemes with flowers.

"Then she proceeds like this:

"She washes the flowers thoroughly, wraps them in wax paper and puts them in the refrigerator to chill. Mrs. Ross works out her ideas ahead of time, but when the recipe involves whipped cream, the flower-decorating comes at the last moment before serving.

"When she's made several of the pies, Mrs. Ross likes to display them on a side table to her guests before cutting into them. 'It's a real bouquet when there are seven or eight of them together.'

"Here's a recipe we have used for strawberry parfait pie.

"Make crust and line pie pan. The crust is baked and then cooled.

"For the parfait filling use $1\frac{1}{4}$ cups water, a package of lemon flavored gelatin, a pint of vanilla ice cream, and $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups sliced fresh strawberries.

"The water is heated to boiling and the fruit-flavored gelatin dissolved in it. Then the ice cream is added to the hot liquid and you stir until the ice cream is melted. Allow to set for 15 to 20 minutes. Fold in the fresh fruit, and pour into the baked cooled pastry shell. In the wink of an eye the mixture is set (or in 20 to 25 minutes).

"Here are some of the ideas she has used:

"For a Hawaiian touch, lime-gelatin base with pineapple trim, and small Vanda orchids as the flower trim.

"Orange gelatin, vanilla ice cream, coconut—about a cup—and deep orange zinnias.

"Cherry or raspberry gelatin, vanilla ice cream, trimmed with red and white roses.

"Lemon gelatin, vanilla or lemon ice cream, toasted coconut, a fragile pinkish-yellow hibiscus and variegated coleus leaves.

"With only a small amount of imagination you can take it from there."

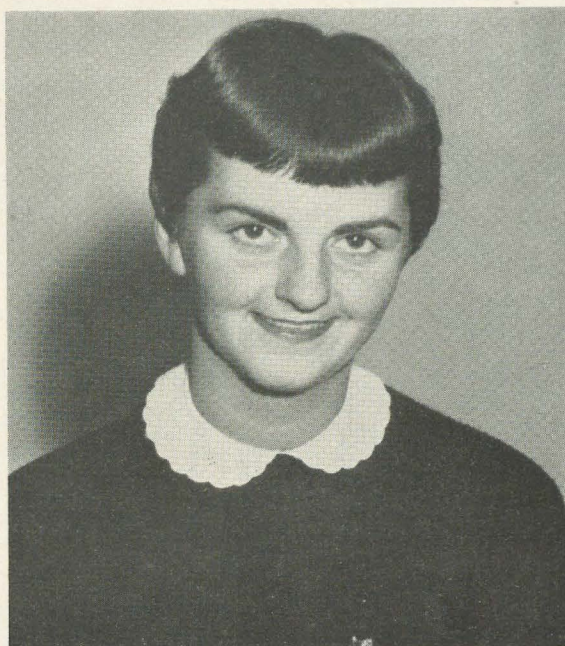
June "Serves" With the Best

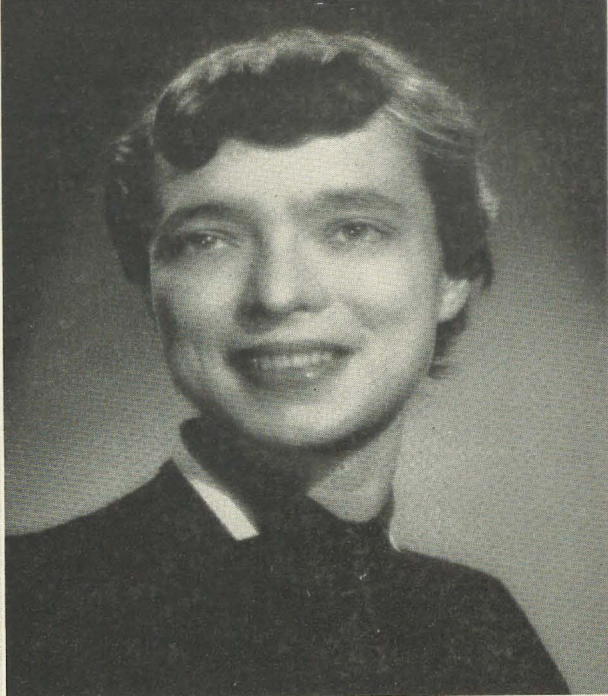

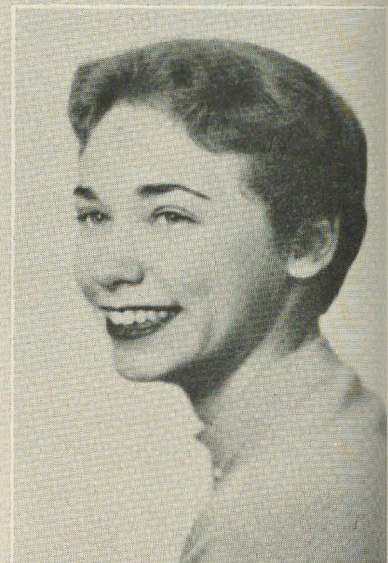

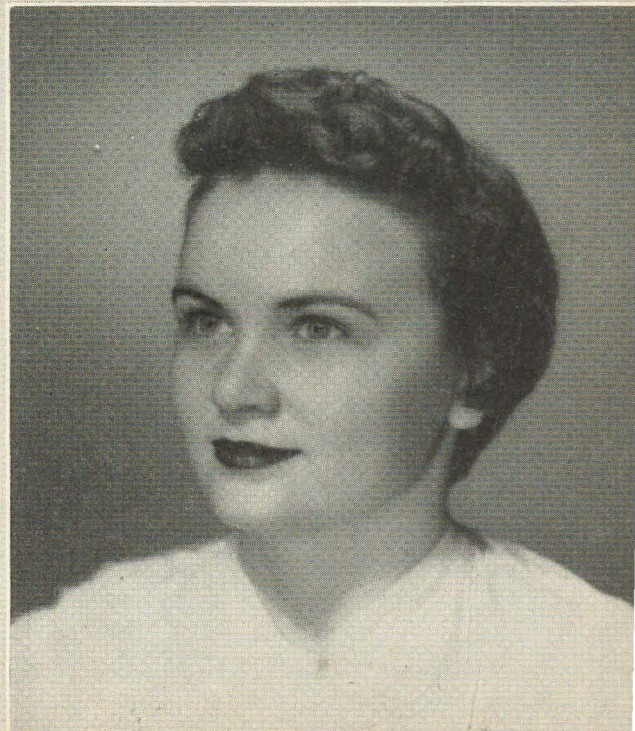

Delta Zetas Do It in French

FULGA PASCU and Ruth Geib, two Gamma Alpha chapter members at Baldwin-Wallace College, alternated in the lead role of Edmund Rostand's immortal "Cyrano de Bergerac" this January when Sigma Lambda Alpha, local French honorary, produced the romantic drama.

Done entirely in French and directed by Dr. William Pendell, head of the college French department, the production marked the first time Cyrano has been staged in-the-round in the United States.

Playing the role of Roxanne, a sweet belle of the French aristocracy of the 17th century, it was the first acting experience either of the Delta Zetas had encountered in high school and college.

Miss Pascu, a Romanian immigrant, lent an international flavor to the production which was dedicated to International Theater Month. Her story is an inspiration to all Americans.

Her father, a Baptist minister, traveled to America in 1938 to attend the Baptist World Alliance Congress in Atlantic City. His return to his native land was prevented by Hitler's invasion of Poland.

Immediately, he made plans to bring Fulga, her mother and her brother to this country. He accepted the pastorate of the Romanian Baptist Church in Cleveland; this allowed him to bring his family here under a non-quota status.

However, the immigration of Fulga and her family was stopped by Mussolini's sudden entry into the war. It wasn't until March, 1941, that the family sailed past the Statue of Liberty and entered New York harbor.

Fulga's father celebrated his 15th anniversary as pastor of the Cleveland church last year. During those years he has helped literally hundreds of displaced persons settle in Cleveland.

Fulga has two grandmothers, two aunts and an uncle still in Rumania, now behind the iron curtain of Soviet oppression. Communication is seldom received from these relatives, but Fulga does know that one grandmother is prevented from coming to the United States because she refuses to surrender her small farm to the communist state.

Reverend Pascu traveled to Europe last year and managed to phone his family from Belgrade, Yugoslavia. But he is a man marked by the communists and he did not dare journey behind the iron curtain.



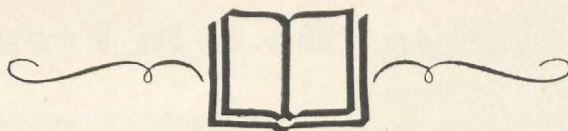

Fulga's name is taken from a Romanian epic by Vasile Alaxandri and translated into English means Snowflake. In the epic the heroine, Fulga, rides a white wonder horse down from the clouds and rescues her uncle from the pagan hordes that had invaded the holy Romanian land.

At Baldwin-Wallace Fulga is a member of Sigma Lambda Alpha and the Bach chorus. During high school she was a member of National Honor Society and Student Council.

Miss Geib is a junior from Akron and vice-president of Gamma Alpha Chapter. She is also Sigma Lambda Alpha veep and business manager of the college yearbook. In high school she was editor of her yearbook and on Student Council. She previously attended McGill University.

Do you know WHY your recommendation is of more importance than ever before?

As you have read, college enrollments are expanding rapidly, which means that the number of freshman women interested in sorority membership will be larger each year. This, in turn means:

Longer rush lists—which make it necessary to limit the number of rushees invited to parties of each sorority. The chapters must depend almost entirely upon recommendations to expedite preparation of invitation lists.

Larger rush parties—with the result that it is impossible for the entire chapter to know each rushee individually. The already overburdened registrar's office can, in many cases, no longer supply sufficient supplementary information. Therefore, intelligent selection of members will depend on thorough, accurate information from the recommendation forms.

As sorority women we welcome the challenge of expanding university enrollment and the opportunity to share sorority membership with a wider circle of friends. Membership is the life-line of sorority. The strength and length of DELTA ZETA'S life-line depends on YOU!

RECOMMENDATION GUIDE

ALUMNAE

1. Use recommendations forms from this handbook. Secure additional forms from State Chairman or National Headquarters.
2. Send voluntary recommendations to rush chairmen as soon as possible. Pre-school rush is the rule on many campuses.
3. Reply promptly to chapter requests for recommendations. Notify the chapter if you are unable to supply a recommendation.

COLLEGE CHAPTERS

Every girl invited to membership in Delta Zeta MUST have a recommendation signed by an alumnae member. Every girl residing in a town where there is an alumnae chapter of Delta Zeta must be approved by that alumnae chapter.

The Rush Chairman or Rush Adviser should contact directly:

1. The alumnae chapter of the area from which a recommendation is desired.
2. The State Chairman for information from a locality where no regular alumnae chapter exists.
3. The National Recommendations Chairman for special assistance.

NOTICE:

Advise of maximum time allowed for response to recommendation request.

Requests for recommendations will not be acknowledged unless accompanied by complete information as to name and address of rushee, name of parent and previous school attended.

Allow time for recommendations to be correctly processed. Last minute emergencies are costly and often times inconsiderate.
