



A chapter installation is indeed a happy occasion. It is a tremendous thrill to greet these new, enthusiastic Delta Zetas. The University of Rochester, the University of Virginia and Trenton State are bright new additions to our chapter roll.

Delta Zeta has always pioneered in extension. It is part of her heritage and tradition. From the Founders to the present day there has been a commitment to extending the scope of Delta Zeta.

At the present time, many national sororities have ambitious extension programs. The latest figures show that from June, 1975 to June, 1977 a total of 95 new chapters were added by all National Panhellenic Conference sororities. That number is evidence of the continuing interest in expansion.

Many campus situations today make extension very attractive. Some that have not had NPC sororities are now open to them. Some of these are new campuses, others are schools where women have been newly admitted, and still others are simply places where administrations have recognized the contribution these groups can make.

Fraternities are well over one hundred years old at the Universities of Rochester and Virginia. The administration of the University of Rochester realized the interest and importance of such groups for women, and Delta Zeta became the first sorority at this fine school. The sorority movement has taken hold quickly at the University of Virginia and Delta Zeta takes its place among a number of other chapters established there. The strong belief of the administration and staff of Trenton State in the sorority system was a major factor in the acceptance of Delta Zeta on that

In considering places for new chapters, many factors are examined. These include geographic location, proximity to other chapters, alumnae support, the number of groups already established, administrative encouragement, and housing needs. On some campuses, Delta Zeta representatives start the colonization process. At others, already established groups petition to become Delta Zeta chapters. Many potential extension opportunities are brought to our attention through the efforts of our alumnae and collegiate members. A Delta Zeta transfer from Virginia Polytechnic Institute was instrumental in the formation of the chapter at the University of Virginia, and a Delta Zeta faculty member directed the local group at Rochester to us. The Trenton State chapter, where we pioneered, was a local sorority contacted by Delta Zeta.

Each new group is most carefully selected. Whether Delta Zeta is to be the first sorority on a campus or taking its place among those already established, no colony is now installed until it is competitive with others in size and quality. This assures each chapter of the vitality and strength with which to grow and such ceed. Each of the three new chapters introduced in this Lamp was installed with well over fifty members.

Just as working with our older chapters is a special kind of endeavor, so is extension. It takes specialized people in both areas, and Delta Zeta is fortunate to have both. We are ever mindful of the needs of the established chapters and are strong in our commitment to serve them. As our pledges are the life blood of every chapter, so new chapters are necessary for continued strength. To be a strong, vital sorority Delta Zeta needs both the old and the new.

Delta Zeta extension is directed by Betty Agler who has a remarkable record for success in this area. She works closely with our Field Representatives and National Consultants to give them the specialized training for Extension assignments. With the Council reaffirming our long tradition of continued expansion, and aware of the need for excellence in this program, Delta Zetas can look forward to the addition of other fine, carefully selected chapters.





That same day Doris was honored at the Kentucky Association of Women Deans and Counselors and was their speaker. She received a citation and arrived home just thirty minutes before she was due at the initiation. It was a big day for Beta Gamma's long time rushee, and for Louisville alumnae.

# Lambda Iota Chapter Installed at By Cathy Lieurance, National Field Representative University of Rochester

The University of Rochester, where fraternities are well over 100 years old, was originally an all male school. Later, when women were admitted, it was thought that sororities were prohibited based on a rumor that a trustee had donated money with this stipulation.

In the fall of 1976, Melissa Townsend, current President of Lambda Iota chapter, found the rumor to be false, and she began the process of forming a national sorority at Rochester. She gathered sixteen of her friends to help her in the selection. After interviewing several sororities, Jane Sullivan Gibbons, one of the founders of Iota Rho chapter, West Chester State College, and currently Director of Women's Intercollegiate Sports at Rochester, suggested contacting Delta Zeta.

It was then that Cathy Lieurance, National Field Representative, came to talk with the group. While meeting with this group, many winks were exchanged and Cathy was asked to leave the room during discussion. In Cathy's absence, the group then voted Delta Zeta as their choice.

On a return visit, Cathy pledged the seventeen girls, the charter members of Lambda Iota. The new chapter then began rushing and doubled their size within two weeks! With officers elected, they began their pledge program and on April 20, 1977, the girls were initiated, and the chapter was formally installed by Betty Heusch Agler, Past National President. The initiating team was from Iota Theta chapter at Mansfield State College in Pennsylvania. Following the initiation, a reception was given by the Rochester Alumnae.


With only two weeks of school remaining, plans were set for the Formal Installation Banquet to be held in October. This past September, the chapter held a successful fall rush, pledging 24 new members. Delta Zeta is still the only national sorority at Rochester, yet it is the largest Greek chapter with its membership of 55 topping even the fraternities!

Lambda Iota Chapter not only has the most members, but it is also made up of many campus leaders and has been accepted into the Inter-Fraternity Council on campus. The fraternities have been very receptive to the Delta Zetas and have been most anxious to have various functions with them.





## University of Virginia Welcomes Delta Zeta

"Lambda means whip" signifies the drive of a force that initiated a handful of dedicated women to form our new chapter. "Delta means door," a door that has opened into the new and challenging existence of Lambda Delta chapter of Delta Zeta at the University of Virginia, and doors that the sixty new members will proudly open in the future. Janet Kerr, the new chapter's College Chapter Director, offered these words at the formal banquet that followed installation. But, before giving details of the beautiful installation, a tale of the rise of this chapter is in hand—for it is a tale indeed!

It was November 10, 1976, and two junior transfer students, Carol Barringer and Sharon Lamb decided they missed the friendship and fun they had in Kappa Theta chapter at Virginia Polytechnic Institute in Blacksburg, Virginia. They wanted to begin a new Delta Zeta chapter at the University of Virginia, and so they met with a graduate student, Janet Kerr, an alumna from VPI. With sixteen other interested women, and with the help and hospitality of alumnae, the group worked out a rush strategy. Most had just met each other, but each had a feeling that, together, they could accomplish something no other sorority had ever done. As a local sorority, they competed in formal rush with six campus-established sororities and proudly accepted thirty new pledges. Now they were 48 members strong.


According to campus regulations at the University of Virginia, each new sorority was required to function as a local for a one-year probationary period, receiving no assistance from a national organization. Our group proudly assumed the name "Zeta Delta." "On to new and better pursuits" they all agreed. Zeta Delta began to make a name

for itself on Mr. Jefferson's campus. A retreat was held so the group could get to know each other and begin to work with each other. A potluck dinner was held for the pledges and initiated members. A spring formal was held, and they were invited to several fraternity functions. Zeta Delta even won the intramural softball championship. The other sororities knew they were in business.

The chapter played hard, but also worked hard. They raised money for philanthropy by winning the Sigma Chi Derby Chase on Derby Day, and the pledges sold donuts in the dorms. In addition, work was done for the Charlottes-ville Housing Improvement Program helping to reroof, repaint and replaster dilapidated houses for the poor. After a busy semester, Informal Rush was upon them again and twenty more fine pledges were added to the membership roll

The long anticipated date of November 10, 1977, finally arrived. Now came the time for national installation. No one could comprehend the true sisterhood that was in store for Zeta Delta. Linda Mans, National Field Representative, explained the faith that National Council felt by accepting this group as a new chapter of Delta Zeta. A spirit of pride and privilege prevailed as the group was prepared for Initiation.

Lamplighting began on Tuesday, November 8. All the sisters joined in a friendship circle with the lights out. This Lamplighting ceremony helped all members to realize how much the past year had meant and how tight the circle of friendship had grown. Later that evening, Linda Mans, as always, working behind the scenes, gave the chapter another briefing on what was about to happen. Thursday

night formal pledging to Delta Zeta took place at the Westminster Presbyterian Church. After the ceremony, the new Delta Zeta pledges changed from their white gowns to paint the Beta Bridge. The bridge is in the middle of fraternity row and the ideal place to advertise the Installation! It boasted "ZETA DELTA goes DELTA ZETA" in a bright rose and green. Friday, November 11, each girl wore her pledge pin to class for the first and last time.

Friday evening all the pledges met at St. Paul's Episcopal Church for the long awaited Initiation. For the first time, the entire chapter met the attending National Council members of Delta Zeta. With fine tradition and ritual, the initiating team from Kappa Theta at Virginia Polytechnic Institute, presented the Golden Lamp of Delta Zeta to each of the sixty-two new sisters. Janet Kerr, CCD, Carol Barringer, President, and Sharon Lamb, Vice President Pledge Training, already initiated members of Delta Zeta, signed the charter as founding members of the chapter.

On Saturday, a formal reception was held at the Student Center where all had an opportunity to meet the families of the new chapter and other members of the faculty and administration.



Education Building overlooking one of the lakes in the campus setting of Trenton State College.






Aerial view of Trenton State College campus.



The 1977 meeting of the National Panhellenic Conference in Tulsa, Oklahoma, held special significance for Delta Zeta since our Gwen Moss McKeeman as chairman planned and then presided at the meetings.

The Tulsa alumnae chapter assisted with the opening reception honoring the Panhellenic officers, which was held in the Executive suite.

Throughout the four day session, Oklahoma Delta Zetas from the collegiate and alumnae chapters were there to honor and lend moral support to the Delta Zeta delegates. Helen Baird Danne, AE, as Delta Zeta's Tulsa panhellenic delegate, was in charge of the luncheon and style show featuring fashions based on authentic Indian designs.

The biennial meeting of the National Panhellenic Conference in Tulsa last October reflected a spirit of confidence and a feeling of well-being that comes from knowing that the Greek system is again flourishing and returning to a position of importance on the American college campus.

NPC Chairman, Gwen McKeeman's description of a typical day in her life in which the number of telephone calls becomes the medium of measuring an ever increasing interest in fraternities and sororities sounded a familiar note to all Panhellenic women working on a national level. Inquiries mean interest, and callers range all the way from a Panhellenic president requesting an interpretation of Quota-Total, to a college administrator seeking information about expanding the Greek system on his campus, and a newspaper reporter interested in writing an article on the rise in sorority membership.

So once again Greeks are being cultivated as a news source, perhaps as a reflection of a new student profile and certainly with curiosity about how they made a comeback. Outsiders credit "change" within the system, overlooking the broader impact of continuing values and standards.

Like the stock market, statistics are the indicators of the health of the system. For the fourth consecutive year, women's fraternities showed a continued upward trend in membership. Whereas the 1973-1975 biennium showed a 9.6% gain over the two previous years, the 1977 report indicates approximately a 9.5% increase over the last biennium. New members during the 1975-1977 biennium total 100,228, an increase of 5,212 new members over the last accounting period.

It should be noted that the new colony group total is 42, compared to 37 two years ago, which brings us closer to the all-time high of 1967-69. Lost chapters are being replaced and the gain now outweighs the loss with 95 new chapters reported this biennium,

compared to 7 two years ago.

As encouraging as the statistics are, NPC is not a group to become complacent with success. Mrs. McKeeman expressed a concern that area advisers are acutely aware of, the problem of too many women dropping out of rush. Rush registration has indeed increased. The number of girls pledged is ever climbing, but the size of the group that registers for rush and then drops out before pledging is a statistic which calls for a plan of action. Thorough orientation of rushees, a realistic rush schedule, and a sound system of counseling rushees are the key factors in reducing the dropout rate. A new booklet, "Rush Counseling . . . a Positive Program," has joined the NPC line of publications and is available to all college Panhellenics.

A positive, national publicity program will be undertaken as a joint effort of the National Panhellenic Conference and the National Panhellenic Editors' Conference as a result of a resolution sponsored by the Editors' Conference and passed by the NPC delegates. This publicity project of the 75th anniversary program will focus on philanthropies, scholarships, loans and grants of member groups.

A strong stand was taken on the matter of Alcohol Abuse, encouraging the sponsorship of education programs to emphasize the dangers involved in alcohol abuse.

Another resolution supporting the previous recommendation by NPC to college Panhellenics that the use of alcoholic beverages during rush be prohibited, was backed up by a decision to again mail to all college Panhellenics, a reprint of the resolution sent out in 1975.

Awards for outstanding achievement went to the following college Panhellenics: NPC Award . . . first place, Louisiana State University; second, Iowa State University; third, Auburn University. The Fraternity Month Award was given to the University of Missouri with Oregon

State University taking second and the University of Washington in third place.

Over fifty Delta Zetas were present at the final banquet with Gwen Mc-Keeman as toastmistress.

Peter Greiner, President of the National Interfraternity Conference and a member of Beta Theta Pi, was the speaker with his title "Mother of Women."

The National Panhellenic Editors meetings ran concurrently with the delegate meetings. Editors heard talks on page make-up, photographs, costs, and other techniques to make the sorority magazines more interesting and economical. Discussions were held on general policies and many ideas exchanged.

Collegiate members of Alpha Epsilon chapter at Oklahoma State entertained at the Brass Tacks dinner with a medley of college songs, accompanied by their College Chapter Director, Laurel Dieken.

Elections were held at the closing session with *Lamp* Editor Florence Miner voted as Vice Chairman of the Editors Conference.

# CITIZENS fo

Norma McIntyre,  $\Theta$ , addressograph supervisor at Delta Zeta National Headquarters, is devoting most of her free time these days to an organization called Citizens for Humane Action (CHA). A non-profit humane society staffed entirely by volunteers, CHA has since 1975 been serving the Columbus, Ohio area as an alternative to services employed by the city.

This has been a needed function, as shown this past year by the conviction for cruelty to animals of the two ranking administrators of the city-supported group. Macabre tales of cruelty arising from the trial shook the community, bringing a new awareness of animal problems, and new recognition for CHA and other truly humane organizations.

Norma, long concerned with animal welfare, has worked harder than ever for Citizens for Humane Action during recent months because of the critical situation exposed by the trial. When local residents learned what had been happening to homeless animals, they were sickened, and looked elsewhere for shelter for unwanted strays.

"This has put a burden on us," says Norma, "because for us, to shelter animals means to take them into our homes. CHA does not have an animal shelter as such. We have a foster home system instead, with members taking care of one or several animals, depending on their situations. We hope that our hard work (Norma is one of the most active members in organizing fund-raising projects) will enable us to build a shelter someday."

Columbus residents wish CHA had that shelter right now. Testimony from the trial of the two humane society administrators confirmed their worst fears—injured animals were often neglected for long periods; animals were kept in crowded, filthy cages; and the so-called "euthanasia" ("good death") procedure, by which the vast majority of the animals met their deaths, was in fact a horror-filled end to life.

"Only the most cynical person could have imagined what was happening there. The equipment was faulty. They didn't bother to fix it."

Information regarding the malfunctioning equipment and the suffering of its victims profoundly disturbed and saddened CHA members. "It is ironic," says Norma, "what happens to a person who becomes involved in humane work. An animal lover is forced to face facts that hurt—facts that, for one's own peace of mind, she would rather not know. But it is only when those of us who *are* affected by animal suffering expose ourselves to it that we can be sure something is done about it."

The organization through which Norma chooses to work, Citizens for Humane Action, is an organization of people of all ages and diverse backgrounds. They are united

in a program with one central purpose: to prevent suffering. To accomplish its purpose, CHA employs the efforts of its members and friends to operate a pet placement service, to investigate cruelty-and-neglect complaints, to educate the public, and to promote responsibility in pet ownership.

The CHA pet placement service is one that members would like to see copied by all agencies that place animals. Since 13.5 million dogs and cats are killed yearly by euthanasia, CHA does not wish to exacerbate the animal overpopulation problem. Therefore all animals placed by CHA are neutered before adoption or, in the cases of very young animals, neutering fees are paid at the time of adoption and the animals are brought in for neutering at the appropriate time. Since CHA wants to ensure all of its animals an acceptable quality of life after adoption, applicants are screened to assure that they understand and can meet the responsibilities of pet ownership, and to weed out applicants who are obtaining animals under false pretenses for profit (dog dealers sell animals to guard dog companies, laboratories, and for illegal dog fighting contests). The organization follows up all adoptions with a call or visit to see if the animal and owner have made a satisfactory adjustment. At any time an owner may return an animal to CHA, and is in fact required at the time of adoption to sign an agreement to do so in the event the owner ever wishes to get rid of the animal. Citizens for Humane Action prides itself on never relinquishing responsibility for any animal that comes under its protection.

Cruelty and neglect complaints are always immediately investigated by CHA, whose investigators must be prepared to deal with the most pathetic animal suffering as well as aggressive and hostile owners. The organization has succeeded in obtaining city- and county-wide police recognition and cooperation in enforcing anti-cruelty laws. Although CHA recognizes that cruelty or neglect sometimes occurs because of ignorance, it seeks prosecution whenever there are instances of wanton abuse. The group is also supportive of laws for the control of pets, since these laws work for the protection of the animals as well as the community. CHA seeks stronger legislation in all areas for dealing with cruelty or misuse of animals.

Animal care education is also available from Citizens for Humane Action. Representatives have appeared in elementary schools, teaching basic care and handling, and before senior citizens' groups, dealing with the problems of the elderly in caring for companion animals. CHA also endeavors to educate the public in its everyday contacts, stressing the fact that only animal birth control can end the most persistent source of animal suffering, overpopulation. This problem is so overwhelming that five of every six animals taken to local pounds are euthanized. The faith of

those who surrender pets that their cute and loveable animals will be adopted is ill-founded. The best they can reasonably hope for is a quick death—and even that is not guaranteed. Many of the common euthanasia methods often result in painful and protracted dying. Citizens for Humane Action recognizes only injection of sodium pentothal as humane euthanasia.

The ugly facts of life that greet someone who becomes involved in humane animal work have disturbed and depressed Norma McIntyre, but instead of being discouraged, she is more determined than ever to continue her work. She says the only thing that really discourages her sometimes is the attitude of others towards her efforts.

"Many times," says Norma, "people accuse me of not caring about people because I do so much work for animals. The fact is that I do care for people, as do most humane workers. But the animals are in trouble too, and there is so much to do and so few of us to do it."

Norma, like other humane workers, feels overwhelmed with her task.

"I wish the government would help, but there are no agencies for dealing with these problems. I would be pleased if some of my tax dollars went for this purpose. Some government agencies use dogs and cats, but there is no agency to help them. With the animal overpopulation problem continuing unabated, the suffering of the unwanted will be with us for a long time."

In the meantime, it is people like Norma McIntyre and the Citizens for Humane Action who will do all they can to help the animals.

"We've got to," says Norma of her unenviable task.
"We're the only hope they have."





Buttons are one point each if they are not the same color as the garment.


Count one point each for bows, ruffles, contrasting belts, etc. Add one point if you have red hair.
