Dear Lampwriter:

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Today I received a care package from my husband. He had enclosed the current copy of *The LAMP*. I am sure I am the only one in Saudi Arabia with a copy of this magazine. I thought this might be a good opportunity to write and let other Delta Zetas know first hand about the Mideast Crisis.

I am sure I'm not the only Delta Zeta Army officer. I have run into numerous other officers who are in sororities. My tent mate, CPT Cary Gum, is a Gamma Phi Beta. Currently, we are set up in the middle of the desert living in tents. We sleep on cots with a sleeping bag for a mattress. We have all the comforts of home which include "portable" bathrooms and a mobile kitchen. While our mobile kitchen hardly prepares gourmet meals, we usually get a hot breakfast and dinner. The lunch meal consists of prepackaged, partially dehydrated meals called MREs (meals ready to eat). Most soldiers will tell you the acronym stands for meals rejected by everyone; however, they do come in a variety of types and taste similiar to most canned food.

The typical day begins around 0530 hrs. The mornings are a cool 65 degrees. However, by mid afternoon, the temperatures are in the high 90s. Since my unit is responsible for all the supply and services provided to a mechanized infantry brigade, most of our soldiers are busy working supply warehouses which store everything from food to repair parts. In addition, all soldiers are busy training in weapons qualification, first aid, chemical warfare defense and various other survivability tasks. While no one wants to see war, the level of readiness is highly maintained.

My specific job consists of local purchases for the government. Any items which are not readily


available through the supply system, I have authorization to purchase on the local economy. The government issues me funds which I use to buy various items. My job interacts with numerous people and businesses in the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia. While most businesses were not used to dealing with women, the reception I received at most has been hospitable. As an American soldier, I am not required to wear the black overgarment. I wear civilian clothes, usually jeans and a blouse, and purchase items such as building supplies, comfort items, medicine, copy machines and various other items. While women are not permitted to drive in the Kingdom, I have authorization because I am in the service. This, however, does not stop the local authorities from occasionally stopping me. Once I show my i.d. card, the local police understand and I am permitted to continue.

Currently, no one knows how long we will be deployed in the Mideast. All of us miss our family and friends very much. We have set up recreation areas with TVs and VCRs, however, they are hardly the comforts of home. Magazines and video tapes are censored here so most of what we receive is from family members' mail to the soldiers. We have made volleyball nets out of camouflage netting and some soldiers have even built a basketball hoop out of a garbage can.

Hopefully, this has provided a brief overview of a life in the desert.

I am a graduate of Baldwin-Wallace College, 1986 Gamma Alpha chapter. My maiden name was Lisa Latessa.

There are no castles, cathedrals or cottages in Delta Zeta's building plans but the sorority is currently involved in the most ambitious, hands-on housing program in its history. Adjustments in campus housing programs, reestablishment of lost chapters, new chapters, changes in local building codes and risk management make the sorority's involvement of great importance. Building new houses, renovating existing ones and determining that each Delta Zeta house is safe and secure are conditions calling for the national organization's involvement. All are being addressed by sorority resources and a network of financial, professional and volunteer personnel.

Professional resources for the housing program include Squire, Sanders and Dempsey (legal), Corbin-Gillespie (insurance), Coopers and Lybrand (management), Group 4 (architects), the National Headquarters administrator and comptroller. Added to these are the National Housing Director and a complement of dedicated and competent Regional Housing Chairmen.

TRADITION

Housing needs for Delta Zeta chapters vary widely from campus to campus and depend largely on the accepted norm for any specific college community. If all groups have a room in a dormitory as their central location, Delta Zeta's needs are met by having the same; if all have houses, Delta Zeta must have one as well. Whether it be a classroom, a suite, a Panhellenic building or a large chapter house, each Delta Zeta chapter must have a like facility to be competitive and successful.

Often housing is determined by established tradition. Alpha chapter at Miami University and all sororities at that institution occupy suites in college dormitories — a long-established tradition. When Delta Zeta reestablished Gamma Delta chapter at Penn State three years ago, she took her place along with all other groups in a university dorm suite. On both of these campuses, fraternities have large houses — the women are in dormitories. That's tradition! Many campuses have long-established, beautiful sorority houses. That, too, is tradition.

CHANGE

Changes are taking place in housing as new options appear and campuses grow and mature. Today, college administrations and local zoning regulations are determining where sorority and fraternity housing can be placed and under what conditions. There are efforts on some campuses to establish Greek villages where each participant owns its own facility. Private investors who rent to interested groups provide another option. The University of Connecticut Greeks are currently promoting a village concept; the chapters at the University of North Carolina at Wilmington are working with a private developer.

Changes in campus housing for sororities may be determined through the joint action of all National Panhellenic Conference members. More often than not, there is a common, written agreement binding all groups to pursue the same type of facility. Such agreements are generally in effect for a biennium, reviewed and then renewed or discarded. These agreements make possible a united effort and decrease the possibility of one group having a facility that sets it apart from other NPC groups.

A number of Delta Zeta chapters have no central facility at all. A member's home or apartment, a college classroom or even a table in the student union may serve meeting needs. Delta Zeta chapters at Northeastern (Massachusetts), Loyola-Marymount and North Georgia are among those who operate successfully along with the other groups on their campuses who have the same arrangements. Each of these schools and others like them will be open to new options and changes.

EXTENSIONS, RECOLONIZATIONS AND NEW HOUSES

The ability of the sorority to meet the housing needs of a specific campus is a primary factor in extension and recolonization decisions. If housing requirements are beyond the limits of a local chapter to support with initial national assistance, the most inviting extension invitation must be rejected. All such possibilities are investigated thoroughly and housing is a major component of any decision. Purdue University, Ohio University and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill are campuses new to Delta Zeta where competitive housing was a requisite of the campus invitation to colonize. A commitment to and the ability to support suitable facilities was a factor in Delta Zeta's return to the University of Georgia, the University of Michigan and Southwest Missouri State. At each of these schools and others, the host institution has been instrumental in identifying property and, in some cases, developing it.

RISK MANAGEMENT, BUILDING CODES AND OLDER HOUSES

Several factors have determined the necessity of a comprehensive national housing program and its involvement in some local housing operation. Delta Zeta has a number of older homes on campuses

throughout the country. While many have been well maintained, some are lacking in basic safety features and no longer meet code requirements. Adequate fire protection, security systems, handicap facilities as well as equipment, mechanical and other basic components need attention and, when not properly in place, put the entire organization at risk. When some of these conditions are ignored, liability locally and nationally increases in proportion to the extent to which these areas are substandard. We set as the highest priority the safety and security of our members because of the risk we take when we do not and, most important of all, because we care and have an obligation to each young woman who makes the Delta Zeta house her home.

Determining adjustments for life safety in our houses can be confusing and uncertain. Local inspectors (building and fire) often pass over conditions that should be taken care of because other like buildings are substandard or because the city lacks the personnel to reexamine conditions cited. Agents for Delta Zeta's insurance carrier inspect on a periodic basis and are happy to work with local personnel in remedying any situation that exists. Likewise, the architectural firm used on some Delta Zeta projects is available to make recommendations on life safety issues.

BUILDING PROGRAMS

Building programs are put in place whenever there is new construction, renovation or a need to bring an existing facility into compliance with the current building code. All such programs must be done in concert with the national organization. In so doing we bring together the legal, contractural, architectural and financial components. No project is without its share of frustration, delays and associated problems and national involvement in no way erases those difficulties. It does, however, make the project a truly cooperative effort, assures that all life safety issues are resolved and makes it possible for the national organization to minimize any risks to the entire membership.



FINANCING


Whether Delta Zeta is building a new facility or redoing an older one, whether the project is large or small, financing is a major consideration. Delta Zeta houses are supported by a Building Fund, a Furnishing Fund and room and board. To make any program successful, those items must be able to meet the debt service necessary to carry the financing. The national housing program is designed to help make a reasonable project work. With escalating costs, older homes needing major renovation and limited budgets it takes time and effort to bring a project into being.

In most cases, local financing has been secured for major projects. The support of the national organization is a must and a commitment necessary for local lenders to feel comfortable. With a professional approach and a cooperative effort from all concerned, reasonable, well-developed programs can be done.



A major part of the Delta Zeta program is that which provides assistance, information and support for local house corporations and chapters. The Regional Housing Chairmen are in place to help deal with the myriad of concerns and considerations in the everyday operation of a housing facility. Each chairman is knowledgeable and eager to provide whatever help is needed. All have had extensive experience and have served on or worked with a house in their own area. These Delta Zetas are Kathleen Johnson Sledge, Danna Donnelly Wylie, Dawn Levreau, Karen Cane Courtney, Louise Parker Bingham and Beth Hibler Allen. Their addresses are included in the Directory portion of this magazine.

As the Delta Zeta housing program has developed, a commitment has been made to a standard of excellence . . . that Delta Zeta houses stand out in design and function for the benefit of all who reside there. No castles — just beautiful, new campus homes for Delta Zetas; no cathedrals — just older places of warmth and comfort; no cottages — just special spaces for fun and friendship.

Woman of the Year Honored




National President Marvona Tavlin pins the Woman of the Year medallion on the 1990 winner, Dana McMillan.

The Kansas City Chiefs usually provide the excitement inside Arrowhead Stadium on Sunday afternoons in autumn. But on Sunday, October 21, it was Delta Zeta's turn.

More than 300 collegians and alumnae filled the Arrowhead Club for the Founders Day luncheon honoring Dana McMillan, 1990 Delta Zeta Woman of the Year. Dana is an initiate of Delta Sigma chapter at Northeast Missouri State University. She has been Province Collegiate Director for Province XI since 1984. Her many professional achievements are in education as Dana is Director of Early Childhood Programs for The Learning Exchange, a one-of-a-kind idea bank and material source.

Province Alumnae Director Phyllis Berens Ross introduced those seated at the head table including National President Marvona Tavlin, Past National President Carolyn Gullatt, former ΔΣ Collegiate Chapter Director Dr.

Phyllis also introduced Dana's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles K. McMillan of Fayette, Missouri, and Jan McBurney Armstrong, Oregon State-X of Kansas City, 1974 Delta Zeta Woman of the Year. The president of the Clay-Platte alumnae chapter, Kim Hassler, offered the invocation and following lunch, members of Zeta Rho chapter at William Jewell College honored Dana with several musical selections including "Wind Beneath My Wings."

Dr. Towne told the crowd that Dana is one of only two Delta Sigmas to ever serve two terms as the chapter's vice president-pledge education. Dr. Towne said she renewed her acquaintance with Dana in 1987 when Dana visited the chapter to help members organize Province Day. Dr. Towne said Dana's meeting with the chapter lasted exactly one hour. "I have seldom witnessed such smooth and efficient organization," Dr. Towne said. She added, "Dana is indeed the new woman of the '90s. Her work involves dedication to service to others."

Dr. Campbell said she was representing the tens of thousands of educators nationwide that Dana has reached through her workshops and books. "We recognize you for what we have known all along. You are the first among equals," Dr. Campbell said.

Phyllis Ross then spoke of her long-time friendship with Dana. "We've laughed together. We've cried together, and we've laughted until we've cried together," Phyllis said. She saluted Dana for her "countless hours of selfless caring" to Delta Zeta and commended Dana for being a great public speaker and a gentle childhood educator.

Marvona said Dana is "the epitome

Upon receiving the beautiful Woman of the Year medallion, Dana thanked the speakers and her biggest supporters, her family. "They value education as much as I do," she said. Dana noted that both The Learning Exchange and Delta Zeta are empowered by staffs of dedicated people.





Dr. Charlotte Tullos is NPC Faculty Member of the Year



Dr. Charlotte Elam Tullos of the University of Southern Mississippi at Hattiesburg has been selected as the first recipient of the NPC Faculty Member of the Year award.

This \$1,000 honorarium, funded by Delta Zeta, is part of the National Panhellenic Conference program encouraging the 553 college panhellenics in the United States and Canada to recognize November as Faculty Appreciation Month and to nominate candidates for this yearly presentation.

Striving for academic excellence has always been a primary purpose for all NPC groups, so it seemed only natural to promote this program.

Dr. Tullos received her honorarium at the 1990 meeting of the Association of Fraternity Advisors in New Orleans with NPC Delegate Carolyn Barnes Gullatt making the presentation.

Dr. Tullos, whose degrees include Doctor of Education, Master of Science and Bachelor of Science, was Director of Student Orientation and Retention at USM but most recently became Director of Placement Services. Her association with USM goes back to undergraduate days when she received her bachelor's degree in 1963. Advanced degrees are also from USM although she has also studied at the University of Virginia, Wellesley College, University of Northern Colorado and the University of Georgia, to name a few.

Professional and community activities are numerous and Dr. Tullos has authored extensive publications and research presentations. Honors and awards include Achievers '85, an award for professional advancement and community services, Mississippi's Young Career Women, Outstanding Young Women of America, World's Who's Who of Women, Sixth Edition, and from her sorority, Kappa Delta, the 1986 Order of the Pearl, their national award for leadership.

"Aptly titled Gladys Whitesell -The Charmer, the orchid entered by Rotorua grower Andy Easton took the premier prize at the conference which is held every three years in a different country.

"And the original twinkly-eyed charmer has herself been to 10 of those 13 conferences. It was at one of them that Mr. Easton met Mrs. Whitesell and decided to name his new hybrid after her.

"The orchid fan from Florida has travelled the world to follow her hobby.

"She was given her first plant about 40 years ago as a present from her husband and sons. Her interest stemmed from there — and stemmed and stemmed, it seems.

"Now Mrs. Whitesell has 'hundreds and hundreds' of orchid plants in the enclosure that surrounds her pool.

"Judged primarily on form and color, the Rotorua bloom proved to be up against the best — competing against entries from 43 different countries. About 2200 people from around the world had registered for this event."





Belle is coping with the physical limitations that come with reaching your 91st birthday and is hoping to

remain in the house where she has lived for the past 40 years until "the good Lord calls me home."

Belle is almost totally blind and travels outside her home with the help of a white cane. Her closest relative is a nephew who lives in another state. But, with the help of neighbors, former students, church friends and Delta Zeta sisters, she continues to live alone in a three bedroom house with a lovely yard full of rose bushes.

Those roses were almost her downfall this past October. As she was picking a bouquet, she was stung by ten yellow jacket bees. It was more than a week later when she casually mentioned this to her doctor during a regular checkup. He treated her immediately and remarked that it was a miracle that she was still alive as these are often fatal insect bites.

So, it was an extra special occasion when Orlando alumnae gathered on October 26 to present Belle with one of the first certificates for the Order of the Pearl, commemorating her more than 65 years of Delta Zeta membership. She has been an active member of the alumnae chapter for more than 50 years and also served as Province Collegiate Director for Florida in the 1950s. Belle received the Achoth Award in 1987 in recognition of her loyal dedication. Her last trip away from Orlando was for the 1983 convention in Dallas, where she charmed everyone who met her.

Belle is an inspiration to all who know her. Her cheerful optimism helps her find the best in every person and situation. She is sincerely interested in everyone she meets and has more friends than there are stars in the sky. Susan Adrianson Skambis, Florida Southern College-BM, who supplied the information for this article, wrote: "She lives daily by the Delta Zeta Creed and her life is a testimony of giving graciously of what is mine... understanding and appreciation, and . . . love that is ever steadfast. I hope that my Lamp will burn as brightly at age 91 as Belle's does."

Jordan recipient of Victory Award

Gallaudet President I. King Jordan was selected as one of the five recipients of the 1990 Victory Awards. The presentation was made at the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in October before an audience of more than 2,000 people.

For them, and for me, I express my heartfelt thanks." Following his acknowledgement the entire audience responded with "high fives." President George Bush and Barbara Bush served as honorary chairpeople.









Beginnings and endings in life are important. Observe some of each together as sisters. Experience wonder together — a new life, a pink rosebud, a beautiful song. Sisters allow some things to just be. Everything in life cannot and should not be explained. Care about others. Show others that you care. Be involved in something bigger than yourself. And remember the little bitty things. Big and little are both important in sisterhood.

We all know how magic those moments are when we hold hands, light the flame and sing together. Carry that feeling with you wherever you go and remember that it is still true, no matter how old you are, when sisters go out into the world, it is best to hold hands and stick together.

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
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


More from Lisa in Saudi Arabia

Editor's note: When I received Lisa's October communication, I immediately wrote her for more input and thoughts on the Middle East crisis. The following is excerpted from her December 20 letter.

I attended Baldwin-Wallace College-FA chapter in Berea, Ohio from 1981 to 1985. I was a psychology and biology major. My senior year I was rush chairman and the last thing on my mind was taking a commission in the Army. However, after about a month on the job market, I decided I wanted to be a pilot and the easiest way to do that was to join the service.


Since I was a college graduate I had no trouble getting into Officer Candidate School. OCS was not the most fun I have ever had. The training is very similar to what is portrayed in "An Officer and a Gentlemen" only the movie made it look easier.

However, I did meet my husband, Alan, while attending OCS at Fort Benning. He was a 1st Lieutenant in the 3/75th Ranger Battalion. We were engaged for a year, and then married in November of 1986. After OCS I was commissioned a second lieutenant and sent to 5-101st Aviation Battalion at Fort Campbell,

Kentucky, the home of the 101st Airborne Divsion. I worked in an aviation unit, specifically with UH-60A Blackhawk helicopters, for three years. I was the assistant operations officer, a platoon leader, a company executive officer and the battalion logistics officer.

After that, I branch transferred to the Quartermaster Corps which is responsible for logistics. I attended my Officer Advanced Course (required of all Army officers while a 1st lieutenant or a captain) at Fort Lee, Virginia, specializing in water and petroleum logistics. While I was attending this OAC in Fort Lee, my husband was back with the 3/75th Ranger Battalion at Fort Benning. (Our frequent flyer mileage really accumulated between Virginia and Georgia.)

The army does keep married couples stationed together, so after the OAC I arrived at Fort Benning. My husband and I were so happy we were finally stationed together again. However, one week after I



signed into Fort Benning my new unit, the 197th Infantry Brigade, was called to Saudi Arabia. Since my husband's unit has a different mission, he was not deployed. Luckily, we have no children. Some children have both parents deployed over here and they have to give custody of their children to someone else. The most difficult part of being here is not the danger I might be facing, but being separated from my husband and family. Sometimes I think it is more difficult for the people back home.

One interesting thing that has happened since I've been here is that I was invited to dine with the President and his wife for Thanksgiving dinner. I sat at Barbara Bush's table. I gave Mrs. Bush a picture of my dog, Ranger, and my parents' address. The President wrote my parents and sent them a picture of their dog Ranger. It said, "From Ranger Bush to Ranger Ornoski."

The President's visit went very well. I spoke with Mrs. Bush about 15 minutes and she introduced me to her husband, so I was able to shake hands with the President.

There are a number of American families here in Saudi Arabia who have opened their homes to the American soldiers. A number of American professors teach at the Saudi universities. A few times a

week, they allow the soldiers to come to their apartments and eat a home-cooked meal, do laundry, make phone calls home to the United States, and take a real hot shower. While it is not home, it reminds us of why we are over here and what we are fighting to protect.

For recreation we have flag football games, play volleyball and run. Running in the desert sand isn't much fun but at least it keeps us all in shape. Some units have built basketball courts. We have recreation tents that have televisions in them but Saudi Arabia has limited television stations. We have VCRs but the only movies we see are what family and friends send us. They have very strict censor laws so you would never see an issue of Glamour or Cosmopolitan. The LAMP is probably considered risque by Saudi standards.

The treatment of women over here leaves much to be desired. I have had a few 'conflicts' with some of the locals because I wear jeans and a polo. I am supposed to have my face covered and wear what is called a Habia. Women here are not allowed to drive, but that does not apply to service women. However, we do get harsh stares when we drive down the road.

I hope the large number of service women in Saudi will have a positive impact on the treatment of all women here. I can already see changes in the four months we have been here. Many women in town now wear western clothing that is not covered by the Habia. There was even a protest staged where over 50 Saudi women drove their cars to the capitol in Riyadh. While I'm sure the changes will

occur slowly, at least they are starting to occur.

Since I have been deployed in Saudi, I cannot believe the amount of support we receive from home. Every other day I receive an envelope or package filled with messages from school children or other organizations. The mail means a lot to all of us out here. Phone lines are difficult to get to and most of the soldiers cannot afford to call home often. While the mail system is slow, any news from home is well received. I have heard from sorority sisters I haven't seen since college graduation. Recently, I received a care package from my college with a tee shirt and a bunch of letters signed by the administration. It was nice to recognize a couple of Delta Zeta names on the card and read their messages for a safe and quick return home.

The nights here are very cold. I only brought one sweatshirt and some soldiers didn't bring any cold weather clothes. The Army is going to issue us some weather clothes soon. In August, it was so warm that it was impossible to fall asleep at night; however, since December the weather had dropped below 35 degrees. Most of us sleep in tents; however, some of the forward infantry units are sleeping on the sand with only a sleeping bag. I'm a bit luckier because I'm in a support unit. It's not the Hilton but it's home until I return to the States.

As of this writing, there is no war on. However, by the time this is published, we will either have gone into Kuwait or hopefully, will begin to return home. Regardless, American soliders are going to be stationed in the Middle East for some time. Many of us feel this will become the new Germany.

Whatever the outcome of the conflict, all of us out in the desert appreciate the support we have received from everyone back home. The joy a letter or a care package brings cannot be expressed. The sound of a husband's or wife's voice gives you the strength and support you need to keep going. Some soldiers out here have had a baby born that they haven't seen. Others

will return home to find their child can walk or talk. The main wish we have, and especially I do as an officer and a leader, is that all soldiers return home safely and soon, and if there is a war, we hope it ends quickly and with few casualties.

Right now it is after midnight and my fingers are a little cold on the computer. I'm not the best speller nor a great typist. Luckily the Army didn't hire me for either or I would have been fired a long time ago.

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

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
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
