

When University of Nevada System (UNS) Regent Shelley Levine Berkley was named the 1991 Delta Zeta Woman of the Year, an important milestone was reached. The award not only honors a special member of Delta Zeta, but also signifies a coming-of-age for the Iota Phichapter and the University of Nevada, Las Vegas.

Shelley's friends, colleagues, and sorority members honored her at the Caesar's Palace Hotel in Las Vegas, Nevada, on October 17, 1991. Everyone who spoke on her behalf talked about her vivacious, positive attitude and her commitment to making UNLV one of the rising stars in

American education.

The first female to be elected student body president at UNLV, Shelley attended the university in the early 1970s. Dr. Donald Beapler, former university president, recalled the humor in having to serve as Shelley's chaperone at student leader conferences where most of the other students were male.

"Shelley made a distinctive mark not only as a lady, but also as a leader," Dr. Beapler said. "She set many goals when she was young, and she has met

every one."

In his letter of recommendation, U.S. Senator Richard Bryan agreed with Dr. Beapler's

description.

"Shelley is an ambitious and determined person who approaches all her tasks with industry and commitment," said the Nevada senator, who sent a representative from his office to the event to speak on her behalf.

Current UNLV President Dr. Robert C. Maxson won applause when he began his remarks by acknowledging Delta Zeta's strength and distinction. He pointed to alumnae such as Shelley and the fact that the Iota Phi chapter has captured the Homecoming Queen title for eight consecutive years as evidence of the sorority's academic,

professional and social achievements.

Dr. Maxson gave a brief history of the university's struggle for equitable funding from the state and the UNS Board of Regents. He commended Shelley on her steadfastness in fighting for UNLV.

"Shelley votes and speaks her convictions, which is something I admire in people," he said. "I'm very proud that she remembers her alma mater and, more importantly, the people who elected her.

"She's an overachiever," Dr. Maxson continued. "I don't know of a single limitation that Shelley Berkley has. Outside of her home and family, the university

gets all her energy."

Shelley's husband, Fred, spoke during the reception while their two sons, Max and Sam, sat behind the podium with Shelley. Six-year-old Sam peppered Fred Berkley's eloquent speech with humerous antics and expressions.

Without skipping a beat, Fred Berkley introduced their sons as Shelley's two finest achievements. He went on to say, "We're proud of her as a legisla-

tor and a regent. I'm honored that she has decided to spend the rest of her life with me."

Delta Zeta National President Maryona Taylin recounted Shelley's many accomplishments including graduating from the University of San Diego School of Law in 1976 and being elected to the Nevada State Assembly in 1982.


Marvona recalled her congratulatory telephone call to Shelley before the awards ceremony. She told the audience that Shelley said she was speechless and then went on talking nonstop for five minutes.

"I knew then why she had done so well in her profession," Marvona said.

Before awarding the Woman of the Year medallion Marvona talked about the history of the award, which was established in 1950 to honor women who have distinguished themselves in their professions or through community service. The recipients have come from all walks of life, including science, medicine, theatre, and law. Then, Marvona pinned the medallion on the 1991 Woman of the Year.

"I'm truly honored to be selected. This award was totally unexpected," she said. "But, those are the best kind of honors."

Shelley explained why she chose to join Delta Zeta over the other sororities when she rushed. She had heard that before Iota Phi became chartered



by Delta Zeta, the local chapter petitioned another sorority because they admired that group's alumnae. The group was told they could not be chartered because they had a Jewish member, and the girls decided to petition Delta Zeta rather than cast out one of their friends.

"A couple years later, when I heard that story, I knew Delta Zeta had reached out to someone of my faith," said Shelley, who was impressed that both the local chapter and national sorority did not discriminate against Jewish people.

She also credited her sorority sisters with launching her political career. "My sisters helped me campaign, and I'm sure it was because of their help that I was elected student body president."

Other special presentations that evening included a proclamation from the Las Vegas mayor's office declaring October 17 as Shelley Berkley Day, Las Vegas Alumnae Chapter Vice President Lisa Story presented a new badge to Berkley, who had misplaced hers a few years before. And, Shawna Hyatt, Iota Phi president, and Kim Kershaw, vice president, gave Shelley a dozen roses.

A number of special and honored guests attended the reception, including XV South Province Collegiate Director Karen Severloh Moffit: XV South Province Alumnae Director Karyn Doble Laurenzello; UNS Regent Carolyn Sparks (Alpha Gamma Delta); Province XV-Central Alumnae Director Catherine Clay Lassesen and husband Rune; UNLV Senior Vice President and Provost John Unrue and wife Darlene; Vice President for Student Services Robert Ackerman and wife Barbara and Lou Gamage, representing U.S. Senator Richard Bryan.

Women of the Year . where are they now?

Have you sometimes wondered what a Delta Zeta Woman of the Year does after her year of recognition? *The LAMP* is fortunate to be able to update you on four of our most outstanding alumnae.

Woman of the Year in 1975 was Margaret Edsel Fitch, Oklahoma State University-AE chapter. Margaret graduated from OSU in 1942 with a B.S. in home economics education and returned to earn the M.S. in 1961. She joined OSU in 1943 as an extension home economist, serving Cimarron and Canadian counties in Oklahoma during her 17 year tenure.

Margaret was later state administrator for home economics in Arizona and Hawaii and was president of the American Home Economics Association in 1974-1975. She is the only United States citizen ever elected president of the International Federation of Home Economics. In 1981 the International Federation established the Fitch Fund to be used by home economists

for professional improvement in developing countries. In 1983, the Oklahoma Home Economics Association established the Margaret Fitch Public Relations award in her honor.

On the international scene, Margaret has traveled to Qatar on behalf of UNESCO to evaluate the potential for a master's degree program in that country's university. She also went to the Pacific island of Tonga, at the request of the U.N. Food and Agriculture Organization, to plan and develop a cooperative extension home economics program.

In 1986 Margaret was a recipient of the Henry G. Bennett Distinguished Service Award which is presented to outstanding OSU alumni, recognizing leadership and citizenship. The recipient of this award may be an alumnus of the university, a citizen of the state or nation or a distinguished world citizen. His or her record of achievement and qualities of leadership and service



must be truly outstanding and merit this high award of recognition given by the university.

In 1990, Margaret received the Oklahoma State University Women's Council outstanding alumna award and in the spring of 1991 was inducted into the OSU Hall of Fame, the highest honor the university can bestow.

Our 1975 Woman of the Year lives in El Reno, Oklahoma, where for the past two years she has devoted hours of support and leadership to the Oklahoma Home Economics Cooperative Extension Ambassadors Association which she serves as president.

Carolyn Lee Wills, Georgia State University-ΔΔ, 1976 Woman of the Year, traveled as a Field Representative (Chapter Consultant) for Delta Zeta for a number of years before settling into a public relations career in Atlanta, Georgia.

This year Carolyn, a longtime volunteer, chaired the 10th Annual Crystal Ball which raised over \$222,000 for the Georgia chapter of the Arthritis Foundation.

The event, the most successful yet, was called "A Night in China" and was held at the Ritz-Carlton, Buckhead.

The evening was filled with authentic Chinese happenings—greetings were in Mandarin and Manchurian by Richard Mafong and Lilani Nan as guests entered through red palace doors.

An Asian Fine Arts display was part of the decor and scrolls of ancestor portraits lined the walls of the ballroom. Guests could have their names written in Mandarin running grass calligraphy on rice paper, an important Chinese art form.

As the guests entered the ballroom, 18 ribbon dancers filled
the dance floor with a mass of
whirling color and a glowing lantern hung over every table.
Hotel waiters were surprised at
how many guests used the decorator chopsticks for the elaborate meal of Peking duck
appetizers with lobster and
Szechuan beef tenderloin.

The grand prize was a trip to Hong Kong and Shanghai with eleven other door prizes valued at \$1,000 or more being distributed. Every guest received a Tiffany glass piece as a favor and several Chinese momentos. Crystal Springs water was put into the cars as the guest departed.

The celebrity guest was Miss Patricia Neal, Oscar winning ac-

tress and coming from the embassy of the People's Republic of China were Minister and Mrs. Zhao Xixin.

Beverly Baldwin Burnsed, 1983 Woman of the Year, was featured in a recent issue of the American Legion Auxiliary's National News in an article on "The Women of Girls State." Bev, a Past National Officer of Delta Zeta, is a member of Alpha Sigma chapter at Florida State University.


For 12 years she served in the Florida legislature and worked on a number of important and prestigious committees, including the Appropriations Committee and as chairman of the Higher Education Committee. She was the first woman ever to head the Commerce and Transportation Committees.

A former Dean of Students in the Polk County Schools, Beverly has been repeatedly honored for her distinguished legislative service. She holds an Honorary Doctor of Laws Degree from Flagler College, is a Director of the Florida State University Alumni Association and the Florida Sheriff's Youth Ranches and is past chairman of the Board of Trustees of Polk Community College.

Since November 1988, Beverly Burnsed has served as Assistant Secretary of State, second in command of a department with some 875 employees and an annual budget of more than \$90 million. The agency oversees historic preservation, supervises elections and issues corporate charters.

Yvonne Kauger, Southwestern (Oklahoma) State University-EA, 1989 Woman of the Year, was recently featured in *Country Home* magazine in an article called "Mother of Red Earth."

Yvonne, an Oklahoma Supreme Court Justice, is a preservationist intent on preserv-

ing Native American culture because it is an important part of her state's heritage. Native Americans in Oklahoma call her "Mother of Red Earth" and in 1984 she was adopted by the Cheyenne-Arapaho Tribe. That was the year the governor appointed her to the Oklahoma Supreme Court.

Yvonne is adamant about all forms of tradition. She's a zealous quilter, stitching heirlooms as did generations of women in her family before her. With enthusiasm and hard work, she also meticulously restored the 1898 cottage on the old family farm.

Most of the major projects in her life have involved preservation. In 1981 she and her friends renovated the old post office in Colony, Oklahoma, where Yvonne grew up — and where the Cheyenne-Arapaho have held their annual Labor Day powwow since World War II. The building now houses native Oklahoman and American art in the Gallery of the Plains Indians.

Yvonne had a vision of tepees on the hills of Oklahoma City's Myriad Gardens and a few years later she made it a reality, cofounding the Red Earth Festival from which she received her nick-name.

The story in *Country Home*, written by Candace Ord Manroe, also told that she is now germinating a new project: The International Linguistics Center for Native Languages. With a liaison through Oklahoma University, which would give college credit, and the Smithsonian Center for the American Indian, native languages would be recorded before they are lost.

"It can happen," declares Yvonne, "because it's unique to Oklahoma. Who has the speakers, the elders, to repeat the language? This needs to be done in an academic environment. Why not teach Cheyenne-Arapaho and a little Fort Sill Apache right along with the French?"

Alabama Greeks give library a \$21,000 boost

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. — Several Greek representatives and their faculty advisors at the University of Alabama were honored recently for helping to raise \$21,000 for the University's main library.

Twenty-four Greek organizations donated either \$500 or \$1,000 each to create "The Greek Library Support Fund" which will make possible a new "American Biographies" book collection for the Amelia Gayle Gorgas Library. The collection will feature books on various Americans who have contributed to the American experience. It is the beginning of a yearly contribution to facilitate the growth of the collection into a major research holding for the library.

Such a project for the library is unprecedented at UA, according to Dr. Russell Bryant, a member of the UA history department and co-chairman of the Greek Advisors Council which co-ordinated the project. Bryant said the project will benefit stu-

dents as well as faculty members.

"It is the largest sum any student group ever gave to the library." Dr. Russell Bryant.

"We came up with the idea because such a large percentage of the library's purchase funds go toward journals, used largely by the technical and scientific side of the faculty. This project was designed specifically for the creation of a collection of books which deal with undergraduate needs," Bryant said.

At a reception held in the Special Collections Room of the Gorgas library, Dr. Charles Osburn, dean of libraries, also praised the students.

"This is a noteworthy gift and is a sterling example of students helping other students. I salute the fraternities and sororities who participated in this project." Dr. Charles Osburn Bryant said the donations are evidence that UA's Greek students are committed to education.

"The bad news about Greeks usually makes the headlines, while the good things are usually ignored. This contribution shows that an overwhelming majority of Greeks are serious and interested in improving the quality of education at the University of Alabama."

The UA faculty senate commended the group for its efforts "to reinforce and strengthen the educational mission of the University of Alabama."

"I'm so glad that Greeks have this opportunity to express their appreciation to the library by donating money that will help all students at the University," said Darcy Fogelberg, president of Alpha Gamma Delta.

Greek organizations participating in the project include Sigma Chi, Pi Kappa Alpha, Beta Theta Pi, Zeta Beta Tau, Pi Kappa Phi, Sigma Phi Epsilon, Kappa Sigma, Sigma Nu, Theta Chi, Alpha Gamma Delta, Kappa Delta, Alpha Chi Omega, Sigma Delta Tau, Zeta Tau Alpha, Kappa Kappa Gamma, Phi Mu, Alpha Omicron Pi, Delta Zeta, Kappa Alpha Theta, Alpha Delta Pi, Delta Delta Delta, Sigma Kappa, Chi Omega and Pi Beta Phi.

Oregon State honors Alice Wieman



The Fall 1990 issue of *Home Economics Today* from the College of Home Economics at Oregon State University was dedicated to several pioneer graduates who accepted and met the challenges made to the fabric of the American family. "They are role models, not by design, but because they saw what needed to be done and did it," the author wrote.

Among these pioneers is Chi chapter's Geneva Alice Feike Wieman of the class of 1922.

Alice Feike was initiated into Chi chapter in 1919 as a charter member at then Oregon Agricultural College. She was active in the chapter, holding several offices. Later, a charter member of the Portland alumnae chapter, she held the office of president twice and served in every possible capacity. Alice Wieman was a Province President (Director) for four years in a province which included three northwestern states. Later she served nationally as Magazine Chairman and Colonnade Club Chairman. Alice was also a member of the Chi Corporation Board and president of the Portland AZ Mothers Club.

Her older sister Zelta Feike Rodenwold and her younger sister Vivian Feike Copple were both Delta Zetas and she has two Delta Zeta sisters-in-law.

Her two daughters, Betty Wieman Morrison and Zelta Wieman Adams, granddaughter Debra Adams Reynolds, two nieces, Alys Belle Feike Farrell and Joan Feike Hall, and a grand niece Brenda Farrell

Black are also Delta Zetas. This supports the belief that she was, and still is, a terrific "rusher" for Delta Zeta.

The article in the magazine was written by daughters Zelta Adams and Betty Morrison. It related a delightful, warm story of a pioneer in the field of Home Economics, a professional, teacher, volunteer — one very much involved in home and family. Alice founded the Home Economics Department at Lewis and Clark College and became a professor and department head for five years. She attended sev-

eral international Home Economics meetings.

Alice and her husband John are members of the Holly Society of America and past officers of the Northwest Holly Growers Association. They grew and sold holly on their farm for many years. Alice designed wreaths, arrangements and boxes of English holly which were shipped all over the United States and to many foreign countries.

"Today, at 93," Zelta wrote, "mother maintains energy far greater than that of those years younger. She bowls weekly, reads, gardens, travels and is an active homemaker for John, her husband of 68 years.

"A supportive parent, loving wife, caring friend, concerned teacher, leader and community servant, a pioneer in the field of family life education, Alice Wieman continues to inspire us today."


A dedication ceremony was held October 12, 1991.

Southern California celebrates 90 years of fashion

A multimedia slide show of photos from collegiate chapters and alumnae scrapbooks formed the backdrop for fashions being modeled.

Also attending were Dr. Thomas Corts, president of Samford University; Suzanne Martin. Assistant Director of Student Affairs and Panhellenic Advisor and Susan Gattis, the chapter consultant who has been working with the chapter.

Alpha Pis came from as far away as New York to see the new house and visit with friends from time gone by. Some of these people may not have seen each other for years but the noise level in the reception area seemed to indicate that it didn't take long for everyone to be as comfortable together as they had been during their college years. Special guests were Inez Rogers Hazen, a new Golden Rose from Jacksonville, Florida, and Jappie Bryant King of Atlanta, a member of the 50th anniversary class being recognized that weekend at Homecoming.

The Delta Zeta Foundation is the philanthropic arm of the Sorority and, as such, provides for many of the education and charitable programs. These programs are not limited to the collegiate side but also encompass any new alumnae programming, the National Historical Museum, speech and hearing programs and school scholarships. Traditionally, the majority of monies coming into these programming opportunities have come from the collegiate dues paying members. As most Greek organizations have ascertained, these members can no longer afford to carry the burden of all the programming areas for the Sorority. Therefore, the private donations of individuals to enhance these programs in both the collegiate and alumnae area are of vital importance if the Sorority is to continue to enjoy its excellent reputation.

Over and over in recent interfraternal meetings, it has been stated that those Greek organizations which do not concentrate on their basic values and who do not keep up with the latest in technology and alumnae and collegiate programming will be left behind.

The new Director of Development is seen to be a vital link in establishing the funds to assist Delta Zeta in being a leader in the Greek community. This person will be trained at a very

professional level in many forms of development including annual giving, planned gifts, annuities and trusts. The new Director of Development, while working closely with the Foundation Trustees and various members of National Council, will report to Executive Director Cindy Menges. 


Houston, Delta Theta—Delta Zeta introduced its new formal rush skit Delta Zeta House and pledged quota for the 28th con-

I was reminded of the blessing of sisterhood on Thanksgiving this year. On that day, I visited 103 year old Effie Nickells Sherwin in her Florida nursing home and had the privilege of presenting her with the Order of the Diamond certificate for more than 75 years of Delta Zeta membership.

She was snuggled under blankets and her eyes were faded behind her spectacles but they sparkled as she told me about the social activities she and her sisters had with their "men friends" and how the girls had "watched out for each other." It seemed to me that some things hadn't changed much over the

years.

Effie was one of the first members of Epsilon chapter at Indiana University and was initiated on February 5, 1910. She told me that there were five members and that they had been initiated by a group from Alpha Chapter at Miami University. At Indiana, she met and later married Dr. Carl P. Sherwin, then associate professor of biochemistry. They left Indiana for Scarsdale, New York, where Dr. Sherwin practiced medicine in New York City for 30 years. They raised a daughter and son and finally retired to Zephyrhills, Florida, in the early 1960s. Effie lived alone after his death in 1974 and moved to a nursing home at the age of 101. Her daughter, Isabel Sherwin Harris, lives nearby.

Delta Zeta is special to Effie Nickells Sherwin and she remained a loyal supporter of our sisterhood across her many years. It was an honor to recognize a sister whose Delta Zeta lamp has burned brightly for so long.

100 YEARS OF PANHELLENIC FRIENDSHIP

The "adventure in friendship" begun in Boston in 1891 by representatives from seven women's fraternities reached its century mark in November, 1991. For the fifty-second time, delegations from the National Panhellenic Conference member groups met to celebrate interfraternalism. And, for the fifty-second time, the gathering also provided a forum for issues of mutual concern as well as a means of initiating appropriate action to "carry out the mission of the Conference." The Ramada Renaissance Techworld in Washington, D.C., provided a fitting location for this historic centennial meeting.

Chairman Louise Kier (Phi Sigma Sigma) reported on the "Leadership Team" management style implemented by the Executive Committee during the 1989-91 Biennium. Executive Committee responsibilities were shared by Chairman Kier, Secretary Harriett Macht (Delta Phi Epsilon) and Treasurer Harriet Rodenberg (Sigma Delta Tau). According to the Chairman, the "combined expertise of one hundred and three women" from the twenty-six member groups "resulted in definable, measurable and significant accomplishments." Facilitation of service was a major goal of the Leadership Team. With Rebecca Mitchell assuming the position of Administrative Assistant, the NPC Central Office became the true hub of this service-centered philosophy.

Noteworthy accomplishments

of the biennium included restructuring of the College Panhellenics Committee and the development of a College Panhellenic Association Programming Manual; a new publication, Viewpoint, which targets College and University Presidents and Chief Student Affairs Officers; 279 new colonies whose starts were fostered by the Bulletins and

other materials from the Extension Committee, and the restructuring and comprehensive self-study of the Alumnae Panhellenics Committee.

Reflecting Panhellenic tradition and purpose, the 1991 meeting combined educational programs, social events and business sessions in a non-stop agenda. Congresswoman Pat Schroeder (Chi Omega) established a strong underlying theme with her call to harness and use woman power on behalf of women. This message was echoed in the three Issues Forums. The first of the forums dealt with "Common Agendas We Share With Women's Organizations," the second with the roles and relationships within the Conference, and the third with "Education — the Responsibility and the Possibilities."

Serving on the Alumnae Panhellenics Committee are Patricia Rosser, Deanna McKinnon and Norma Andrisek. Sandra Nesbitt is an area advisor on the College Panhellenics Committee.

A special report on her study on hazing in women's fraternities was made by Deborah Shaw, Greek Advisor at Auburn University. The Conference had commissioned this study as a result of a resolution passed at the 1989 meeting. Dr. Dayle M. Smith, management professor from Georgetown University, was the speaker at the alumnae luncheon. Her topic: "Kin Care in Corporate America."

At the alumnae luncheon, delegates were able to socialize with more than 500 local Panhellenic women. In addition, a planned "free" evening allowed delegations to schedule specific time with their local alumnae. Delegates also were privilege to a White House briefing and a special White House tour. Alpha Phi and Kappa Kappa Gamma hosted luncheons in honor of retiring delegates. Vendors joined in a "Fair" that was the major between-sessions attraction. Receptions enabling those in attendance to share unstructured time together were held on the opening night and before the Awards Banquet.

As to the business part of the meeting, nearly forty resolutions were considered, and all but two were adopted. Most were aimed at effecting change and will require action in the months ahead as well as the support of all Panhellenic women. For ex-

ample:

 Services will be increased through the development of a Panhellenic Directory, a workshop facilitator's guide, a speaker's bureau and a public relations display.

 All groups are urged to omit logos of alcoholic beverage companies from Greek-related activities; Panhellenic funds may not be spent on alcohol.

 Member groups are urged to incorporate the findings of Deborah Shaw's hazing study into their hazing education programs.

• A committee will be formed to begin plans for an NPC-spon-



sored Interfraternal Forum.

 The Conference will hold an interim meeting in 1992, possibly paving the way for annual

meetings.

As a follow-up to the 1987 resolution calling for an evaluation of the costs and quality of membership recruitment, resolutions were passed that define guidelines for simplifying rush and for eliminating all gifts and letters for rushees.

 Guidelines will be prepared for scheduling and coordinating Greek philanthropic activities.

 Closer working relations between Alumnae and College Panhellenics Committees will be promoted.

The week came to an exciting conclusion Saturday night with the Awards Banquet. The presence of representatives from each first place award winning Panhellenic and traditional African storytelling by a griot added great excitement to an already festive occasion.

The depth of commitment to the National Panhellenic Conference was underscored by the presentation of various gifts: The Delta Zeta Delegation met on the steps of the Old Executive Office Building prior to the White House briefing.

Pi Beta Phi donated \$10,000 for long range planning; Phi Sigma Sigma gave \$2,500 for NPC publications; Delta Gamma presented \$4,000 for the purchase of a public relations display, and Alpha Delta Pi gave \$1,000 toward alumnae panhellenics programming, Additionally, Delta Phi Epsilon announced it will sponsor the new alumnae panhellenics award and presented officer badges to be used by each of the three Executive Committee members; Alpha Epsilon Phi underwrote the expense of distributing materials from the Values and Ethics Commission to all 26 groups; Alpha Xi Delta donated a plaque for the NPC Central Office to continue the listing of NPC Chairmen, and Alpha Gamma Delta gave a FAX machine to the NPC Central Office.

The presentation and the retiring of colors by the Girl Scout Honor Guard to the accompaniment of the Alexandria Royal Fyfes & Drums was at once symbolic of the past, ever a colorful backdrop to the proceedings, and the future, always the focus of the program and resolutions. Providing a bridge between the two was the ongoing shared adventure which, for 100 years, has bound fraternity women in Panhellenic Friendship.

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
