Delta Zeta Comes to Georgia

DELTA ZETA is honored to be the first national sorority to be installed at the Atlanta Division of the University of Georgia. The weekend of January 15-16, 1955, will be a memorable one to members of Chi Rho Sigma

sorority as it marks the date they officially became Delta Delta Chapter of Delta Zeta.

Chi Rho Sigma was also the first local sorority founded at the school in 1936 with ten charter members. Of this group, the first president, Louise King Minor and Eleanor Morris Lewis were initiated into Delta Zeta. As their purpose was to establish a feeling of friendship among the members, to foster a consciousness of school spirit, and to promote high scholastic standards, what could be more fitting than to become a part of similar aims in Delta Zeta.

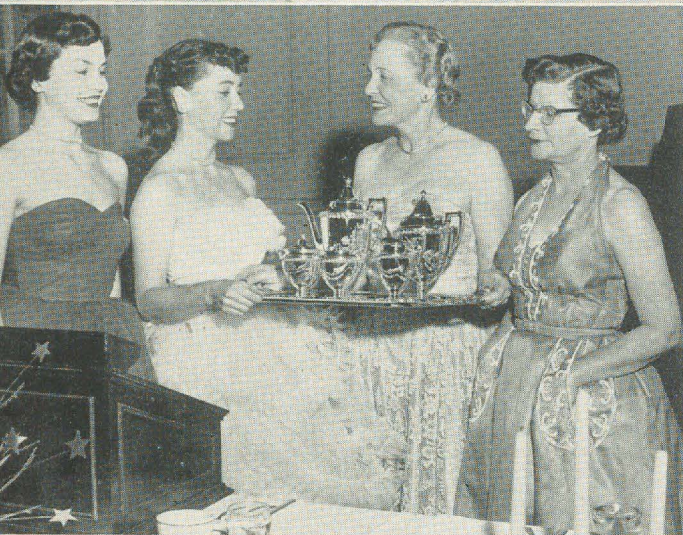
The Atlanta Division, University of Georgia, now in its forty-first year, attained in 1954 a goal long sought. Its new \$2,000,000 building overlooking Joel Hurt Park, was just completed.

Georgia high school graduates who enrolled as freshmen in the fall of 1954-55 were the first students to enjoy attending classes and using the library facilities in a completely new building. Other students through the years, who attended classes in rented rooms, or in one of the three remodeled buildings, found a completely modern building, air-conditioned, with Georgia marble front, and three stories of modernly equipped

classrooms, organizational rooms, and other facilities. Instead of a few students as in the early days, over 5,000 will be found in any one quarter studying a variety of subjects, with more than twenty career concentrations leading to the Bachelor of Business Administration degree, and a full program in nursing education leading to the Bachelor of Science degree in Nursing Education, as well as a School of General Studies in which three years' work is given toward the Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, and Bachelor of Fine Arts degrees.

Established in 1914 as the Georgia Tech Evening School, it is one of the pioneer evening schools of the country and is continuing to provide opportunities for many who must earn their livelihood but who wish to continue their educational development on the college level.

Separated from Georgia Tech in 1932, the school was made an independent unit known as the University System Center by the newly created Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia. The school's curriculum was enlarged and a full-time faculty acquired. By 1935 day classes were also organized and classes were scheduled from eight in the morning until ten in the evening. The resulting flexibility of scheduling together with the breadth and quality of program offerings has made its appeal to thousands of students.

In the summer of 1947 the Regents of the University System of Georgia changed the designation from the University System Center to the Atlanta Division of the University of Georgia. A complete coordination of scholastic work was planned and put into effect by the Administrators of the University of Georgia at Athens and Atlanta. All work is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

Epsilon Realizes Its Dream

IN 1950 Epsilon members began dreaming about a new home at Indiana University when property adjacent to the original structure was bought with an outlook for future expansion. These fanciful visions were not mere "castles in the sky" because now in 1955 we Epsilon girls are living in the \$100,000 expanded and remodeled Delta Zeta house across from the University campus.

Construction began in June, 1954, during summer vacation. Even before the end of the semester, however, architects came often to look at the rooms as they advanced with plans to remodel the original section of the house and to build a new addition from the framework of the house next door.

Not long after we left for the summer, the balcony was torn from between the pillars of the porch; the driveway was demolished; the adjoining walls of the two houses were torn away;

and the dormer and porch of the other house were removed. Bloomington members kept the rest of the chapter posted during the summer with long letters and pictures showing the building. Many of us in the state made special trips to Bloomington just to look at the doubled size of the house and to tramp through a maze of hanging plaster, wires and ramps to see the interior.

By September so much progress had been made that we scarcely recognized our home when we came back to school. We moved into newly painted rooms with tile floors and sliding birch closets. Two phone booths and a drop-from-the-wall ironing board had been installed upstairs to add to the convenience. Downstairs the dining room had been expanded to hold 90 girls, and a new kitchen and large pantry extended from the dining room. On the kitchen roof a cement floor was being laid for a sun deck, and a patio floor between the kitchen and the new reception room

was being built for easy access into the parking lot. The dining room, living room, and smoker all had been repainted and the floors sanded and shellacked to add to the newness of the remodeled section.

Those first few months no alarm clocks were needed to wake us up in the morning because the workmen arrived promptly at 7 A.M. to begin hammering and sawing in the new addition. For awhile we entered the house from the side door in the new section and trooped up ramps and temporary steps while the stairway in the original part was being varnished. No one minded at all because this added to the glamour of living in the house where we could see it grow as building continued.

The first eight weeks we ate in the University cafeteria while the new kitchen appliances were installed and the dining room was being finished. The first meal in with a new cook and waiters was a festive occasion celebrating our return to the house. By now new pillars had replaced the old ones on the porch and the steps had been changed from the front of the porch to the side next to the impressive Colonial door where the driveway had once been.

In November the upstairs partition separating the two sections was removed, and just like playful kittens we surged into the new study rooms on the second floor and the heated dorm and guest room on the third floor exclaiming with wonder at our new quarters. Before Christmas vacation, the downstairs partitions were removed, and we decided that this was the best gift we could receive after we looked at the new doorway, entrance hall, reception room, and living room.

Day by day new dining room chairs, new tables, new drapes arrived to tantalize our curiosity about interior decoration for the house. Our fathers gave us a new television set which became favorite entertainment for dates and the girls, too, when studies were done.

At the end of January all the new furniture arrived and the old living room was changed into a formal living room with beautiful pink and gray velvet furniture to match the filmy pink and gray curtains. In the dining room the yellow, brown, and aqua figured drapes are set off by the yellow walls and the yellow with varicolored threaded material in the upholstered chair seats.

Classical wallpaper in the entrance hall with noble Greek heads and other ancient symbols set off the charcoal walls of the reception room. In the white tile floors large Δ Z letters are set in just at the top of the five steps leading from the doorway. In the new sunken living room a deep gold carpet is set off by a gold circular couch, sectional furniture, large table lamps, and large plants. Here the girls congregate to chat and look over the campus from a large picture window. The lighted trophy case displays our many awards won for five consecutive Fall Carnival booths, decorations for the Little "500" bicycle race, and the University Sing.

A stairway leads from the living room down to the new white mahogany paneled recreation room with lounge furniture for easy relaxation. The old recreation room has been converted into a chapter room and the smoker has been remodeled and added to the quarters of our housemother, Mrs. Mabel Hoagland.

Delta Zeta is one of seven sororities and fraternities with new homes or new additions this year. Our house is the closest to the campus of these seven, and students have often paused on

their way to classes to look at the impressive Colonial home.

Over 850 girls registered for rush and came to ΔZ for formal teas before the end of the first semester. All of them remarked about its spacious beauty and 32 of them became ΔZ pledges.

Nearly 500 persons, including President Herman B Wells and Dr. Eunice C. Roberts, Assistant Dean of the Faculties and director of Women's Educational Programs, came to a ΔZ open house, March 6, to take a tour of the house. Also present were Miss Frances E. Westcott, past national president of Delta Zeta; Miss Hannah M. Popper, one of the three living founders of

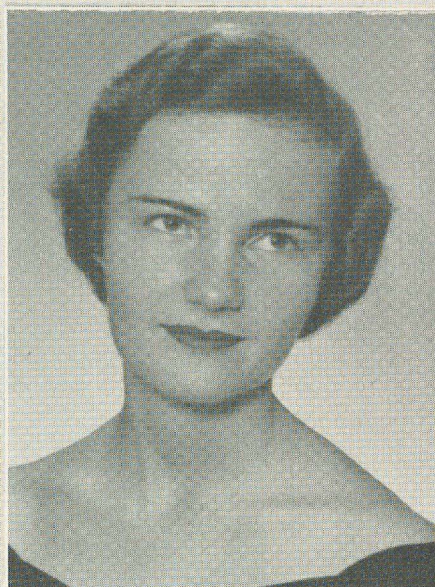
Epsilon; Mrs. Ray Richardson, state chairman; Mrs. Frank Silverthorn, province director; Mrs. C. D. Overman, president of the house corporation; Mrs. Kenneth Potter, president of Epsilon alumnae; Mrs. Charles D. Hendrich, chapter adviser; Miss Barbara Goodall, alumnae rush adviser; Mrs. Paul Jenkins, editor of the LAMP; and Miss Irene C. Boughton, executive secretary.

A song title which seems appropriate for our new home is "A Dream is a Wish Your Heart Makes." Certainly the dreams of our members five years ago have blossomed into a beautiful house which is a thrill for all of us to call home.

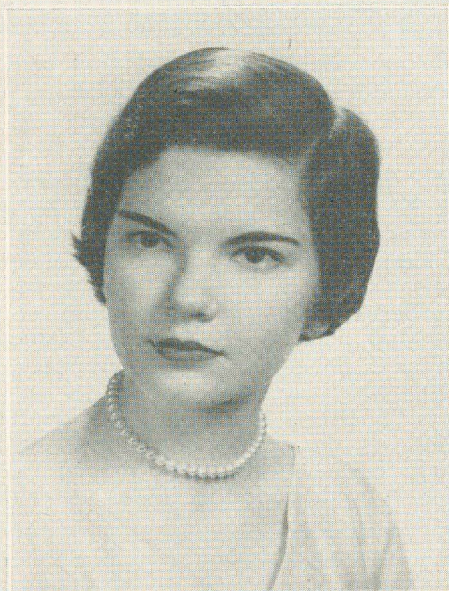

While talking with some of her old friends she said, "Do you know, I went off to Hollywood for a week and now it will be 23 years in August. It was a long time though, before I turned my ticket back." Gail went off to the movies declaring she'd first make a success in Hollywood and then come back and be governor in 1952. "I didn't quite make it," she said. "I've waited a long time for my children and now I am enjoying every minute

of them." She and her husband have two adopted children, Jennifer, three, and Thomas Cornwell Jackson, Junior, eighteen months.

Gail may have retired from the screen at the peak of stardom but she retired to many other interests. Her "Enchanted Cottage," where the stars outfit their youngsters is internationally known. We hope that in our small way we have brought a bit of sunshine into Patty's life.

However present achievements are even more important and her interests are widely varied as shown in her present activities. These include the following: First, of course, she is a member of the Dayton Alumnæ Chapter of Delta Zeta; a member of the Advance Club, a literary club; the Dayton Music Club; the League of Women Voters; the West Alexandria Club; and the Centennial Committee of the Y.W.C.A. She serves on the advisory committee at the school of nursing at Miami Valley Hospital, the Educational Television Committee of South Western Ohio as set up out of Miami University by the President of Miami University, the nominating committee of the Dayton Federation of Women's Clubs, the credential committee of the Ohio Federation of Women's Clubs; and she is vitally interested in various legislative programs. One of these programs is concerned with the treatment of alcoholics, and she is constantly working for state legislation toward that end.

Peg is married to a wonderfully understanding husband, Judge Paul Sherer, now a judge in the Domestic Relations Court of Montgomery County. It is through his daily work with people that he and Peg have developed a mutual interest in a community project that has won first place in their hearts. At present Peg and Paul are advisors for the Montgomery County Allied Youth Council, which is composed of youth posts in seven high schools throughout Dayton and Montgomery Counties. These posts are sponsored by the schools and work toward character building in high

school youth through meetings, wholesome recreation and interesting programs. 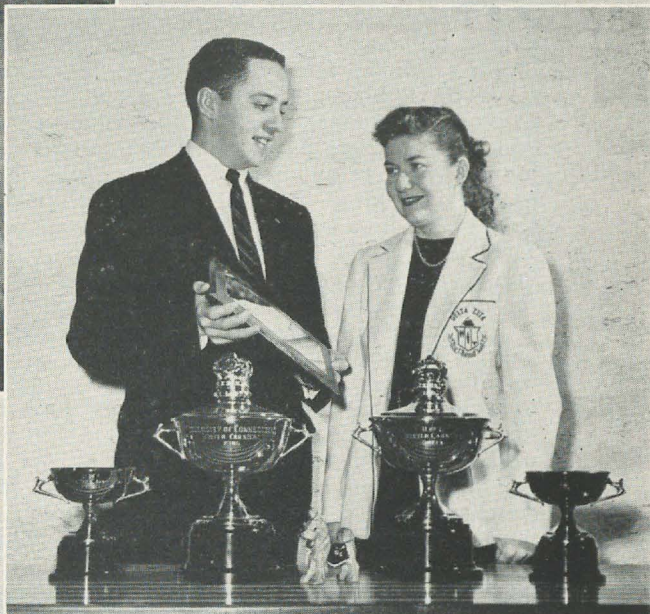

SYLVIA RULFF, *First Scholarship Winner*

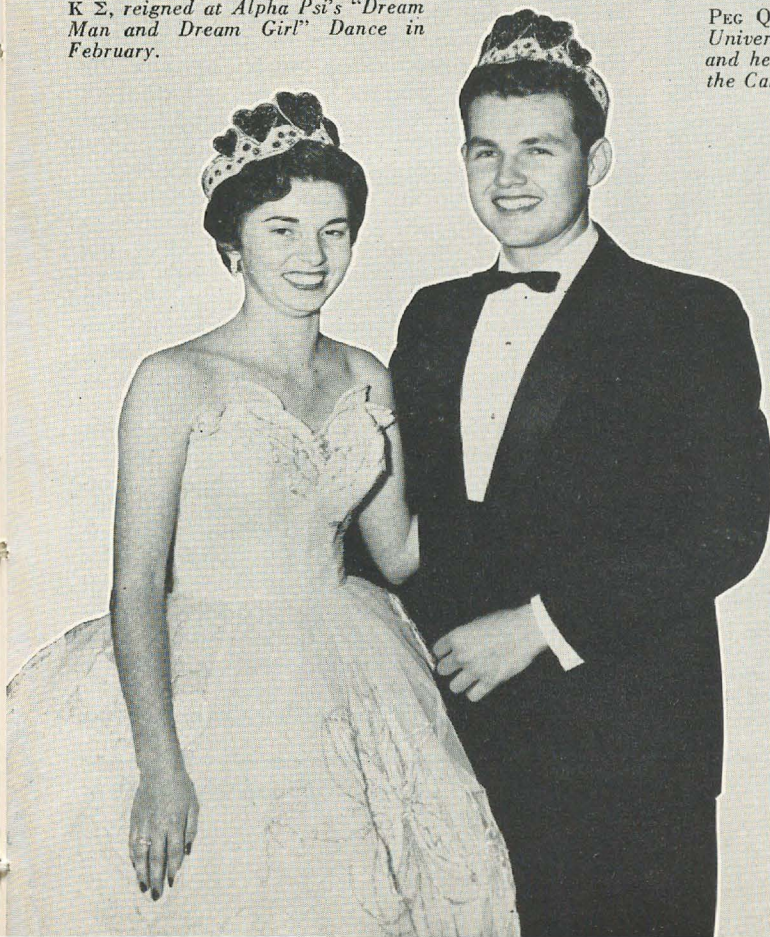

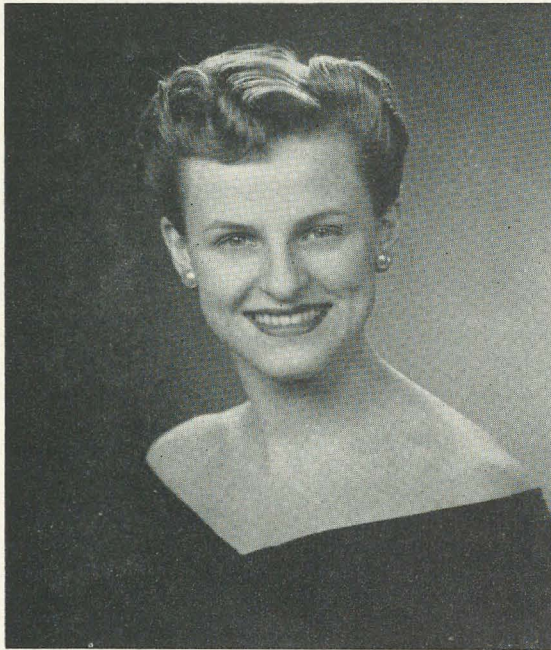

Fashion Display Calls for Versatility

MY JOB is fashion display co-ordinator for L. S. Ayres and Company in Indianapolis, Indiana. I work with another girl, and together we co-ordinate the windows and accessorize them. Management makes out a schedule 6 weeks in advance detailing the windows for each week. Buyers then submit their candidates for the windows and from these we choose the bank of windows—looking at it as a complete bank of windows and not as individual windows. The theme could be based on color, type of fabric, occasion, type of merchandise, etc. After the merchandise is chosen, we must accessorize it. This includes millinery, jewelry, gloves, handbags, neckwear, and shoes. Usually in each case we make appointments with the respective buyers to pick out what they are showing and have in stock, and what is right for the outfit. Often we work with the merchandise managers as well as the buyers. You certainly learn the store, the merchandise, and the people in it. We also assemble accessory groupings for each window.

The accessories are used with props and signs in each window and are things that could be worn with the outfits in the window. They consist of handbag, gloves, scarf, flower, jewelry, shoes, cosmetics, and any other accessory which would be appropriate. Cosmetics are usually keyed to color: perfume according to the color of the package; facial cosmetics according to the color to be worn.

On Monday there is usually a complete change of background. All of the mannequins are removed from the windows. We undress them and redress them to go back in. There are usually about 25 to 30 mannequins to be dressed each week. In choosing the mannequins, we must know the backgrounds and the relative positions of the mannequins in each window, so we will know which ones to choose. That is, whether they are looking left, right, or straight ahead; whether they are to be seated or standing. Then we also try the hats on the mannequins to see which one wears each hat the best. After all the merchandise is in place, we dress the mannequins. We then accessorize a window at a time. From the collection of accessories we have obtained from the buyers, we choose the right handbag, gloves, jewelry, scarf or umbrella, whichever the outfit calls for. Through our accessorizing, we try to show the public the many different looks one can get from the same type of costume with different accessories.

After the backgrounds are in, the mannequins are put back into the windows and set in place. Then my partner and I check each window from the outside to see what should be fixed on the mannequin, such as: pins, tags, petticoats showing, runners in hosiery, etc. We go back and fix what we have found wrong and check again from the outside. When we can find nothing wrong, the windows are closed and a week's work is finished.

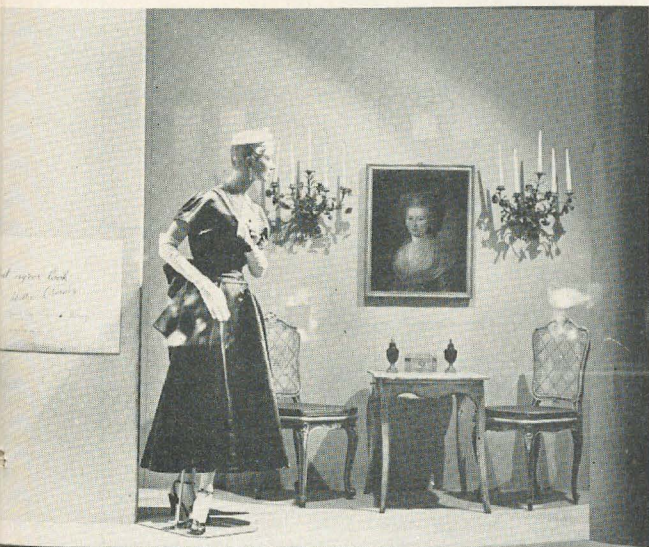
Our work for each week actually begins on Tuesday. After we return all the merchandise from the past week's windows, we began gathering for the next Monday. After we get the merchandise, the art director and his assistant look at it and get the feeling so they can start the backgrounds and get them into production. All of this work is done either in the display department at the store or in the display section at the warehouse. Almost everything used is made by people in the department.

The rest of the week we gather the accessories

for each outfit and the accessory groupings. When we get the merchandise for the children's windows, we have to try each outfit on each mannequin to make sure they fit. Quite often we have to change sizes as our mannequins are like real children and often don't wear the size they should for their ages. The merchandise is then taken to pressing. Here as in the women's windows, each outfit must be accessorized and we have to contact

the respective buyers. Then on Friday we dress the children to save us time on Monday, since there are usually 9 to 15 of them.

When Friday comes we really feel that we have done a week's work, but we have loved all of it. This job as any other one has its trials and tribulations and its good and bad days. But it always seems that everything works out in the end and the good overcomes the bad.

This is the most fascinating job I have ever had because there is always something new and different. I deal with all types of people on all levels. I get the merchandising side, the display side, and the fashion side. We have to keep up with all the new fashions and fashion trends and know what the store believes in and the look they want to create. As well as being part of the display department, we are also connected with the Fashion Bureau. We attend all the fashion meetings and deal directly with the Fashion Coordinator, Mrs. Elizabeth Patrick. On the organizational chart we are under the publicity division and we attend all publicity meetings.

L. S. Ayres is one of the few stores in the country which changes a complete bank of 23 windows every Monday; sixteen of these are women's ready-to-wear, three men's ready-to-wear, and four home store. Although the store is closed on Monday and open Tuesday through Saturday, the display department works a five day week, Monday through Friday. We work on Monday so that no one is in the store while the windows are being changed.

During the Christmas season when the store is open six days a week, we have five institutional windows (mechanical) and the remainder are changed before the store opens at 9:00 A.M. We have to arrive at 7:00 A.M.

Most people never realize the amount of work that goes into presenting good windows. At least, before I became a part of the Display Department, I didn't. There are approximately 35 people in the department. Each one has a designated job, but you soon find that you can do many things you never dreamed of. Everything has to be done and everyone pitches in to help whether it is painting, pasting, sewing, cutting or numerous other jobs.

Last year at Christmas time we had lingerie windows, the backgrounds of which were to be wall niches with a seated mannequin in each niche. Each niche had a mattress in it, and each mattress had to be covered in a color of fabric that was just right to go with the wallpaper and the merchandise. I happened to mention the fact that I had done some sewing, and before I knew it, I was seated before a machine with fabric of all types, cording and the thread for eight mattress covers (one 144 inches long).

We have our comical moments in the department just as anyone else does. The incident which I recall could be called comedy and tragedy both. This particular week we had a lot of mannequins in the windows and we had to use an old one which had been taped together in the middle. Everything was fine all week until Saturday, our day off. A customer called in and said that we had a headless mannequin in the window. Since no one of us was there, one of the models went down to see about the disaster. Sure enough, there was the mannequin, her top half hanging down the back, clinging only by a small piece of tape. The model removed the mannequin from the window, and we found out about it on Monday morning.

Scholarships to Aid Gallaudet Students

Dr. Leonard M. Elstad, President of Gallaudet College, the world's only college for the deaf, has announced six continuous \$50 scholarships, totalling \$300, from Delta Zeta, national women's sorority, which recently adopted Gallaudet College as a nation-wide philanthropic project.

The scholarships will be awarded to six deserving young women as an aid in buying books and paying fees for the 1955-1956 academic year.

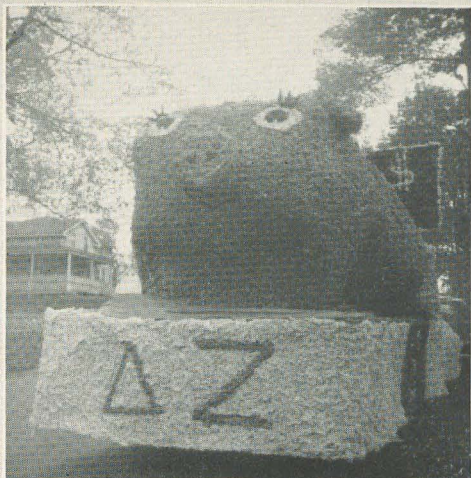

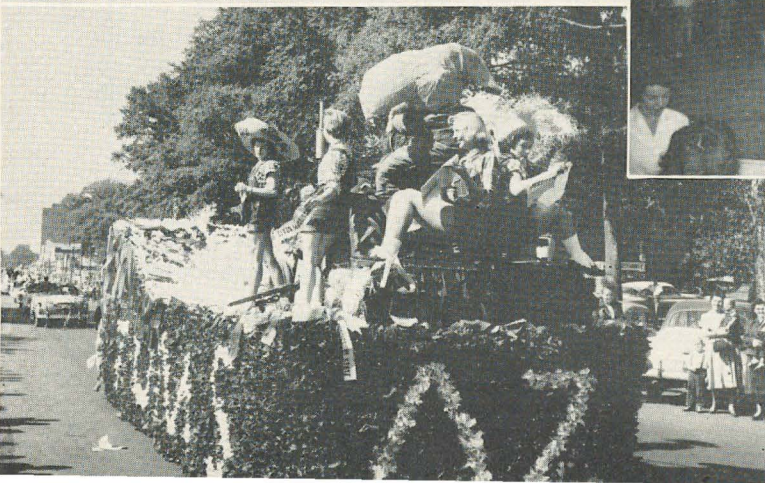

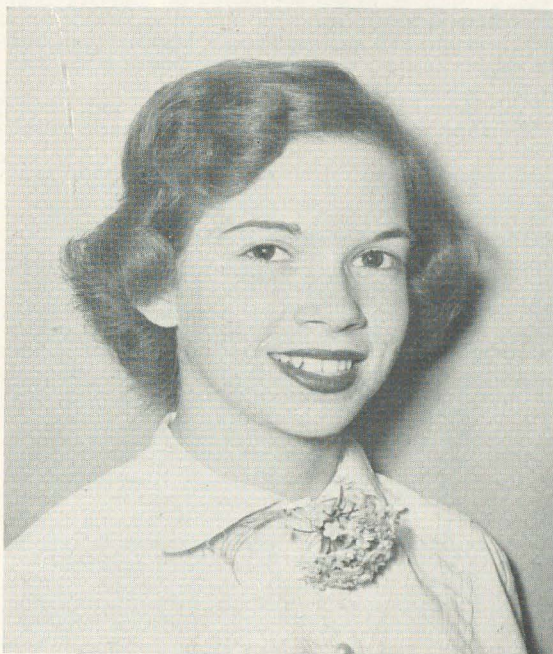

Graduate Internships in Personnel Women's Residence Halls

The internships offer an opportunity for professional experience in guidance under the direction of a staff trained in the personnel field. Graduate study may be pursued with a major in Personnel and Guidance, or in Education, Psychology, Recreation, Sociology, and other fields.

Stipends which cover room, board, and basic fees are granted for half-time service in the Women's Residence Halls. In addition to the personnel responsibilities in the halls, the Counselors carry a part-time academic program limited to a maximum of 10 hours each semester. The Master's degree may be completed under this plan in four semesters, either with or without a thesis. During one semester of the second year, Counselors may gain further experience by supervised employment in University offices dealing with student personnel administration. The training and experience received in this combined program of work and study in personnel may lead to careers in education, government, industry, and social agencies.

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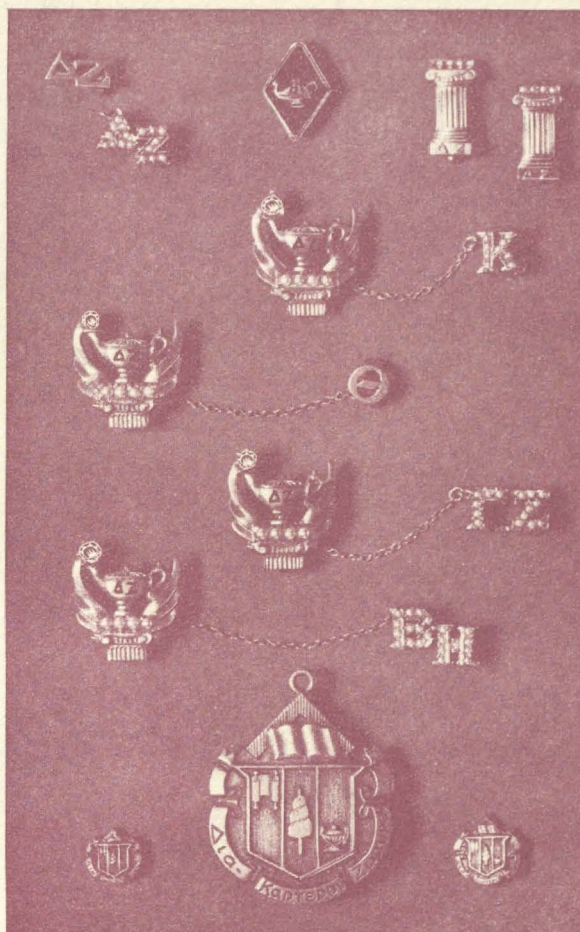
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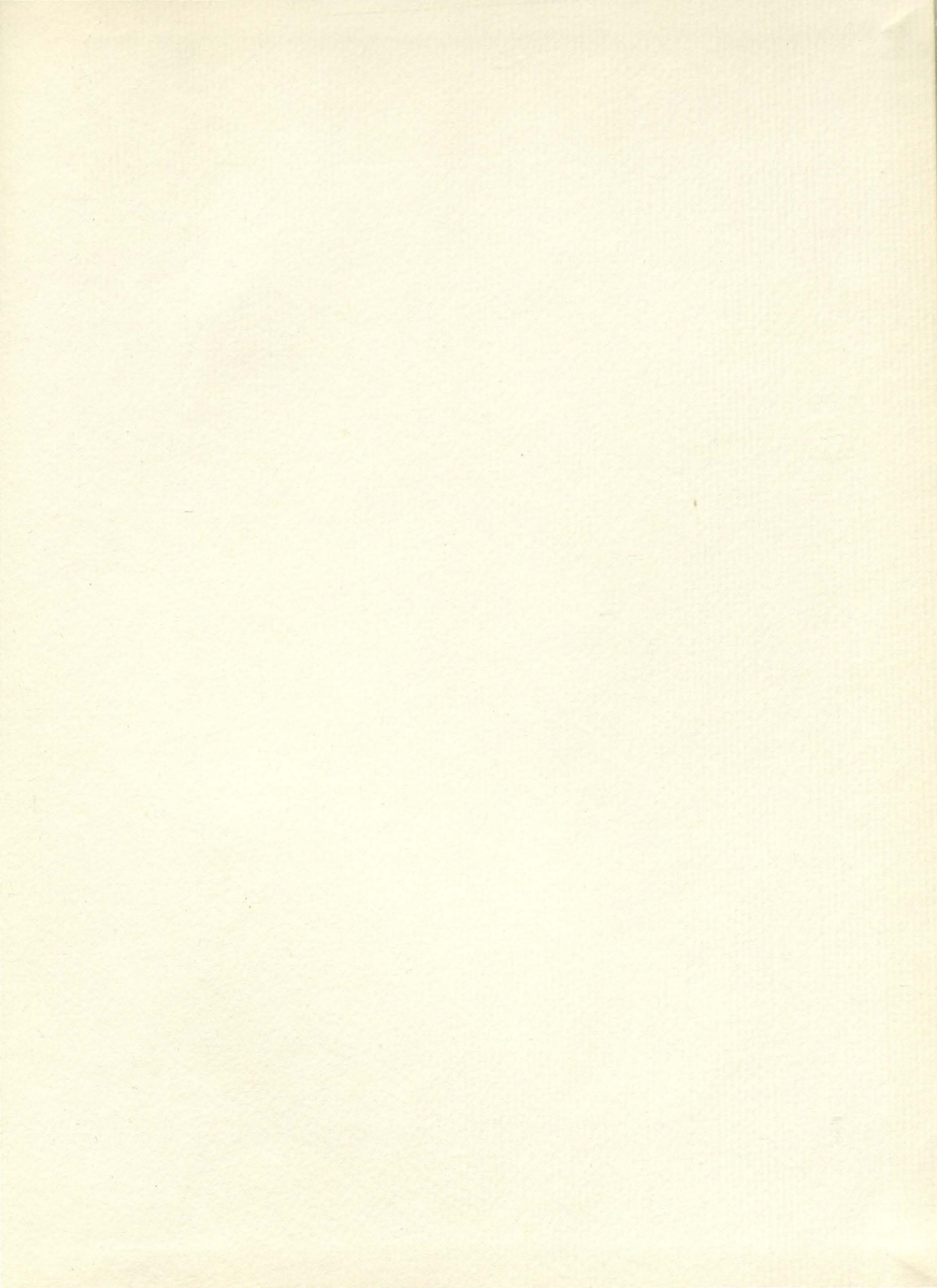
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
