RANCH is a cattle farm—a collection of "wide open spaces" covered with green grass where lean, bowlegged cowboys "ride hard in the saddle" all day and raise sleek, fat cattle for the nation's beef-steak platters. Cattlemen are rough, rugged, and two-fisted. Their wives are lanky and leather-skinned from long hours in the wind and sun.


MARCHING ON WITH DELTA ZETA! Lorie Johnson, Ω , majorette at the University of Oregon, is typical of Delta Zetas country-wide who are marching on with their sorority. Maintaining a 3.31 average, Lorie keeps up with scholastic as well as extra-curricular activities. Maybe fifty years ago this was an accurate description, but now it's no more than a child's television or comic book dream.

Cattlemen like comfort like anyone else. Some of them early saw the future in selling their herds, dressing up their cowhands in fancy boots, embroidered shirts, and tight pants, and opening their range to an invasion of eastern "dudes" who wanted to play cowboy for a while and were willing to pay for the chance.

Although there are still thousands of head of cattle raised, dude ranching has become a fine art. Now, the wife of a prominent Texas attorney has established, of all things, a "finishing ranch"

for sub-debs, a five-week summer course on an Arizona ranch in the art of gracious living.

The prospect of riding herd on fifty or sixty teen-aged girls for five weeks would make the hardiest cowman saddle up and take to the hills. This little Houston lady not only keeps track of them, but turns them into charming, poised, and competent young women.

Mrs. T. Everton Kennerly considers personal charm and beauty mighty important to any girl. She also thinks there's a lot more to developing into a mature and happy woman than knowing how to apply makeup, wear clothes, and select the proper forks.

As her two young daughters, Ann and Mary Marcia, were growing up, Georgia Kennerly spent summer after summer at camps looking for the kind of training she wanted for her girls.... But she never found quite what she wanted. When Mary Marcia, the youngest, was six years old, Georgia Kennerly began to dream about starting a summer school of her own for her daughters and their sub-deb friends.

Five years ago she opened her first season on a cattle and guest ranch in Southern Arizona . . . hired a staff of specialists as instructors, chartered a Pullman train, and brought 32 Texas sub-

debs to Arizona for a five weeks' course none of them will ever forget....

Wherever the location, Mrs. Kennerly's training course is essentially the same—to prepare her young charges to become happy and useful, as well as charming and decorative.

Believing strongly that every girl needs to develop to the fullest extent, all of her talents and abilities, Georgia Kennerly insists upon thorough training in the usual techniques provided in "charm" schools. For such training, she lines up real experts....

For more than an hour every day the girls, under their direction, receive intensive training in details of makeup, care of skin and hair, proper carriage, and high-fashion modeling. . . .

At the end of five weeks, these girls stroll confidently and gracefully before a crowd of guests, displaying the latest fashions at a style show they plan and execute themselves. . . They can be doubly proud, too, since almost every girl wears an outfit which she has made in the sewing class and accessories she has made in the arts and crafts class. These are girls many of whom, two months before, had never so much as threaded a needle.

It is in the emphasis which Mrs. Kennerly places on housekeeping, homemaking, and sewing that her "finishing ranch" follows an unusual course.

"I wasn't trying to start a bride's school," she explains, "but I don't see why our young girls of today should be expected to learn homemaking almost by osmosis. In the old days a girl learned, from her mother, exactly how to run a household. And, personally, I've never thought it was the least bit funny for a bride to produce only burned toast and bad coffee."

... At the Kennerly Ranch it is called "Home Economy" since the courses show the girls short cuts which same them time, energy, and money in the homemaking arts. Regular meals are prepared by a kitchen staff, but the girls plan, cook, and serve all the food for their side trips into the surrounding country.... The girls take care of the niceties that go with eating. Each day two dining room hostesses are appointed. It is their job to set out the dishes, silver, and glasses according to the menu, and they serve the food.

Each of the small tables in the dining room has its own hostess. She sets the tables, generally sees that the meal runs smoothly, starts the food around, watches to see that each girl gets enough, leads the conversation, and gives the signal to rise at the end of the meal. In this daily process the girls learn the art of dining graciously. . . .

One of Georgia Kennerly's chief purposes is to teach consideration of others. She asks the girls to regard themselves as guests while they are at the ranch. She wants them to learn the technique of being a welcome guest, and considers this as important as being a good hostess.

Each day there is a class in the "Art of Gracious Living" which Mrs. Kennerly teaches herself.

"One of a guest's duties," she explains, "is to take care of the property. We always try to leave a place in better condition than when we came."

The girls learn that a good guest accepts the hostess' plans graciously and without complaining. They learn that a good guest is on time to meals. In their "homes," each with its own counselor, the girls learn general housekeeping habits. The heavy work is done by maids.

Georgia Kennerly is trying to get rid of the idea, that, "My parents brought me into the world. I had no choice, therefore I owe them nothing."...

With the beautiful setting of the Oak Creek country outdoor activities take on added zest. As in most summer camps, swimming is a required subject... Tennis is played... and archery in the green woods is like playing Robin Hood. And, of course, any ranch, even a "finishing ranch," without horses is unheard of....

Under brilliant, blue Arizona skies the girls take long rides over the wooded hills which loom on every side of the ranch... and counselors are hard put at times to keep them from racing their horses across the hills under a particularly virulent attack of the "joy of living."

Their enthusiasm and energy is given a chance to explode in dramatics classes which Georgia Kennerly teaches. Mrs. Kennerly is famous in Houston for her dramatic readings.

"I don't feel that I am a professional," she says. "I just love to teach young people." She has been associated with the theater and dramatics groups for many years. Mrs. Kennerly feels that the girls can learn much more than acting in a dramatics class. She says, "You teach life itself when you teach dramatics."

The girls learn to use their ingenuity in preparing and presenting variety shows each Friday night. Each week one cabin or "home" is responsible for the show, and "Ken" Kennerly (T. Everton, Jr.) helps the girls write and prepare their skits. Imagination runs wild! The acts are usually comic take-offs on some popular song, current Broadway show, and frequently exaggerated imitations of the counselors....

In Georgia Kennerly's opinion, taking part in these shows is one of the best ways for her girls to learn self-possession and poise. Mary Marcia Kennerly, now 19, and a sophomore at the University of Texas, teaches ballet, tap, and modern dancing.

When the girls go back to Texas, they know

nearly as much as the local citizens about the area in which they have spent the summer. Side trips to all the points of interest within reasonable distance are a part of the Kennerly curriculum. Before they leave for these trips, one girl is assigned to study available books and brochures and, when they arrive, she is prepared to give the other girls an instructive lecture on the spot. . . .

Religious training at any school is always a ticklish subject, but Mrs. Kennerly, herself a deeply religious woman, instituted non-denominational Vespers Services every evening. She asks the girls themselves to take complete charge of the simple service. Each evening as sunset approaches, every girl hurries to bathe and change into clean, white shirts and shorts for the short outdoor devotions. Not a single sub-deb in the history of the Ranch has ever missed the voluntary service. With their freshly scrubbed faces and wind-blown hair, these young "glamour girls" add a further peak of beauty to the indescribable parade of light and color that is an Arizona sunset. The high point of the season is graduation night. With their introductory training in the delight of being women at an end, the girls present the final style show of the season for guests from nearby towns. Up to this point, the girls are completely unaware that they will receive diplomas which state that they have satisfactorily completed a course of charm and modeling with the purpose "to develop her individuality, enabling her to learn to grow beautiful physically, mentally, and spiritually ... also to inspire her to further develop these potentialities through daily application."

When the girls go home, parents decide that when it comes to turning out delightful, attractive, and competent young ladies, it's a good idea to "let Georgia do it" at her Kennerly Finishing Ranch in Arizona.

Harriett, a senior, is an outstanding chemistry student, having won the title of Chemistry Major of the Year as a junior. She works in bio-chemistry research on synthesis of amino acids. She has served her Delta Zeta chapter as secretary and president of Panhellenic, as representative on the sorority council for two years, chairman of Homecoming Float two years, and the debate team.

Her campus activities include, program chairman for freshman class carnival, Alpha Lambda Delta (freshman honorary), WFSU (radio station), program chairman for Disciples of Christ Fellowship, Inter-Faith Week Committee, sophomore council, secretary and president of Student Affiliates of American Chemistry Society, Garnet Key (campus honorary for loyalty, service and spirit), Mortified (honorary), and publicity chairman for Dad's Day. She has maintained an all college scholastic average of B+.

Mrs. Robert Beach, Director of Alumnæ for Region One came to East Tennessee State College on November 12, 1955, and after meeting with the alumnæ of the Tri-Cities area arranged for the first pledging on November 13. Fifteen excited girls were pledged, including the two faculty sponsors, Ann Garland and Jana Jones.

Following the pledge ceremony, which was conducted by Mrs. Beach, Mrs. Mary Charlton, Linda Marstall, both of whom are members of the Knoxville alumnæ chapter, and Mrs. Winnie McMahon, Miss Joelle Rush, Mrs. Julie Sivert, Mrs. Mary Hatfield, Miss Patsy Smith, Mrs. Margaret Murray and Miss Mary Virginia Combs, all alumnæ of the Tri-Cities chapter, a tea was given for the new pledges at which time rose corsages were presented to each of them.

A few of the campus honors held by the Delta Zetas are Savanna Clinton, Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities; Mary Ellen Stallard, ROTC Sponsor; and Louise Weickel, Cheerleader.

Delta Pi Delta Sorority was organized on the East Tennessee State College campus in 1950. The primary aim of this group was to promote leadership, friendship and co-operation among its members. The colors were red and white, with the flower being the red rose.

Delta Pi Delta's first rush party which used a ranch theme was such a success that the Dude Ranch Party became a traditional social for the next few years. Besides having assembly programs and assisting in many other campus activities, the Delta Pi Deltas were in charge of the information booth at Homecoming for several years. The house party was an annual affair and was always looked forward to with much eagerness. The Sweetheart Dance was another social function in addition to the sorority's assisting in the annual Panhellenic Christmas Dance.

Historical Sketch of East Tennessee State College

MONG the places competing for the location of the East Tennessee State Normal School were Johnson City, Sweetwater, Athens and Dayton. After visiting the various competing localities and considering the advantages and disadvantages of each, the State decided in favor of Washington County and chose as the site of the school a tract of a hundred and twenty acres on the southwestern outskirts of Johnson City and within easy view of a lofty chain of picturesque mountains a few miles distant. This location of the school was the generous donation of a distinguished citizen of Johnson City, George L. Carter.


With the donations from Washington County and Johnson City the plant was built and the school was opened to students October 2, 1911. In February 1943, the General Assembly changed the name to the East Tennessee State College. On November 11, 1949, the authorization from the Board of Education to grant a Master of Arts degree to the college was approved; and in 1951 the granting of Bachelor of Arts degree was approved.

The two fundamental responsibilities in service to the State as an institution are: (1) Preparing teachers for the public schools of the State; (2) Giving general, pre-professional, and vocational education on a college level to those students who should not, or do not wish to enter teaching.

The East Tennessee State College is located on 177 acres of land within the corporate limits of Johnson City. The school has an elevation of 1,700 feet above sea level. Some of the highest mountains in the whole Appalachian system can be seen from the school grounds. Above the campus rise the heights of Buffalo and Cherokee. The peaks of Holston, seen from the front of the Administration Building, make a picture of wonderful beauty, and in the distance towers the Roan, rising to a height of 6,394 feet.

The beautifully landscaped campus consists of seventeen brick buildings in addition to the Administration Building. These include the various dormitories for the men and women; the ROTC and Music Building; the Industrial Arts Building; the Fine Arts Building; the Health and Physical Education Building which contains a gymnasium with seating capacity for 5,000 and a swimming pool; the English Building; the Science Building; the Cafeteria, the Home Management House, where girls majoring in Home Economics life for at least one quarter under practical home conditions; the Training School, which provides for six elementary grades, junior high school and senior high school; and the Charles C. Sherrod Library which contains 50,000 bound volumes, a museum, reading and work rooms and a Little Theatre for dramatics. Also there is the ever popular Grill which is used only for social purposes. Outdoor entertainment is well taken care of by a beautiful amphitheatre which is styled after Greek architecture: the stadium, which has ample seating space and all necessary equipment: and the ten tennis courts which are used for instructional as well as recreational purposes. There is an established and growing fund for the building of a chapel.

There is a very friendly atmosphere among the students and faculty at East Tennessee State College. There are fifty-two different organizations which offer activities of interest to the students. There are denominational groups, drama clubs, athletic clubs, sororities and fraternities, music organizations and clubs which function for educational and vocational purposes.

Founded as a junior college in 1927 the University of Houston was expanded in 1934, to meet the needs of a thriving Gulf Coast area, to include a four-year program. Since its first year as a four-year school, the university has seen its enrollment increase nearly ten-fold.

At present the University of Houston has an enrollment of 14,000 students, representing nearly every county in the world. It is the second largest educational institution in the Southwest.

There are 17 permanent buildings located on the main campus. Architecture is a blend of modern, stylized and classical types featuring the sand-colored Texas limestone. Newer buildings are constructed of blending brick, steel and glass materials.

Four air-conditioned dormitories cluster around Oberholtzer Hall, a combined guest house and recreation center housing two large cafeterias and a snack bar.

The university is composed of a junior college division, a graduate division, a school of architecture, a downtown school and nine colleges: arts and sciences, business administration, education, engineering, law, nursing, optometry, pharmacy and technology.

Other sororities installed on the University of Houston campus are Chi Omega, Delta Gamma, Alpha Delta Pi, Phi Mu, Alpha Chi Omega, Zeta Tau Alpha, and Alpha Phi. National fraternities on campus include Phi Sigma Kappa, Sigma Phi Epsilon, Phi Epsilon Pi, Sigma Alpha Epsilon, Delta Chi, Kappa Alpha Order, Phi Kappa, Pi Kappa Alpha, Lambda Chi Alpha and Pi Kappa Phi.

Indiana University Announces Graduate Internships in Student Personnel

The internships offer an opportunity for professional experience in guidance under the direction of a staff trained in the personnel field. Graduate study may be pursued with a major in Personnel and Guidance, or in Education, Psychology, Recreation, Sociology, and other fields.

Stipends which cover room, board, and basic fees are granted for a half-time appointment in the Women's Residence Halls. In addition to the personnel responsibilities in the halls, the Counselors carry a part-time academic program limited to a maximum of 10 hours each semester. The Master's degree may be completed under this plan in four semesters, either with or without a thesis. During one semester of the second year, Counselors may gain further experience by supervised employment in University offices dealing with student personnel administration. The training and experience received in this combined program of work and study in personnel may lead to careers in education, government, industry, and social agencies.



The Pride of Beta Gamma

B ETA GAMMA Delta Zetas at the University of Louisville are bursting with pride over the accomplishments of two of their graduating seniors. Temple Hill and Tinker Everhart have not only brought honor to their chapter, but have gained state-wide recognition for themselves and Delta Zeta.

Since last spring, Temple has led all Kentucky chapters of the Future Teachers of America as state president. Her election to this post was preceded by a year as state treasurer and as president of the U of L chapter. She had also been historian and publicity chairman.

This summer Temple spent a busy two weeks, representing Kentucky at three successive conferences in DeKalb and Chicago, Illinois: the National Association of F.T.A.'s Leadership Conference, the National Commission on Teacher Education and Professional Standards, and the National Education Association Conference. In November, she was the representative to the Regional Classroom Teachers Conference in Asheville, North Carolina.

Though her major is elementary education, she has not confined her activities to this field alone. She pledged Delta Zeta her freshman semester, was vice-president of her pledge class and received the scholarship award. This was to be expected from the girl who graduated from high school with second honors in a class of 135 and received the highly prized math award.

As an initiate, Temple served as house manager, parliamentarian, publicity chairman, and treasurer. Throughout her college career, she has contributed to the campus weekly, *The Cardinal*, as a reporter. In December, she received the *Cardinal* "Salute," a weekly feature which pays tribute to the outstanding seniors in the various colleges of the University.

In the spring of 1954, she received a singular honor; election to the post of Women's League president. The Women's League is a campus organization composed of *all* women students in all ten colleges of the University. As president, she was also director of the most successful "Career's Day" (an annual event for freshmen) ever held at U of L.

Temple is also well known throughout the state through her work in the Rainbow Girls, a fraternal organization for teen-age girls. In addition to holding the highest offices in her local group, she held state officerships for four years. She is now on the state advisory board.

In addition to her many scholastic and extracurricular activities, Temple finds time to serve as assistant to the secretary to the Dean of Women. In her little spare time, she plays the piano and follows her hobby, photography.

One of the brightest personalities on the U of L campus is Beta Gamma's "Tinker" Everhart. Christened as Iola Margaret, she has so completely squelched the use of her given name that when she received the *Cardinal* "Salute" in October, it said simply, "The Cardinal Salutes "Tinker."

Her college career started with a bang, when, in her freshman semester, she became a charter member of the AFROTC Sponsors' Corps. She was elected Queen of the Military Ball, and her fellow sponsors selected her as their first president, bearing with it the rank of full colonel.

Tinker has been a loyal Delta Zeta, also, serving as culture chairman, recording secretary, and vice president. She has been "mother" to a large family, having had five little pledge sisters. She is also a member of the Barbershop Quartet.

Work with the University Players occupied much of her time last year. In addition to minor roles, she played the lead in "Mother Was A Freshman." Her nimble fingers and home economics major made her a natural for wardrobe mistress of all the productions. She received statewide publicity when her picture appeared in the *Courier-Journal*, in costume advertising a "flapper-era" play. She also played feature roles in the Louisville Little Theatre presentations of "Harlequinade" and the "Browning Version."

Her sense of the dramatic produced another front-page picture last year when Tinker, sitting demurely in the midst of a large papier-mache oyster shell, received first prize at the Louisville Beaux Arts Charity Ball—her title, "Oyster on the half shell," of course.

Tinker has contributed a great deal to the *Cardinal*. A year of reporting and proofreading led to her appointment as office manager for two years.

Much of her time she spends in the U of L Alumni Office, as assistant to the Alumni Director.

Her third job probably accounts for at least some of her popularity. As campus representative for Liggett and Myers, she is the frequent donor of sample packages of Chesterfields and L&Ms. This, plus her sparkling, effervescent personality, has endeared her to the whole campus.

An honor student, Tinker has been elected to Pi Delta Epsilon, journalism honorary, and Mortar Board. In her free minutes, she may be found in the Snack Bar, teaching freshmen the finer points of bridge, her hobby.

ALUMNÆ

The responsibility for successful pledging in all of our chapters rests directly upon our alumnæ. The very basis of our recommendations system is alumnæ support.

- 1. Use recommendation forms from this handbook. Secure additional copies from State Chairman or National Headquarters.
- 2. Send voluntary recommendations to chapter rush chairman as soon as possible. Some chapters rush early in September. Summer mail is often delayed.
- 3. Reply promptly to chapter requests for recommendations. This is of utmost importance to the success of a recommendations system. Notify the chapter if you are unable to supply a recommendation.
- 4. Give immediate attention to requests for recommendations from your Alumnæ Chapter.

COLLEGE CHAPTERS

Every girl invited to membership in Delta Zeta MUST have a recommendation signed by an alumna member. Every girl residing in a town where there is an alumnæ chapter of Delta Zeta must be approved by that alumnæ chapter.

The Rush Chairman or Rush Adviser should contact directly:

- 1. The president of the alumnæ chapter of the area from which a recommendation is desired. The alumnæ president is responsible for directing the request to the alumnæ chapter recommendations chairman.
- 2. The State Chairman for information from a locality where no regular alumnæ chapter exists.
- 3. The National Recommendations Chairman for particular problems or in the event of no response to recommendation requests.

NOTICE:

Advise of maximum time allowed for response to recommendation request. Requests for recommendations will not be acknowledged unless accompanied by complete information as to name and address of rushee, name of parent and previous school attended.

Allow time for solicited recommendations to be correctly processed. Last minute emergencies are costly and often times inconsiderate.

To what degree does the program lead?

The Master of Arts degree. This program may be taken in either Psychology or Education, and may be continued as part of a Ph.D. program. Applications from students in related fields will be considered.

For what types of positions does this program in Student Personnel prepare?

Deans of Women, Counselors of Women, Directors of Residences, Directors of Social Programs.

What is the length of time required?

Ordinarily this will be a two-year program. The minimal requirement for the Master of Arts Degree is forty-five quarter hours. First year students may carry 12 hours of course work each quarter with 15 hours of work in the residence halls; second year students may carry 10 hours of course work with 25 hours of service to the halls.

What does the Residency offer?

First year students will receive a total remuneration equivalent to \$1200 for 3 quarters, but will not receive remittance of fees. This remuneration will consist of room and board for 3 quarters valued at \$705, and a stipend of \$55 per month for 9 months, totaling a cash payment of \$495. The second year student will receive a total remuneration equivalent to \$1785 for 3 quarters. This will consist of \$705 for room and board for 3 quarters and \$120 per month stipend for 9 months.

What are the responsibilities of the Graduate Resident?

She does individual counseling, works with the program in women's residences, with student government and with student activities.

What courses are included in the program?

Among the offerings in Psychology and Education the following are required: University Personnel Psychology Psychology of Counseling Laboratory in Educational Counseling Problems of the Dean of Women Laboratory in Psychology of Campus Group Activities Problems in Higher Education Theories and Curricula of Higher Education




