Dedication of Gallaudet Library

HE NUMBER "TEN" alone, or with zeroes added, seemed to be the key number that led to the building and dedication of the Edward Miner Gallaudet Library on February 5, 1957. One hundred years ago a school for the deaf was established by Amos Kendall at Kendall Green. The first instructor appointed to head the institution was Edward Miner Gallaudet. A few years later, in 1864, the college was established by a proclamation signed by Abraham Lincoln.

Information about the college library dates back to 1876, when it was housed in a room 17 x 48 feet on the second floor of the men's dormitory. The library could only be open to the women until 4 o'clock as men had to pass the open door of the library on the way to the showers. In 1947, an enterprising Library Science class started looking for new quarters for the library. They began by measuring every possible building on campus, despite the fact that all were being used to capacity. The students weren't to be daunted, and in 1949, the library was moved to a suite of five rooms located on the first floor of the men's dormitory. Two more rooms were added on in 1952 for a reference collection and the second, in 1954 for a classroom. This was the absolute end of available space.

With the needs for a new library very apparent, the alumni lent a helping hand. The Building Fund set up as a memorial to Edward Miner Gallaudet was diverted to the library. Here we meet up with our figure ten again. The Alumni Building Fund gave \$100,000 towards the library and the Agnes Meyer Foundation added \$10,000. Congress appropriated the additional money necessary for building. No money was available for furnishing the library. When the library was being built. Delta Zeta met this need. The National Council of Delta Zeta announced a \$10,000 drive for furnishings for the library. Our contribution furnished the main reading room with tables, chairs, lounge furniture, and other library furnishings. The colors used are a light green and soft rose, which make a pleasing background for the blond furniture and stacks. There is no need to say that we may feel proud of the part we played in furnishing

Delta Zeta was represented at the dedication on February 5, the birthday of Edward Miner Gallaudet, by Mrs. Wilbur Stout, National Director of Philanthropies; Mrs. Charles Bednar, Director of Public Relations; Mrs. Leland B. May, Chairman of Gallaudet Committee; and members of the Washington Alumnæ Chapter. Dr. Leonard Elstad, president, in his presentation of distinguished guests, presented Mrs. Stout, Mrs. Bednar, and Mrs. May, and was extremely generous in his tribute to Delta Zeta for our efforts for Gallaudet.

Gallaudet College falls under the jurisdiction of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. Because of this it was fitting for Mr. Bradshaw Mintener, former assistant secretary of this Department, to give the dedication address. Mr. Mintener said that the "new library is a symbol of strongly renewed interest on the part of the American people in the future of Gallaudet College." He also said that "a student's progress can be marked by his familiarity with his books and the facility with which he makes use of his library." These students will make good use of this library because they have watched it grow and develop. Their faces, as well as their hands and lips, expressed their gratitude.

As Mintener and other speakers addressed the crowd in the main reading room of the library, their words were repeated by the nimble fingers and hands of interpreters for the benefit of the deaf students and alumni present. When members of the alumni took the podium the thoughts expressed in their hands were put into words by the same interpreters.

Mr. Mintener, as well as President Elstad, felt that the library was the beginning of a new era for Gallaudet. It is the first building of a nine million dollar building program for the world's only college for the deaf. This program includes a women's residence hall, which is now being constructed, a speech and hearing center, classroom and science buildings, men's residence, cafeteria, auditorium, and classrooms, and also dormitories for Kendall School, which is the elementary school. This program will double the capacity of the college so that between 500 to 700 students will be able to attend.

Greetings were given by alumni and representatives in the fields of education for the deaf. Miss Marion Michele Gallaudet, greatgranddaughter of the founder, represented the Gallaudet family, and said that she knew her great-grandfather would be "extremely proud" of the new library. Last but not least was a greeting from Lucille Hunt Pendell, Librarian, and a Delta Zeta. Mrs. Pendell was the first full time librarian at Gallaudet. In Lucille's

"ten" years at Gallaudet, she has seen the library grow from one room to five, to seven, and now to a beautiful new building to be used exclusively as a library. It was with warmth and a great deal of pride that Lucille invited us all to see the library which she calls, "The most beautiful library in the World!" This means you, Delta Zetas.

The Buff and Blue, newspaper of Gallaudet College, devoted most of its February-March issue to the new library and the dedication program. A double-page spread was used to display many pictures of the library and its special features. Of interest to Delta Zetas is the description of the main reading room which appeared in the newspaper.

"The main reading room and mezzanine of the library have the same attractive pale green walls, white ceilings, and tiled floors. The blonde birch furniture blends in well with this color scheme. Approximately twenty tables, six dictionary stands, an atlas case, a newspaper rack, and a sofa and armchairs in which to read the newspapers in comfort, were bought with \$10,000 which the Delta Zeta National Sorority donated to the library. Other furnishings include forty-two individual study desks, and sixty-four chairs. The fifty-one bookcases in this part of the library have a capacity of fifty thousand books, but at present hold only between twenty-

five and thirty thousand, with more to be purchased in the future. All magazines are located in the main floor bookcases at the north end, while at the south end are the offices of the librarians and a place where newspapers may be read.

"The reading room and mezzanine, which seat 150 students comfortably, are extremely welllighted, since fluorescent lights are above almost every row of desks and tables. This makes studying easier and gives the room a cheerful air.

"There is a display area in the reading room near the entrance. Bookcovers of the newest books and other materials are shown here. A gift set of the world's great books is shelved nearby, together with a set of the 'Harvard Classics.'

"The library reading room is a pleasant place, popular among the students, especially when hot weather descends upon Washington, because the insulated structure of the building and the many windows keep it cool."

In addition to the main reading room and librarians' offices, the building includes the Edward Miner Gallaudet Room where the board of directors meets and an important collection of books concerning the deaf is housed, visual aids room, staff lounge, storage room, vault for rare books and college archives, bindery, and the Alumni Room, used as a lounge for faculty and students and a meeting place for alumni, and the children's library.

ELTA ZETA initiated and installed its 119th chapter, Delta Nu, March 23 and 24 on the Parsons College campus in Fairfield, Iowa. This marked the beginning of national sororities on the campus. Delta Nu replaced the former Empyrean local sorority which had been on campus since 1903. Fairfield is in the southeast section of the tall corn state. Amid rich farmland, Fairfield houses several branches of large industries, among them, the Philco plant and Lowden company.

Saturday morning Mrs. Russell T. Costello, national president, Miss Irene Boughton, national executive secretary, Mrs. George C. Havens, college chapter administrator, and Iota chapter from the State University of Iowa met with the Parsons pledges at the First Methodist church for formal initiation. After the ceremonies were over one sparklingeyed Parsonite said, "I never expected Delta Zeta to be so wonderful. It is worth all the tribula-

Gamma Kappa Aids Kent Schools

OR its philanthropy project of 1956-57, Gamma Kappa chapter, Kent State University, participated in the Hearing Conservation Program of the city of Kent, Ohio. This program involved testing the hearing of the children in the Kent Public Schools.

Before starting this project, the chapter attended a class of instruction given by a speech and hearing therapist. The testing procedure was explained and the girls were familiarized with the operation of the pure-tone audiometer, the machine used in the testing.

This project took about one and one-half months to complete, as the girls worked two days a week in testing. Our collegiate chapter tested three schools in Kent, consisting of grades 3, 4, 6 and 7; 21 grades in all. After the first testing, it was necessary to retest those who showed negative results on the first test. When all was finished, a total of 563 children had been tested!

The work done was valuable in aiding the Hearing Conservation program for Kent's future citizens, but the chapter also benefited. The girls felt that the giving of time and effort for something such as this had its own intangible rewards in the growth of bonds of sisterhood.

Missouri Valley's First Fulbrighter



GAMMA GAMMA'S VALERIE BECKER is the first Fulbright scholar from Missouri Valley College. She will study in France.

Valerie Becker, president of Gamma Gamma Chapter, Missouri Valley College, and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin S. Becker of Macomb, Illinois, will soon be packing her trunks and sailing for France because of the Fulbright scholarship which she has been awarded for graduate study next year.

She is scheduled to arrive in Paris on October 2 for a threeweek orientation course

given by the State Department to Fulbright scholars. Then she will go to Besançon, about thirty-five miles from the Swiss border in southeastern France, to study French literature and history at the university. Valerie plans to teach French, Spanish and other romance languages in future years.

Selection for the award is based on scholarship, character and suitability for the Fulbright program which entails meeting and mingling with French people. The scholarship will pay all expenses including travel, tuition and living allowance as well as incidentals during her year of graduate study. She plans to travel through other European countries during vacation periods from the university.

Valerie has very ably led Gamma Gamma chapter this year as our president. In the past she has been both treasurer and secretary of our chapter and did a fine job in these offices, too. Not only has Valerie been very active in sorority affairs, but we are also extremely proud of her many other accomplishments. Her grade average for her four years of college is 2.8 out of

a possible 3.0 and she has been on the dean's list continuously since she entered college. She graduated this June summa cum laude. Last year she received the college's distinguished scholarship award given to the four students in the college with the highest grade average for the previous year. She has had an honor scholarship and a music scholarship all four years. She is a charter member of Cap and Gown at Missouri Valley College and is president of Beta Gamma Phi, our equivalent of Phi Beta Kappa.

This past year Valerie has also been president of Valley Players Dramatic Society and Alpha Psi Omega, national honorary dramatics fraternity. She is secretary-treasurer of Panhellenic council, secretary of Student Christian Association, and secretary-treasurer of Future Teachers of America. As a high school student, Berit attended class six days a week and took six classes each day. Five years of study were required before graduation.

Berit comments, "It's really quite easy to be a foreign student at C.M.S.C. The Delta Zetas certainly have not treated me like a foreigner."

Berit became an active Delta Zeta March 17, 1957, and has proved to be one of our most industrious members. Epsilon Gamma girls feel fortunate to have her in the group and take pride in her high scholastic average and the place she has won on the campus.

The Gertrude Hosey Memorial Scholarship is awarded every other year to an outstanding foreign student. Miss Marita Gama of Brazil was the last student to receive this scholarship.


