The evening was closed with a most impressive song fest and rose ceremony ably performed by members of Sigma Chapter who also were the initiation team on Saturday morning.



HOME OF THE COWBOYS

Once named "Cow College" because of the livestock roaming its then barren acres, today McNeese State College of Louisiana ranks high academically. It was founded in 1939 as a two-year college, achieved four-year status in 1950, and in 1954 was admitted to the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, top accrediting agency in the South. Its enrollment has grown from 154 to more than 2,000, and its rapidly expanding facilities include such recent additions as three ultra-modern dormitories and a student center known as "The Ranch," a Reserve Officers Training Corps which is among the foremost in the country, a 280-acre agricultural training farm, and a new \$850,000 science building. Cal DZ Is Congressional Fellow

DELTA ZETA has been one of the 15 Congressional Fellows learning about this country's legislative process by participating in it this year.

For six months in Washington, D.C., Mu chapter's Betty Wentworth, a member of the University of California's class of 1946, has been one of two women in the group of political scientists and journalists chosen by the American Political Science Association for the fifth year of its Congressional Fellowship program.

Betty—who signed her Cal finals bluebook as Mary Elizabeth Wentworth and will be signing her name in years to come as Mrs. James R. Trotter—divided her working time in Washington between the office of Congresswoman Leonor K. Sullivan of St. Louis and that of Mrs. Katie Louchheim, vice chairman of the Democratic National Committee and its director of women's activities.

Her years as women's editor of The Ventura County Star-Free Press stirred Betty's interest in women in politics and made her want to know why women haven't played a larger, more responsible role in politics and government. Winning a Congressional Fellowship in a nationwide process of selection, she spent nearly three months on Congresswoman Sullivan's staff, where she was working with one of the 15 women who by their election to the House of Representatives have taken on one of the most responsible roles politics has to offer. Lending a hand with news releases, legislative research and constituent problems, watching her Congresswoman in action in committee and on the floor and talking over ideas and problems with her, Betty was impressed by just how large a woman's job can be in government.

Says she, "A Congresswoman not only handles all the normal House members' responsibilities—both to her district and to the country—but, if she wants to, she can perform a real service by developing issues, such as the need for better laws to protect American families from unsafe foods, that really hit close to home for most of us women."

Moving to the Democratic National Committee office late in March, Betty helped to prepare for a national conference of Democratic women and thus saw another aspect of politics, as national party leaders sought to interest more women in taking active part in political affairs.

Before starting these assignments, Betty spent a month in orientation sessions. She and the others in the Fellowship group met with key capital figures, collecting their views on Congress. Similar discussion sessions with Congressional leaders and others important on the Washington scene continued throughout the Fellows' months of active participation in office work.

Another kind of orientation kept Betty busy after office hours. She was practicing up on her domestic skills in preparation for her marriage to James R. Trotter, a Northwestern graduate and like his bride a veteran traveler to foreign parts, who is now a petroleum geologist in the Ventura area.

In Ventura County, Betty is past president of the Ventura County Panhellenic Association, the Ventura Business and Professional Women's Club and the Ojai Valley Junior Women's Club. Last

A charter member and past president of Delta Delta Chapter, Carolyn proudly points out that two of the seven May Queen finalists were Delta Zetas. Asked for information about herself for this story, Carolyn obliged with news of outstanding doings by all the other DZs at Georgia State (read about these in Delta Zetas on Campus) and explained, "When I begin talking or writing about our sorority it is difficult to stop."

She has also served DZ as publicity chairman, charm chairman (a "natural"!), first vice president and convention delegate. She was on the Homecoming and Mardi Gras Courts, and is being sponsored for National Rose of Pi Kappa Phi by the Georgia State chapter of the fraternity.

too. The year 1958 marks the 38th year that Upsilon has been nationally affiliated with Delta Zeta and the 41st birthday of the chapter on

UND campus.

The "original thirteen" Upsilon sorority sisters met on December 16, 1916. Three years after that first meeting the chapter received a telegram which carried the members to the heights of excitement and bliss. It read that the petition for membership with Delta Zeta had been granted and that Alpha Sigma Epsilon would be able to go national. Membership has grown tremendously until today the Upsilon chapter of Delta Zeta means home and friendship to 60 girls. Celebrities initiated into this chapter include Margot de Brynn Kyss, a famous dress-designer, and the late Princess Marthe of Norway.

Outstanding campus co-eds from the DZ house on UND campus are Louise Johnson, an accomplished harp player and a member of national Sigma Alpha Iota; Karen Olson, Sweetheart of Sigma Chi and past secretary of Panhellenic Council; Evelyn Berglund, a talented actress who has leads in many of the Dakota Playmaker productions; Maxine Allen, finalist for 1957 Homecoming Oueen; and Shirley Gillgard, Engineers

Queen for 1957.

This fall we are planning to redecorate the DZ house at its present location on 2724 University Avenue.

Growth and progress have marked the 75 years

of the University story.

Founders' Day ceremonies in mid-February launched the observance, with Eric Sevareid, noted newsman, giving the main address. A few days earlier the gift of a million dollars to the University for a library building was announced. Donor was Chester Fritz, international financier and former UND student. Dr. George W. Starcher, University president, called the gift "the diamond setting" in the Anniversary Year.

In the span of years from 1883 to 1958 the University has grown from a one-building institution to a great educational plant. Approximately 4,000 students now study at the Univer-

sity during a year.

It was back in the years following the Battle of the Little Big Horn—and before North Da-

kota became a state—that Dakota pioneers, with foresight and faith in the future paused amid breaking the prairie sod to plan for higher education. The official date of the University's founding is February 27, 1883, when the Territorial Governor signed the organic act into Law.

The act gives the University claim to a couple of "firsts." The name, University of North Dakota, constitutes the first official use of the words "North Dakota." And the University is the first state institution—educational or otherwise.

Four faculty members met the 11 students who entered the University on the opening day, Sep-

tember 8, 1884.

Today the University consists of 10 academic divisions: University College; College of Science, Literature and Arts: College of Education; College of Engineering; School of Law; School of Medicine; Division of Nursing; College of Bus-









IRIAM MASON SWAIN'S distinguished career in children's literature has brought her much recognition:

A school in Noblesville, Indiana, dedicated a room to her; an Illinois school which she visited met her at the train with a host of children, a big welcome arch and all the trimmings; her own town, Batesville, Indiana, had a special Miriam Mason Swain Day, and last fall the library starred her in a "This Is Your Life" series on women of note; every year she is invited to attend children's literature conferences and to visit more towns and schools than she can possibly schedule; her works have been chosen for anthologies and translated into foreign editions.

But her richest reward is probably the hundreds of letters from "small fry" who take pen or pencil in hand to scrawl a note of thanks and admiration for the lady who has given them so many delightful hours within the world of books.

Or the comment of one librarian: "Miriam's books are among those which never stay on the shelves and are simply loved to shreds."

Lively personalities, delightful humor and realistic backgrounds contribute to this popularity, but the basic distinction was best described by Delta Zeta's beloved Grace Mason Lundy, who as a teacher—and the author's sister—reads and uses children's books with avidity. She says, "They illustrate a truth which makers of primers and readers were sadly slow in recognizing; namely, that a controlled word list doesn't necessarily have to permit only mediocre reading. Miriam's books are for the child who is just beginning to read for himself, but they don't sound like 'easy'—in other words, 'dull' stuff. Simple words can carry an absorbing story."

Among her most popular works for very young readers are a cat story, "Matilda and Her Family," and a dog story, "Timothy Has Ideas," both on the Macmillan list. Children of the fourth and fifth grades have especially enjoyed two stories of early Indiana, "Smiling Hill Farm" and "A House for Ten," and one now out of print but based on her own grandmother's childhood in Ohio, "O, Happy Day." Her books for the Bobbs-Merrill Childhood of Famous Americans series include stories of Mark Twain, William Penn, John James Audubon, and Mary Mapes Dodge, author of "Hans Brinker."

As these subjects suggest, her books have values which older critics especially appreciate—the good pictures of family life; of stress on the real values of living; of growth in the personal traits of courage, humor, dependability, love of animals and nature (her first author's check was for a story about a mule), helpfulness, making your own good times, participating rather than just watching the world go by.

It is most unusual for an author to have two books in one season with two different publishers and almost the same name for the heroine, but that was the case last fall when Macmillan brought out "Katie Kittenheart" and Bobbs-Merrill published "Kate Douglas Wiggin, The Little Teacher."

"It just turned out that way," she says, "but I've always loved the name Katherine, Kathleen or just Katie." By dint of weeping all day she managed to get her youngest sister's name changed from Margaret to Kathleen, and her only daughter and her older granddaughter are also named Kathleen.

"Kate Douglas Wiggin" is her second biog-

raphy of the well-loved teacher and story teller who wrote "Rebecca of Sunnybrook Farm." The first was a teen-age book from Houghton Mifflin, named "Yours with Love, Kate." The new one is for little girls, with emphasis upon the child-hood which led this woman to grow into the zestful, generous achieving person she became. Miss Mason did an enormous amount of reading and study in preparing the books and believes "The Little Teacher" born 101 years ago would have loved life today, with its TV appearances and swift transcontinental flights.

"I think, too, she would have made a wonderful Delta Zeta, for she had the gift of friendship and the genius of participation and the power of both gaining from and giving to any organiza-

tion of which she was a part.

"'Katie Kittenheart' is very close to my own heart, for the replica of the young heroine is my granddaughter, Kathy. Katie's traits are those of Kathy; her love and admiration and imitation of certain teachers; her propensity for selecting the smallest, ugliest, skinniest and most fleabitten of the litter when she was allowed to have a kitten."

The jacket and pictures for "Katie Kittenheart" are also drawn from photographs of the

Kathy who inspired the book.

"A Small Farm for Andy," due from Macmillan this summer, is similarly inspired by her grandson, Andy, and will be illustrated from his photographs. This summer she will also have a biography of John Smith from Houghton Mifflin, and three more of her books have gone into foreign editions this season: "Little Jonathan," a pioneer boy's story, in German; "Freddy," an "impossible" but "possibly probable" story of a rabbit, published in Sweden; and "William Penn," translated for use in Japanese schools.

Miss Mason spent her early years on an Indiana farm with her five sisters and a brother who, drawn together by the isolation, worked out their own entertainment by reading, writing and acting out plays, and planning and giving musical concerts. She progressed from a one-room school house to Indiana University, where she was a member of Epsilon of Delta Zeta, and then to Ball State Teachers College and Missouri University. She was a rural school teacher, copy writer for an urban department store and editorial reader for children's texts for a Chicago publisher before the birth of her daughter, when she decided to follow her desire to write.

Her book, "You Can Write a Poem," was the subject of a television program on poetry in Champaign, Illinois, where she shared a panel with Dr. Louise Dunbar of the University of Illinois and Miss Ruth Van Deventer of the Urbana-Champaign Pen Women. This book originally written for use by the Hospitalized Veterans' Writing Project of Theta Sigma Phi, has been widely used throughout the country and received much praise for its clearness and helpfulness.

She also addressed the Illinois State Pen Women in a program which included the outstanding Delta Zeta Chorus of Eastern Illinois University.

One of Gail's poems, used on the program of the national convention of Theta Sigma Phi in Chicago last year, has been incorporated into the initiation ceremony for new members. Adela Rogers St. John, speaker at the banquet, paid tribute to the poem and quoted it in her address.

"Pictionary" Helps Teach Deaf Children

PARKED by a social services chairman who is herself a teacher of the deaf, Oakland, Michigan, Delta Zetas have spent countless hours preparing a "pictionary" now being used in special classes for deaf children. Thirty-five members of the Oakland, Alumnæ, Group Two, participated in the project, which was reported by The Daily Tribune of Royal Oak, Michigan:

The "pictionary" is a card index file with illustrations of more than 1,000 words in the basic vocabulary taught in the first through fourth

grades.

"The most time-consuming job that a teacher of the deaf encounters is the endless searching, cutting out and filing of pictures—one of the most helpful mediums in teaching communications to the deaf child," says Mary Stack, who suggested the project. With 14 years of teaching the deaf behind her, she is employed by the Birmingham Board of education as a special education teacher.

Members of the Oakland group, working on a second pictionary, found it comparatively easy to find suitable pictures for most nouns. It was the verbs and adverbs that proved difficult. Such abstract words as "yesterday" and "today" seemed impossible.

The "pictionary" has proved useful "not only in developing both a written and spoken language for children deprived of normal vocabulary and speech patterns but for special speech cases and the mentally retarded," said Miss Stack.

Miss Stack, who taught a summer preschool class for deaf pre-school children last summer in the North Shore area of Chicago, is convinced that deaf children can read and write at five or six years (like a normal child), with special training.

Co-chairmen with her on the project were Mrs. William A. Newman and Mrs. Harold Van

Two Heads are Better Than One


