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

To an almost ideal degree, Julia Bishop Coleman's life could stand as an exemplification of the American way of life at its best. She lived it happily, helpfully, in a typical town in a typical state; and in a typical house, the generous, spacious, hospitable, unself-conscious home in which she was the third generation to carry on the tradition of a gracious American mother, wife of the beloved community physician. The life pattern of love and service shows progressively through her days—a lively and popular young girl, a leader in college life, a devoted worker in her church, a loyal and active member of sorority and other organizations, the creator of a busy and harmonious home life, constantly spending herself in all that meant the welfare and especially the educational progress of her community and her fellow man.

This quality of giving herself wholly, unreservedly, to whatever engaged her heart, was a natural gift outstanding through her whole life. It lent to her associations with others a quality that communicated itself, and the consequence was that fine human accomplishments were realized because of the complete trust and respect mutually created and activated.

Her service as a member of Delta Zeta Council was not as long in years as it was lasting in influence. During these four years she traveled widely on chapter visits and presided over a number of installations, province conventions and State Day gatherings. Though she declined re-election as President, feeling that her first duty then lay with her home and growing family, she continued that active interest in the sorority and especially enjoyed National Conventions, of which she missed only those of 1942 and 1956.

Through these fortunate circumstances she was probably known by more Delta Zetas

than any other Founder. Her always delightful fund of reminiscences, her words of praise, counsel and vision, were invaluable features of the national meetings. Unforgettable among the Conventions in which she took part were 1928, at which Delta Zeta observed its Silver Anniversary, and four Founders attended; 1933, at which her daughter Mary was initiated; 1936, when her daughter Jean was the initiate; the Golden Anniversary Convention, creating the Order of the Golden Rose, at which the Honor Initiates were Julia Bishop Coleman, Mary Collins Galbraith and Alfa Lloyd Hayes. (It had belatedly come with some surprise to Delta Zetas that the Founders had not, after all ever been formally initiated!) And finally, the Convention of 1958, largest in our history and first to be held after the union of Delta Zeta and Delta Sigma Epsilon, was highlighted by the presence and the blessing of this truly ideal Founder.

No Delta Zeta at Convention entered more wholeheartedly into its events and spirit than did Julia Bishop Coleman. By her own request, she had been given no official part on the program, but the warmth and sparkle of her personality made her company much sought by members of all ages and areas. As the Convention progressed and she became better acquainted with so many of the younger members, there came a moment when it was inevitable that they ask her for a

message to the Convention. How we wish, now, that a record of those words had been kept! What did she say? Today none of us knows, absolutely; but we all know she spoke from her heart to ours, and that she said what our hearts had been waiting to hear, and will never forget, though the actual words be not recalled. Looking every inch the lovely lady and inspired leader that she was, the light in her eyes and the sincerity in her voice caught and held her listeners, so that it is safe to say the dimensions of their dedication expanded lastingly under the influence of that message so simply, lovingly and confidently given. We know this to be the truth from its having been confirmed by many members at various times and places since. Some were in personal letters sent her, which gave her much pleasure and comfort. She had been concerned, so Jean Coleman Lisle later revealed, lest she might fall short of the expectations of old friends or new members, in any attempted speech, for she felt time had made it harder to say what she wished in the way she would like. But the occasion itself had sustained her, and her luminous parting words were the capstone of the Convention.

To Dr. Coleman and to Mary and Jean must go the sorority's appreciation for Mrs. Coleman's continued activity. The unity which has always marked this family in its support of each mem-

ber's interests was especially generous in the matter of sharing their wife and mother with her sorority. Dr. Coleman has his own place in Delta Zeta history and in its Founders' early experiences, and has always been untiring in his interest and encouragement of all that his wife and daughters undertook to do in Delta Zeta. As for Mary and Jean, they grew up in the lore of their parents' college romance, in the events and places which associated Delta Zeta and Miami University, and in the hospitality which their home constantly offered to Delta Zeta visitors, singly or, as sometimes happened, the Council en masse. Both attended Stephens College before going to Miami to complete their college work; each was a Convention initiate. Mary served overseas with the Red Cross in Holland and Belgium in World War II, was later a member of the sorority's Vocational Guidance Committee while on the administrative staff of Stephens College. Their unofficial family committee has been responsible for easing the way for Mrs. Coleman's trips in these

In her memory, the family have established at Miami University a Julia Bishop Coleman Memorial Fund, to be used for some purpose which shall meet a need of the University and serve as a lasting testimony to the lasting love of her Alma Mater. Friends have been given an opportunity to share in this memorial and the generous response from hundreds who loved Mrs. Coleman already assures that this will become a tribute worthy of her.

As she served her sorority and held its love and respect, so all her life long she had served her home community and equally held its love and high regard. A lifelong member of the Presbyterian Church, she gave three years of devoted service to preparing a complete history in observance of its Centennial and was herself the member with the longest record of membership. She gave peacetime and wartime service to the Red Cross; helped organize the first P-TA in the town schools, shared the activities of the Eastern Star, helped form the local chapter of PEO Sisterhood (an organization which promotes the higher education of girls) and was later its state president. She had time, always, for her friends and deeply loved the close ties with the many who, like herself, loved and cherished the rich life of their home town. She continued to share in the activities of the Delta Zeta alumnæ chapter in Cincinnati as often as possible, and was always in demand when an event of importance was scheduled for Ohio Delta Zetas.

The illness which in the fall of 1958 first appeared and could not, eventually, be conquered, afforded additional instance of the extent of her friendships and the support they gave. In her repeated stays in Christ Hospital she won the admiration and devotion of all nurses and doctors

A Charter Member of Gamma Chapter and Her Professor Husband

Leona Train Rienow, whose new book deals with a "hot" subject, was one of the original "sparks" that ignited Gamma Chapter at the University of Minnesota and the former roommate of a Delta Zeta who is now rather" well known.

"How proud our original 13 are to have our own Gamma Chapter Founder, Helen Woodruff Nolop, the National President of Delta Zeta!" writes Mrs. Rienow.

She received her master's degree from Minnesota in 1929, in French, and soon thereafter married a West Pointer who shortly became a school principal in Wisconsin and, after going on to a Ph.D. at Columbia, a professor of political science at New York State College

They live on a farm, mostly woodland with a tumbling creek through it, about nine miles out of Albany, N.Y. They have redone a rambling 240-year-old farmhouse in knotty pine, with walls covered with bookcases. fireplaces in the kitchen and front room, exposed beams,

plank floors and all the trimmings of country life. They are great bird watchers and claim their greatest ex-travagance is sunflower seed for evening grosbeaks, purple finches, nuthatches, chickadees and other visitors.

During World War II Bob Rienow went overseas as a private; he is now a colonel in the New York National Guard. He has about eight books to his credit, mostly texts for high schools and colleges. Mrs. Rienow's first two books were "The Bewitched Caverns" and "The Dark Pool"—"both cave man novels for kids between 9 and 13," she says.

This is their first tradebook and collaboration, and

they researched a full year to do it.
"What actually got us excited," she says, "was the gross ignorance of the American people regarding this exciting and dangerous new age. Most people don't know 'fission' from 'fusion'—or strontium 90 from cesium 127—though it is much to their advantage to know all the angles-and without delay."

For another, the Rienows offer a constructive approach to this power which has been associated with so much terrible destruction. They have outlined eight practical suggestions for controlling the atom, some of them on a national level, others related to the community and a few directed at the individual.

"Can you think of a better project for a woman's club than this?" asks Mrs. Rienow.

Feeling a great need for more information among the laymen in regard to this very vital phase of our modern life, the Rienows studied for a year among an ocean of research, bulletins of the atomic scientists, Congressional hearings and in the laboratories of Brookhaven and General Electric. The result is an overall, concise view of the atomic age for the average citizen, to help him protect himself and his nation.

She stresses the "why" of etiquette

Louise Davis Bradley's syndicated column titled "Today's Etiquette," appears in seventy newspapers throughout the United States and Canada, and as far abroad as Brisbane, Australia, and Manila, P.I. She uses Louise Davis as her professional name, and is listed this way in Who's Who of American Women.

As society editor of the Cleveland Plain Dealer, Louise Davis has long been the social arbiter of northeastern Ohio.

Just after World War II, she began to receive an unsolicited avalanche of etiquette calls and letters, which convinced her and the editors of the need for a column beamed at the 170,000,000 rather than the 400. The *Plain Dealer* gave birth to her question and answer column in May, 1955. The avalanche immediately grew to a deluge. More than 70 newspapers are publishing this up-to-date, down-to-earth etiquette advice.

A trained reporter on the daily beat, Miss

Davis has her finger on the public pulse. She is inherently democratic. She loves people, is interested in what they do, what they think and why. She believes in flexibility of rules when needed. She stresses the "why" in her columns, thus helping readers think for themselves.

Her columns are short, folksy and human. Her mail is flooded from readers from all walks of life and she takes a personal interest in each. The answers are popular with all classes, including teen-agers.

A graduate of Ohio State University in 1922, she has worked for the *Plain Dealer* thirty-three years. Special interests include Il Cenacolo Italiano, an Italian cultural group where she is able to practice her speaking knowledge of Italian (she also speaks French and German); and her special hobby of weaving drapery material, upholstery and novelty fabrics. She has had fabrics in the Cleveland Museum of Art May Show.

Katherine Kinsel Muller: Botanist and Naturalist

Plants are the profession of Katherine Kinsel Muller, who has made a career of studying them and of teaching.

Mrs. Muller is director of the Santa Barbara Botanic Garden in Santa Barbara, California, and is coordinator of the Institute of Nature Study and Conservation, University of California Extension Division.

Born in Portland, Oregon, Mrs. Muller received her education in the Los Angeles city schools and won her bachelor's and master's degrees at UCLA and her Ph.D. in botany at the University of Illinois. She taught at Santa Barbara State College and the University of California at Santa Barbara before joining the Botanic Garden in 1949.

She holds professional memberships in Phi Beta Kappa, Phi Kappa Phi and Sigma Xi. She is also a member of AAUW and the Botanical Society of America, and is a fellow of the Royal Horticultural Society.

She is married to Dr. Cornelius H. Muller, professor of Botany at the University of California at Santa Barbara, and they have one son, Robert Neil.

Jeanette Washburn: A Noted Florida Artist

Jeanette Washburn is a well-known artist and judge of art shows in the Jacksonville, Florida, area, and is listed in *Who's Who in American Art* as well as the new listing of outstanding American women.

She attended Florida State University, received her B.F.A. from Syracuse University and studied at the Art Students League in New York City. 
