

In February, the National Council of Delta Zeta met on the campus of Miami University in Oxford, Ohio. For Delta Zetas this is the magic name, the first lesson in every pledge's education. "Delta Zeta was founded on October 24, 1902, at Miami University, Oxford, Ohio."

Many of the National Council members had never before visited this spot where Delta Zeta's history began, and they were delighted with their sentimental journey. Your Editor felt that perhaps Delta Zetas everywhere would enjoy knowing more about their birth-place, and what it is today.

Vice-chairman of the Miami University Board of trustees is Lucile Crowell Cooks, A, herself a distinguished Miami alumna and booster, and the only female on its Board of Trustees

The Council met in the Trustees conference room in the Murstein Alumni Center, ate in the trustees private dining room, and were housed in the Climer guest lodge which adjoins the alumni center.

The Murstein Center with its guest lodge was built entirely from gift funds. Each room is a gem in itself, with its various traditional furnishings, and the walls are hung with works of art as well as memorabilia. The Center houses the alumni association offices as well as the Office of Development and related departments. The main lounge is the scene of many receptions and teas, and Delta Zeta Council entertained at a reception with the help of the Alpha chapter officers.

The campus of Miami University is laid out with neatness and wide green lawns. The newer buildings are of the same red brick and general style of architecture as the nine-teenth century buildings. It has an air of serenity and spaciousness not found on big city campuses. While the University and its students are very modern in their functioning, it is not difficult to close one's eyes and imagine Julia Bishop, Alfa Lloyd, Anna Keen, Mary Collins, Anne Simmons, Mabelle Minton, with their pledge Elizabeth Coulter, riding in their horsedrawn buggy and carrying their parasols against the sunshine—and the then president, Dr. Guy Potter Benton sitting in his high-ceilinged office, encouraging these brash young women who were among the first females admitted to the university.




On the cover:



THIS IS MIAMI UNIVERSITY



The bell tower officially is The Beta Theta Pi Campanile, but the campus generally designates tower and all as the Beta Bells. Believed to have been the only free-standing Georgian bell tower in existence at the time it was built, it has become the symbol of Miami's fraternity tradition. It was the gift of Beta Theta Pi to the university on the occasion of its centenary in 1939.

Alpha Chapter—1972



Miami University, Oxford, Ohio, second-oldest state university west of the Allegheny Mountains, was created February 17, 1809, by an act of the Ohio General Assembly. It often is pointed out that Miami thus was "born the same week as Abraham Lincoln."

Miami University actually was a direct result of a 1792 Congressional act, signed by President George Washington, requiring that one township in a Southwestern Ohio land purchase be set aside for permanent support of an educational institution.

This was the John Cleves Symmes Purchase, also known as The Miami Purchase, since it involved more than one million acres between the two Miami rivers. Terms of this purchase followed closely the terms of the Ohio Company land contract which led to establishment of Ohio University in Athens in 1804; both contracts were based on provisions in the Northwest Ordinance of 1787 for the reservation of lands in support of public education. The township eventually designated by the legislature for the support and location of The Miami University is outside the boundaries of the original Miami Purchase, but that is quite another story!

The act which created the Miami University made it clear that this was fully a creature of the state legislature, its trustees named individually by the legislature on nomination by the Governor, the powers of its trustees and faculty defined by the legislature and specifi-

cally subject to further action of the legislature. However, the term "state university" did not come into common usage until many years later. Direct and regular financial appropriations in support of the university did not begin until 1885.

Even to this day, state support of Miami and other state universities is far from complete. The cost of the instructional program and general operation of the university is financed by student fees as well as by state appropriations. While construction of academic buildings is financed through state appropriations, all residence halls are financed through funds borrowed by the university and repaid from room-board charges made directly to students. Other buildings not directly related to the academic program are constructed from a portion of the Student Service Fee.

Although created in 1809, Miami did not actually begin collegiate instruction until 1824. Throughout the intervening 13 years, its trustees encountered many difficulties in their efforts to bring a university into actual operation. These were frontier days, and the frontier had few people, few dollars, few roads. The War of 1812 and general hard times contributed to the delay. A grammar school was taught in a log cabin on the college grounds for several years before a brick building called "The College Edifice" was completed and collegiate instruction begun on November 1, 1824.

With a rugged Scotsman, Robert Hamilton Bishop,

as its president and principal teacher, the young university in 1824 required that boarding students bring as much as \$93 to meet expenses for the year, as follows: board, \$50; tuition, \$20; washing, \$8; candles and wood, \$5; servant hire \$5; extras, \$5. Although only about twenty students reported for the opening, about eighty more came in during the year as they could get away from farm work or as roads became passable.

The first study period at the university began at 5 A.M. and extended til 7, with classes following. Except for meals followed by two exercise periods, students were assigned to study and recitation until the evening prayers. Their classes were in what has been identified as the classical pattern: logic and moral philosophy, Greek and Latin and mathematics.

By 1827, the new university was building a dormitory. By 1834, its enrollment had grown to 234 students, and there was need for a second dormitory. By 1839, with 250 students, Miami actually was the fourth-largest collegiate institution in the United States—after Harvard, Yale and Dartmouth. Dissensions and disputes through the next two decades brought periodic dips in enrollment; the Civil War weakened Miami again, and the Panic of 1873 was a telling blow. Miami was forced to close. It reopened 12 years later, in 1885, with 20 students and some state support. Recovery was slow. Enrollment did not get above 150 until 1902, when the opening of the Normal College brought 78 women students.

Miami was growing in many ways. The Normal College established for the training of teachers and school administrators in 1902 became the School of Education in 1927. A School of Business Administration was added in 1927; a School of Fine Arts, for architecture, music, painting and design, in 1929. Graduate study

was coordinated into a Graduate School in 1947. The School of Applied Science was organized in 1959. The general liberal arts pattern of Miami University from its beginning had led to identification of a College of Liberal Arts to distinguish it from the Normal College; this in turn was given its present name, College of Arts and Science, in 1946.


"Extension" classes were offered by Miami in other Southwestern Ohio communities for many years, and in 1954 this program was organized into a Division of Academic Centers to offer evening classes in facilities of local high school buildings during hours when they were not needed by those schools. At its peak, this program served some 5,000 persons in Academic Centers at Hamilton, Middletown, Dayton, Norwood and Piqua. Three of these Academic Centers eventually became evening functions of university branch campuses; two others were absorbed into the evening programs of other universities.

In 1964, Miami and Ohio State together opened a joint branch campus at Dayton called the Wright State Campus of Miami University and the Ohio State University. Miami opened a second branch campus at Middletown in 1966. By the time its third branch campus was opened at Hamilton in 1968, the state legislature had accorded the Wright State Campus separate entity as Wright State University.


In the fall of 1966, when it was responsible for a part of the Wright State Campus as well as the Middletown Campus and five Academic Centers, Miamilisted an over-all enrollment of 18,500. Separation of Wright State and the realignment of Academic Centers produced a new basis for comparative enrollments, but the Miami of 1971-72 has been 13,131 for the Central Campus at Oxford, 2,144 at Middletown, and 1,592 at Hamilton.

HARRISON HALL

The present Harrison Hall is named after Benjamin Harrison, twenty-third president of the United States who was a student at Miami. It is built at the site of Old Main.

The plaque hangs in Harrison Hall. In the Harrison room of the Student Center hangs an immense mural depicting Miami's early days. The Miami triad men are featured as it was a male world' those days. Female trustee Lucile was justly aroused that the women were not included. As a surprise ther, before the dedication, the artist painted in the ΔZ crest on the tower of Harrison Hall, pictured $^{\text{th}}$ center of the mural.

Oxford College for Women was a neighbor of Miami in the community from 1849 until it was merged with Miami in 1928. Its principal building still is used as a residence hall for Miami freshmen women as Oxford College; its alumnæ are considered as part of "the Miami family" although separate records are maintained for them by the Miami University Alumni Association.

Miami is distinguished in many fields. Among state universities it has been a leader in the development of an Honors Program, in the concept of university support of an Artist in Residence, in the insistence on a broad liberal arts base which at Miami is known as the University Requirement, in various academic programs designed to meet special needs of its times and its region, and in development of a residence hall and food service system and an intramural sports program.

Miami was among the first Midwestern schools to experiment with classroom television along with other experiments in new methods of large-group instruction, as well as with methods for measuring the effectiveness of these approaches. In an unusual program of cooperation with industry, it has developed a degree program in paper technology which is the only one of its kind in Ohio and one of only seven in the entire United States. Its degree program in systems analysis may be the first of its kind anywhere.

The Miami Student, founded in 1826 and still published twice weekly, claims to be the oldest college

newspaper in America.

Because six Greek-letter social organizations have been founded here, Miami is known as "Mother of Fraternities." Three of them are known throughout the collegiate world as The Miami Triad: Beta Theta Pi, founded in 1839; Phi Delta Theta, founded 1848, and Sigma Chi, founded 1855. Also founded at Miami after the Triad designation had become current are Delta Zeta, founded 1902; Phi Kappa Tau, founded 1906, and Delta Sigma Epsilon, founded in 1914 and merged with Delta Zeta in 1955.

Walter Havighurst in The Miami Years opens a chapter on "Fortunes of the Greeks" as follows: "In 1871 the Board of Trustees passed a resolution: "Resolved that the faculty be requested to require every student of the institution who is known to be connected with a Secret and Invisible Society . . . to withdraw from it forthwith . . . and that it is hereby declared to be unlawful for any student to become a member . . . Fifty years later Miami was known as Mother of Fraternities. Of some 4,000 fraternity chapters in the United States and Canada in 1958, one in every ten had its origin on the Miami campus. One sixth of all members of Greek letter fraternities belong to societies founded at Miami University.

More recent in world notice is Miami reputation "Cradle of Coaches" because Miami is the alma mater of more of today's collegiate and professional head coaches or managers than any other college or university. These constitute the more widely publicized and more frequently identified alumni of a university which for more than 160 years had produced an impressive list of statesmen, educators, business men and leaders

in other fields.

Miami buildings bear the names of famous Miami alumni Benjamin Harrison, 1852, 23rd president of the United States; Whitelaw Reid, 1856, diplomat and journalist; David Swing, 1852, eminent liberal minister; Samuel Spahr Laws, 1848, inventor of the stock market ticker, president of Westminster College and the University of Missouri; John Shaw Billings, 1857, organizer and first director of the New York Public Library; David S. Tappan, 1864, Raymond M. Hughes, 1893, and Alfred H. Upham, 1897, who became presidents of Miami; Calvin S. Brice, 1863, railroad magnate, U.S. Senator and national political leader; William Dennison, 1835, one of the earliest members of the Republican Party, chairman of the Convention which nominated Lincoln for re-election, Lincoln's postmaster General in 1864, and Henry Mitchell Mac-Cracken, 1857, who later headed both the University of Pittsburgh and New York University. Miami also has named buildings for Oxford College graduates, and thereby has two pairs of buildings named for famous couples: women's residence halls have been named for Caroline Scott Harrison and Elizabeth Porter, who became wives of Benjamin Harrison and David Swing.

Miami also is proud of its McGuffey heritage. William Holmes McGuffey, as a young Miami professor in the early 1830's, prepared and tested with neighbors' children some of the readers in the series which was to play such an important part in the education and moral training of young Americans for the next hundred years. The home which McGuffey built and occupied near the edge of the campus in those years now is surrounded by Miami buildings. Maintained by Miami University as the William Holmes McGuffey Museum, it has been declared a National Historic Landmark. It includes one of the world's largest collections of Mc-Guffey Readers, and its furnishings include a number of articles which he used at Miami.

Tributes to him also are found in the names of Mc-Guffey Hall, housing Miami's School of Education, and William Holmes McGuffey Laboratory School, a part of its teacher-training program. A McGuffey monument by Ernest Bruce Haswell, Cincinnati sculptor, stands in the McGuffey Hall courtyard.

Miami's president since 1965 is Dr. Phillip R. Shriver, who came to Miami from the deanship of the College of Arts and Sciences at Kent State University. He is author of several books of biography and Ohio history. He succeeded Dr. John D. Millett, who had left in 1964 after 11 years as Miami president. Acting president for the year between Millett and Shriver was Dr. Charles Ray Wilson, who remained as the university's provost and academic vice-president until his retirement in 1970.



The New Approach

Admissions

"We need to remind ourselves constantly that a student at whatever level is not in competition with his fellow students—he is in competition with the best that is in him. The purpose of assessments of all kinds, be they marks or test scores, is to help us understand an individual student and to help him understand his unique interests, aptitudes and talents."—Eugene S. Wilson, longtime dean of admissions, Amherst College.

The admissions picture in the sixties was one of great selectiveness. As we start the seventies, it is easing somewhat.

—The financial pinch is causing many families to shop around for a good buy in a college education. Through necessity, high-tuition colleges and even some state universities are reassessing their requirements for acceptance of students.

The whole problem of finding ways to identify the full potential of poor and minority group students is having great bearing on principles and practices of formerly selective admissions.

—There is a strong nation-wide movement by students toward the two-year community colleges, most of which do not require admissions tests.

—Now a large university has adopted an open admissions policy—the City University of New York (CUNY). Despite many complications and problems attendant on the change, the policy seems to be working and it brought 12,000 more applicants to CUNY now in the second year of the program.

Does this mean the end of testing? Not yet. Aptitude and achievement tests, required as a part of many college applications, are holding steady, with admissions directors repeating what they said in the sixties: No one is accepted on test grades alone. Other important considerations: high school grades and rank in class; also evaluation of motivation, creativity, self-discipline, traits not measurable by tests. Likewise, tests, even if not used for admission, continue to be used for placement.

For those who see the trend toward open enrollment as a threat to quality in higher education, there are the reports just in on "risk" students accepted over the past several years at both Stanford and Brown. Nineteen of 21 black students with lower than average test scores accepted at Stanford have already made it through creditably to graduation and the other two are on their way. The some 2100 risk students at Brown have graduated at almost the same rate as other students and have shown themselves as equally likely to succeed after graduation.

Curriculum

"A degree has become a credit card which allows the student to buy his way into society's institutions rather than allowing him to orient his education toward what he wants to know and how his personal development can come about."—Dr. Robert Krueger, Duke University.

College curriculum is being turned upside down with students taking responsibility for their own educational plans.

Have you heard of the "free" university or the "experimental" college, in vogue for awhile, but now not so prevalent? Many of these are student inspired, hold classes on campus and present courses arranged for by students on a wide range of subject matter, quite often those they consider "relevant" to social issues of the day.

However, while such courses usually do not provide college credit, many schools are liberalizing curriculum with credit at student suggestion. Indiana University says members of the class of 1971 triggered their new School for Public and Environmental Affairs. Student designed courses at the University of North Dakota in clude Technology of the Modern World and Dialogue between East and West. Any group of 15 students at Notre Dame may petition for a credit course on any subject for which they prepare a bibliography, secure a teacher from the regular faculty and have the approval of his department.

Today, with over 7 million students—double the 1960 number—seeking higher education, with a 25% increase in the number of colleges and junior colleges, and with attendant disenchantment with education felt by many, change is rife on the campus scene. As colleges and college-age individuals seek to reassess priorities so as to better resolve the problems of contemporary human existence, we are confronted with a new approach, new patterns in universities, new organization, new freedom, a new student, and new developments for fraternity.

Other courses particularly linked to student concerns are, of course, the black studies plus the study of the role and history of women, the latter highlighted by San Diego State College's full-scale eleven-course offering

There is also considerable effort to make existing courses more meaningful. A new approach to chemistry, relating it to man's environment, has students enthusiastic at places like the Universities of Maryland, Wisconsin and Rutgers. On many campuses "core" courses have been eliminated. DePauw, wondering whether English, science and a foreign language are really essential to a liberal arts education, has embarked on a three-year pilot study to find out.

Students in many places also have a good deal to say about their own graduation requirements. The University of Alabama is starting The New College, a small, flexible personally-oriented undergraduate program, allowing students to set their own pace of study and in many instances, their own requirements. In Duke's Program II students may have all course requirements waived upon presentation of a different plan of study.

The method of study is increasingly coming to mean independent study, a highly personal, individualized program determined by a student in conference with a professor-adviser. Indeed, say its proponents, the goals students are thus allowed to set for themselves are usually as ambitious as any professor would outline.

Work is implemented many places through the interdisciplinary approach, which brings together the resources of several departments or even of several different colleges; also through the honors program for academically gifted students.

Work off-campus is also more frequent. This varies from entire semesters devoted to work-study or study abroad, to smaller projects locally oriented. One of these is Cornell University's Human Affairs program which grants credit for student work in the community. Another is Goucher's Center for Sociological Study which gives students credit for work on small independent research projects in the community which they then correlate with their academic study.

Critics of so much student-inspired work stress the importance of stronger faculty-student rapport. Indeed,

professors, long used to handling lecture classes, find the closer student relationship with the necessity of frequent student conferences challenging—and time consuming, a matter for additional study and planning. To better general faculty-student relations Ohio University has a University Day each quarter used for teaching or other student-designed educational activities when students and faculty participate together. At the University of Delaware, twelve student-faculty commons rooms are being set up to foster closer informal association between the two groups.

Besides humans, machines help out with the new curriculum. Through "Dial a Lesson" students at Penn State can dial to hear a lecture they missed or listen to supplementary materials. Ohio State has a computerbased information center in the library, which, upon receipt of a phone call, will provide a printed bibliography of materials published in any one of five areas of science and engineering. At South Dakota State University a responder system has been installed in a large classroom so the lecturer can have immediate feedback as to whether students are comprehending the material. Self-learning techniques are being tried at Indiana University, particularly in the journalism school where a student sits in a booth with a camera in hand and is shown by slides and tape-recorded instructions how to use it. A program called STIR (Self-Teaching Independent Research) has excited the Ohio Wesleyan campus where 16 learning carrels are available to students for study at three levels of an evolutional botany program and where they can work at their own speed using equipment provided-two microscopes, a tape deck, film loop projector and a 35 mm. project. Even some sorority houses are now being built with study carrels.

Grading

"What kind of substitute can be found for the maintenance of good academic standing if the grade-point average, which academic standing committees have commonly used as a basis in the past, is no longer reliable?"—Dr. H. Bentley Glass, past national president, Phi Beta Kappa.

The pass-fail grading system, also the pass-no credit system, are nibbling away at the traditional ABC grading system. In many colleges students now can choose to get only a "pass" or "fail," the option usually restricted to elective courses (although a few schools have gone to complete pass-fail).

However, there are drawbacks. Some people feel students need grades to be motivated. Graduate schools still like to know grades and class rank and unless a school is small enough to provide personal evaluation from professors in lieu of grades, graduate schools feel they have little to go on. (Even students find drawbacks, suspecting that teachers, freed from making numerical judgments, are not painstaking enough in evaluating course grades.) Too, employers need more precise knowledge and may equate a pass grade with a D.

On the other hand, the letter grade is thought to encourage cheating and to cause students to steer away from challenging courses as likely to damage their grade point average because they are "too hard." Dean Wilson, former head of admissions at Amherst takes this view: "I have become suspicious of marks . . . Marks are evidence of how much a student has met the demands of a teacher, but whether a teacher demands memory, thought, obedience or reasoning, I rarely know."

Is it possible to combine the best of both systems? Ohio University has made a try. Under the pass-fail option a student may decide during the first ten days of a quarter to have his final grade in one course converted by the office of student records to a "pass" if he has earned any grade from A through D, or to a "fail" if he has received an F. The instructor turns in the usual letter grades without knowing which students have chosen the pass-fail option. No more than 45 pass-fail hours can be counted toward a degree.

But nothing can be said to be the last word on grading today. It is changing so rapidly that the officers of Phi Beta Kappa, an organization whose whole existence has been predicated on grade-point average, found that a report they prepared on trends last year was completely out of date this year. The only thing that seems to be sure about grading is that there is dissatisfaction with the way it is and great effort is being put forth to find something better.

Applications

"You don't have to go away to go to a good school any more, and it's cheaper to stay near home."—From an article on college applications in the New York Times.

Knowing that it's easier to get into college today than it was a few years ago (see section on Admissions), high school seniors are not in such a frenzy as they have been. Besides, it is thought that some, viewing the job situation, may have decided not to go to college at all or wait out a year. By mid-July schools were reporting 400,000 vacancies yet unfilled. However, some college-bound students may be in for turn-downs. Some schools are decreasing enrollments by self-imposed enrollment quotas and because of economic difficulties. Others have housing, classroom and faculty shortages.

With many seniors choosing schools closer home for cost reasons, the pressure is on state and land-grant institutions. By early spring 1971 these schools reported they had an average 1.5 applications for every available place in autumn enrollment. They expected to have to turn away 50,000 qualified people, although freshman enrollment overall will increase 3.8%. They also reported that in-state applicants, as usual, would be given preference over those from out-of-state.

As an indication of what is happening in expensive private colleges, as of April 1971 Ivy League schools in the east reported a 7% decline in applications, after steady growth for the past three years. Their counterparts, the Seven Sisters, showed a 2.5% decline. However, overall, these schools could only accept 20,874 members into the class of 1975 and sent out 45,263 letters of rejection.

Cost

"From coast to coast whole families are sharing the cost of college outlays nowadays. Wives work. Husbands 'moonlight.' Homes are refinanced. And students increasingly compete for scholarships, work part-time and take out sizeable loans to be repaid after graduation."—U. S. News & World Report.

Everything costs more nowadays, including college. Tuition is up at least a small amount at nearly all schools and has risen in varying degrees at others. Public institutions still cost less than private ones, with instate students at state schools getting the best break; out-of-staters pay much more. Parents considering a private college or university for their child can expect something close to a \$3,000 tuition at many of these.

The average national tuition increases for this year have been figured at \$200 at private coed schools and \$96 for in-state students at public schools. But, even at this, at public universities resident students now only pay 28.3% of the bill for their education; non-resident students pay 70.3%.

Various schools have various ways of helping students meet these costs. Yale has come up with PAYE—Tuition Postponement Option—under which a student can stretch out tuition payments over a 35-year period and which will allow a freshman entering in 1971 to defer \$5,000 over a four-year period. With help from the Federal College Work-Study Program universities in Texas have banded together to launch Project SET—Summer Employment in Texas—trying to help solve the growing student problem of finding summer jobs. The University of Tennessee opened a cooperative dormitory last fall which costs students about \$300 less annually than if they had lived in other university dormitories.

Unfortunately, there is also a squeeze on outright grants or loans available to students trying to meet the new costs. No one knows whether Congress will extend the National Defense Education Act in 1972, a program which enables students to borrow money and repay it within ten years at 3% interest. But even with such money available, Auburn University reports they had to turn down one-third of their applicants for loans in 1970. The University of California at Santa Barbara says that 80% of their student body inquired about or applied for financial help during 1969-1970. During that same year Penn State notes that two out of three of their fulltime students received financial aid. Rutgers reports that for 1971 it can meet only half of the financial needs of its freshman class. It might also be mentioned that the emphasis on enrolling more youngsters from poor and minority families has significantly added to the need for financial aid.

It might not be so bad if the colleges themselves were in better shape. According to a study made by the Carnegie Commission on Higher Education, the rising cost of recent improvements (better salaries, courses, scholarships, community services) have increasingly outstripped income from endowments, gifts, grants and government aid, which means that at least two out of

three U.S. colleges and universities are facing financial hard times. Many private schools are already dipping into endowment principal for current expenses.

Besides the slowing down of state and federal support, these other causes are mentioned for the financial distress: faculty salary increases of as much as 75% between 1959-1969; tenured faculty; unbusinesslike handling of affairs; revolt on campus, also the realization that a college degree no longer guarantees a job, all of which has caused the public's disillusionment with education; a slump in alumni giving; inflation-fed operating costs; and on and on.

Cost-cutting efforts by schools involve trying to save on maintenance (grass cutting, maid service, etc.); freezing professor's salaries and hiring fewer new ones; abandonment of construction plans; trimming graduate programs; increasing the ratio of students to faculty. Another innovative economical move is for groups of neighboring schools to cooperate on courses and library materials. However, a few weaker schools have closed already and others have found it necessary to combine with public institutions.

Based on this, is it any wonder that the Carnegie Commission on Higher Education recommends that a publicly supported community college be established within commuting distance of every person in the U.S.? Average tuition is only \$300-500 (and none in California), and since students live at home there is no cost for room and board. Two-year programs are available, one leading to transfer to a four-year college, the other, vocational-technical geared to those who want jobs. Currently nearly two and a half million students attend the 1100 junior colleges of which some 250 are private with higher tuition). Forty to 50 community colleges are being added each year.

The New University

"No longer do we automatically assume that four years, two semesters, 15 hours is an education."-Donald Nolan, director of the New York state program providing for an "external" degree.

What constitutes college, any way? Sometimes schools cut across lines to lower "requirements"; i.e. Goucher, a private women's college, accepts especially qualified students who have not completed formal high school requirements. Then there is the New Hampshire College in Massachusetts which also does not require a high school diploma. On the other end of the scale, Columbia University has come forth with a two-year program leading to a Master's degree for executives to accommodate the self-educated man without a bachelor's degree.

But colleges are going farther than this. The big move is toward off-campus study, credit by examination,

external degree programs.

Two programs are underway in New York State designed to allow high school graduates to get a college degree without going on campus for more than placement or counseling. One program allows students to take courses at any of the university's 70 campuses, or, if they prefer, at home through correspondence, TV lectures and cassettes. Tutoring sessions with faculty

are required intermittently. The other program will grant "external" degrees to students who pass college equivalency exams on material learned on their own through reading, practical experience or company train-

The fall of 1971 sees the formal opening of the University without walls, a program backed by HEW and the Union for Experimenting Colleges and Universities, a group of 17 cooperating colleges where a student aged 16-60 or over, can get, a.) a study program tailored to individual needs, b.) take as long as he wants to graduate, c.) be given the advantage of an adjunct faculty of government executives, scientists, artists and the like, d.) take any of his courses at any of the 17 colleges or by independent study, TV, or tape, e.) receive credit for off-campus work such as supervised internship, VISTA, travel abroad and so on. One requirement: before receiving a degree he must produce a contribution to his field, perhaps a research study, a work of art, an identifiable community service, etc. CLEP exam (College Level Examination Proficiency, directed by CEEB, the organization which handles SAT tests) is a newly developed method to earn college credit, or satisfy college equivalency requirements for a license or a certificate or for job advancement, on the basis of examination. The tests are available monthly in 60 urban locations, are accepted by some 600 institutions for up to two years of college credit. They are considered especially valuable for people whose learning experiences have taken place primarily outside the formal classroom.

Syracuse University has a four-year program where students spend only 24 days each year on campus. . . . In a special cooperative program, tool and die workers can receive 32 hours of credit at the New York Institute of Technology for their 5,000 hours of apprenticeship.

And so it goes toward the goal of developing, not finished graduates, but lifetime learners.

Earlier in the year the couple had been signally hon-

ored at Chatauqua, New York, where Carl has given thirty-nine years of service, by receiving a flag designed and made especially to signify their many interests and services to the Chatauqua program.

For the special interests which Alice herself shares, she says: "We have made several trips around the world, visiting places far off the beaten tourist trail, and I found it heartbreaking to see the poverty, both physical and spiritual, of so many people. Ten years ago, after one such trip, a group of my friends organized The Globe Club to help me with some dreams around the world. These have included such things as an incubator for a little hospital in Gauhati, an eye clinic in Japan, furnishings for a small church in Africa. Our big project has been the creation of a rooftop nursery school for refugees in Hong Kong. This is run by a wonderful young Chinese couple whom we met some twelve years ago. We were able to aid Jimmy in completing his training, and this is the result.

"My other big interest which has become almost a fulltime job, is the Salvation Army. I have served on the Woman's Board for the Greater Chicago area for thirteen years, and currently as president of the board and auxiliary. Our big job is to back up the Army with money and service. It's a big, big, job and very close to my heart."



Elizabeth Sutton Gustison, K

"Just a housewife!" This is Elizabeth Sutton Gustison's answer to the question, "What were you before you were director of the Museum of History and Industry in Seattle, Washington?" Other museum directors, especially men, are surprised at her answer. Mrs. Gustison is representative of the earnest and intelligent volunteer workers who find a career in their volunteer field, although her entrance into the business world was an extraordinary one.


The Greater Seattle alumnæ are justly proud of their Delta Zeta sister. A member of Kappa, she graduated from the University of Washington and also had three years in the University's Law School before she decided to marry. Her only other experience in the business world was running her father's real estate contract office after he died. A member of a pioneer Seattle family, Elizabeth was a Delta Zeta Province Director from 1928 to 1932. She is Seattle's Delta Zeta Woman of the year candidate, and last fall spoke at Kappa's pledge banquet.

Previous to being named director, Elizabeth was an active board member of the Seattle Historical Society. which operates the museum and gave the museum to the city. There have been many changes under her able direction. The year she became director the Maritime Wing was added. Then the Brinkley Natural History Wing was added, but the change that caused the most worry was the designing and building of a new entrance when the freeway was constructed nearby. Streets were closed and the public had to arrive on the other side of the building. The changed landscaping of the surrounding area and the new façade gave the museum an entirely new look. Suddenly the beautiful museum was visible from the freeway, no longer hidden off the beaten track. The eager visitors quickly found the correct freeway exit, and their cars filled the new parking lot.

Museum Director

Just this last year a much-needed wing, which houses an auditorium and meeting rooms, was added. With this addition, the facilities of the museum are greatly expanded. It was open in time for the museum's annual "Christmas Around the World" program, which began 20 years ago. Twenty-three countries were represented last year. Six thousand volunteers worked on the program and over 27,000 people attended during the three week-ends of programs featuring dances, food and customs of many different countries. The museum cases display Christmas material from around the world, and the halls are filled with Christmas trees from many nations. Other workers prepare food, make costumes and take part in the programs. Christmas Around the World is a cherished part of the Northwest's calendar.

International cookbooks have been printed as a result of these programs. The museum has also published

a pictorial history of Seattle, and an information bulletin is mailed to members regularly. The museum is especially proud of their Marine History of the Pacific North West, which is the maritime Bible for all maritime museums today. The manuscript for this huge tome was reviewed by a board of 18 experts over the United States.

Education is the main purpose of the museum, which is especially for children. Bus loads of school groups visit daily. With their excellent docent program of both men and women, the children are divided into groups of 15, so each child can see and hear on the tour.

There is always a crowd around the submarine periscope, with children and adults alike waiting to view the surrounding neighborhood through a real, working periscope. The U.S. Navy gave it to the museum, but when she asked for installation directions, there weren't any. The head of a local shipyard who was a board member sent a crew over. After they figured it out and installed it, she sent directions to the Navy.

The planning never ends in a museum. Elizabeth is making plans for the next addition which will enlarge the library and storage areas. Museum conferences and travel to other museums are an interesting side to her career. An upcoming trip through Europe will enable her to see new display techniques and to see what other museums are doing, a vital part in keeping abreast of her field.



United States and Morocco

Pen & Palette, publication of the National League of American Pen Women in California, South, salutes Dr. Luella J. Hall, Y, on the publication of her latest book, "The United States and Morocco 1776-1956."

"Like a postman taking a walk on his day off, Dr. Hall, when not professionally writing history, devotes her time to her collection of primary historical material. Her large collections have been presented to Hartnell College, University of the Pacific, University of North Dakota, Stanford University, and Harvard University. There's no chance of Dr. Hall's mind rusting what with her interests in literature, history, political science, poetry, mystery novels, drama, music, genealogy and public speaking. All this and writing, too!"

Luella received her BA and MA from the University of North Dakota where she was one of the founders of Upsilon chapter, and her PhD in history and political science from Stanford.

A longtime teacher in both North Dakota and California, her other published books include "History of the Formation of Counties in North Dakota" and "The United States and the Moroccan Problem, 1776-1907. She has contributed widely to educational and historical journals.

Luella was National Scholarship chairman for Delta Zeta in 1924, which isn't surprising with her background of membership in Phi Beta Kappa and Delta Kappa Gamma. She is listed in The California Register, Social Blue Book of California; Who's Who in California, in the West, and in American Women.

Of her book, the Pen & Palette writes: "Throughout our history the perennial Moroccan Problem has engaged the attention of such eminent American states men as Washington, John Adams, Franklin, Jefferson, John Quincy Adams, Lincoln, and the two Roosevelts. Morocco has been a proving ground for two major American foreign policies—the Monroe Doctrine and the Open Door.

"Yet despite the fact that the U.S. has had more important dealings with Morocco than with any other minor country, this area of the U.S. foreign relations has been virtually ignored by American and European historians. Dr. Hall's study, with its extensive and thorough documentation, leads the way for further exploration of this long-neglected topic and sets into proper perspective the real significance of American-Moroccan relations in the great international embroilment over control of the state of Morocco."

She has won pottery and painting honors from Greater Gulf States Fair, Mobile Opera Guild and Dauphine Island Association. She has exhibited in Gautier, Pascagoula, Pass Christian, Jackson, Mississippi and Mobile and Montgomery, Alabama. She is also represented in numerous private collections.

Though not near an active alumnæ chapter, she has designed and painted a 12 × 80 foot rush textile mural for Epsilon Mu at the University of Southern Mississippi. For the past several years she has designed and painted pageantry for local Mardi Gras festivities. She is a member of EM House Corporation, American Crafts Council, Alabama Craftsmen Council, Singing River Art Association, Mobile Art Association, Mobile

Art Gallery, American Legion Auxiliary and Order of Eastern Star.

Her husband Harold operates his own security contracting agency and fills his extra time with the Army Reserve, where he is a Lt. Colonel. They have one Delta Zeta daughter, Diane Jones Skelton, EM.

Pioneer Education for Physically Handicapped

From a one-room country school in Iowa to an important position of leadership in the Michigan program of pioneering education for physically handicapped children, Grace Milledge, AΛ, Flint Alumnæ chapter, can trace her career in an area of education that continually increases in value, and expands in opportunity.

At the University of Colorado, where she had become a member of Delta Zeta in 1924, she combined that enthusiasm for science and special education in the winning of both AB and BE degrees, and later received her MA from Columbia University.

Her teaching experience included stints of service in schools in Illinois, Wisconsin, and finally Michigan, where she found her niche and where she has remained for more than twenty-five years doing work in education with the physically handicapped. Her program in Flint was so successful that it soon attracted state-wide notice and she was called upon to counsel and advise in expanding this work to a larger field.

Thus, in 1946, there was inaugurated the first Teacher-Counselor program for handicapped school children in the state. The program is a comprehensive one, and has involved the participation of students, teachers, parents, and administrators. Social and government agencies, doctors, and clinics have been enlisted in strengthening and constantly improving this service. The children who are benefitted by the state's efforts include many who might ordinarily not have the experience of normal school training.

Problems include vision, hearing, orthopedic conditions, epilepsy, heart or speech disabilities. The child

is enabled to attend every regular class which he can, and is treated as a normal student, up to his ultimate capacity. Crippled youngsters, for example, can attend the regular classes in mathematics and English, but will then be enrolled in special classes for physical therapy.

Happily, the timely and inspired quality of Grace Milledge's work has been noticed and rewarded with membership and offices in a number of organizations concerned with this service. In fact, in each city where she has taught she has quickly been recognized as outstanding in her specialty. She has enjoyed her association with Delta Kappa Gamma, in which she has held state offices and served on the national program committee. Her offices in the Michigan Council for Special Education and the Michigan Education Society, have been numerous, and she was official delegate to the National Education Association.

What does she do in her vacations? She works in camps for physically handicapped children, or directs workshops which are concerned with counseling and assisting this group. She takes an active part in the Easter Seal Drive, assists at a nursery school for handicapped small ones, teaches a Sunday School class for the deaf, and passes on her guidance and inspiration as study chairman of a women's circle in her church.

Officially "retired" at present, Grace Milledge continues to give and to serve. It is a source of real happiness to Delta Zetas to have her say, "Long ago when loans for college girls were sometimes non-existent, it was a loan from Delta Zeta which made it possible for me to remain in college one crucial year. This has always made me grateful for my membership."

There should be thousands of alumnæ who are eager and willing to be of service in helping the college chapters to secure information about the girls whom they hope to pledge. Each of you has received a letter from your state's chairman requesting your cooperation. If you haven't already answered her, why not take a moment NOW to write to the chairman of your state's committee, offering your assistance. You will be proud when "your" girl becomes a Delta Zeta pledge.

Even though your name is not listed as a member of the state committee, you may still receive a request for a personal reference on a girl from your community. You may be the only Delta Zeta living in your town. The college chapter needs YOUR help. Wouldn't you like younger girls from your hometown to become Delta Zetas? If you do not know the girl or her family personally, there are various ways in which to obtain enough information to warrant your sponsoring, or not sponsoring the girl. Some sources of information that may be of help to you are listed:

- (1) High School Principal, Counselor, or a teacher.
- (2) Church—if the girl's church membership is listed.
- (3) Some of your friends in town.
- (4) A Panhellenic pool-if your town has such.
- (5) Some organization that the girl belongs to.

If you are unable to secure any information, PLEASE DO indicate so on the reference form and return to the State Chairman. Too often the forms are not returned to the State Chairman or to the college chapter. This entails extra time, and postage.

Should you know of a girl whom you feel would not be an asset to Delta Zeta, it is hoped that you will impart this information to the College Chapter Director, or to the State Reference Chairman.

You will find listed the name and address of each State Chairman and the members of their committees. It should be rewarding to find your name listed as a member of this committee, knowing that you have volunteered to do your part in maintaining the highest quality of Delta Zeta membership.

Delta Zeta is YOUR sorority. Delta Zeta IS THE BEST. You, as alumnæ should feel a responsibility to keep it so.

Building Homes for Delta Zetas

Because House Corporations function quietly, even though they hold a most important place in the Delta Zeta world, the motto of our birthplace, Miami University, could well be the slogan of Delta Zeta's House Corporations: "To accomplish rather than be conspicuous."

A necessary part of Delta Zeta, a house corporation is the business arm of the college chapter and as such, manages, operates, and maintains the owned, leased or rented house, apartment, lodge, suite, or classroom facility used by the chapter for meetings.

Inasmuch as a college chapter changes its membership yearly, its house corporation, as a permanent entity in itself, provides continuity of chapter management, assuring through its influence and guidance, continuing interest and concern for the welfare of the chapter and Delta Zeta.

As a loving and understanding landlord, governed by an elected Board of Directors, membership in a house corporation is composed of all the members of the college chapter and those alumnæ of Delta Zeta who are interested and who qualify under the chapter's house corporation bylaws. No funds are distributed among members; and no member, officer, or any other person, receives any remuneration or realizes any profit from the operation of the house corporation. Each state has specific laws which differ in the governing of a corporation, therefore the individual house corporation is incorporated as a non-profit organization chartered by the state in which it functions.

University and campus requirements also differ, and because the majority of the membership in a college chapter are not of legal age to sign or enter into legal contracts or assume legal liability, there are specific requirements to which each house corporation must adhere in assuming these roles. In addition, it is inadvisable for the sorority's college chapter to be burdened with the long-term responsibility of owning and/or managing property. To ascertain that collegiates are included in all house corporation planning, the chapter president and house manager or treasurer are automatically appointed to the house corporation's board of directors. It is the college chapter's responsibility, however, to see that its house corporation complies with all provisions of the bylaws as well as the Constitution of Delta Zeta.

To insure attractive continued or future housing and/or furnishings for a chapter, Building and Furnishings Funds are established. Each house corporation member, as well as interested persons, contribute to these funds thereby equalizing payments for expenses over the years. The house corporation guides and advises in planning, financing, and budgeting.

Chapters which meet in classrooms or Student Union facilities especially need a house corporation for long range planning and financial preparedness. By so do ing, they will be ready to act when the university administration changes its rulings or policies, and housing becomes available or is advised.

Just as with the chapter's Alumnæ Advisory Board the house corporation also serves as a means whereby a Delta Zeta alumna can gain fulfillment and make he membership meaningful through house corporation in volvement. Membership in a house corporation offer the alumna the opportunity of communicating with the collegiates; broadening her dimensions through discussion, analysis and planning; participating to improve the sorority she helped to build. Volunteer! Be useful and truly enjoy participation in one of those benefits the which your Delta Zeta membership entitles you. Our collegiate sisters do encourage and do support alumnate who are interested and willing to share the value of their experience when they give of their time and the ents as resource persons.

Over the years there have been many loyal Delta It tas who have served our sorority as house corporation members and directors; many Delta Zeta husbands brothers, and friends who have assisted our house corporations. We are truly indebted to each and every of them for contributing their time, their ability, their money, their patience and their untiring efforts.


