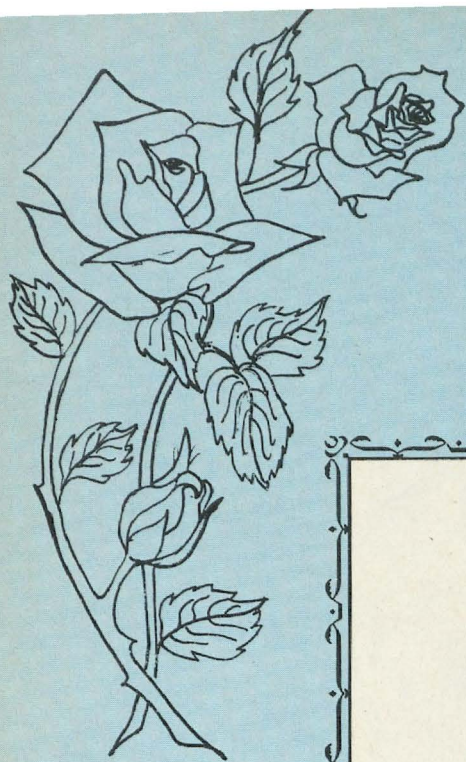

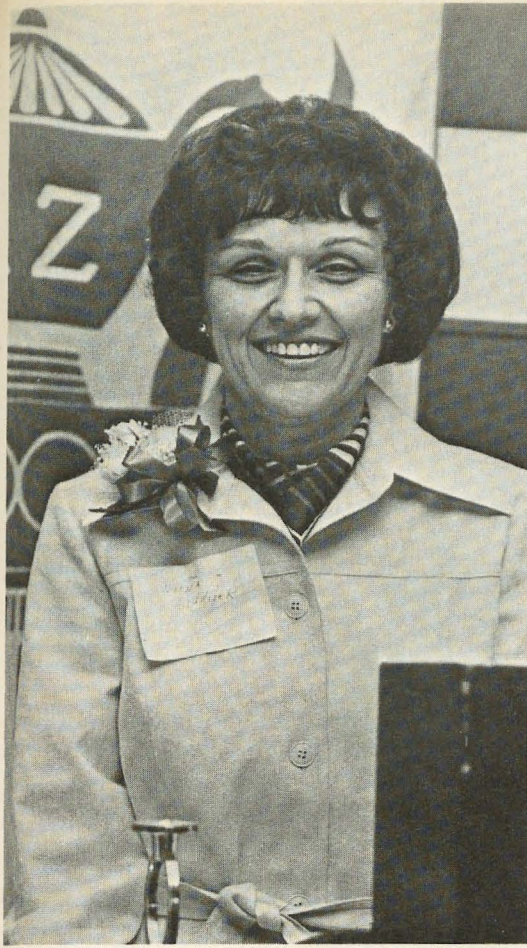

# Of INTEREST AND CONCERN

## THE PRESIDENT WRITES:

This is the time of year when all Delta Zeta alumnae are encouraged to send their personal references to our chapters for rush. These letters of introduction are sent for girls who should receive extra consideration and attention from our chapters. Some of these girls are special indeed for they are Delta Zeta legacies.

The chances are that the legacy comes to the campus well-informed about Delta Zeta. Her mother or sister is a Delta Zeta so she has grown up knowing about it, sometimes sharing some of it. She is generally ready and eager to learn how she can take her place in the group with which she is already familiar. How important it is for our Delta Zeta chapter to give her every opportunity to make Delta Zeta her choice! How important it is to rush her in such a special way that she recognizes that what she has known through a family member can be important and significant in her own life! Our Delta Zeta policies regarding legacies and all recommended girls charge each chapter with the responsibility of giving this special consideration to these young women.

The kind of support exhibited by the alumna who takes the time to send her personal recommendation is vital to our chapters. Delta Zeta is a lifetime opportunity and the alumna is showing her interest and concern for the sorority's growth and strength by volunteering her help in this way. No chapter can afford to disregard it.

Each voluntary reference deserves a written acknowledgement from the chapter. Each alumna who sends this important information should be assured that the girl recommended will receive every consideration. The alumna will continue to introduce these rushees to the chapter and rush in her own area only if she feels confident that there will usually be a favorable response to her recommendation.

Experience shows that the legacy and the voluntarily sponsored girl generally become strong chapter members. By accepting and using the alumnae references the chapter will be in a position to pledge the best rushees and will encourage continued participation and support from our alumnae. This kind of support of one another can only strengthen Delta Zeta everywhere—on the campus and in the community.

As you read this issue of *The Lamp* take note of the reference form included on page 26. You'll be helping Delta Zeta by filling it out and mailing it for your special girl.

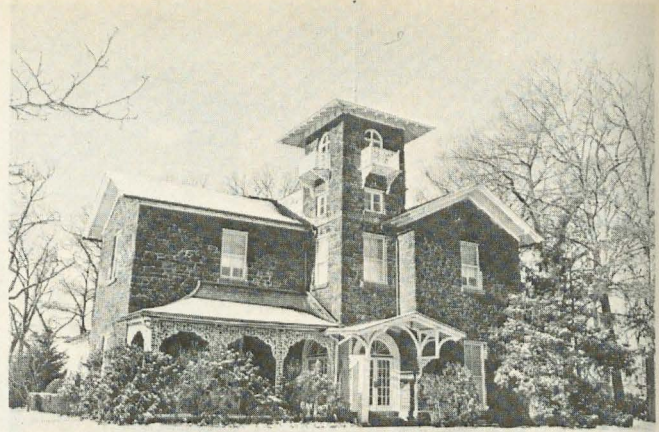

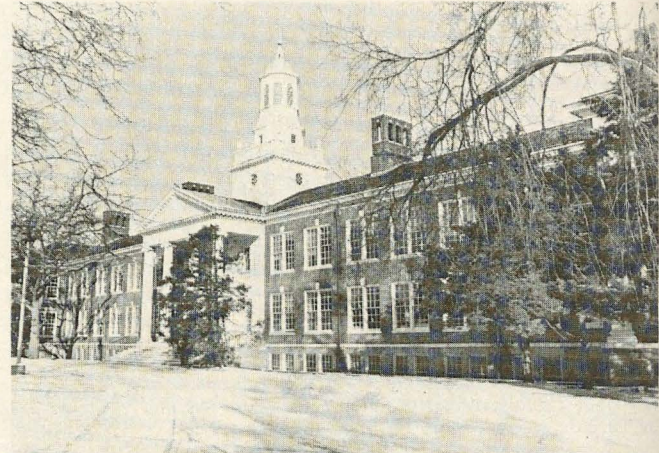

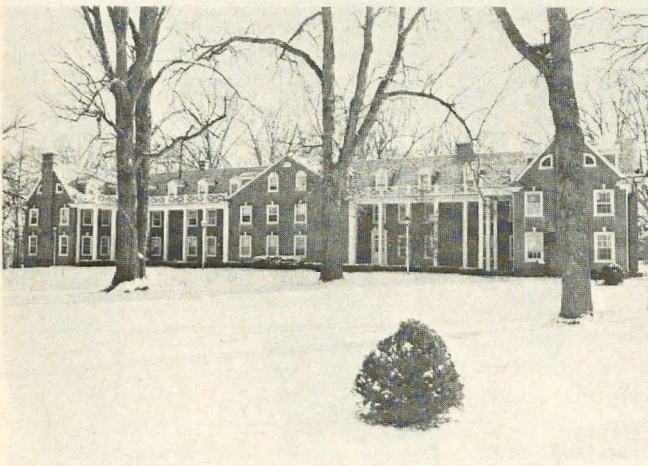

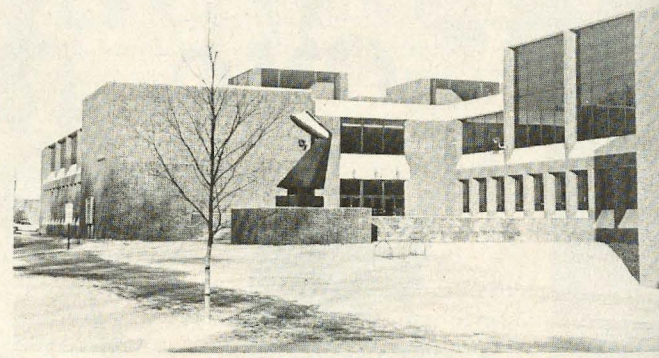
*The tree shaded entrance to Glassboro State College.*

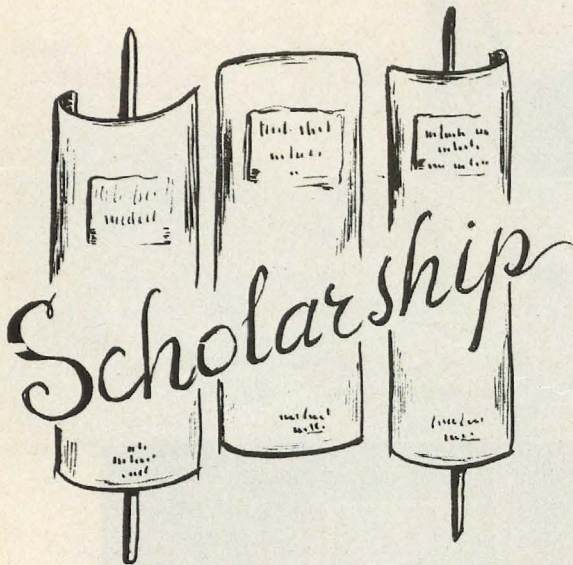

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION  
FOR  
DELTA ZETA FOUNDERS MEMORIAL FUND

The undersigned incorporator, desiring to form a corporation, not for profit, under Sections 1702.01, et seq., Ohio Revised Code, does hereby certify:

FIRST. The name of said corporation shall be DELTA ZETA FOUNDERS MEMORIAL FUND.

SECOND. The place in Ohio where the principal office of the corporation is to be located is Columbus, Franklin County.

THIRD. This corporation is organized and shall be operated exclusively for charitable purposes. The purposes for which this corporation is organized shall be construed as limited to such as will qualify it as an exempt organization under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code, as now enacted or hereafter amended.

No part of the net earnings of the corporation shall inure to the benefit of any private shareholder or individual.

No substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall be carrying on propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, nor shall the corporation participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distributing of statements), any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office.

FOURTH. The names and addresses of the persons who shall serve the corporation as its initial trustees are as follows: Mary Lou McConnaughey Barth, Dayton, Ohio; Betty Heusch Agler, Columbus, Ohio; Arlene Newman, Houston, Texas; Florence Hohnbaum Harvey, Westfield, New Jersey; and Eleanor Strickler Fariss, Seattle, Washington.

FIFTH. In the event the corporation is dissolved, the net assets of the corporation remaining after payment of debts and obligations shall be transferred to an organization which is qualified as an exempt organization under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

It has been said that Success is GETTING what you want, but that Happiness is WANTING what you get. If success was achieving a goal of \$75,000 in the 1977 Founders Memorial Fund Drive . . . then certainly happiness is reaching a little over 94% of our goal. Now, let's go over the top! The final figure of over \$70,000 includes donations received, profits realized from the sale of commemorative items, and pledges made for future contributions.

On behalf of National Council, we want to thank the provinces, the collegiate and alumnae chapters, and each individual who contributed to this worthwhile project. Many of you have given more than one time and often these gifts have been a real personal sacrifice.

Contributions are still coming, in response to a recent letter sent to chapters and province officers by Grace Mason Lundy, Honorary Chairman. She expresses her deep appreciation for all the delightful and heartwarming letters that have been included with the contributions. Also, through the efforts of our National Headquarters, the sale of commemorative items was very successful with almost a complete "sellout". The profits from these sales helped boost the fund, but equally important is that you have Delta Zeta memorabilia that will only become more valuable in the coming years.

The Founders Memorial Fund, established in honor of Delta Zeta's 75th Anniversary, is operated exclusively for charitable purposes. A Board of Trustees, elected by National Council, manages the affairs of the official corporation and reports to the National Council. The main purpose of the Founders Memorial Fund is to provide

scholarships to loyal Delta Zetas who need financial assistance in order to complete their education. These scholarships are available to undergraduates, graduate students, or women who have been out of school for several years and wish to continue or complete a particular course of study. Application forms are mailed to all our Delta Zeta college chapters in the Winter college mailing and extra application forms may be requested from National Headquarters. Recipients of the scholarships are selected by the Board of Trustees.

We were proud to award the first six scholarships at the 1977 DIAMOND JUBILEE National Convention, and it is hoped that six or more scholarships can be given each year. Though the official drive began with a goal of \$75,000, please remember that this is a continuing fund. All collegiate and alumnae chapters, as well as individuals, are encouraged to channel their philanthropy funds to the Founders Memorial Fund as a tribute to the memory of Delta Zeta's Founders.

One of the biggest thrills in life comes from doing a job well . . . even greater than this is the personal satisfaction of believing in others. You have done this job well! Delta Zeta believes in you and you have proven your belief in Delta Zeta. Again, thanks to each of you from Grace Lundy, National Council, and me for your generous contributions and continuing support in this combined Delta Zeta effort to achieve something very special and lasting in honor of those six women who gave us our Delta Zeta heritage. We look forward to reporting to you on the continued progress of this fine program.

Last fall National Activities chairman Allyson Knoebel announced that an activity award would be given to collegiate chapters who commemorated the Diamond Jubilee in a special way on Founders Day, and recognition would be given in three categories.

The first was the MOST ORIGINAL PROGRAM or ACTIVITY commemorating the Diamond Jubilee. First place in this category went to Alpha Epsilon chapter at Oklahoma State.

The program consisted of a special banquet, guest speakers, songs and a candlelight service. There was also a newspaper announcement in two local papers. BEST PARTICIPATION OF MEMBERS was won by Kappa Phi chapter at the University of North Carolina with complete attendance at the banquet and ceremonies.

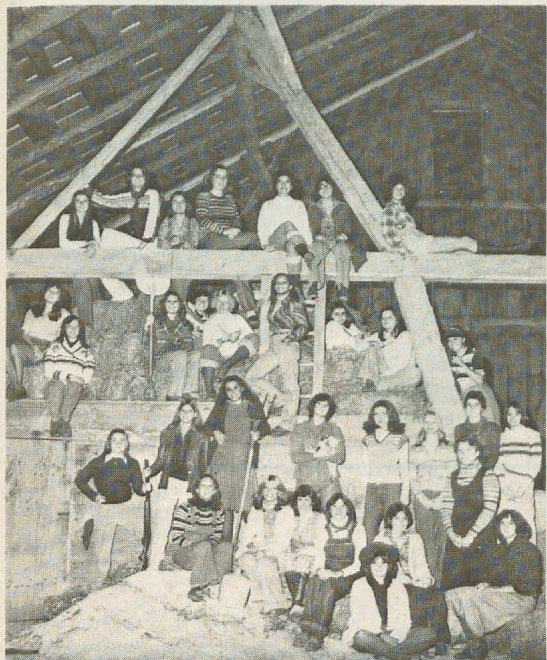

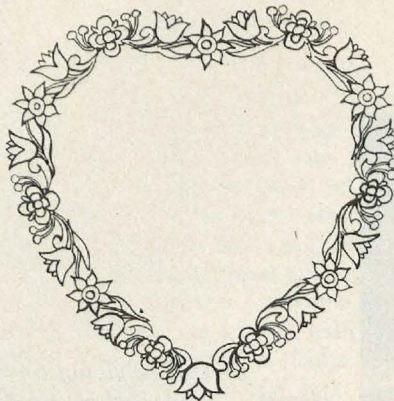

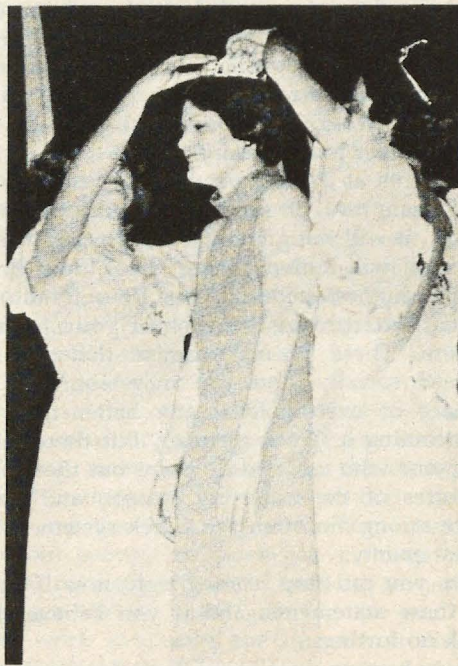

# THE GREEKS HAVE WORDS FOR MICH

Dr. Mary Wallace is Coordinator of Student Activities and Director of Fraternity Relations at Michigan Technological University in Houghton. This speech was given during Greek Week and for the new students orientation at Michigan Tech. She is an alumna of Lambda Theta chapter.

For the past two years I have found myself to be intimately involved with fraternity/sorority systems or "the Greeks" here at MTU. At first the feeling was strange. I was, in fact, attempting to relate to a world completely alien to me. You see, I was not "a Sally Sorority". I never joined a sorority.

You students at Tech have the same choices to make. Joining a fraternity or sorority will not insure college success . . . it will not guarantee good grades (in fact, for some, grades will suffer). Being Greek does not elevate you to the highest pedestal, nor does it automatically raise you in stature in the eyes of your professors or your peers. There is no promise that you will be transformed socially, and you may not even learn to drink more or even hold it any better than you did before becoming a Greek member. But there are always those persons who can and do point out these shortcomings, failures of the fraternity system, and their arguments are strong. So often the Greek system becomes its own worst enemy.

So then, you can stop reading right now if you choose to hear these statements, and if you believe them you need look no further.

But if you keep an open mind, look closely, do not judge by the superficialities opponents of fraternities would have

you judge, you might see things you didn't expect, find new dimensions to measure, and, if you are fortunate, new worlds to explore. You laugh and say that I'm dreaming. I don't think so. You ask, and rightly so, what will becoming a fraternity member do for ME?

Good question! A fraternity or sorority, just as anything in which you participate, will return to you in kind what you have put into it. In other words, you will get out of it, just what you put into it. Make no mistake about it, joining a fraternity or sorority isn't easy and, in modern terminology I'm not "promising you a rose garden". To pledge requires effort, demands work and time on your part. But most importantly, the decision to pledge a fraternity or sorority involves a personal commitment to a way of life, to a fellowship of brotherhood or sisterhood that has existed since the birth of this country in 1776.

Phi Beta Kappa was the first-born Greek letter society. Let me describe it to you, using Baird's Manual as a source, " . . . has all the characteristics of the present day fraternity (sorority): the charm and mystery of secrecy, a ritual, oaths of fidelity, a grip, a motto, a badge for external display, a background of high idealism, a strong tie of friendship and comradeship, an urge for sharing its values through nationwide expansion."

The choice is yours and do not take it lightly for it may change your life. Pledging will not be easy, for the attainment of those things we value seldom comes easily. Fraternities and sororities have been around for a long time and probably will remain a part of the college scene. Whether this is to be a good part or a bad part lies in your hands, individually and collectively.

It might be wise to say, at this point, that if you or a group of students choose not to work within the already

established chapters, there are many other national fraternities and sororities desiring to establish a chapter on the Michigan Tech campus. Think about it. Don't dismiss the idea casually. Every President and Vice President of the United States born since 1825 has been a fraternity member (except 2 in each office). One hundred cabinet members during the past 60 years have been affiliated with a fraternity as have 40 Supreme Court Justices since the Civil War.

When the late J. Hillis Miller, Sigma Phi Epsilon, was president of the University of Florida, he said, "whatever the exceptions may be, the fact remains that the college fraternity movement bears the name which defines the concept upon which the hope of the world must ultimately rest. This in itself is a challenge of unmistakable importance."

Finally, I would say truthfully, fraternity/sorority life isn't for everyone, but I, for one, regret the missed opportunity for learning the meaning of sisterhood, and, you, too, might find that you are missing that vital element in human relationship that is brotherhood.

I close as I began . . . yet I am no longer alien . . . for now I know, my questions have been answered . . . the doubts removed . . . the fallacies exposed and the truth revealed.

"No one would tell me where my soul might be; I searched for God but he eluded me: I sought my brother out and found all three."

You say, what has all this to do with me? It has everything to do with you, first as an individual and then as a Tech student. I missed that opportunity to contribute something positive, and I missed the opportunity to share the brotherhood and sisterhood that comes with fraternity/

sorority membership. Think carefully before you reject this opportunity.

At its best, and by giving your best, the fraternities and sororities offer a positive environment for learning and a personal concern for every initiate and/or pledge. The button you see Greeks wearing this week says it all: "No Greek Stands Alone".

Fraternity is not just for college years . . . fraternity is so much bigger than that. The true fraternity experience just begins during your college years. It ripens and matures after you graduate as you meet brothers or sisters from other collegiate chapters through participation in alumni affairs or as co-workers or next door neighbors. And fraternity isn't just your own chapter, it encompasses the total, national and international brotherhood and sisterhood of all Greeks.

True, I am speaking of an ideal, the best of all possible worlds, and this is achieved only on those rare occasions when dreams mesh with reality to form a perfect union. Here at Tech there is much that needs to be done to purge the image of irresponsible conduct, and otherwise destructive attitudes that so often are said to be synonymous with "being Greek".

But look at it this way, the fraternity is diversity melded with conformity to produce brotherhood. There is room to grow, to expand, to enlarge the view in each fraternity and sorority and it is a loss to both the fraternity/sorority and the independent or non-Greek when you fail to join because of the negative things you see instead of seeking the positive and working toward creating that image. What I am offering to you is the challenge to work to change the image you dislike by becoming a positive part of the system instead of a negative bystander.

# BARBARA DUNN Helps WOMEN in Small BUSINESS

Small business is not really small, as it comprises 97% of all businesses in the country, some 13.2 million small firms.

The Small Business Administration offers financial assistance, management assistance, procurement assistance, and advocacy programs through over 100 field offices, with central offices located in Washington, D.C. It was created by Congress in 1953 to encourage, assist, and protect the interests of small businesses.

Congress has directed SBA to take the lead in identifying and analyzing small business problems, to be the voice and advocate of small business, to foster and coordinate research and organization of significant data and to initiate ideas and innovations that will widen opportunities for small business to get started and compete on an equitable basis.

While all programs have been and are open to all, recently it was felt there was a great need for more emphasis on activities and programs for women. In December, I became the Advocate for Women-in-Business and for Consumer Affairs. It is a most challenging position, as I am responsible for the planning and development of a nationwide program to be supportive of women who are or wish to be small business entrepreneurs, insuring awareness at SBA with our Management Board of the concerns of women and consumers in the nation; to speak for the SBA in intergovernmental matters with private sector organizations and with the White House Office of Consumer Affairs.

Sorting it all out, I feel one of the most important aspects is to increase awareness among women of what SBA can and will do to help women reach their goals in the world of business.

In Fiscal Year 1974, 1947 loans totaling \$91 million were given to businesses owned by women. These figures account for 7% of the business loans approved and 5% of the dollars loaned during the year. By Fiscal Year 1976,

the figures increased to 2,981 loans totaling \$168.5 million accounting for 11% of the business loans approved and 8% of the dollars loaned.

My advice for those starting a business is to study, read, research, and then research, read and study some more. Find trade journals and become better acquainted with your particular field. Know what you want to do first, get your facts about your goods or service well in mind, and then be prepared to devote all your time, money, energy, and attention to the project. SBA will guide you with management skills; offers the help of trained personnel; and seminars. Guaranteed loans are available through our field offices. The quickest way to receive booklets, information, or help is to call or visit the office nearest you—look under U.S. Government, Small Business Administration, in the telephone book.

The world of small business is typically American, it's challenging, it's all-consuming, demanding, fun and frustrating—isn't everything that is worthwhile?

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Barbara Baxter Dunn was appointed SBA Advocate for Women in Business and Consumer Affairs at the end of last year. Prior to joining the SBA, Barbara was Vice President of Sales and Consumer Relations for the Pepsi Cola Bottling companies of Hartford, Connecticut. Previously she was Commissioner of Consumer Protection for the State of Connecticut and was the first woman Boxing Commissioner in that state.

A graduate of the University of Connecticut, she was the 1976 recipient of the University's Distinguished Alumni Award. Her daughter Joanne is a member of Iota Kappa chapter at Rider, and her sister Nancy Baxter Broadhurst was a member of Gamma Beta Chapter at Connecticut.

When she moved to her Washington DC office, she found her secretary Claudette Turner Thompson, was also a Delta Zeta from Beta Theta chapter at Bucknell.

Her first career consisted of more than 25 years as a homemaker and the raising of three children who are college graduates with professions and families of their own.

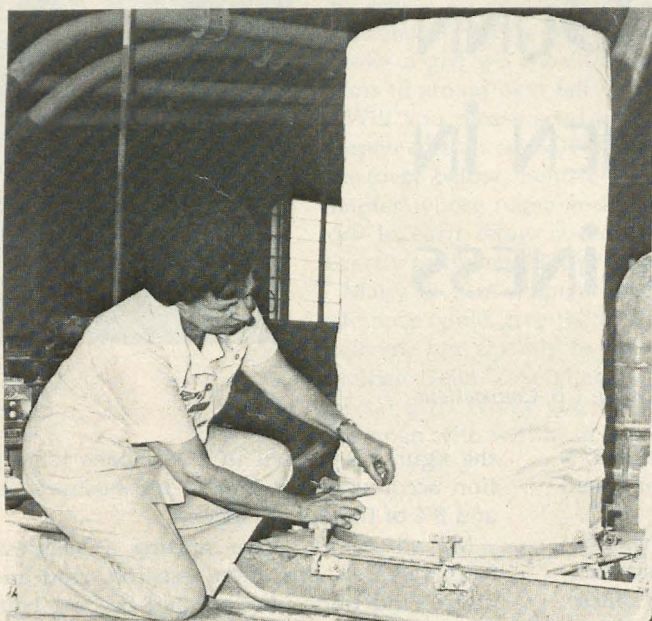

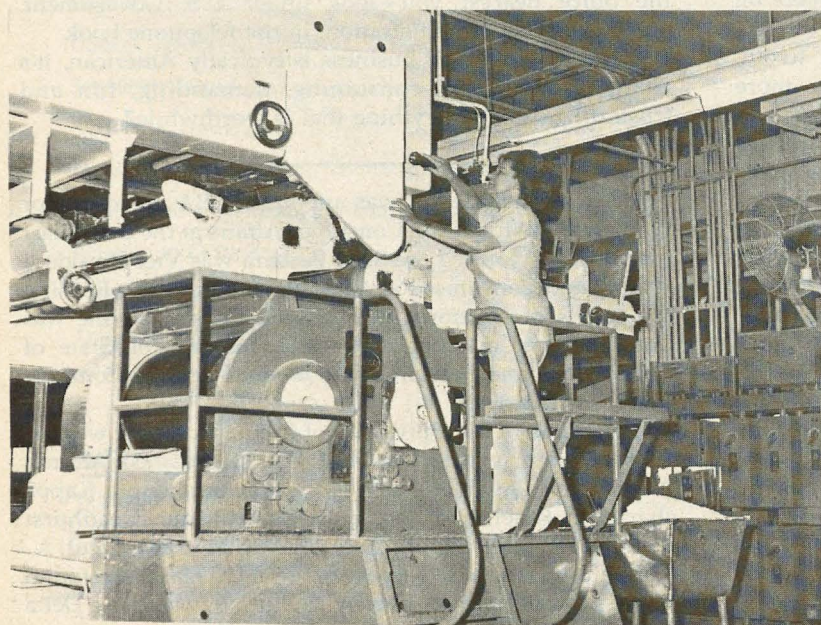

## MARGUERITE MULLIGAN: OUTSTANDING PRIVATE SCHOOL TEACHER

Sparkling black Irish eyes, a bubbling sense of humor, a flair for the dramatic and a devotion to imaginative scholarship, characterized Marguerite Stevens Mulligan when she was one of the most popular members of Beta Gamma chapter at the University of Louisville. These same outstanding qualities led to her selection last November as the outstanding private school teacher in the five-state region which includes her school, Kentucky Country Day School of Louisville, Kentucky.

At the annual conference in Indianapolis of the organization of private schools, her citation read in part:

"Consider if you will, a major in chemistry and a Master of Arts in Teaching degree being applied to the instruction from fourth grade through college preparatory chemistry classes. To this, one adds the creation of a lower school math lab, the co-authoring of a major segment of the school's student handbook and the production of a three-day Bicentennial "Mini-Mester" appropriately titled "The Spring Fling".

"Qualified to administer first aid,

Mrs. Mulligan has been volunteering to act in emergencies as school nurse. While she herself was recuperating from an operation she wrote a skit that was used to kick off the school's *Values and Ethics* program. Finally, her regular bus and car duties at school must stand her in good stead for the other phases of her life as wife and as mother of two teen-age children.

"Versatility, yes, competency, yes, but far more than these, Mrs. Mulligan cares more for others than for herself, and thus becomes an example for everyone. As a special friend to all, she is both an inspiration and an impetus to be satisfied with nothing but the finest of which one is capable."

After establishing herself as an exemplary independent woman student, Marge Stevens joined Delta Zeta in her junior year and served the chapter as Social Chairman, in addition to bringing much honor and recognition to her chapter from her many campus and extra-curricular activities. She starred in many, and directed other campus Little Theatre productions, as well as performing similarly in the Clarksville Little

Theatre Company. She staged and conducted groups in the annual Fryberger Sing choral competitions and was also one of six Delta Zetas who handily won first place trophy in the first annual Lambda Chi Alpha Can Can Contest.

Following graduation, she obtained valuable experience as a chemist in private industry. She entered teaching after her two children started to school.

Although she has great dramatic and social skills, Marge is probably best known for her serious scholarship and communicating a love of knowledge to others. She belonged to and was active in many professional and scholastic groups, where she was also respected and recognized. In the Spring of 1977, she was named as the "first" Outstanding Faculty Member of KCD. This award was presented by the Alumni, but the Faculty made the selection.

Beta Gamma and Louisville Alumnae have long counted Marge among their most popular and beloved members and can only heartily agree with her selection for these honors.



# CLARA WILTSE CATALOGUES ANCIENT GLASS COLLECTION

What should one do when one retires? That's not an easy question to answer because each individual has a different pre-retirement notion of how these "extra hours" should be used.

For Clara Wiltse, a Ball State University art professor who retired in 1971, and a Muncie Delta Zeta, it was all decided before she left the campus. Dr. Alice Nichols asked her to do a catalog for the university Art Gallery of its two ancient glass collections.

The collections include a large collection of ancient glass, mostly Roman, which the late George A. Ball purchased from the Parke Bernet Gallery in New York years ago and the Kraft Collection acquired by Edmund F. Ball in 1952. Dr. Nichols and Mrs. Edmund F. Ball were both anxious to have a catalog prepared on the collections which number 176 pieces of ancient glass dating from the first century A.D. to the fifth century A.D. The Ball Brothers Foundation agreed to fund the printing of the catalog.

Six years and four months later the new catalog, *Ancient Glass Collections*, was officially presented at a reception for Clara Wiltse during the opening of the new exhibit, "Indiana Pattern Glass of the Gas-Boom Era."

Clara's interest in glass, both

modern and ancient, can be attributed in part to her having lived in West Virginia as a teenager and later as a teacher in the Charleston school system during the depression. Her father, the late Herbert A. Wiltse, a mechanical engineer, had designed the first double furnace for sheet glass for the Libby Glass Co. in Charleston. A visit to see the new furnace after it was installed had piqued her curiosity about how glass is made.

A teacher at Ball State for 23 years, Clara Wiltse has always loved to read. She devoted one of her special assigned leaves in 1964 to studying the art of ancient civilizations. This included, of course, "the discovery of glass and its development in Mesopotamia, Egypt and then in Rome," she writes in her new catalog. This led to additional study of stained glass. Twice she has gone to Toledo to study the Museum of Art's ancient glass collection, once after she retired and agreed to do the catalog.

Most of the literature on glass, she discovered, was written in German. Spanish and French were her languages. So Clara Wiltse, special assistant professor emeritus of art, became a Ball State student. She audited a first year German course and this, she said, "has been very rewarding."

All the reading, research, drawing, measuring and writing took much longer than she envisioned when she agreed to do the project in 1971. Consider, for example, that she doesn't drive a car. She walks a considerable distance from her apartment just to get a city bus to make the circuitous trip to the campus and back home again.

But Clara Wiltse has always been one who has enjoyed walking, even when she taught. And when one has a goal, obstacles aren't so formidable.

Her new catalog, currently on sale at the Art Gallery, contains a thorough, but concise record of each piece in the Ball and Kraft collections, both on permanent loan to the gallery. She indicates how it was made—blown or free-blown—its color, height, dimensions, a brief description of the bottle, jar, flask, jug, cup, beaker, bowl or vase.

Miss Wiltse's catalog also indicates for what use the glass piece was originally intended, such as to hold oil or unguents, and the condition of the piece. And then she records, as nearly as she has been able to determine from her research and reading, approximately when the glass was made. The last information noted is whether it is from the Ball collection or the Kraft collection.



# ANTIQUE TOY THEATRES

Vivian Ring Mackey, K-Washington, showed some of her collection of antique toy theatres, at a recent meeting of the Greater Seattle alumnae. She has worked with marionettes and related interests since childhood and told about this little known Victorian form of paper art.

Her uncle, the late Cedric M. Lindholm of Minneapolis, was a collector and it is through him that Vivian fell heir to some of her possessions. She has toy theatres from England, Spain, Denmark and Germany.

It is the English toy theatre which has the longest and most distinguished history. Beginning in the early 1800's, there was no English theatre, actor, or actress which was not "done" in Portrait, Souvenir Sheet, Tinsel Ornament, or entire play. From 1811-54, William West alone had 146 sheets or plays for sale.

Boys seemed to be especially attracted to these miniature theatres, and Robert Louis Stevenson was no exception. In 1884, *The Magazine of Art* published his essay, "Penny Plain and Twopence Coloured" so named because the uncolored sheets cost only half as much as those which had been hand-colored.

Whole families would gather or take the packets of uncolored engravings and, to earn a few pence, apply the pigment which seems to be unequaled in rich, bold coloring, as brilliant today as it was when first applied.

## Wildlife Specialist

Cindy Uptegraft, AB-Illinois, is an Interpretive Specialist at the Tinicum National Environmental Center in extreme southwestern Philadelphia.

A recent graduate of the University of Illinois, she is in charge of all public use and environmental education for the Center and the surrounding National Wildlife Refuge as described in the brochures.

And reading these interesting brochures one learns that Tinicum Marsh was first diked by Swedish farmers who settled there in 1643. Dutch farmers and the Pennsylvania colonial government constructed additional dikes during the Revolutionary War.

In 1955, through the efforts of area citizens and the Philadelphia conservationists, 145 acres of marsh and upland were donated to the city for a wildlife preserve, and in 1972, Congress established Tinicum Center to be administered by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

The Marsh is one of the last remain-

ing fresh water tidal wetlands, and when completed will total 1200 acres. It even harbors lingering patches of wild rice favored as food by migratory water birds. Over 270 species of birds and 13 resident mammal species are present. Migrating birds such as Canada geese, black ducks, great blue herons, killdeer and sandpipers use the Center as a rest stop during spring and fall flights.

Thousands of ruddy ducks and pintails winter here in view of the Philadelphia skyline. Muskrats and cottontail rabbits are common. Osprey and peregrine falcons are endangered species that are occasionally observed.

While an undergraduate in the Department of Park Administration, Cindy had related summer field work positions. # STANDOUT High School Principal

Accomplishment is a way of life for Helen Ringle Ditzhazy, BP-Michigan State. As one of the one per cent of high school principals in the country who are female, and the only female high school principal in Michigan to hold a doctorate degree, she is at ease being a standout in a crowd.

Dr. Ditzhazy is serving her fifth year as principal and curriculum leader of Novi High School in Novi, Michigan. She is also currently president of the Southeastern Conference Principals' Association, a member of the board of directors of the Michigan Association of Supervision and Curriculum Development, and Michigan representative to the National Committee on Status and Welfare of the National Association of Secondary School Principals.

Helen has served on the faculties of the University of Michigan, Michigan State University and Eastern Michigan University. Her active professional life began at MSU in East Lansing where, after her mother discouraged her from becoming a veterinarian, she decided to major in institutional administration. During her senior year she began working for the university as an apprentice

dietitian. Assuming her career would be in the area of residence hall management, she earned the necessary master's degree in guidance and counseling.

Soon, however, she and husband Joseph moved to the Detroit area where he became an engineer with Ford Motor Company, and she, a home economics teacher at Thurston High School in Redford. While working on her Ph.D. in secondary administration at the University of Michigan, Helen quickly assumed the roles of counselor and then assistant principal at Thurston; from there she stepped to the Novi principalship in 1972.

Along the way she convinced Joseph to leave his successful engineering career to join the ranks of the educators. He now teaches math and science in Plymouth, Michigan, and regrets not having made the transition sooner.

As a principal, Helen has hopes of upgrading her school's curriculum, making it more in depth. Inspired by a Harvard University seminar she attended this past summer designed for school administrators to study moral and ethical decision making, she also hopes to incorporate moral education into the school curriculum. She will soon be reporting on this to the North Central Association, a regional accrediting organization in which she has been extremely active, heading numerous evaluation and reviewing committees in Michigan and other states.

Despite heavy professional demands on her time, Helen has managed to raise two children who have achieved much in their own lives. J. Andrew Jr. graduated in 1972 from MSU and later took his Master of Science degree at Cornell. He is currently in charge of Research and Analysis for the Augusta, Maine, Police and Public Safety Division and he teaches at the University of Maine.

Daughter Carol, a 1976 graduate of Kalamazoo College, is now in her second semester at Chicago's Kent Law School. Through her deep involvement in Youth for Understanding she has traveled to numerous foreign countries while her family has hosted 14 exchange students from around the world. It is no wonder that travel ranks as Dr. Ditzhazy's favorite activity.

No matter how busy she has been over the years, Dr. Ditzhazy has always reserved time for Delta Zeta. Having served as president of Beta Rho, she was also that chapter's CCD for four years. After moving to the Detroit area she became Delta Zeta representative to Dearborn Panhellenic, holding all offices including president. She was Detroit Metropolitan *Lamp* editor and a member of the Metropolitan Detroit Reference Committee. For her efforts she was nominated by her sisters for Delta Zeta Woman of the year and the Detroit area Heart of Gold Award in 1977.

Dr. Ditzhazy's other memberships include Michigan Association of the Professions, Phi Delta Kappa, and charter membership and first president of the Beta Chi chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma Society International. She is also active in numerous community organizations.

She has been published in the *NASSP Bulletin*, the *MASSP Journal of Secondary Education*, and the *MEA Journal*.

Helen Ditzhazy has indeed achieved a great deal, as evidenced by her listings in the *Dictionary of International Biography*, *Who's Who of American Women* and *Who's Who in the Midwest*; but she isn't through yet.

Women hold only one-tenth of one per cent of the nation's school superintendent positions. Only one superintendent position is held by a woman in Michigan. Guess who wants to be number two?



# FROM MUSIC TO DAIRY

How did a jet pilot and a Chicago school teacher wind up operating a prize winning dairy in New Mexico?

It was the furthest thing in the minds of Michael Hamilton and Dawn Holman, AB-Illinois, when they met in the big city while he was serving in the Navy air force. They decided this was no way to raise children so they moved to Bosque to help in his parents' dairy. With a degree in mechanical engineering, Michael spent considerable time planning for their own dairy, and it and their hilltop home was built to an unusual design. The house is double insulated to regulate heat, and the dairy designed for a minimum of labor.

With 130 Holsteins to be milked twice daily, efficiency makes the operation possible with two people. The personal touch is not lost amid modern methods. Besides the numbers they have for computer records, all the Hamilton cows have names.

A family affair Dawn even helps out with the milking, which is a long way from her music education. But engineering and hard work won Michael and Dawn a trip to the annual convention of the Associated Milk Producers in Miami, Florida, when they were chosen Young Cooperators of the Year for the southwest district which includes New Mexico, Texas, part of Colorado and Oklahoma.

## SENTENCES Drop Words

Sentences have dropped about 10 words a century since the mid-1700's, according to Dr. Wayne Danielson, dean of the School of Communication at the University of Texas and a specialist in mass communication research.

Danielson has spent the past several months in a study of historical changes in writing styles in newspapers and in American and English novels.

Working with materials back to 1740, he found in general a long-range trend toward simplification of the language—a decrease in sentence length by about 10 words each century, and the disappearance of long words and punctuation marks such as colon, semicolon, dash and hyphen.

Such trends reflect changes in society requiring more easily and quickly read materials and imply alterations in the levels of thought in public discourse, he says.

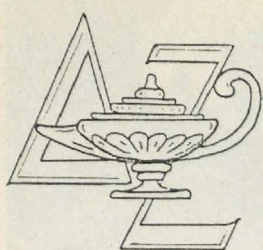

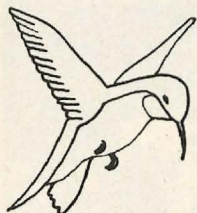

that trims a birthday cake?

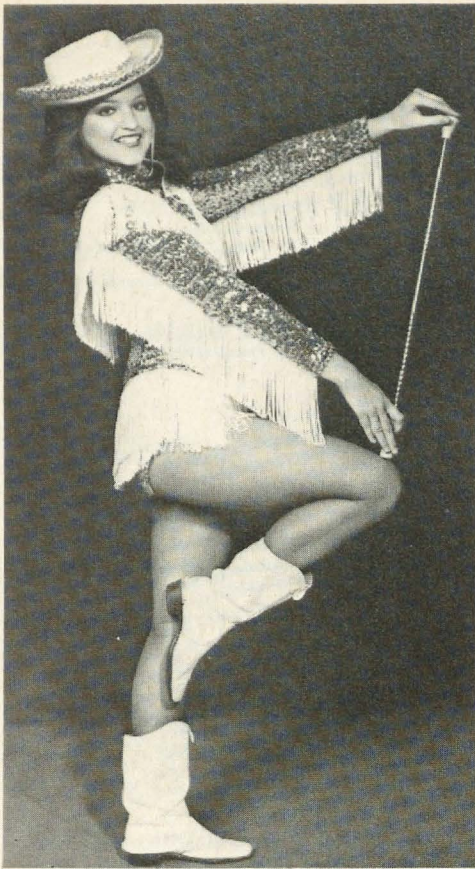
Wider, ever wider, with new awareness,

I've willed my golden stamen to the wind.

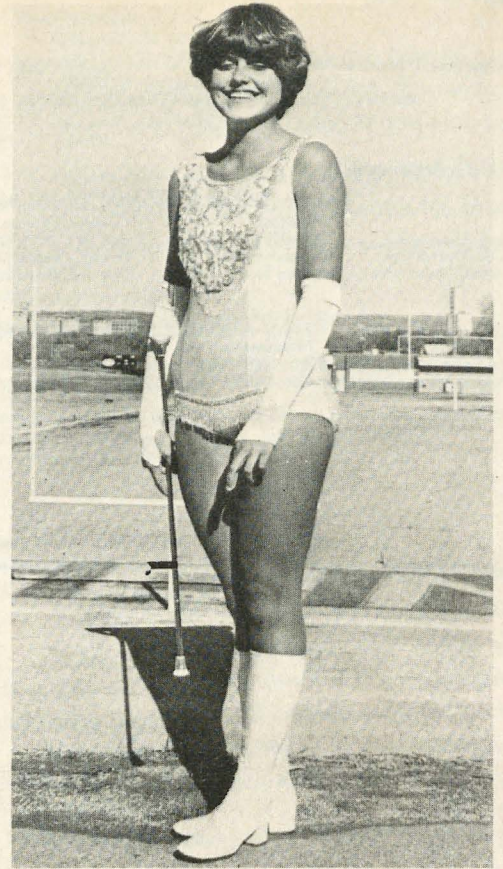
Are there then new ways of Being?
