Jill Teresa Banks Florida State University-AΣ

Jill Banks first served Delta Zeta as a member of the judicial and standards boards, then as assistant rush chairman, corresponding secretary, rush chairman and finally, as president. As president, she led the  $A\Sigma$  chapter's initiation team for the installation of  $\Delta B$  chapter at the University of Tampa.

Jill has represented Delta Zeta in several beauty pageants and has been involved in the campus Greek Fellowship group. She is an officer of Rotaract, a career oriented service club, belongs to Garnet and Gold Key (leadership and scholastic honorary) and is a member of Rho Lambda, Panhellenic honorary.

Dean Stephen S. Winters wrote of Jill: "I have known her since her freshman year and, in the best meaning of the word, she exemplifies the sorority woman; soft spoken, well mannered, highly motivated, academically capable, completely loyal and with impeccable character. The positive point system was designed as an alternative to a required activities/fining system. Under the point system no activities are required, but each member chooses those activities she wishes to attend. The only requirement is that each member must earn 44 points per semester.

Brenda Tobias served Delta Theta as president and as chairman of the chapter's 25th anniversary celebration. She was named Dream Girl and was nominated for Miss UH. She received a Houston Alumnae Panhellenic scholarship and a Founders Memorial scholarship. As Senior Panhellenic Delegate, she was Panhellenic rush chairman and was named the outstanding Panhellenic officer.

Brenda is a member of Alpha Lambda Delta/Phi Eta Sigma (freshman honorary) and Beta Alpha Psi (professional accounting fraternity). Maintaining a place on the Dean's List for six semesters, she also was named to Beta Gamma Sigma (business and management) and Phi Kappa Phi, the national honor society for recognition of superior scholarship in all academic disciplines.

At that time, chapter morale was low and little was being accomplished. Terry grasped the situation without hesitation. At Convention no one could have guessed she was a novice at her job!

It is a pleasure to announce that Iota Pi chapter has returned to the campus of West Virginia Institute of Technology. Originally installed in February, 1967, the chapter had been dormant for several years.

West Virginia Institute of Technology is located in Montgomery, WV, along the Kanasha River. The school is noted for its excellence in engineering, dental hygiene and printing. There are five fraternities and Iota Pi makes the third sorority. Because of the engineering programs, the campus is male oriented with a ratio of 3

to 1. Thus, with a relatively small female enrollment, it wasn't all that easy to bring Iota Pi back.

Penny Payne, president of the chapter, was a transfer student from Delta Upsilon chapter at Marshall University. Terry Davis, a transfer from Epsilon Iota chapter at Fairmont State and now the pledge training vice president, worked with Penny and with alumna Dr. Virginia P. Gray to form a local colony of Iota Pi. With the assistance of the two collegiate Delta Zetas and with Dr. Gray as faculty advisor, the first eight young

women pledged for a year!

Even before chartering, however, Iota Pi colony prided itself in being active in the community. They participated in the Run for Children race (approximately three miles), and won the first place trophy for group participation. At Halloween they dressed in costumes and visited the pediatrics ward at Montgomery General Hospital. They also actively participated in campus blood drives and won the title of best decorated float in the Homecoming Parade.

And so, it was only natural that on

February 13, nineteen pledges became Delta Zeta sisters as Iota Pi was reissued its charter. As in 1967, Delta Upsilon chapter from Marshall University performed the initiation ceremony.

California State University, Long Beach was established to serve the needs of Orange County and the southeast portion of Los Angeles County. The instructional program was initiated in the fall of 1949 with one hundred and sixty-nine upper division students, and twenty-four administrative, instructional and clerical members. The first graduation class of 1950 included thirty-two candidates who received a BA degree. Presently, Long Beach State has an enrollment of over 33,000 and there are more than two hundred student organizations on campus, which reflect interests in politics, religion, recreation, cultural, social, and academic areas. C.S.U.L.B. is known for its excellence in art, nursing, and teacher's education.

On March 20, 1950 twelve women founded Omega Phi Delta which was dedicated to promote social activity, friendships, cooperation, growth of womanly character and further good scholarship among the members. Omega Phi Delta was the third sorority to be founded at C.S.U.L.B. The adopted colors were yellow and green with the yellow carnation as the flower. Four years after the founding of Omega Phi Delta, on January 31, 1954 the members, pledges, and alumnae were pledged into Delta Zeta. The sorority was installed as the Delta Alpha chapter of Delta Zeta, the first National Panhellenic sorority on the Long Beach State campus. Maintaining their original founding date, members and alumnae of Omega Phi Delta were initiated on March 20, 1954.

Delta Alpha is known for being a very active chapter, besides participating in activities with fraternities and campus groups, Delta Alpha also does many things with just themselves. Every fall semester, Delta Alpha holds a Hawaiian Luau in honor of the pledges. This starts the year off with a strong feeling of togetherness and sisterhood. The pledges are again the center of attention as Delta Alpha celebrates Halloween with a big and little sister pumpkin carving contest. Awards are given for the most original, scariest, and funniest pumpkin. Afterwards, the chapter goes serenading and presents the pumpkins to local hospitals.

Another major event for the fall semester is the father and daughter football game. The fathers are treated to the game and to pizza after the game. The mothers are not forgotten! Every spring semester we have a mother and daughter tea and fashion show at the Delta Alpha house. Delta Alpha also has activities with the Long Beach alumnae chapter. This year we are planning a joint fund-

raiser with the alumnae. Also every semester we honor them with an alumnae dessert at the Delta Alpha house.

Other activities for the fall semester include an all sorority powder puff football tournament, a weekend mountain retreat and a big and little sister Christmas party. In 1980 Delta Zeta took first place in the football tournament and we are looking forward to recapturing the title in 1982. The mountain retreat is one of our most memorable activities every year. It is a time where sisterhood abounds and Delta Alpha's strength and spirit is renewed. The weekend includes skits, songs, all night talks, and other inspirational activities. The fall semester concludes with the big and little sister Christmas party. Every member brings an ornament for the Christmas tree and gifts for special people. There is always a visit from Santa.

One of the most exciting events of the spring semester is Derby Days, which is an all sorority competition sponsored by Sigma Chi fraternity. The purpose is to raise money for philanthropies. The events include selling ads, spirit and publicity contest, derby swipe, "Miss Venus", sorority feud, cake decorating, and games day. In 1981 we placed first in five of the events and second place in the remaining two events. This gave Delta Alpha the most points for the week and we were given the first

place trophy! This year we are working hard to take first place two years in a row, a feat that no other sorority has been able to accomplish.

Delta Alpha has also received first place for the most spirited house during Greek Week for two out of two years. Other competitions that Delta Alphas participate in include that of the Theta Chi fraternity, the all sorority softball tournament and the Sigma Alpha Epsilon volleyball tournament. During the three year history of the volleyball tournament Delta Alpha has placed first two times and second once. We are practicing now in hopes of bringing home the first place trophy again! Finally, one of Delta Alpha's most prized awards was given to the chapter at National Convention for reaching quota five years in a row.

One of the most enjoyable events during the spring semester is Flame Fantasy. It is a fashion show put on by Southern California Lamplighters, where Delta Zeta collegians work as volunteers. This year's commentator was Nanette Fabray and honored guest National President, Carolyn Gullatt. After the fashion show, the day was concluded with a dinner at the Delta Alpha house honoring Mrs. Gullatt. Additional guests who attended the dinner were Betty Bragg, PAD, Karen Dessel, PCD, Diane Harris, president of Long Beach alumnae, and Cindy Johnson, CCD. After dinner, Mrs. Gullatt led a candid question and answer session, with tales of her early Delta Zeta years. She delighted everyone and allowed us the opportunity to learn more about different phases of sorority life. The evening was concluded by serenading Mrs. Gullatt in a friendship circle singing "Dream Girl of Delta Zeta."

Amidst all of Delta Alpha's involvements, sisterhood and friendship remain the primary foundation of the chapter. Our love and conern for each other help us to achieve our goals.

## Meet Beta Xi at Auburn University

Waaaaar Eagle! The members of the Beta Xi chapter of Delta Zeta at Auburn University can be heard joining in this battle cry in true Auburn tradition. One of the largest universities in the South, Auburn University is located in Auburn, Alabama, just 60 miles northeast of the state capitol, Montgomery.

The Auburn University campus is well known for its beauty and small town friendliness. Chartered in 1856 and called East Alabama Male College, the school was begun as a single four-story building with an enrollment of 100 students, all males, and

six faculty members. After the War Between the States when the building was converted into a Confederate hospital, the school was reopened but the economic ruin of the South had reduced the finances of the school considerably.

This problem was solved when the Morrill Act was passed in 1872, making Auburn the first land-grant college in the South. The name of the school was changed to The Agricultural and Mechanical College of Alabama. Placing great emphasis on the liberal arts and growing steadily, Auburn changed its name again in 1899 to Ala-

bama Polytechnic Institute. This name stayed with the college for 61 years until the state legislature changed the name permanently to Auburn University in 1960.

The Beta Xi chapter of Delta Zeta was begun on the campus of Auburn, then the Alabama Polytechnic Institute, in 1939. When Beta Xi received its charter in 1940 there were twenty sisters and four other sororities on campus. Originally, the home of the Beta Xi chapter was Dorm 1 but since 1965, Auburn Delta Zetas have resided in Dorm D.

Many traditions surround "the lov-

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ast tall.

Another Auburn tradition that Beta Xi gets involved in is the annual Step Sing song contest. Step Sing is held at the first of winter quarter and the contestants are sororities and fraternitites who have all practiced long and hard to "polish up their act" for the judges and spectators.

Beauty pageants have become a tradition at Auburn, with over ten different ones held throughout the year ranging from Miss Fall Rush to Miss Watermelon Bust. One contest, the Miss Glomerata pageant, selects twenty girls as Glom Beautys who compete in the pageant and have their pictures taken for the school annual. Beta Xi has always been well represented in this contest and this year, Suzanne Nash was selected as a Glom Beauty out of the hundreds of girls who entered.

Beta Xi activities are as varied as are Auburn traditions. Each fall the new pledges are honored at a Pledge Formal dance, and Winter Formal always proves to be an exciting annual event for the sisters. Spring quarter will be filled with fun this year with a retreat and a special spring party in the works.

Other activities include two fund raisers held last year to support the chapter's national philanthropy and the All Campus Fund Drive. Campus activities, such as the annual Blood Drive, receive a large percentage of participation from the Beta Xis. An Easter Egg hunt for underprivileged children will be held in the spring as another of the chapter's service projects.

One very special Auburn tradition is Aubie, the team mascot. Aubie is a cartoon tiger who appeared in 1959 on the cover of a football program. Brought to life in 1979, Aubie has become a symbol of the true Auburn spirit.

The annual Alabama Delta Zeta state convention, Province Day, was hosted this year by Beta Xi and the sisters worked hard to organize the meeting and show the other Delta Zetas from all over Alabama what being an Auburn Delta Zeta really means.

The Flame Fantasy committee, chaired by Rae Sweet Templin, Oregon State—X, of the Orange County alumnae chapter, was composed of representatives of the eight alumnae chapters who comprise the Lamplighters of Southern California, Members of the committee included Ruth Wilt, Los Angeles - stage and table decor; Marty Mirabal, Santa Monica reservations; Ruth Thomas and Mary Lou Markling, Orange County - financial manager and invitations, respectively; Alethia Brill, Whittier-West Covina - opportunity tickets; Barbara Gates, San Fernando Valley - table prizes; Catherine Carstens, Pasadena-Foothill - public relations; Ruby McKee, South Bay - patron donations, and Althea Miller, Long Beach - publicity.

Another innovation to the fashion show was the use of models from Sonance, an HEI suppport group of professional models who donated their \$1,000 fee to the Institute. With the inclusion f that amount, HEI, real-

realized nearly \$10,000 in proceeds from Flame Fantasy.

Collegians from CSU-Fullerton-IY, CSU-Los Angeles- $\Theta$ P and CSU-Long Beach- $\Delta$ A were on hand to help with the sale of opportunity tickets. Proceeds of \$3,491 went into the Housing Fund which is used to refurnish chapter houses.

## The Founders Memorial Foundation

This year the Delta Zeta Foundation "comes of age" - it was incorporated in March, 1961, by Mary Collins Galbraith, Alfa Lloyd Hayes and Helen Woodruff Nolop. Since two of the original incorporators were Founders of Delta Zeta Sorority, it is entirely fitting that the term "Founders Memorial" be added to the Foundation name.

It has taken a while, but the "machinery" of the merger of the Delta Zeta Foundation, and the Delta Zeta Founders Memorial Fund is now in

place and in working order.

The intent of the Foundation is to provide a place of safekeeping for the legacies and bequests which have been made to the Delta Zeta Sorority for the purpose of providing scholarships and financial assistance to members of the sorority. As indicated at the time of the merger - all of the Foundation scholarships have been retained, adding the Founders Scholarships to the list, and increasing the amount of these scholarships to \$500.00 each. Also the Edith Head Scholarship has been added, this for continuing studies in Fashion Design. Delta Zeta's long interest in Gallaudet College continues unlimited.

With the curtailment of funds from other sources, members will be looking for further assistance from their sorority to help them finance their education, and continue to be active within their campus chapters. All contributions to the Foundation are tax deductible. And no amount is too small - for it can be matched, or placed with other contributions to build a special scholarship or grant, or build toward a special scholarship.

Many of our scholarships were established long before these days of high interest rates, and the principals

do not generate the returns which would be available if they were invested in the current market. A point which is very important is that these funds be kept intact so as to produce continuing monies for established scholarships or grants. Security and continuity are assured with the Foundation. It is our aim to help as many sisters as possible, and it would be wonderful indeed if we might be able in the future to assist every qualified young woman on every campus where Delta Zeta Sorority has a chapter. It can be done - with your conscious and determined help.



Northeast, Delta Sigma—For the first time in the past six years, an all female team placed in the Blue Key sponsored



## **Campus Sights and Sounds**

A CONCERT UNDER WATER was conducted at Dartmouth College. Music was piped into the college pool via three special low-voltage underwater speakers. Concert-goers swam, floated, and snorkeled in the water heated to 93 degrees in the New Hampshire winter. Many were quoted as enjoying the experience but the music was also described as "sounding something like an off-key, warbling sound track to an outer-space movie performed in a small bathroom with the sink running"

VARYING TUITION could be charged at several Midwestern universities says the College Press Service. Schools trying to cope with budget cuts are considering charging more money for popular majors like engineering and computer science than for liberal arts majors that are less in demand. Some schools, like the University of Minnesota, already charge differing tuition rates based on program cost. (On-Campus Report)

WHEN THE OIL BILL topped \$6,000, the Sigma Nu chapter at Maine/Portland insulated their 1812-built house and added a wood-burning furnace. They buy wood in cheaper eight-foot lengths, cut it to two-foot lengths with a chain saw, and then split it. The cost for heat and hot water last winter was only \$450—and the brothers' hard work.

AN EXCHANGE PROGRAM encompassing research and teaching in marine science has been set up between the University of South Carolina and Stockholm University in Sweden.

TELEVISED SPORTS began with a 10-inning Princeton-Columbia baseball game broadcast May 17, 1939 on NBC from New York City. Princeton won. (*TV Guide*) CLOSE TO HALF of the 286,000 foreign students in this country are majoring in science or engineering and, according to a recent study by the National Science Foundation, almost 50,000 foreign graduate students are stu-

dying in those fields.

WOMEN NOW OUTNUMBER men on American campuses by nearly half a million. This year 52 of every 100 students are women compared to 45 of every 100 six

years ago. (Chronicle)

BLACKBURN COLLEGE (Illinois) students work at least 15 hours a week on construction, cutting grass, cooking, etc. It's estimated that they save the college one million a year. With a 500 student enrollment, they have built eight buildings including a library, swimming pool, and student union.

MORE WORK was done by eight students at Southwest Missouri under the direction of the home economics and industrial education departments. They renovated two houses used as girls' dorms. The physical work included plumbing and wiring repairs, stripping wood, painting and papering. The students also prepared research papers on some aspect of their work.

THE FIRST full-time, paid college fire department was established in 1935 at the University of Illinois. A volunteer unit had existed from 1900 when engines were drawn by horses.

THE SCHOOL OF MEDICINE at the University of North Dakota has received an award of merit from the Association of American Indian Physicians for contributions to improve health care for Indians and Alaskan natives. For eight years, the school has operated INMED (Indians into Medicine) to help young Indians prepare for a career in health care.

SIGN LANGUAGE. A Michigan State alumnus proposed to his girlfriend via the card section during halftime at a football game. The card section provided the service for a donation to the Student Foundation. The alumnus then reported "Yes" by a giant sign of his own. (Collegiate

Hedlines)

ALPHA TAU OMEGA at the University of Nebraska sponsored the 3rd annual "Week of the Wagon" which included a Saturday night "Dry Dance" to show that there are alternatives to drinking. (Collegiate Hedlines) EXXON EDUCATION FOUNDATION has given \$15 million to 66 U. S. colleges and universities in support of engineering, geology, and computer science education. The money will be used to create 100 teaching fellowships and to provide 100 salary support grants for junior faculty. The grant is a special funding in honor of the centennial anniversary of Exxon's founding.

CIVIL ENGINEERS at Ohio State say "geotextiles" (as substitutes for some of the asphalt in roads) can lengthen road life two to three times. They estimate that using polyester layers will cut costs of building a single lane road as much as \$35,000 a miles. (U. S. News)

THE FIRST WOMAN to be dean of a graduate school at Harvard was named recently as dean of education.

(Chronicle of Higher Education)

JUST FOR SHOW. The marching band at the University of Georgia sports 16 tubas but only half of them are played. The rest are merely carried "for visual effect."

THE SAILING CLUB at Oklahoma State has volunteered its time and equipment to the university's medical and counseling programs for drug abusers. The club volunteered its eight sailboats, six sail boards and 46 members to help drug abusers master a sport and build a positive self-image.

A HISTORY CLASS project at the University of Missouri resulted in a city ordinance requiring a 5¢ deposit on all beer, soft drink, mineral water, and soda water containers. Columbia is the only city in the country with its

own deposit ordinance.
