RUSH - small word, big project! Rush is the lifeline to our future in Delta Zeta and a project our collegians take very seriously. Often extending over a period of four to fourteen days in the fall, rush is theme parties, practices, meeting massive numbers of women, laughter and tears, choosing special women to join our sisterhood.

Preparation for formal rush begins in January with the election of the rush chairman followed by party chairman appointments and committee assignments. In Delta Zeta there are no impossibilities as a chapter works together.

Spring is the time set aside for intensive rush education for the chapter. Honing conversation skills, developing skits, rehearsing songs, planning and making decorations, receiving guidance from a CCD, PCD and Field Representative are but a few necessities in laying the foundation for a successful rush. A chapter furnishes complete rush plans to the CCD, PCD and National Vice President of Membership for approval at least one month before the close of the school year.

Summer is not only a time for relaxation but also for continued rush preparation for the chapter. Final arrangements for alumnae assistance, rentals, or the making of a party costume or preference dress fill summer days. Often a summer retreat or work week is

implemented.

Fall sees the return of the collegians prepared for and excited to rush. Parents helping their daughters move into the house or dorm cannot help but feel the enthusiasm as the joy of sisters united begins to peak. Traffic jams are the norm as boxes of clothes, stereos and pictures of fun times and members return to establish their school home.

Pre-rush review is held during the week before rush to finalize plans and polish rush parties. The rush chairman puts the chapter through its paces by timing and cuing parties, anticipating and resolving problems, and being sure the mechanics of rush are under control.

The pace becomes more hectic as the rush

approaches. It's an exciting time!

Before one knows it, the chapter is ready. Everyone and everything is in place. The door opens . . . and . . . there "they" are! The rushees - excited to be rush participants and eager to discover our Delta Zeta. There we are - butterflies not withstanding, collegians' feet are firmly planted on the ground, heads held high, smiles abound. The chapter exudes Delta Zeta pride and energy!

After one or several rounds of parties, each featuring a different theme and highlighting unique facets of Delta Zeta, comes Preference. Candlelight, roses, lace, soft words and hopes are all part of an often emotional Preference Party. It is the chapter's last opportunity to converse with rushees and show them why our sisterhood is so special. The songs and ceremony are senti-

mental for all.

As pledge day arrives, Delta Zetas are nervous, excited and anxious as they await the arrival of the matched bid list. The pledge trainer usually smiles nervously while sisters assure her that she'll do a great job and that the chapter will participate in the pledge training.

Then . . . here comes the rush chairman waving a long list of pledges. As the names are read to the chapter, there are squeals of delight and screams of joy.

As the pledges arrive, Delta Zetas break into song and laughter. Their pride in work well done has manifested itself with our hope for the future . . . a lovely pledge class.

And so our Delta Zeta continues . . . strong, proud, confident.

A new page in the history of one of Delta Zeta's oldest chapters was written with the recolonization of Iota at the University of Iowa.

Preparation for Delta Zeta's return to the campus began with an invitation from the University Panhellenic Council. Plans were made early in the spring of 1983 and included the renovation and redecoration of the lovely stone house that has been Delta Zeta's home. This project continued throughout the summer under the dedicated direction of the local house corporation and Sue Jones Allen, Housing Projects Chairman. By August, when the colonization team arrived, beautiful, inviting rooms, redone in soft shades of blue and rose, were in place.

All of the young women who had signed up for rush toured the Delta Zeta house and heard a special presentation about the recolonization from National President Carolyn Gullatt, Past National President Norma Andrisek and Field Representatives Lisa Straub, Suzanne Jewhurst and Debra Nesbit. This rush team met and interviewed those interested during the remainder of the university's formal rush period. On pledge day, fifty new pledges filled the Iowa chapter house.

Lisa Straub remained in Iowa City, living in the chapter house and directing the colony throughout the pledge period. She was advisor, counselor, teacher, cheerleader and friend as the colony worked to meet the requirements for installation. By February, the colony was ready for initiation and on February 4, 1984 Beta Kappa chapter from Iowa State performed the initiation service.

The installation banquet was held in the evening of the same day at the Roosevelt Hotel in Cedar Rapids. Norma Andrisek presided as toastmistress. Warm welcomes were extended by Province Collegiate Director Janet Eisler Havener, Province Alumnae Director Kay Morrow Wright and Field Representative Suzanne Jewhurst. Kathy Vesilica, colony president, responded, recounting the events that had led to the day. Linda Figg, chapter advisor, acknowledged the chapter's accom-

plishments and Lisa Straub lovingly related her Iota experience. Marvona Easley Tavlin, National Vice President Collegiate Affairs, brought greetings from the National Council and Delta Zetas throughout the country.

The chapter was recognized and accepted on behalf of the university and the Greek community by Randall R. Ross, Interfraternity Council President. Florence Hood Miner, National Historian, spoke briefly, charming the initiates, their parents, friends, and Delta Zetas with her historical perspective of the occasion. The most special moment finally came when National President Carolyn Gullatt officially installed the new chapter.

A winter snowstorm greeted everyone on Sunday morning, February 5, but the reception held in the afternoon at the chapter house was well attended by officers, parents, alumnae and campus friends.

The successful recolonization of Iota was made possible by many people - national officers and representatives, local alumnae and college personnel. Most significant was the outstanding support given by the members of the University of Iowa Greek community, both fraternities and sororities. The Rho Chis provided invaluable help as did so many members of the University Panhellenic, especially Hope Truckenmueller, Alpha Phi, Panhellenic President,

and Pat Vornbrock, Chi Omega, Panhellenic Rush Chairman. Delta Zeta is most appreciative and grateful to these special Panhellenic friends who helped to make possible Delta Zeta's place as part of a fine Greek system

Here are the 1984 recipients:

Leslie Jayne Myers Youngstown State University-KX

Leslie Myers served as president of Kappa Chi chapter for two terms. Her CCD, Linda Mancini, wrote: "Leslie always thinks about what is best for the sorority in all that she does. She is constantly thinking how she can help the chapter. Anyone would be proud to call her their sister."

Leslie was chosen an assistant pledge trainer when she was only a freshman. She has also represented Delta Zeta on the Panhellenic Council and Greek Program Board.

For two years, Leslie assisted the Kent State University chapter with rush. Wrote PCD Lynnda Hoefler: "She is a hard-working, caring individual and a girl whom I most admire."

A reporter for the school newspaper, Leslie is a member of Alpha Epsilon Rho, the honorary broadcasting fraternity. Twice, Leslie has been a member of the Homecoming Court, and she was chosen 1983 Sorority Woman of the Year.

Upon graduation, Leslie would like to become a news reporter and someday anchor an evening newscast. She also intends to continue her service to the sorority. "Delta Zeta has given me so much that I want to be able to continue to give something back after I graduate," she wrote.

Donna Louise Larsen Nebraska Wesleyan University-BT

"Anything I have put into Delta Zeta has been returned to me many times over, in countless ways. This commitment is one which is truly a lifetime bond of friendship, loyalty and service, but above all, love," wrote Donna Larsen.

As chapter president, Donna presented a variety of positive alternatives to the Panhellenic Council before the group made the decision to lower total.

"This could have been an unpleasant situation for a chapter," wrote Beta Tau alumna and former GML winner Shelly Slaughter (who just happens to be Donna's 'sorority mom'), "but Donna chose to turn if around in a positive aspect and make it work for us. And that she did. We filled quota, reached total, and have the best 17 pledges a chapter could only dream of."

Donna has also served her chapter as scholarship chairman and summer rush chairman. Academically, she has maintained a perfect 4.0 gradepoint. Donna was selected to serve on study committees for the future development of Nebraska Wesleyan She is a member of Ambassadors, Kappa Delta (speech and debate honorary), Omicron Delta Epsilon (economics honorary), Phi Kappa Phi and Cardinal Key (scholastic honoraries)

Donna plans to attend law school and pursue a career in corporate law

Betsy Denise Mosgrove University of Alabama in Huntsville- ΛK

Since her first days as a pledge Betsy Mosgrove has been a bust Delta Zeta. She was elected publicity chairman and LAMP editor during her freshman year. Later, she was chosen vice-president of membership. "She is well-informed about Delta Zeta and seems to have a really

special way of getting information across to rushees," wrote CCD Jane Ondocsin. "She rushes with ease and therefore puts the rushee at ease."

Most recently, Betsy has served as chapter president. "I am basically a shy person," she wrote. "My Delta Zeta sisters gave me courage and self-confidence to push myself to the limit, to reach high and work toward my goals."

Betsy has been a member of the Student Government Association, the UAH Lancers (a host/hostess organization) and the Homecoming Court. She was named to Outstanding Young Women in America 1983.

While attending classes on the commuter campus, Betsy has worked full-time as an employment counselor. She plans to begin work toward an MBA. She is also looking forward to being an active member of the Huntsville alumnae chapter.

Allison Winifred Merkel Radford University-∃∆

Allison Merkle served as colony president and was re-elected to that office when the colony became Xi Delta chapter of Delta Zeta.

"We had to build this sisterhood from scratch and that took a lot of tears and frustration. We definitely made it through. That confidence will help me when I leave Radford," wrote Allison.

Her CCD wrote: "She is a conscientious and dedicated leader who guides her sisters in a well-organized and efficient manner. She is both liked and respected by members of Delta Zeta."

Allison was voted Best All Round Greek by all sororities at Radford, and was named Apple Blossom Princess and Outstanding Junior at the university. She has served as the founding president of the Criminal Justice Fraternity, and has been a member of the university-wide Judicial Board. Allison has been a volunteer at the New River Valley Detention Home, and is co-director of a group formed to assist sexual assault victims. She plans to attend law school.

Lisa Gail Rullman Eastern Kentucky University-\(\mathbb{E}\)B

Lisa Rullman is a founding member of Xi Beta chapter. Terry McNeer, past national field rep, wrote: "During their first formal rush as a colony, Lisa stood out among the crowd. She was always working untiringly, never complained, and always had a thoughful word to say to those girls that needed it."

In the fall of 1982, the colony became a chapter. Because of her hard work in rush and on the judiciary board, Lisa was elected the first chapter president. Among her accomplishments was the implementation of the use of service projects when members were absent from functions, instead of the use of fines.

Lisa maintained a 3.57 grade point. She is a member of the Baccalaureate Student Nurses' Association, Mortar Board, Alpha Psi Omega (theatre honorary) and participated in many theatre productions. She was a candidate for Homecoming Queen, SAE County Fair Queen and Miss EKU.

Lisa intends to work as a registered nurse in a pediatric hospital and later return to school for a master's degree as a clinical specialist.

Ellen Jamieson Hammill University of South Carolina-ΒΔ

"Having graduated from a high school senior class of only twentyeight students, I could have felt very alone and scared among the twentyeight thousand students at the University of South Carolina. Instead, Delta Zeta has given me 'a place to come home to' and a place to feel the warmth and love of all of my sisters."

Those are the words of Jamie Hammill, president of Beta Delta chapter. While earlier serving as pledge trainer, Jamie recognized the need for a pledge book to supplement "The Delta Zeta Way." She prepared a 60-page book entitled "Everything You Ever Wanted to Know About ΔZ But Were Afraid to Ask."

Jamie also started a Beta Delta alumnae newsletter, "The Killarney Blarney," and is currently preparing a history of Beta Delta chapter.

Listed in "Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities," Jamie is also a member of the Golden Key Honor Society, Gamma Beta Phi, Alpha Lambda Delta and Kappa Phi Kappa. She has represented Delta Zeta as both Miss Charleston and Miss Berkeley County.

Jamie intends to begin work toward a master's degree in Elementary Education.

Cathy Rene Nott University of Illinois-AB

Cathy Nott was recognized last year with the Florence Hood Miner Award. She continued her service to the sorority this year as president of Alpha Beta chapter.

Delta Zeta from Coast to Coast Meet Lambda Delta at Virginia

This institution of my native state, the hobby of my old age, will be based on the illimitable freedom of the human mind to explore and to expose every subject susceptible of its contemplation.

Thomas Jefferson, founder of the University of Virginia

The University of Virginia in Charlottesville, Virginia, is nestled in the Blue Ridge Mountains that Thomas Jefferson loved. Fondly regarded as "Mr. Jefferson" by the students at the university, Thomas Jefferson founded this state university in October of 1819. His influence remains with modern students in the historic academical village at the center of the university consisting of the classrooms and living spaces of the first students of the 19th century. Yet, his influence runs far

deeper than the actual buildings that have become part of our American heritage.

Mr. Jefferson believed in a strong liberal arts education, which stimulated thought through experience. This is the same emphasis found at the university today. The university has grown from the first class of 26 students in a rural Charlottesville in 1825 to over 16,000 students in today's metropolitan setting.

Traditionally an all men's university, the University of Virginia became co-educational in 1970. When the first sororities were founded on campus in 1975, they stepped into an already very strong Greek system of thirty-two social fraternities. No wonder that in eight short years the sorority system has grown to sixteen national sororities, involving over twenty-five percent of the women on campus!

The Lambda Delta chapter of Delta Zeta was col-

onized by two transfer students and two graduate students. Carol Barringer and Sharon Lamb transferred from Virginia Polytechnical Institute to the nursing school at Virginia. There, they met graduate students Janet Kerr and Kay Steiffen and together they worked to be recognized as a local sorority in November of 1976. One year later, the chapter was installed on November 12, 1977.

The chapter has grown both in size and property since its founding. In the fall of 1979, the doors of our beautifully renovated home were opened. The house is home for thirty-three members and often becomes a refuge for the full membership of 107 women.

The sisterhood has shown an impressive enthusiasm for Delta Zeta programming in its short lifetime. Traditions are being set as the chapter experiments with projects each year. We are perhaps most proud of the growth of our philanthropy efforts. Our big push to benefit Gallaudet is a balloon drive. Helium balloons are marked with the purchaser's name and are then released. The owner of the farthest traveling balloon wins a cash prize. We also have an adopted grandmother, Blanche Mawyer, whose days are brightened by visits from sisters.

We strive to involve the university community in our fundraising activities. The annual pancake breakfast has proven very popular. The sorority women on campus are invited each fall for a Sorority Salad Bar and Fashion Show sponsored by Delta Zeta.

Our weekly meetings are always enlivened by our standards programs on topics ranging from dressing for success to learning techniques for remembering names. The scholarship chairman may choose to recognize the most improved grade point average at a meeting, as scholarship is an important aspect of our chapter. The sunshine committee may do a skit to remind us of the weekly calendar or to recognize birthdays. There seems to be never a dull moment when Delta Zetas get together.

It is even more lively when Delta Zetas and their dates get together! Social activities abound for the Vir-

ginia Delta Zetas. Christmas and spring formals, mixers with fraternities and sweetheart parties (a party where each sister may invite three gentlemen each) fill our social calendars.

But, of course, our most important activities by far are rush and the pledge program. Approximately 1,000 women rush at the beginning of the second semester. The house has changed from a summer camp to Camelot to host the rushees. Lambda Delta has pledged quota for six consecutive years in its rush history.

Once the rushees become pledges, we concentrate strongly on our pledge program. The pledges are guided through the pledge period with the support of Big Sisters and Rose Buddies. Two Caryatides awards show how seriously we regard this special time.

A Portrait in Courage

On December 23, 1982 an escaped convict came to my door in my home in Baldwin, Michigan. As I opened the door, he began to pull a shotgun from behind his back. As I turned to run, I was hit by a blast in the back. My story is long, involving the tremendous blood loss, countless surgeries, amputation of my right leg, etc. But I'm not writing this about myself - I want you to know what terrific sister-friends I have in the Grand Rapids alumnae chapter of Delta Zeta.

My first hospitalization was from December, 1982 through August 14, 1983. From December through May I remember very little. On my birthday, January 31, 1983, ΔŽ sister Gwen Shick, who is also a beautician, came to the hospital to wash and set my hair. This was to begin a ritual that lasted until August. Gwen would come every week. They say I responded best to Gwen although I don't remember. I do remember how soothing the warm water felt, yet I slept most of the time she was there.

Another ΔZ sister, Carole Gue, is a secretary for maintenance at the hospital. On every break, Carole was there checking on me. She became a part of my family and was never barred from ICU.

All of my other ΔZ sisters sent cards and letters constantly. At one time a huge poster was hanging in my room with all of their signatures. I would look at that for hours. I received so many pink roses I lost count. Several Delta Zetas led blood drives, giving their own blood as well.

When I went home in August, my intestines were still open, I had a trach, and was still very weak. I needed someone with me around the clock. Delta Zetas gave whole days and some half days to stay with me. It didn't take me long to discover that Harry, my husband, knew my sisters better than I did. During the long hours at the hospital they had nurtured a lasting friendship. They had called and written letters offering him any help he needed.

Before coming home it was necessary to move from our single mobile home in Grand Rapids to a doublewide mobile home. Delta Zetas and their husbands were there to help on

moving day.

One afternoon in December, 1983, I was expecting Gwen to come to cut my hair. She arrived with about six other AZs. Each was carrying Christmas treats. We had a wonderful afternoon visit with coffee, tea and

goodies.

On December 26, 1983 I returned to Butterworth Hospital for my last surgery. I was closed up, my trach was removed and I was gradually weaned from my IV feedings. During this stay, I received many cards, visits and gifts. I returned home on January 29, able to be at home and get around on my own now. On January 31, stacks of birthday cards arrived . . . from my ΔZ sisters, of

Carole Gue picked me up the evening of February 8 to attend my first alumnae meeting since November. I will be fitted with a prosthesis soon and be able to be active in the alum group once again.

But, in the meantime, I want everyone to know that the Grand Rapids

alumnae chapter of Delta Zeta "walks truly in the light of the flame."

Rapids chapter.

'I have enclosed a copy of an article that appeared in Butterworth Hospital News in June, 1983. As you can tell by the article, Sharon was presumed to be fatally wounded and many, including those Delta Zetas close to Sharon, prayed that the inevitable end would come quickly so as to spare Sharon and her family more agonized pain.

'But Sharon's love of life and will to live pulled her through numerous crises. How many of us can say we would be able to laugh after these

traumas?

"Probably Sharon's greatest supporter during these long months was her husband Harry. Harry's determination and support were vital to Sharon's struggle to come back.

Sterling Courage

The Butterworth Hospital News called it STERLING COURAGE.

On December 23, Sharon and Harry Slovinski were at their vacation home in Baldwin, Michigan Sharon was busy with Christmas preparations. Her mother and stepfather would be joining them for the holidays. Harry was taking a shower when someone knocked at the door. In this quiet resort community, doors generally aren't locked. A Portrait in Courage

On December 23, 1982 an escaped convict came to my door in my home in Baldwin, Michigan. As I opened the door, he began to pull a shotgun from behind his back. As I turned to run, I was hit by a blast in the back. My story is long, involving the tremendous blood loss, countless surgeries, amputation of my right leg, etc. But I'm not writing this about myself—I want you to know what terrific sister-friends I have in the Grand Rapids alumnae chapter of Delta Zeta.

My first hospitalization was from December, 1982 through August 14, 1983. From December through May I remember very little. On my birthday, January 31, 1983, ΔZ sister Gwen Shick, who is also a beautician, came to the hospital to wash and set my hair. This was to begin a ritual that lasted until August. Gwen would come every week. They say I responded best to Gwen although I don't remember. I do remember how soothing the warm water felt, yet I slept most of the time she was there.

Another ΔZ sister, Carole Gue, is a secretary for maintenance at the hos-

pital. On every break, Carole was there checking on me. She became a part of my family and was never barred from ICU.

All of my other ΔZ sisters sent cards and letters constantly. At one time a huge poster was hanging in my room with all of their signatures. I would look at that for hours. I received so many pink roses I lost count. Several Delta Zetas led blood drives, giving their own blood as well

When I went home in August, my intestines were still open, I had a trach, and was still very weak. I needed someone with me around the clock. Delta Zetas gave whole days and some half days to stay with me. It didn't take me long to discover that Harry, my husband, knew my sisters better than I did. During the long hours at the hospital they had nurtured a lasting friendship. They had called and written letters offering him any help he needed.

Before coming home it was necessary to move from our single mobile home in Grand Rapids to a double-wide mobile home. Delta Zetas and their husbands were there to help on moving day.

One afternoon in December, 1983, I was expecting Gwen to come to cut my hair. She arrived with about six other Δ Zs. Each was carrying Christmas treats. We had a wonderful afternoon visit with coffee, tea and goodies.

On December 26, 1983 I returned to Butterworth Hospital for my last surgery. I was closed up, my trach was removed and I was gradually weaned from my IV feedings. During this stay, I received many cards, visits and gifts. I returned home on January 29, able to be at home and get around on my own now. On January 31, stacks of birthday cards arrived . . . from my ΔZ sisters, of course.

Carole Gue picked me up the evening of February 8 to attend my first alumnae meeting since November. I will be fitted with a prosthesis soon and be able to be active in the alum group once again.

But, in the meantime, I want everyone to know that the Grand Rapids

There's not the worry about crime that exists in urban areas. Sharon yelled 'come in.' When no one did, she went to the door. She didn't recognize the man she saw through the glass, but that wasn't alarming either. Often, visitors to the area become lost and stop for directions. As Sharon began opening the door, she saw the man start to pull something from behind

his back. It was a shotgun. At point blank range she was hit five times in the back.

The Slovinskis don't have a phone at their northern retreat so Harry ran to a store nearly a mile away to call for help. Sharon was conscious and recalls waiting for the ambulance to arrive. In the meantime, police shot and captured the man accused of shooting Sharon. He was a prison escapee.

The man was loaded into the same ambulance with Sharon. "He was screaming he was Satan . . . part of the Charles Manson cult." Ironically, Sharon continued, "I had just read that book (Helter-Skelter) last summer."

Upon arriving at the Reed City Hospital, Sharon remembers being in the Emergency Room. "Two nurses were trying to take my contacts out. They were having a difficult time, so I reached up and popped both out. They just went, 'oh!' "





Alumnae, Be Cautious!

This article is reprinted from the Trident of Delta Delta Delta by permission of its author, Kathleen Davis Nye, NPC Delegate.

Did you know that an alumna member can commit a rush infraction and that the collegiate chapter can be penalized for this violation? It's true! Alumnae are bound by the campus panhellenic rush rules, and the collegiate chapter is held responsible for the actions of alumnae members, regardless of where the alumnae live.

Last fall some collegiate chapters had rush infractions filed against them for violations of local panhellenic rush rules for actions of alumnae. In one case, an alumna sent Delta-shaped cookies decorated with silver, gold, and blue icing to a rushee during rush. Another alumna telephoned a rushee (again a family friend) during "silence." In another case, an infraction was filed because an alumna called a rushee's mother to secure reference information.

This year's reference form includes a statement *not* to contact a rushee's family for information. Because of the Privacy of Information Act, seeking personal information has become a sensitive issue. Therefore, we urge our alumnae to be circumspect in securing reference data. Please, DO NOT call a rushee's parents for information.

Penalties for rush violations can be severe. One chapter was fortunate and received only a reprimand. But most were not so lucky. In one instance, the penalty was a six-weeks social probation with no social permitted our chapter. Because of one alumna's action, the collegiate members were denied participation as a chapter in any social function (mixers, exchanges, dances, etc.) with any other Greek group. Another chapter was required to remove labels from seats in the university auditorium-no small task.

We realize alumnae, especially those removed from a college campus, cannot begin to know the rushing rules for the many campuses where we have chapters. However, you can observe these basic precau-

tions: during rush week, do not phone, write, or contact rushees in any manner, even close family friends; do not call a rushee's family for reference information; and above all, do not promise or otherwise imply there is a place in the chapter for the rushee or that the chapter wants her and will give her a bid.

Chapters that rush successfully usually are carefully observed by their Panhellenic counterparts to see that rush rules are strictly followed. It's a compliment, but it also places a double obligation on collegiate and alumnae members and chapters to observe rush rules meticulously. So please observe these simple precautions. We want - and need - your support of our collegiate chapters. All we ask is that you take reasonable precautions, especially during rush week.

Missouri Alumnae Help Zachary

Zachary is a five year old boy who is afflicted with the disease Cornelia de Lange Syndrome which handicaps him in several ways. Among his handicaps, Zachary's arms are undeveloped below the elbow, and he is also deaf.

The Lighthouse Preschool for Exceptional Children, Inc., where Zachary attends, was in need of the money to purchase a communication system for development of Zachary's significantly delayed communication skills. Mrs. Kathy Williams Daulton, William Jewell-ZP, a teacher at the preschool, contacted Clay-Platte alumnae chapter member Rebecca Griffith Gohring, also Zeta Rho, about this need. As a result, the Clay-Platte alumnae chapter of the Kansas City area was able to donate \$600.

This sophisticated piece of equipment is an electrical board containing slots for pictures. A switch is used to control a light indicator which moves from picture to picture on the board. When the light indicator reaches the picture slot which symbolizes what the child wants to

communicate, for example, a glass of water, then the child activates the switch to stop the light at that picture.

Allison Kelly, director of the preschool, has been particularly pleased with this system because it is so versatile. Pictures for the slots, as well as the speed of the light, can be selected which will fit the needs of the child using the machine. The system can be activated by the child using hands, feet, elbows (as in Zachary's case), or even by breathing on the activator.

Although the Clay-Platte alumnae chapter has been involved with the purchase of equipment for hearing handicaps such as hearing aids and a TTY (teletype communicator), this sort of philantrophy project proved to be different. This project will benefit preschoolers who are handicapped in various ways and need further communication development. The Clay-Platte alumnae chapter earns money for their projects by selling concessions at Kansas City Royals baseball games.

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
