Seven hundred were in attendance at Province XVII Weekend at the Dallas Marriott Quorum on March 1 and 2 when Myrtle Graeter Hinkly, DePauw-Δ, received her *Order of the Diamond in the Flame* award for 75 years of membership.

In accepting her certificate from Past National President Carolyn Gullatt, Myrtle emphasized the meaning of Delta Zeta to her through these 75 years.

She surmised that when she was initiated into Delta Zeta there were not as many members in the whole sorority as there were in the ballroom of the Marriott. Myrtle reminisced about her initiation in October of 1911. Martha Louise Railsback, then National Corresponding Secretary, presided at the initation. Welcoming Myrtle into

Delta Zeta, Martha said to her, "Today you have found a way of living, you have found a solid rock on which to stand and keep your balance."

Myrtle added, "Honestly, I don't think I even knew what she was talking about. The years have brought meaning to those words and even now when I have trouble sleeping at night I repeat the words of the Delta Zeta ritual to myself."


In expressing her appreciation for the award, Myrtle repeated a quote she had read recently: "Gratitude takes three forms. The spirit of the heart. The words of expressing. And giving."

It was a March evening in Oxford, Ohio when Elsa Thoma Baer, Miami-A '11 was presented her *Diamond in the Flame* award for 75 years of Delta Zeta membership.

Cincinnati alumnae president Diane Fetherston Babcock, Santa Barbara-ΔΨ wrote, "Best of all was the marvelous evening with Elsa, truly 95 years young!" Delta Eta Installed in Tennessee

East Tennessee State University celebrates its 75th anniversary this year and Delta Zeta celebrates the reorganization of Delta Eta chapter. Located in Johnson City on land donated by George L. Carter, a distinguished citizen, the university was opened to students on October 2, 1911. From the campus one can view some of the highest mountains in the Appalachian system in addition to the peaks of Buffalo, Cherokee, Holston and Roan mountains.

Beginning early in September of 1985, Marvona Easley Tavlin, National Vice President of Collegiate Affairs, and Pam Summerlin and Shawn O'Halloran, Field Representatives, presented their goals for a new chapter to the campus. After individual interviews with interested students, a small core, on which to build the sorority, was established. From the beginning the Delta Zetas were active in all areas of campus and Greek Life.

At 10:30 AM on Saturday, March 22 at the East Unaha Church of Christ, the initiation service was conducted by Beta Lambda chapter at the University of Tennessee. (This chapter also performed the initiation service when Delta Eta chapter was originally installed January 28, 1956). Signing the charter were:

ΔZ Legacy Introduction



These little ΔZ legacies are Adrienne and Jennifer Favorite, daughters of Phyllis Favorite, National Secretary. You can be certain their mom will send a ΔZ LEGACY INTRODUCTION form and a STANDARD REFERENCE form to the proper chapter when these young ladies go through rush! (Little sister Amanda didn't arrive in time for the picture!)

... A Delta Zeta legacy (daughter, granddaughter, sister) shall be invited to at least two formal rush parties upon receipt of a voluntary reference for her prior to rush.

... A legacy shall be dropped from Delta Zeta rush only with justification and only with the approval of the College Chapter Director and the Province Collegiate Director prior to her removal from the invitation list. The National Vice President of Membership must be informed of the decision not later that 24 hours after it has been made.

... A legacy receiving an invitation to the preference party shall be placed on the chapter's first bid list.

A Delta Zeta legacy is someone special so the national policy on legacies has been developed to provide her special care in rush while allowing the collegians to exercise their desires in selecting members compatible with the needs of the sorority, the chapter, and its members individually.

A legacy is neither entitled to an automatic bid from Delta Zeta nor is she required to pledge any particular sorority. A legacy going through rush should review all groups to which she has been invited and pledge that group in which she feels most comfortable and can make a contribution.

As membership selection is the responsibility of the collegians, membership information is the responsibility of the alumnae. Many times a collegiate chapter is unaware that there are legacies in rush because neither Delta Zeta nor Panhellenic references are available. Won't you please take time now to complete the LEGACY INTRODUCTION FORM to introduce *your* legacy on her campus. Also, please send a standard reference form for her to your State Reference Chairman. You may wish to complete this form yourself or have a Delta Zeta sister complete it so another perspective is provided. A standard reference form is necessary so that all special courtesies can be extended to a young woman, her interests assured, and the integrity in membership selection adhered to.



The Insurance Dilemma . . .

Insurance in the Eighties

Delta Zeta, like all Greek groups, participates in a comprehensive group insurance package to provide various needed coverages for our chapters, our house corporations and our volunteer field personnel. In addition, we provide all our employees with life and health coverages. We currently have:

Comprehensive General Liability
Property Coverage where needed
Boiler & Machinery
Workmen's Compensation - locally held
Comprehensive Crime Bond
Umbrella Liability
Excess Liability
Directors' & Officers' Liability

Each of these provides a much needed type of protection. For example, a fraudulent officer can be prosecuted but the lost funds can be replaced through the Crime Bond insurance.

National Council recognizes the value of the volunteer woman and the necessity for protection for her as she gives advice and counsel in the field. Thus, we have the 'D & O' coverage. Our field representatives travel many miles and carry much in personal wardrobes, Delta Zeta manuals and supplies, and Delta Zeta jewelry. And we provide adequate travel coverage for them and their belongings.

The current insurance crisis has left Delta Zeta realizing a need for increased coverage but a market very short on supply. In the wake of the Bhopal, India tragedy of two years ago, many reliable and competitive firms have withdrawn from the field entirely. As the demand increases, the available suppliers decrease and the result is a sharply escalated price tag accompanied by a significantly lowered coverage limit

National Council is quite concerned over this crunch. And, like other Greek groups with whom we have spoken, we recognize the short term outlook is even bleaker. Newspapers and periodicals abound with articles predicting a further shrink in the market and a continued attempt by the insurance companies to recoup years of losses in a short time frame. The only result will be even higher premiums or worse yet, no coverage at all.

The consequences of letting our coverage lapse - and risking it all - are too great to consider. One devastating lawsuit brought upon by a harmful accident could bankrupt the sorority. No coverage is not an option open to us.

One factor in individual chapter liability premiums continues to the local risk situation - have there been any serious incidences involving hazing, alcohol, pranks, etc. on the campus? Where the answer is yes, the premium paid by all groups will be larger, even for those not involved.

Another key factor is alcohol. The Delta Zeta Alcohol Policy and our Alcohol Awareness Program *Choices* were both developed in consultation with our insurance people. Any chapter violating our alcohol policy stands the risk of lost coverage.

In the Greek world, we are not immune from the escalating costs and reduced or unavailable coverages any more than the public officials or professionals. Where the dilemma will end is unknown. Delta Zeta will monitor each development and remain abreast of the ever-changing industry. Our heritage, what we have become, and where we are, are too important to all of us to place them at any unprotected risk.


INSURANCE SITUATION ASSURES ANGER, FRUSTRATION AND PANIC

Anger at increases in insurance premiums—frustration at having policies cancelled—panic at not being able to find coverage—these are the emotions running through the fraternity world at every level, from national board to house corporation board.

Attention is focused on liability coverage, for which costs have soared and availability is scarce. But there have been cancellations in workers' compensation as

well-not cost-effective, insurers say.

The problems, which are affecting both men's and women's groups as well as colleges and universities, were addressed in recent issues of *The Bulletin of Interfraternity Research and Advisory Council*. We reprint here with permission of IRAC.



INSURANCE COSTLY AND SCARCE AFTER WORST YEAR FOR LIABILITY

The insurance drought follows the worst year in the liability insurance industry—a loss of \$3.8 billion.

Insurance executives blame the red ink on the steady increase in the size and scope of lawsuits. Laws expanding the definition of liability and court interpretations of policies have left insurers with hefty judgments on claims they never intended to cover.

Insurers and their customers also are paying for nearly seven years of interest rate underwriting—a time when companies sold policies at bargain basement prices while bolstering profits through invest-

ments paying 14 percent or better.

Some say insurance rates fell below realistic levels as competition raged for the premium dollars. When interest rates dropped abruptly, insurance companies were caught between shrinking investment income and soaring legal judgments.

The losses have cut into insurance reserves—the money set aside to cover future claims. They have also scared away money invested by reinsurance companies, foreign carriers like Lloyd's of London that

basically insure the insurance companies.

The loss of the funds means less insurance is available. With less insurance to sell, companies are more selective about whom they cover. Many now avoid high-risk customers like liquor establishments and municipalities.

LIMIT ON PAYING OF LEGAL FEES PROPOSED BY INSURANCE CARRIERS

Major commercial insurers are adopting a range of strategies for introducing new provisions. Among the

changes:

Insurers want to include as part of a policy's claim limit the legal fees that an insurer pays to defend the policy-holder against lawsuits. Currently, unless otherwise specified, an insurer has a duty to spend an unlimited amount of money on such legal defense.

Insurers complain that they sometimes pay more for legal bills than for damage claims. The Insurance Services Office says that defense costs ate up 25 per cent of the premiums insurers received for commercial liability policies in 1983, compared with 5 percent in the late 1950's.

INSURANCE RATES UP DRAMATICALLY

Fraternities at the University of Pennsylvania have been informed the University group liability insurance

premium will increase by five-fold this year.

Such increases, where liability insurance is available, are not uncommon. Insurance experts predict the increases in fire and casualty premiums received thus far are just the "tip of the iceberg," and policy holders should expect increases of at least one-third more in the next two years. Increases, and shortages of certain types of insurance protection, are certain to cause some alumni corporations to institute new, stiffer rules and regulations concerning social events and mass social events taking place in chapter houses or on chapter property.

NATIONAL FRATERNITY CONSIDERS LIABILITY INSURANCE CRUCIAL

The General Fraternity, as authorized by our General Assembly last summer, (is seeking) comprehensive liability insurance for chapters, officers, actives, associates, and alumni volunteers working with chapters. This action was absolutely crucial to protect our fraternity's existence, given the dramatic increase in liability claims in general.

If we are insured, what do we have to worry about? Plenty! The premiums are paid in equal shares by active members. If claims are made, then the premiums will increase, and the difference will come out of your

pocket!

Moreover, the company may cancel the policy as a result of too many claims. This could prevent us from

obtaining other adequate insurance at affordable rates. That would raise a grave issue of whether we could continue to operate the fraternity without adequate liability insurance to protect not only the organization but each individual member from lawsuits.

How do you avoid such a catastrophe? Manage or eliminate the risks of legal liability! For example, you can entirely eliminate the risk of being sued for hazing by strictly adhering to fraternity policy. However, all risks of legal liability cannot possibly be avoided. They can be reduced by careful planning and by encouraging a sense of responsibility by every member.

FRATERNITY FAILS TO FIND BLANKET LIABILITY COVERAGE

At a recent meeting the High Council received formal reports which made it clear that Alpha Tau Omega is in extreme jeopardy at this time. These reports indicate that there is no immediate prospect for the fraternity to obtain "blanket insurance coverage" to indemnify its individual chapters and the national fraternity against law suits stemming from the legal liabilities incurred by the use of beverage alcohol in chapters.

Recognizing the extra-ordinary extent and seriousness of this growing threat to the welfare—even the very existence of the brotherhood—the High Council has adopted a Resolution on Risk Avoidance. Every loyal ATO is expected to embrace and adhere to this policy. (The policy outlines eight points to be followed

on use of alcohol.)

ANGER AT INSURANCE COMPANIES COULD OBSCURE THE REAL PROBLEM

There is a danger that our collective anger at insurance companies, our consideration of creating captive companies, self-insurance, high deductibles, and various other devices to deal with the current insurance crisis will obliterate our focus from the real problem.

The real problem is that too many fraternity members have behaved like barbarians. This has led to things like the \$21 million settlement in Texas.

Unless the national leadership of every fraternity causes its leaders nationwide to take a very hardnosed attitude on alcohol abuse and misconduct, there is a realistic danger that by 1990 there will be one or more (fraternities) ... engaged in bankruptcy court.

SURGE OF LAWSUITS IS MAKING COLLEGES "RISKY," INSURERS SAY

Faced with a surge in lawsuits, American colleges and universitites are finding they must pay up to 10 times more than last year for liability insurance—if

they can get it at all.

At Southeastern Massachusetts University, students are hoisting double dips instead of beers. In March, the school converted the campus pub into an ice cream parlor after an insurer refused to renew liquor liability coverage.

"There are just horror stories all over the place," said William Jacka, president of Moulton, Allen and Williams Corp. insurance brokerage in Birmingham, Ala. "Most underwriters are just scared of colleges and universities because they don't understand the risks."

Barry Walker, associate vice president of the Chicago-based Alliance of American Insurers, said insurers were trying to recoup by shying away from areas

where their risk is most speculative.

"Premiums have gone up anywhere from four to 10 times," Jacka said. "The other side of this coin is that these costs are going to have to be passed on to the student body."

Insurers blame the higher premiums in part on an explosion in lawsuits against colleges and universities in the last few years and on the unpredicatability of court awards.

FAILURE TO REPORT CHANGES COULD LEAVE YOU UNINSURED

The Changing Roles of Women

The very nature of voluntary participation in philanthropic efforts and specifically, alumnae group participation, is threatened by the changing roles of women in the American society.

BACKGROUND

The interest in women by economists has intensified as our numbers have grown. Currently, females exceed males by about 6.5 million and this figure is expected to be 7.5 million by the year 2000. This increase is due primarily to a higher survival rate for women.

With the increasing numbers of women, there is exciting news for sororities as a whole as more and more of these women attend college; however, much of this increase is in the number of women over 25 years of age returning to college to improve their job market prospects. Thus, women now have an increased rate of employment outside the home. By 1984, about 52% of married women were employed, whereas in 1950, the figure was less than 25%. Among women with children, over 57% have jobs and by 1990, the 25-34 age group is expected to participate in the labor force at a rate of 80%.

Women face today what has been called the "dual labor market," earning 59% of what men earn for This comparable positions! caused by both outright discrimination and the choices women are forced to make regarding their careers and families. Forty-six percent of women want the flexibility to move in and out of the labor force, generally choosing to remain at home while children are young. However, today's economics may not allow such flexibility as the increase in the number of affluent households (earning over \$50,000 per year) indicates such income is necessary to support a family and can only be achieved in many cases with two wage earners.

Women can be classified by their career-orientation. According to Rena Bartos (*The Moving Target: What Every Marketer Should Know About Women*, [New York: Free Press, 1982]), women think of themselves as either having a career or "just a job". There are also two classifications of housewives. There are those who prefer to stay home and those who plan to return to work.

Married women experience, therefore, many time pressures. They often have two jobs: (1) household and family responsibilities and (2) wage earning responsibilities. (In fact, today about 6 million women earn more than their husbands.) Filling two roles, studies indicate that working women today have significantly less leisure time than their husbands or full-time homemakers.

Luckily, the roles of men in families are also changing substantially. Men are filling in the gaps caused by the time pressures faced by working women. For example, in a survey of 1,000 American males by the advertising agency Cunningham & Walsh (as quoted by James F. Engel, Roger D. Blackwell, and Paul W. Miniard, Consumer Behavior, Fifth Edition, [New York: The Dryden press, 1986], p. 298), 47% of the men surveyed vacuum the house, 80% take out the garbage, 41% wash dishes, 37% make beds, 33% load the washing machine, 27% clean the bathroom, 23% dust, 23% dry the dishes, 21% sort the laundry, 16% clean the refrigerator, and 14% clean the oven. Fifty percent take part in regular shopping trips.

PROBLEM

As society strains women more and more, forcing continued employment on women with families; and as the number of careeroriented women grows, women are being forced to make choices. Qualified women and women dedicated to the sorority are being forced to say "no" to alumnae positions and national sorority positions because the responsbilities of these positions may cause them to compromise their priorities. And in the future, trend will continue broaden, as the demographics indicate. Those with the free-time to paticipate may not, therefore, be representative of the attitudes of the majority. Or, working women may take on the positions, but fall short of the group's expectations with substandard work and attendance at functions creating a no-win situation. Along the same lines however, each alumnae group has a core of women who are not a part of this trend. By directing our programming toward this younger age-group, we may alienate our faithful and active members. How can we do both?

PLAN OF ATTACK

Starting with the collegiate chapters, Delta Zeta continues to emphasize career-values, as well as a continued emphasis on scholarship. In addition, alumnae chapters often alter meeting schedules to accommodate women at different times of the day and days of the week with topics including child care, careers, and time-saving ideas for our "busy and limited time at home" people in order to bolster attendance from younger members. And a lot can be gained from collegians and alumnae working together with joint meetings covering topics like working wardrobes and job search tactics in encouraging alumnae group membership after graduation.

SUMMARY

The changing roles of women challenge all philanthropic organizations which, for years, relied on



National Presidents' Statement on Alcohol



At their meeting held during the National Panhellenic Conference in October 1985, the national presidents of all 26 NPC sororities agreed that alcohol is the leading problem on college campuses. Because of their concern over the use of alcohol, the 26 presidents agreed to the following:

1. that we are opposed to the misuse of alcohol;

2. that all college chapters, all individual members, and all guests must abide by state, local, college/university laws and regulations;

3. that no college chapter funds may be used to purchase alcohol (Co-sponsors of social events are potentially liable regardless of how the expenses are shared.)

4. that it is inadvisable to host a party involving alcohol when the majority of guests attending are under the legal drinking age.

Each NPC group has a national alcohol policy and is expected to abide by it. In addition, the national presidents expect their chapters to respect the regulations of any NPC co-sponsoring group.

We hope that this agreement will give college chapters the courage and ability to initiate discussion and formulate a Panhellenic stand on the subject of alcohol.







Georgia Bonesteel:

Quilter, Teacher, TV Personality

"To make something practical and pretty out of leftovers - that's the backbone of America," says Georgia Jinkinson Bonesteel, (Iowa State-BK '56) author of five books on quilting and creator and star of the PBS se-

ries "Lap Quilting."

For the past 13 years, Georgia Bonesteel has taught thousands of people across the country an alternative way of quilting through her books, lectures, workshops, and television series. This different way of piecing a quilt, or "lap quilting" as Georgia calls it, is much easier and faster than the conventional way of quilting with a huge wooden

In this method, the "blocks" of fabric are sewn together on a sewing machine, and the layers of top. batting, and liner are quilted together by hand. "It's more portable," Georgia says of the practice. "You don't have this huge thing (the

quilting frame) and it permits you to do smaller projects such as wall

hangings.

Georgia first became interested in quilting while living in New Orleans. Already a skillful seamstress with a B.A. in Home Economics, she began to experiment with silk tie remnants while working on a "Sewing is Fun" promotional television series for Sears. She began making small quilted evening bags out of the colorful scraps, and from there became interested in entire quilts.

The Blue Ridge Mountains of western North Carolina provided Georgia with more background on the timeless craft after she and her family moved to Hendersonville in 1973. She began to teach courses in quilting at the local technical col-

lege, which was where she devised her "lap quilting" method. The beauty of lap quilting, Georgia says, is that it's not consistently even, unlike a "store-bought" garment or bedspread. "Every quilt is unique," she says, "because every maker has put something of herself into the making of the quilt."

Georgia learned to sew from her mother, but believes quilting "skips generations." "My great-great-grandmother earned her 'egg money' being a seamstress and selling quilts," she says fondly, "the quilts she left

were very fine.

"Lap Quilting I" Georgia's first instructional television series, was produced by UNC-TV in Chapel Hill, N.C. in 1979. The series aired in 1980, and was soon picked up by 120 major PBS stations across the country. The success of the show was overwhelming, and soon after Georgia taped "Lap Quilting II" and "Lap Quilting III", which aired in 1983 and 1985.

The television shows are based on a "gallop and grin" philosophy, and focus on all levels of quilters, from beginners to experienced crafters. Georgia's goal throughout the series has been to "focus on the beginning quilter, bringing new and speedy tips

to an age-old craft.'

The shows are designed so that the viewer can participate and complete projects such as guilted vests, handbags, sewing machine covers, and skirts throughout the series. "People want the sense of accomplishment from finishing something," Georgia says, "and the way to do that is to break a large project down to sections.'

As a companion to the television series, Oxmoor House published Georgia's *Lap Quilting* in 1982. The book, filled with more than 50 color photographs of completed projects, has over 70 traditional quilt designs along with patterns and advice on

all aspects of quilting.

More Lap Quilting, Georgia's most recent book, focuses on new adaptations of lap quilting, one of which is the use of flexicurve, or pieces of plastic which quilters use to create "freestyle" quilt designs. Georgia has made quilts and clothing using this method, some which represent the gently sloping mountains she lives in.

Besides her books and television shows, Georgia is in constant demand around the country for her workshop and lecture presentations. She has annually judged quilt competitions such as the City of Baltimore Quilt Show, and has designed her own fabrics for use in craft and garment home sewing.

Georgia also runs a "quilt corner" in her husband Pete's hardware store in Hendersonville, where she teaches classes and has a dealership of Bernina Swiss sewing machines. She and her husband have three children, ages 24, 22 and 20.

Georgia's love and passion for quilting is obvious in the way she eagerly helps others to learn the craft. "The gratification is in the teaching," she says, "It is a rewarding feeling to make something and I enjoy helping people receive this feeling."




