

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

GUIDELINES


The National Council has established and follows guidelines for consideration of new charter sites. Each of these factors is important to the success of an expansion effort. While conditions change and it is difficult to foresee the forces exerted upon the college climate in the future, current decisions are made relative to these considerations. They include the quality of the institution and its ability to maintain or increase a stable female campus population; its recognition of the value of Greek letter organizations to the campus; a local Panhellenic that extends positive recognition and asssistance to a new group; the number of interested local alumnae available for advisory positions; housing requirements, and the resources available by the national organization to provide both personnel and financial assistance in developing the chapter.

Maximum attention is given to the "health" of the institution. At a time when the number of traditional college students is decreasing and the cost of education rising it is important to weigh the effect of such changes and the university's response to them. Current information suggests that as fees rise, many students will head to local colleges where they can live at home. The long established major state university as well as the smaller, well regarded private school still attracts, but schools located in urban, more densely populated areas may offer a greater possibility for stability and growth in the long run, reversing trend to avoid the "commuter school."

Equally important in determining the value of the school is its ability to retain its students. High drop out rates affect chapters as their members withdraw from school, and normal attrition is adversely affected. Failure to

Ever since Elizabeth Coulter Stephenson established Delta Zeta's second chapter at Cornell University, extension has played a major part in the growth and maturing of Delta Zeta. This is no less true today as the sorority continues an aggressive program to place Delta Zeta chapters at colleges and universities of merit, reputation and worth. There is little need to justify such activity for without it, just as without successful membership recruitment by established chapters, Delta Zeta would be diminished in size, quality, resources and prestige. Today, almost all National Panhellenic Conference groups are actively involved in extension. The competition is keen, the opportunities tremendous.

demand reasonable academic performance also diminishes the university as its students leave the institution or settle for a standard that is less than the students and organizations should expect. The school that gives attention to current issues and concerns, that establishes a framework for acceptable behavior has the greatest appeal for the sorority for its students are generally more committed to and interested in an organization that does set standards and contributes to personal growth.

As the reputation of an expansion site is considered it is important to remember the school in relation to the area in which it is located. Clarkson University may not be well known in the Southwest but it is very highly regarded in upper New York State. Loyola Marymount in Los Angeles may have limited recognition in the East but enjoys a fine reputation in its area.

NEW CAMPUS OPPORTUNITIES

During the past three bienniums, eleven new campuses meeting the criteria set by the sorority have been opened to Delta Zeta. They are Clarkson University, Potsdam, New York; the University of Massachusetts, Amherst; Millersville, State College colony, Millersville, Pennsylvania; Muhlenberg College, Allentown, Pennsylvania; Northwood Institute, Midland, Michigan; the University of Missouri-Kansas City colony; the University of San Francisco; Loyola Marymount

University, Los Angeles, California; Tarleton State University, Stephenville, Texas; Eastern Kentucky University, Richmond, Kentucky, and Radford University, Radford, Virginia.

In this same period, a major portion of Delta Zeta's extension activity has been devoted to reestablishing or reorganizing lost chapters. The Council has made a commitment to this, recognizing the value to the sorority and to its members of returning these charters to the chapter role. Recolonization on these campuses may mean a return after an extended period of time or the absence may have been a brief one. Whatever the situation, these

returns require a tremendous amount of time, energy and financial support, exceeding often times the effort necessary for a chapter on a campus new to Delta Zeta. Some of Delta Zeta's losses through the years have occurred on campuses of prestige and recognition where a major housing commitment is necessary for success. These do not come easily or without considerable cost to the organization.

One of the most painful parts of a reorganization process is the necessity for placing current chapter members on an alumna status. It is a decision reluctantly made. Often the members have worked long and hard with little success. The women who accept this in the hope that the future of their chapter can be best assured serve Delta Zeta with a dedication not asked of most.

RECOLONIZED/REORGANIZED CHAPTERS

These seventeen recolonized or reorganized chapters have been added to the Delta Zeta chapter role: The University of Maine-AY, Orono, Maine; Temple University colony-ΔΤ, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania; West Virginia Tech-IΠ, Montgomery, West Virginia; Ball State University-ΓX, Muncie, Indiana; Eureka College-Π, Eureka, Illinois; University of Iowa-I, Iowa City, Iowa; University of

Denver-P, Denver, Colorado; University of Washington-K, Seattle, Washington; University of Oregon-Ω, Eugene, Oregon; UCLA-AX, Los Angeles, California; Louisiana Tech-OE, Ruston, Louisiana; University of Southern Mississippi-EM, Hattiesburg, Mississippi; East Tennessee State University-AH, Johnson City, Tennessee; University of Tennessee-BA, Knoxville, Tennessee; University of Georgia colony-ZII, Athens, Georgia; Samford University-AII, Birmingham, Alabama, and University of Tampa-ΔB, Tampa, Florida.

While Delta Zeta has a wish list of campuses on which it would like to be represented and places to which it would like to return, that is not always possible. There is a procedure for extension. A chapter cannot be established without invitation or without approval of the host institution. Sometimes there is no room - the system is weak, not all established groups, healthy. At times, Delta Zeta is asked to participate in an extension process with other interested groups. The invitation may go to someone else. More often than not, the sorority is limited by its resources and the major housing commitments that are required to be competitive and well represented. The cost of providing housing in today's market that equals what others long established enjoy is dear indeed and means that only a very few of the schools with these requirements can be considered.

Delta Zeta fully supports and follows NPC extension policies. The sorority responds to and cooperates fully with local Panhellenics and advisors. Delta Zeta is proud of that and the positive effect it has had on the sorority's reputation with others associated with the larger Greek community. The article included in this *LAMP* from D. Craig Peterson of Clarkson University written for the *Association of Fraternity Advisors Newsletter* speaks to that perception.

The sorority is also limited by the personnel resources available. Once the invitation to colonize or recolonize is received and accepted, the real work begins and it

is at this time that the people resources are most severely tested. At least two field representatives must be assigned to any such effort and no less than two national officers or representatives able to give the amount of time necessary for this kind of assignment. With the complexities of today's society, there are not enough women available who are able to be away from their home or job for the length of time required for a colonization. The initial membership recruitment process generally takes two weeks with a great deal of follow-up activity important for success.

Delta Zeta is firm in its resolve to provide on site supervision from a field representative or graduate counselor, assigning such an individual to remain throughout the colony period and first year. In addition, an assigned national officer must be in constant communication. An equally important resource is the help and assistance of local alumnae, willing to provide the day to day support so necessary for a new chapter. The initial effort may be successful without this help; the sustained good health of the chapter cannot. Each of these resources, the national organization personnel and the alumnae are vital for the development of any new chapter.

Delta Zetas everywhere can contribute to the growth of the sorority through expansion to new campuses or returns to those once chartered. The letter to all members seeking support through contributions to the Loyalty Fund addresses the need for the financial commitment necessary. Should that appeal generate sufficient funds, we will have gone a long way toward making new chapters possible. Expansion - whether to the new or old — strengthens Delta Zeta and helps to assure her bright future.

Xi Omicron Makes Nine for California

Loyola Marymount University is the direct successor of Southern California's first institution of higher learning. Founded by the Jesuits, the beautiful 100 acre campus is located above Marina del Ray and midway between Santa Monica and Palos Verdes.

In January of 1986, the women of Kappa Theta local were interviewed and pledged to Xi Omicron colony of Delta Zeta. Following a busy spring during which pledge lessons were completed, officers elected and programs established, the charter members were initiated at the Alpha Chi house at UCLA by members of that chapter on May 9, 1986.

The formal installation of Xi Omicron took place on Saturday, November 1, 1986 at the Sheraton La Reina Plaza Hotel in Los Angeles. Presiding at the banquet was Past National President and Extension

The Power of Delta Zeta

When I was asked to speak at this installation banquet nearly a month ago, I thought I would probably share the dates and events that have brought us to this celebration tonight. I could have stated that the first formal contact with Delta Zeta Sorority took place on December 4. I could have mentioned that the first interest meeting of 18 women took place on January 26. I could have even gone on to say that Field Representatives Anne Moser and Lynne Ciervo arrived on March 3. But rather than simply reviewing your colony's history, I have chosen to speak of your chapter's future ...

Over the past few months, you have fulfilled chartering requirements; you have learned the history of your sorority. You have done all of this because you desired to become Delta Zeta. A lot has been asked of you. A lot has been expected from you. You have been asked to give 100% of yourselves because that is what it takes to make a sorority chapter run. A chapter cannot function on half-hearted efforts or partial commitments.

A lot has been asked of you, and you think you are tired. You think things have been pretty hectic, and you have wondered if your installation date would ever arrive. Well, it has arrived, you've made it. You have gained the respect of your National Council, the University administration, and the Greek community. Where now? What to say? What to do? What does this all mean for the charter members of the Xi Rho Chapter of Delta Zeta Sorority? It means that your initial goal of installation has been achieved, but the challenge of upholding the message of your ritual has just begun, a message not to be placed in a bottle and set to sea for another to find, but a message to be translated into the daily lives of all true Delta Zetas.

Take a look across this room. Look at the faces. I mean really look into your sisters. Do you realize the power that is out there?

Take advantage of the opportunity you have right now; reach out and draw from that power. Never again in your lifetime will you have a support system so vast, a resource pool so conveniently located, an abundance of sisters so close.

So when you are down, when you are tired, when it feels like the whole world is sitting right there on top of your shoulders, when it feels like you cannot move another step and you really need help, all you have to do is reach out and take some of that power. Reach out and take it. Pull it in and eat it up, and if you did not get enough the first time, reach out and grab some more. Pick yourself up, get going, and get the job done.

And that power is always there. You know why? Because when you are not down, when you are feeling good, you are giving power. And when Penny and Amy may be down there taking it, Louise and Angela are

giving it. But you know as soon as Penny and Amy are feeling good again, they will be giving power back.

It's give and take, give and take. That's the whole secret. It has to be a two way street. So when one of you is down, when one of you cannot quite pull 100% of your own weight, that means that it's up to you and you and you to reach down and pick her back up. That means that you have to put out 110% in order to help her along ... Sisters of Delta Zeta that is how you will survive; that is how you will grow; that is how you will always be strong ... it all happens because you believe in it.

Think about it for a moment. Take the two words "I believe." What do they mean? Are they a statement of opinion, or are they an admission of faith? Probably both, but I view them as a commitment. A commitment not only demands an allocation of time, but it requires a constant challenging of one's own mind and a reinforcement of one's own values. A belief is also a reflection of one's own personality. A reflection that often times is carried over into the people with whom we associate ourselves. For this reason it often becomes difficult to say "I believe." It is more difficult to say "I believe" than it is to say "I don't know," and to truthfully say "I believe" is a thousand times more difficult than it is to admit that "I don't care."

This should all be starting to come together now as you have been enlightened by the meaning of Delta Zeta. You have cast your ribbons aside, and you now wear proudly a badge emblematic of the pure and lofty ideals of your sorority. Emulate your success, consider what you believe, and reflect why you believe. Believe in Delta Zeta, believe in your sisters, and most importantly, believe in yourself.

Clarkson University Chapter Installed

An invitation to participate in the sorority expansion process brought Clarkson University to Delta Zeta's attention. The school, a private institution in upstate New York, was founded in 1886. Largely male, females make up approximately 20% of the total enrollment. Emphasis is on engineering in a highly competitive environment.

Following a presentation to interested women on the campus in the spring of 1986, Delta Zeta was pleased to be selected to establish a colony. Field representatives Lynne Ciervo and Anne Moser were sent to begin rushing and interviewing. Within a week, this activity resulted in the pledging of seventy-five outstanding women. Anne Moser

stayed with the group for the remainder of the school year, setting the ground work for the Xi Rho colony.

In the fall of the year, Lynn Ciervo returned to complete pledge lessons, work on philanthropy projects and make installation plans. A complete social calendar, rigorous academic responsibilities and fund raising events for a local hospital made the colony's schedule a busy one.

The installation weekend began with an informal get-together. National and province officers and the visiting sisters joined the colony members for an evening of introductions, singing and entertainment.

Members of Lambda Iota chapter at the University of Rochester with their graduate counselor Diane Rooney, and Theta Gamma chapter at the University of New Hampshire performed the beautiful initiation service on Saturday, November 15. Selena Morrell, social chairman for the colony had made many of the arrangements for the installation banquet held on the campus on Saturday evening with parents and friends sharing this special event. Past National President and Extension Director Norma Minch Andrisek was the toastmistress. The invocation was given by Christine Gihlstorf, Dianne Fellows Guild, former National Vice President of Alumnae Affairs and Frances Robinson Carnes, Province Collegiate Director, welcomed the new chapter to Province I.

Lynne Ciervo spoke to those present about the change from a colony to a strong chapter. "It was just as special for me as it was for them," said Lynne, "to see their excitement and emotion, and to have them comprehend what each initiated Delta Zeta feels. Being with them was a once in a lifetime experience that I'll never forget and could never replace."

The chapter presented Lynne with a beautiful gold and porcelain music box in appreciation of her love and support in working with the colony.

National Vice President of Membership Terri Severy brought the greetings from the Council and Delta Zetas everywhere. Assistant Dean of Students Heather Wilson welcomed the chapter to Clarkson as did IFC President Dyke Morrisey and Panhellenic President Stacy Jones, presenting two beautiful trays to Xi Rho.

D. Craig Peterson, Greek Affairs Coordinator, spoke of the importance of Greek life and what the new group brought to Clarkson. His remarks about "taking energy and giving energy to one another in time of need" was inspirational to all. A special gift was presented to him on

behalf of the National Council for his continued support and guidance of the colony and for his work with the national organization in assuring the establishment of the new chapter.

The installation service was conducted by National President Mary Margaret Calhoun Fore, and was followed by the newly installed chapter singing "The Rose" as Lynne Ciervo conducted the Rose Ceremony. A significant moment occurred when the new initiates recited the Creed in sign language in honor of Delta Zeta's philanthropy. The banquet ended with the traditional Friendship Circle.

An open reception for the entire student body and faculty was held on the campus on Sunday, November 16.

Special mention and thanks is extended to the University of New Hampshire, Plymouth State and the University of Connecticut chapters for acting as big sisters to the Xi Rho colony.

1893-1987

Myrtle Graeter Hinkly

Shortly after noon on Monday, January 26, 1987, Myrtle Graeter Malott Hinkly, sitting in her customary chair in her Brownsville, Texas apartment, entered eternal life. Her earthly life was one of dedication to high ideals, service, sharing and leadership.

Born October 17, 1893 in Fort Wayne, Indiana, Myrtle was initiated into the DePauw-∆ chapter of Delta Zeta in the fall of 1911. She attended her first National Convention at Winona Lake in Northern Indiana the summer of 1912. As co-chairman of the Convention Pups and Hounds banquet fifty-six years later in 1968, Myrtle was one of the oldest hounds present.

It was at the 1968 convention when Myrtle led other past national officers in the presentation of the initiation ritual for the entire delegation. All Delta Zetas in attendance have remembered through the years this "quickening personal experience," in the words of Grace Mason Lundy.

The Myrtle Graeter Hinkly Council award, a 50 cup silver coffee urn, was presented in 1968 by Texas

collegians and alumnae as a traveling award to recognize overall chapter excellence in alumnae work.

Myrtle served as National Treasurer from 1918-1922; National Registrar, 1922-24; and again as National Treasurer, 1924-26. Elected National President in 1928, she served through the depression years until 1934. Again at the 1938 Convention she was elected president for a two year term.

Upon the certification of the Delta Zeta Foundation as a legally organized corporation of the state of Minnesota in 1961 listing Founders Mary Collins Galbraith and Alfa Lloyd Hayes and then National President Helen Woodruff Nolop as incorporators, Myrtle was elected a member of the first Board of Trustees.

From 1970-1972 Myrtle served as treasurer of the Foundation and worked with Katie Blanche Masters Stallworth, SMU-AΨ, then Foundation president, to promote the philanthropic activities of the sorority through the Foundation. The Myrtle Graeter Hinkly Foundation award for alumnae chapter excellence in local philanthropy was established by the Foundation in 1973.

Myrtle was one of the early dreamers of a home for the sorority national headquarters in Oxford, Ohio, scene of Delta Zeta's founding. When this dream became a reality in 1983, she made a gift of \$10,000 in memory of her sister, Hope, also a DePauw-Δ chapter member. In the summer of 1984, at ninety plus years of age, Myrtle made her first trip to Oxford and spent a night in the authentically restored Victorian home, the Delta Zeta National Historical Museum and National Headquarters.

Plans were made for Myrtle to attend the 1985 National Convention in Scottsdale where the beautifully colored portrait of the Founders was given by Myrtle and Jean Coleman Lisle, Miami-A, daughter of Founder Julia Bishop Coleman. This picture now hangs above the mantle in the front parlor of the Museum. (see story in the Fall 1985 issue of *The* LAMP.)

A severe heart attack in April 1985 prevented Myrtle from attending the convention.

In March 1986 she attended Texas-New Mexico Province Weekend in Dallas and received her *Order of the Diamond in the Flame* certificate for 75 years as a Delta Zeta from Past National President Carolyn Barnes Gullatt and National President Mary Margaret Fore.

An inveterate traveler, Myrtle's first trip around the world was in the late 1930s. She made numerous tours after that to every continent. Always planning ahead, Myrtle and Ed had just returned from a ten day trip to Hong Kong, mainland China and Tokyo in September 1986 when she was again hospitalized with a severe heart attack. The morning of her death she had been on the telephone securing a substitute for her evening bridge game since she had not slept well the night before.

The 1934 history issue of *The LAMP of Delta Zeta* quotes Grace Mason Lundy, National Historian:

"It is difficult to estimate at close range, the exact values of the contribution which Delta Zeta has received from Myrtle Malott's varied contacts with it. Whether to say that the straightening out of financial policies and routine, thus making for greater security and satisfaction for the chapters and the national soundness of operation; whether to stress the quality of leadership that was necessary to bring an organization through years of surprises and upsets everywhere; whether to give first place to the unwavering loyalty, the ceaseless ambition for, the deepseated devotion to the sorority



Gallaudet University: A Celebration of Learning

Dr. Jerry C. Lee, President of Gallaudet, described October 20-25, 1986, by stating, "These are momentous days for Gallaudet. In a sense it is a commencement — a graduation to university status. This

culmination of over a hundred years of service marks a recognition and a tribute to deaf persons everywhere, and to previous as well as current members of the faculty and staff who have guided Gallaudet toward this milestone."

Upon being appointed President of Gallaudet in May 1984, Dr. Lee identified the attainment of university status for Gallaudet as one of his major goals. In October of that year he informed the Gallaudet community of this goal in his inaugural address. The passage of Public Law 99-371, the Education of the Deaf Act of 1986, bestowed university status upon Gallaudet and also included other issues involving the education of deaf persons. On August 4, 1986, President Ronald Reagan signed into law the Education of the Deaf Act (EDA). Members of Congress who were instrumental in passage of the EDA were Senators Lowell Weicker and John Kerry, and Representatives Pat Williams, Steve Bartlett, David Bonior, Steve Gunderson and James Jeffords.

Representing Delta Zeta at part of these University Week festivities were Arlene Newman Marshall, University of Houston- $\Delta\Theta$, president of the Founders Memorial Foundation, and Lucille Bolstad May, North Dakota State- Φ B, FMF Gallaudet chairman.

The climax came at the Convocation on Friday, October 24, when Jane Bassett Spilman, chairman of the Board of Trustees, said, "Now the moment has come for Gallaudet College to enter a new era of teaching, learning, research, service and leadership. It is with great pleasure and high honor on behalf of the Board of Trustees to proclaim hereby that this institution shall be officially designated Gallaudet

Joining the Gallaudet community in witnessing the historical event were delegates from 145 universities and colleges, and representatives of 28 societies. associations and organizations and 7 schools for the deaf. Also in attendance were representatives of congressional offices, federal agencies, District of Columbia government, the Gallaudet Foundation Board and Gallaudet University Regional Centers.

GALLAUDET: A PROFILE

HISTORY: The college was established in 1864 when President Abraham Lincoln signed a bill for the National Deaf-Mute College of the Columbia Institute. The school was renamed Gallaudet College in 1894.

FACULTY AND PROGRAMS: There are 274 fulltime faculty members and 30 undergraduate and graduate programs in three schools: College of Arts and Sciences, School of Communication and School of Education and Human Services. In addition to its undergraduate and graduate programs, Gallaudet includes a diagnostic center, preschool, elementary school, high school, research institute and an international training center that helps foreign countries develop educational programs.

STUDENTS: 1,273 undergraduate and 380 graduate students. The college estimates that it enrolls fewer than one-fifth of the nation's deaf college students, yet accounts for two-thirds of the bachelor's degrees awarded to deaf students in recent years.

CAMPUS: The main campus is a 99 acre site at Florida and West Virginia avenues in Northeast Washington. In 1983 the school opened a second 8.7 acre campus in Northwest Washington that serves as a preparatory school for students needing remedial work before entering Gallaudet and as a semivocational school for high school and college-age students.

FUNDING AND COSTS: Most of the school's funds come from the federal government. Tuition, room and board is \$5,600 for the 1986-87 year. Ninety percent of the students receive some form of financial aid.

GALLAUDET: THE MISSION

The mission of Gallaudet University is to serve as a comprehensive, multipurpose institution of higher education for the hearing impaired citizens of the United States and of the world, by means of the modern three-fold functions of higher education: teaching, research and service. Gallaudet reaffirms its commitment to instruction in the arts and sciences as vital to the development of the intellect; its commitment to research aimed at improving the quality of life of hearing impaired persons; and its commitment to serve hearing impaired people, their families, their friends, and the professionals who work with them.


While Gallaudet's basic mission is reaffirmed, the demands of the times and needs of hearing impaired people require new and expanded emphasis which make Gallaudet's scope of services equivalent to that of a modern land grant university.

To fulfill these service obligations, Gallaudet affirms a commitment to traditional and contemporary university emphasis upon:

- 1. Education for work and independence.
- 2. Acquisition of learning skills.
- 3. Enrollment of all qualified students.
- 4. Service to society.
- 5. Productive associations with other educational institutions.
- 6. Provision of services to constituencies in their local communities.
- 7. Increased attention to improving the quality of life of all deaf persons.
- 8. Assurance of the economic vitality, personal enrichment, and intellectual growth of adult constituencies.
- 9. Provision of services on both a national and international basis.
- 10. Creation of new knowledge through scholarly pursuits.

A Barrel Racing Cowgirl

Barrel racing is an event for female rodeo participants in which the rider guides the horse in a clover leaf pattern around three barrels that are set up in the shape of a triangle.

The horse speeds out of the gate at one end of the arena—either indoors or out—rounds the barrel on either the left or right side from the middle, shoots across to the opposite side and tears up the middle to the barrel at the point of the triangle and back through the center to the score line—a line spotted by an electric eye that varies in distance from the first and second barrels from 30 to 60 feet toward the gate.

Hitting a barrel costs seconds and one-hundredth of a second can separate first from second place in a barrel

race.

The lyrics from a popular country and western song a few years ago implored mamas not to let their babies grow up to be cowboys.

But, what about growing up to become a barrel rac-

ing cowgirl?

Dana Cogburn Jandreau, CSU-EY, has, with the encouragement and help of her family, grown up to become a top barrel racer.

"I have had a lot of family support and backing," she said, noting that her grandfather has even helped in hauling her, as well as her horse, to rodeos.

Her goal when a youngster was to be the youngest world champion barrel racer. But that dream was shattered on the eve of her ninth birthday when another nine-year-old secured that distinction.

That disappointment has not stopped her from striving to be a champion barrel racer, though.

"I try to make as smooth and fast a run as possible," she said of what goes through her mind during a race.

That objective served her well in 1985 as she earned \$35,000 on the Women's Pro Rodeo Association (WPRA) circuit and an additional \$7,000 to \$8,000 from other races during the season. She was one of 15 top barrel racers to compete at the National Finals Rodeo in Las Vegas in December and finished the season ranked 8th in the world.

But, what qualities does a person need to be suc-

cessful at barrel racing?

"The same as for life," she confidently replied. "You need perserverance, to give it 110 percent everytime you're out, and to have one special horse—mainly the horse."

She said she feels very fortunate to have two — not just one — good barrel racing horses. 'Mixer' is a good horse for riding on outdoor arenas, while 'Pokey' is good on indoor arenas.

It's in her blood

Rodeoing is in her blood in more ways than one. Her father, D. C. Cogburn, is a retired professional rodeo clown who also had specialty acts. She says she has been on the road because of rodeos since she was 3-weeks-old, coming home for only days or a week or so between rodeos.

Dana said she has had her rodeo "pro card" on and off since she was seven and the first time she competed as a barrel racer was when she was three.

At the age of seven, her father bought her a second horse and before she was eight she acquired 'Buck', a horse that won the World Championship with an 11-year-old in 1965. 'Buck' helped her win the first pro-rodeo competition she entered, which was in Cortez, Colorado.

"I made a deal with my parents, they could keep the dollars if I could keep the cents!!!"

She won \$159.15 with a time of 16.8. She said she does not always remember her times or winnings from recent races, but that she remembers the exact time and winnings of her first pro-rodeo victory.

She has had several horses since then. In November of 1984 she purchased 'Pokey' and went to the

National Finals Rodeo on him.

A product of the Guthrie (Oklahoma) School System, Dana was active as a cheerleader, in DECA (serving as president and queen), FCA, served as Senior Class and Student Council treasurer, and was a member of the honor society before graduating from Guthrie High School in 1983. She attended Central State University in Edmond before deciding to devote her time on a full-time basis to barrel racing. But,

Working Together: Greek Advisers and NPC

Since becoming involved in the Association of Fraternity Advisors in 1984, I have often heard concern over the relationship between Greek Advisors and National Panhellenic Conference. I feel strongly that the Greek Advisor cannot develop a strong Panhellenic system without the support of national organizations. Likewise, national sororities cannot develop strong Panhellenic systems without administrative support.

Recently at Clarkson University, the decision was made to add a third national sorority to the two-year-old Panhellenic Association. After a careful selection process, Delta Zeta was chosen to colonize and took a charter pledge class of 75, the Panhellenic total. I am pleased to report that the relation-ship between the Clarkson administration and Delta Zeta is exemplary of the cooperation that is necessary for strong Greek systems to emerge and be maintained on college campuses

In analyzing this positive relation-

ship, the primary reason for success is communication. From the time that Delta Zeta national representatives arrived for their extension presentation, cooperation began. The two main agenda items for the Clarkson administration were ongoing national support for both the colony and College Panhellenic. Time was also an extremely crucial factor. An interest group of 35 women was anxious to begin sorority involvement. Delta Zeta understood the needs, adapted to our situation, and agreed to take the interest group in its entirety. Within less than a week from the time that an offer was extended to Delta Zeta. two national field representatives were on campus to begin the colonization process.

Clarkson selected Delta Zeta because of the on campus support the colony would receive directly from ΔZ national. With the concept of national sororities a relatively new one on campus, the importance of visible role models was crucial. When the two field reps arrived, the

team effort definitely continued. The reps and I met daily to discuss strategy and potential problem areas. The climate was one of partnership and not ownership. The Clarkson administration supported Delta Zeta's standards, and Delta Zeta respected Clarkson's philosophy on Greek organizations. The bottom line was that both Clarkson University and Delta Zeta wanted a solid colony to emerge ... and it has.

What can be learned from this successful colonization effort? The fact is and always will be that when college administrations and national sororities work together in accomplishing their goals, the results will be favorable and will set the foundation for additional progress and achievement. The same is true on a national level. The Association of Fraternity Advisors and National Panhellenic Conference must respect one another and understand that its relationship with the other is not an optional arrangement but a necessity in 1986.








Notes from Beth Heaston

During the summer of 1986, I decided on a drastic change in my life that showed me something very special about Delta Zeta. After attending the University of Virginia for two years, I decided that I needed to follow my heart and transfer to Indiana University. In 1963-64 Toni Gilbert was elected pledge educator of Gamma Nu at Eastern Illinois University in Charleston. Your financial support to the Delta Zeta Founders Memorial Foundation Gallaudet Fund enables Delta Zeta to help deserving Gallaudet women students with their college expenses. The Delta Zeta-Gallaudet Endowment Scholarship Fund was established by the Foundation in 1975 with an initial \$4,000 donation. The first award of \$200 was made in 1976. By the early 1980s a \$1,000 scholarship was provided annually.

The Delta Zeta-Gallaudet Endowment Scholarship Fund now has a permanent balance of over \$100,000. Scholarships are awarded from the interest derived from investing the fund.

In the fall of 1986 Gallaudet became a participant in a Federal Endowment Challenge program. This means that the university now receives a matching amount for each dollar it receives from private sponsors, such as the Delta Zeta Founders Memorial Foundation. That gives us double value for our contributions.
