

Position Statement on Alcohol


Because of our concern for the health and well-being of our members, the presidents of all 26 National Panhellenic Conference (NPC) groups have agreed to the following:

- 1. that we are opposed to the misuse of alcohol;
- 2. that all college chapters, all individual members, and all guests must abide by federal, state/provincial, local, college/university laws and regulations;
- 3. that it is inadvisable to host a party involving alcohol when the majority of guests attending are under the legal drinking age;
- 4. that no college chapter funds may be used to purchase alcohol. (Co-sponsors of social events are potentially liable regardless of how the expenses are shared.)

Each NPC group has an alcohol policy and is expected to abide by it. In addition, the presidents expect their chapters to respect the regulations of any NPC co-sponsoring group.

We hope that this agreement will give college chapters the courage and ability to initiate discussion and formulate a Panhellenic stand on the subject of alcohol.

As we approach another fall formal rush period, let us look at what makes a good rush party.



Introduce your legacy to Delta Zeta

A legacy is the granddaughter, daughter, or sister of a Delta Zeta and these women should certainly be given special consideration as rushees.

According to Delta Zeta's policy, all legacies will be invited back to at least one invitational party during formal rush. If a legacy is dropped during rush the chapter must notify the Province Collegiate Director of this decision immediately. If a legacy is invited to a preference party, she will be on Delta Zeta's bid list.

In order for a chapter to give special attention to a legacy, they must know a rushee *IS* a legacy. Many chapters do not have access to information sheets on rushees, so it is imperative that this information be provided. Please inform the chapter where your legacy will be a rushee so that she does have that special Delta Zeta connection.

Being a legacy does not mean instant membership in Delta Zeta, just as being a legacy does not prevent a rushee from choosing another group to whom she will belong. Encourage all legacies to know that Delta Zeta is special; however, it is important for each legacy to look at all the Greek groups on campus and find the one where she will be happiest.

LEGACY INTRODUCTION

Long Term Commitment

Lucille May has given these words special emphasis

Lucille May and Gallaudet University have been special friends for about four decades. It all began in 1951 with a routine phone call, one of many Lucille made while working on a update of the alumnae chapter's membership directory.

The phone call brought Lucille in contact with sorority sister Lucille Pendell, then Gallaudet's librarian. Since aid to hearing impaired people had long been one of Delta Zeta's philanthropies, their conversation naturally turned to Gallaudet and its unique character. Both women then met to discuss how the sorority could help the college. Soon after their meeting, Lucille wrote to the Delta Zeta Foundation, the sorority's philanthropic division. In her letter, Lucille suggested that Gallaudet be considered for Foundation support.

At its 1954 National Convention, Delta Zeta adopted the proposed new Edward Miner Gall Memorial Library as one of its "Adventures In Friendships" service projects. When the library was built, Delta Zeta gave ten thousand dollars for furnishings, with other donations over the years for library facilities and equipment. After Lucille Pendell retired in 1972, Lucille May began looking at other areas of need.

Once again she wrote to the Foundation, this time proposing that an endowment fund be set up to provide scholarships for outstanding young hearing impaired women.

The Delta Zeta Scholarship Fund was established in 1975 with a four thousand dollar donation. The first award of two hundred dollars was made in 1976. By the early 1980s, a one thousand dollar scholarship was provided annually. By 1986, the fund totaled more

than ninety thousand dollars and six students were awarded one thousand dollars each. The fund currently totals \$170,000.

Until recent years, members of the Delta Zeta Scholarship Fund Committee decided who would receive scholarships. Now personnel in Gallaudet's Financial Aid Office handle the selection process, following guidelines set by the Foundation.

Lucille, a former Province Director, recalls one wonderful experience when she represented Delta Zeta at Gallaudet's Centennial Dinner on June 6. 1964. 450 invitations had been extended, with the guest list headed by President Lyndon B. Johnson. President Johnson was there to present to Gallaudet the annual award made by the President's Committee on Aid to the Physically Handicapped. The American Hearing Society had recommended the college for this award. Five Centennial Awards were given at the dinner, with President Johnson receiving the first. Senator Lister Hill was

presented the second and Delta Zeta the third.

Lucille says equal to the thrill of receiving the medal for Delta Zeta was the magic response to the name of Delta Zeta. "Whenever I was introduced and identified with Delta Zeta, a compliment was forthcoming."

Lucille recalls with amazement the first time she was asked to speak before members of the college community. Her topic was finances. "That's a hard subject to make interesting," she said, "So I thought of some funny things to say."

During her speech she was dismayed to find that the audience was not looking at her. Not only that, but her humor lines also seemed to fall flat. She said she would be into the next sentence before the laughs caught up. She thought she had really bombed. That was Lucille's introduction to sign language interpreting.

Born and raised in North Dakota, Lucille graduated from North Dakota State, earning her degree in education with a major in science in 1937. During her college years she was active in campus and sorority activities. President of her chapter of Phi Omega Pi, she served as rush chairman, Panhellenic delegate and attended two National Conventions. On campus she was a member of the Women's Senate and the YWCA board.

Three months after graduation, Lucille married Leland B. May. He was formerly a budget analyst with the Air Force and is now retired.

Lucille served as a Province Director for Phi Omega Pi for two years, 1938-1940, was vice-president of the Fargo City Panhellenic and on the YWCA advisory board.

During the war, Lucille was the director of a USO clubhouse for (continued on page 10)

Handmade books published right from the heart

All the books on Rachel Roller's coffee table are hers. Really.

A retired teacher and librarian, the Coral Gables resident writes stories, types them, photocopies the pages, stitches them on the sewing machine, then binds them with cardboard and fabric.

During the last two years Roller has made 650 books, all by hand.

One of the youngest and most energetic 80-year-olds you are apt to meet, Roller explained how she decided to make her own books. It started when she attended an Elderhostel (an educational program for senior citizens) in Des Moines, Iowa, to learn how to write one's family history. Once she had her story written, Roller decided to turn it into a book so that her family and a few close friends would have the story to keep.

Since much of her married life was spent in Newman, Ill., she titled the book *Love Affair with a Small Town*. She made 25 copies and thought she was finished. After a story about her book appeared in the Newman newspaper, however, she began to get requests for the book. So Roller made more books, 200 in all, and sold them for \$20 each.

It costs her \$14 to make a book. "I'm not getting rich, but I'm having fun," she said.

The other books she has made include Gentle On My Mind, A Collection of Poems by Thelma Peters, a South Florida historian and Roller's sister; Makeshift Christmas, a child's Christmas story written by Roller's son, George E. Roller, when he was 13; and *Eldehosteling with Rachel*, Roller's experience at an Elderhostel in Germany.

Stories to tell

Roller lectures at clubs and schools to encourage others to pen their family histories. She's got four lectures lined up for this month and April, including two at Barry University in Miami Shores.

"My philosophy is that there are just worlds of interesting stories going to waste," she said. "Yet it's impossible for common folk to get a book published and make money on it. Authors make only around 40 cents a book, and if the publisher doesn't market it well, the book doesn't sell. And if you go the vanity press route, it can cost you \$6,000 to \$10,000 to get a book published.

"Making your own book is the best way to preserve family history," she said. "If you use a loose-leaf notebook [for family memories], it won't get saved."

When she decided to turn her family history into a book, Roller looked for a course in bookbinding. She found one offered by the Art Institute of Chicago, but the course was canceled because too few people enrolled. As a librarian for many years, Roller had mended lots of books, so she had some knowledge of the craft.

> She vowed to learn it on her own. First, she bought a book at a garage sale and tore it apart to learn how a book is assembled. Standard parts include a title page, copyright, dedications, a blank page or a picture and a table of contents. Roller's books have all of this, including a copyright. To obtain a copyright, Roller sends a letter to the Library of Congress along with \$20 and two copies of the book. She has obtained three copyrights this year.

How-to primer

Here's how Roller makes her books:

■ Story written, Roller decides how many pages, or "signatures" in book talk, her book should have. A signature is eight pages. A three-signature book has 24 pages. She takes blank sheets of white paper and numbers them. She uses paper with a rag content that costs three cents a sheet.

Working on an IBM electric typewriter with a typeface that looks like print, Roller measures to see how many lines of manuscript will fit on each page.

Once the master copy has been typed, Roller takes the manuscript to an office supply store and photocopies it.

Once the pages are collated and folded in half, Roller stitches each book on the sewing machine, using white thread and long basting stitches. Then she hand-stitches the basting thread in four places, adding strength to the book. A piece of white muslin is glued to the spine of the pages for additional strength.

Two pieces of cardboard become the cover of the book, with a strip from a cereal box serving as the spine. The three cardboard pieces are glued (she uses Elmer's glue) to a cloth cover upon which Roller has printed the title of the book and her name, using liquid correction fluid. "It doesn't rub off and it shows up on any fabric," she explains.

Once the book is glued, including plain end papers inside the covers, the book is inserted in a press and left to dry for 24 hours. Removing a book so a photograph could be taken of it, Roller quipped: "This is what you call hot off the press."

Evoking memories

Roller illustrates her books with sketches. "I'm not an artist. I just doodle until something comes through." Her family history book even sports the Roller family crest, which Roller hand-colored in red, blue and silver.

"I've gotten so many letters from people who are touched by the book," said Roller, leafing through a binder full of hand-written letters. One letter was from an elderly man who remembered riding the Roller family's horse, Freddie, when he was a kid. He sent Roller a wood figure of a horse he whittled.

Even if you don't know the Roller family, *Love Affair with a Small Town* is a delight to read. If you yearn for small-town living, Roller's tales of the telephone operator who knew all in Newman, Ill., during the 1930s will make you smile.

If you like house restoration, her tale of how she and her husband rescued an old, 20-room mansion in Newman is interesting. Born in 1910 in Independence, Mo., Roller, her sister Thelma and their parents moved to South Florida in 1914. Her stories of growing up during the teens and '20s are wonderfully nostalgic.

Roller includes sad stories, too, such as her daughter Ann's death as a result of a brain tumor in 1979. "I include them because I think death is part of life," Roller said.

young people in Macomb, Ill., and also helped in the District of Columbia and in Petersburg, Va. While her husband was in India for two years during World War II, Lucille held a position with the Government Printing Office.


When Lee returned from India the Mays moved to Alexandria, Va. In June 1946, Lucille was initiated into Delta Zeta and affiliated with Gamma chapter. She has been very active in the Washington, D.C., alumnae chapter, holding the offices of social chairman, program chairman, Panhellenic delegate and alternate and served as treasurer of the Washington, D.C., Panhellenic Association. She was also president and program chairman of the Virginia group.

Besides her Delta Zeta involvement, Lucille has been an active member of the Bethesda, Md., Woman's Club, consumer advisory Board of the Bethesda Chevy Chase Chamber of Commerce, the Forty Club and the Lutheran Church, and also worked as Panhellenic Secretary at the University of Maryland.

During recent years, Lucille has continued her commitment to Delta Zeta and Gallaudet by serving as Foundation representative to the University. In addition, she has been an important part of the Council for Better Hearing & Speech Month.

Lucille Bolstad May has given her time and effort to create a greater level of understanding between Delta Zetas and Gallaudet University. Lucille is indeed an excellent example of Delta Zetas who have, and will continue, to work hard as volunteers for Gallaudet. The challenge and people-impact of the work of Lucille and Delta Zeta is perhaps best summed up by a quote from Thomas Wolfe: "To each his chance, to each his shining golden opportunity to become all that his manhood and his vision will permit him to become. This is the promise of America." This too, is

the goal of Delta Zetas who have, and will continue to work hard, to make this promise a reality for deaf Americans as well.

"Everyone should look for volunteer opportunities since there is nothing more rewarding," Nanette Fabray MacDougall stated recently. She went on to say that giving even an hour a week can help in anyone's neighborhood. She indicated that simple activities like reading or writing letters for the blind or running errands for the handicapped can make a difference.

This comes from a Delta Zeta who spends many hours working for others in spite of a busy acting-lecture series schedule.

One of her local philanthropies is the House Ear Institute of Los Angeles. She often emcees or performs at their functions as well as at Southern California's Delta Zeta Flame Fantasy fashion show whose proceeds go to HEI. Through a generous donation from Nanette, the Institute was able to add an auditorium in their new complex.

Nanette knows firsthand about hearing difficulties since otosclerosis, a hardening of the small bones of the middle ear, threatened her career. A series of operations restored her hearing in 1975 and she was so pleased she wanted others to know about advancements being made in this field.


A member of the Board of Directors of the Better Hearing Institute, among other boards, she also is a Trustee of the National Captioning Institute. She points out that it is through this organization that all of the major nighttime television programs now are captioned. They are looking forward to the time when the different language translations will be offered through captioning.

Television viewers recently enjoyed her on "Coach" when she played the mother of her real-life niece, Shelley Fabares. Nanette also is proud of her physician son, Jamie MacDougall, who is a dermatologist in Manhattan Beach, California.

Along with her television appearances, she is a lecturer with the Town Hall series. She speaks with humor about the serious side of life on such topics as "Widowhood" and "The Financial and Physical Problems of Aging." This takes her to cities all over the nation.

Her one-woman show "Almost Everything You Wanted to Know about Nan, But . . ." also is being performed in many U.S. cities. Rave reviews say that "she looked radiantly youthful and demurely feminine" and that "she puts herself through a routine that would have exhausted a rock star. Obviously she was born to entertain and does it superbly." She has performed this show as a major fund-raising project for the Doyle McIntosh Center for the Disabled.

Delta Zetas feel they are fortunate to have a talented star in their midst who finds time to do work for their national philanthropies of Gallaudet University and the House Ear Institute. She is a wonderful example of how to share one's time and abilities with others. Nanette is one to say "Yes, Yes."

"I just wanted to take this opportunity to commend you and your editorial staff on the recent articles published in *The LAMP* on Sexual Assault on college campuses.

"Ten years ago while I was a student very little was ever mentioned about date or acquaintance rape. In fact, I did not know that it even existed and I always had felt safe on my college campus, nor did I realize how prevalent violence against women was until recently when I became active in the Battered Women's movement.

"I am currently working at a Women's Shelter as Victims Assistance Coordinator and I counsel victims of sexual assault. You do a tremendous service to all Delta Zetas and women everywhere by publishing articles that educate women about crime. I hope that you will continue to publish articles such as these in the future. Again, thank you." Suzanne is at the Women's Shelter of East Texas, Inc., in Nacogdoches, Texas.

The winter issue of the *Marshall Alumnus* carried an article about Marshall alumni "in the Global Village by Christine Grishkin."

Delta Upsilon's Victoria Beattie, '81 was featured in a section on Zambia.

Victoria was quoted:

"At night I hear drums. The people still practice dancing and initiation ceremonies. I'm not sharing this to say the people here are backward, but I find that Americans are shocked to learn that some Zambian people still live in a more traditional way."

Victoria lives in a rural area of Zambia where there is a population of about 15,000 in a five-mile radius. She shares a three-bedroom bungalow, with a bathroom, kitchen and living room, with a missionary nurse from Canada. The natives don't have running water or electricity and most live in mud houses with grass roofs. She says her experience in Zambia is limited to the rural area.

Victoria graduated from Marshall

in 1983 with an A.A.S. degree in nursing. Before attending Marshall she went to St. Mary's School for Girls in Johannesburg, South Africa. Her father's job took her family to South Africa.

Now she is a registered nurse and supervises Zambian hospital staff in the rural mission Luampa Hospital.

"There are many diseases to learn about, including malnutrition, tuberculosis and AIDS. I have been the 'sister' in charge of a male ward with 34 beds. I have more responsibility for my patients than I did in the United States. At times I even prescribe medication for them."

Attending Marshall was difficult for Victoria at first. She stated, "My first year was a time of adjustment for me. I was experiencing counterculture shock reentering the United States after six years in South Africa. Joining Delta Zeta was helpful to me. My sorority sisters accepted me for who I was, they did not force me to change to be like them. It was good to feel accepted when everything was new to me."

An innovative program chairman for the Southern New Jersey alum-

nae chapter, Barbara Mellon-Denesevich, West Chester-IP, sent the following notice to chapter members:



The surprise meeting was High Tea at the Four Seasons Hotel in Philadelphia!

Zeta chapter's Peggy Haskell Benjamin has written another book! Using her father's journals, records and letters, Peggy weaves a vibrant biography of a man and family who contributed to civilizing the west.

"Years to Share" is the title of the story which spans 53 years of growth and expansion on the Nebraska frontier . . . everything from vigilante justice to 20th century politics. Peggy's father campaigned for Republican Taft of Ohio in a Nebraska inspired by its native son, William Jennings Bryan.

Peggy has been living in Taneytown, Maryland, but returned to her Grand Island, Nebraska, home in late March. She is also an artist and one of her paintings hangs in the National Historical Museum in Oxford.

The March issue of *The Lutheran* carried an article called "Caring 101." At Wittenberg University a new graduation requirement calls for 30 hours of community service, done preferably during the sophomore year for one 10-week term.

And so the article features different involvements of students. 

House by the windmill

"They say there's a house by the windmill, a house that can bring joy to you. Come along with me, be a Delta Zee and join in our sisterhood true . . ." These are the words of a popular song with the Delta Zetas of Bowling Green State University.

Windmills in Bowling Green? It just so happens that their chapter house is located next to a well-known local landmark, the windmill. Because this building is so distinctive, the Gamma Tau chapter has adopted it as their local symbol.

The history of the windmill is a fascinating one. It was built in 1938 by Bertis H. Urschel to hide the heating plant that supplied heat to the Urschel Court Apartments. Urschel also planned on using the windmill to create power for an electric fountain in the quarry behind it. The windmill stands 45 feet high, is hexagon-shaped and is done in cobblestone and red shingles.

While the windmill has become a local symbol for the Gamma Taus, it has also become home to some members. On the inside of the mill there is only one circular room to each floor. The ceilings are low and the stairs are steep, but that does not detract from its beauty and uniqueness. Currently two Delta Zetas live in the windmill, but years ago it housed up to eight people! It has become a tradition that Delta Zetas live there because of its closeness to the chapter house and its close bond with their history on the Bowling Green campus.

"... When you come to the house by the windmill, you'll find what you're searching for. A lamp and its light and a friendship so bright and a sisterhood true evermore. ...

Paws with a cause

Have you ever wondered what your life would be like if you were unable to "hear" the telephone ringing? Or what your life would be like if you were "mobility limited" and were unable to get up from a fall? You would probably feel frustrated, isolated and dependent on others.

Thanks to "PAWS WITH A CAUSE — Dogs for Dignity" many disabled people have found security and independence.

There are two types of dogs that "PAWS" trains — Hearing Dogs and Service Dogs. Hearing dogs take four months to train and cost about \$3000 each. These dogs are trained to alert their owners to everyday noises that call for action, such as a baby's cry, a teapot whistling. Service dogs' training takes longer and costs about \$5000 each. These dogs are trained to pull wheelchairs, open doors, pick up objects, etc. Both dogs must learn to avoid distractions such as cats. Each dog wears a distinctive orange collar and leash and their owners carry cards that verify the dogs' special training. These dogs are granted the same access rights as leader dogs.

On November 15, 1990, Joyce MacNab and Murphy visited the Metropolitan Detroit alumnae chapter meeting. Joyce, who lost her hearing six years ago, told her story and told how Murphy, her hearing dog, has changed her life. She can now function independently in a world she cannot hear. She also showed videos of other hearing dogs and service dogs.

"PAWS" is a non-profit organization that identifies and develops ways to establish working relationships between people with disabilities and dogs. The organization originated in 1979 and has been able to train hundreds of hearing/service dogs. Their Detroit office is located in Lake Orion, Michigan; the Corporate Office is located in Bryon Center, Michigan.

Campus Sights & Sounds

PANHELLENIC AND INTERFRATERNITY Councils at Purdue have banned any use of chapter money on alcohol.

THE COUNCILS at Illinois have banned kegs of beer at parties and also banned "little sister" groups.

JAPANESE is spoken on a new hotline for applicants to Cornell's Johnson Graduate School of Management. Last year 356 Japanese students applied. (Wall Street Journal)

THE UNIVERSITY OF DENVER says its three-week "M.B.A. boot camp" features rock climbing, war games, and etiquette lessons with Letitia Baldridge.

FAST FOOD companies have established outlets on college campuses, often as part of students' meal plans. Pizza Hut, Dunkin' Donuts, Dairy Queen, McDonalds and Burger King all have college units.

APPLICANTS to medical schools have dropped 40% since 1974. The cost of malpractice insurance is one of the reasons.

THROUGH a Department of Energy grant, research will continue at Mississippi State to develop more efficient uses of our environmental resources and to make a significant contribution to cleaner air.

ARIZONA STATE men's and women's golf teams won the national championships — the first time in NCAA history that teams from the same school won the titles.

THE INTERFRATERNITY COUNCIL at the University of Miami voted to abolish "little sister" organizations.



Alpha Gamma Endows Scholarship

In March, 1990, Alpha Gamma chapter at the University of Alabama endowed its first memorial scholarship with a sense of sadness, but great pride.

The chapter members had been stunned on April 22, 1989, at the tragic loss of one of its own, Kimberly Lynn Lancaster.

Kim was killed instantly in a onecar accident near her home in Gadsden, Alabama, just a few weeks before final exams of her sophomore year. The chapter chartered a bus to attend her funeral and immediately began plans with the alumnae for a scholarship to honor the memory of their sister. It was with a strong sense of accomplishment when they raised the \$10,000 necessary to endow a scholarship at the University of Alabama within a year of the tragedy.

Appropriately, on April 22, 1990, the first anniverary of Kim's death, the entire chapter had a luncheon at the chapter house to mark the occasion. Kim's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lathan Lancaster, and other friends from Gadsden attended the brief ceremony. Also attending were National Vice President Sandra McAlister Nesbitt, Tuscaloosa alumnae and Development Office officials. Kim's portrait was unveiled and hung in the library of the chapter house and the first monetary award was presented.

Patsy Fowler, a junior who had been one of Kim's pledge sisters, received the monetary award from Dr. Minnie Miles, alumnae scholarship advisor for the chapter and the University of Alabama Development Office representative. Patsy, who had served as the chapter's corresponding secretary while maintaining a 3.51 grade point average, fit the scholarship's criteria by demonstrating "a commitment to scholarship and excellence in leadership, service and character." The funds were most helpful to Patsy when she did her practice teaching in New Zealand last fall.

The first actual scholarship is to be presented this spring, effective for the fall of 1991.

The members of Alpha Gamma are grateful to all who contributed to this scholarship program which will assist worthy Delta Zetas in completion of college degrees. The first sizeable gifts were from Mr. and Mrs. Lancaster and the Alpha Gamma House Corporation. Then a heartwarming and widespread response brought contributions from many parents of the collegians, friends of the Lancasters and alumnae of Alpha Gamma from all over the country. The continuing support of the Lancaster family with memorials and gifts on days that had been special to Kim enabled the scholarship to become a reality within the year.

While the juniors and seniors in the chapter have their own memories of Kim, the DELTA ZETA-KIMBERLY LYNN LANCASTER ENDOWED SCHOLARSHIP will provide a perpetual memorial to Kim as well as scholarships for deserving Delta Zetas throughout the years to come. The chapter will continue making donations to the scholarship each year to increase the size of the endowment and produce more and larger scholarship amounts. Memorial gifts and contributions are welcome.
