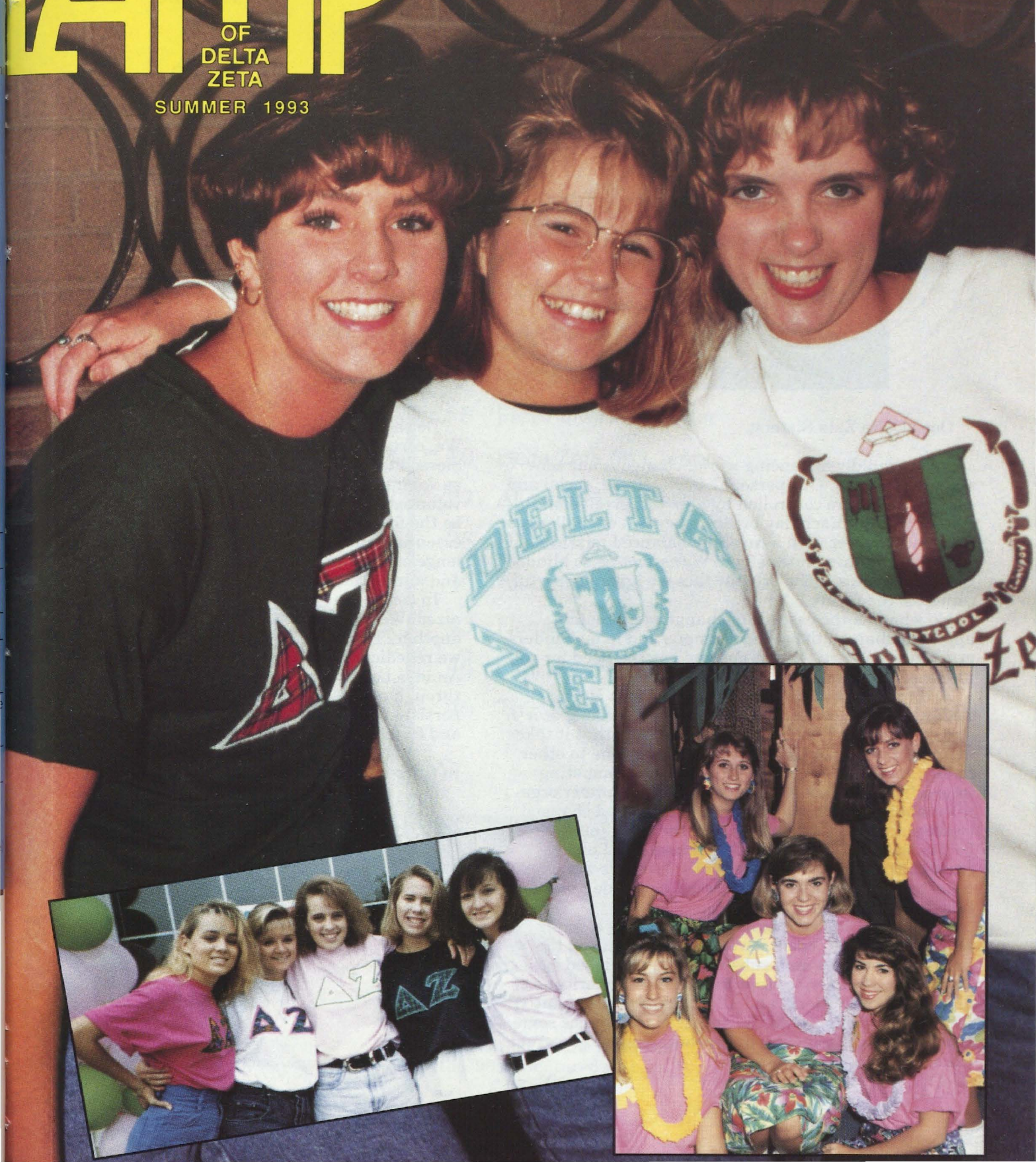

From the Pen of the President . .



Dear Delta Zeta Sisters,

In our rapidly advancing world, change is our constant companion. Our personal, professional, social and spiritual lives are controlled by how we perceive and handle change. Each day brings a new set of challenges that must be met with a carefully balanced mixture of vision, leadership and wisdom. We cannot be so blinded by the successes of the present that we ignore opportunities for the future.

No where is the cascade of change more readily apparent than on the college campus and in our undergraduate chapters. And at no time has the need for volunteers been greater.

According to a Gallup survey reported in *USA Today*, the number of volunteers has been rising at a staggering rate. This may be an indication that it takes more people each doing a little less work, due to other family and job-related commitments and competing interests, to produce the same results. Volunteer organizational structures are being reviewed and changed to accommodate the volunteers of the '90s. Yet studies by the National Volunteer Center and J.C. Penney show that well over 90 percent of volunteers who give their time continue to be motivated by the desire to help and fill a need.

During the 1830s, Alexis De Tocqueville, a young French aristocrat, spent several months touring the new United States and, subsequently, published *Democracy in America*. In it he said, "... Americans of all ages, all conditions, and all dispositions constantly form associations ... if it be proposed to advance some truth, or foster feeling by the encouragement of a great example, they form a society ..."

Delta Zeta is our great example — our great society. We, certainly including our collegiate members, are blessed to have so many committed alumnae involved as volunteers. We salute and thank these dedicated volunteers. Yet we need more. Alumnae volunteers can be the foundation of consistency and continuity so essentially necessary to chapters experiencing the challenge of constant change through officer transitions and annual membership turnover.

In serving, a simple but powerful truth is recognized: We need each other. And we must care for one another. Today, we do more than celebrate Delta Zeta; we rededicate ourselves to the very idea of Delta Zeta. An idea born at the turn of this century and renewed through over 90 years of challenge. 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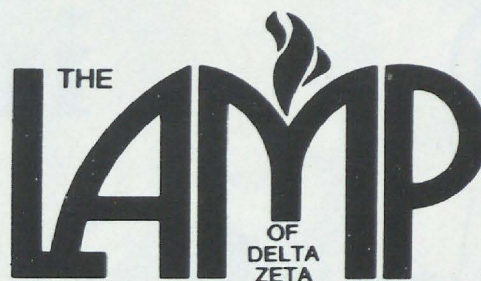

Rush

in the

'90s

"Who knows Reba Rushee?" asked the rush chairman during a membership selection session. No one answers. The rush chairman asks again, and finally someone "thinks" she remembers that Reba came to the first or second party. Does this sound familiar? Are we losing sight of the purpose of rush?

Rush is supposed to be the opportunity for chapter members to get to know potential members, and vice versa, so the mutual selection process can work, insuring the continued growth of the Greek system. However, on many campuses rush has become a real production. This leaves very little time for conversation and the real purpose of rush — women getting to know each other — with the rushee learning about the purpose of the individual sororities.

Not only have rushes become extravagant, but there are also other areas of rush that do not follow the guidelines of National Panhellenic Conference (NPC) in terms of fairness and equality. Expensive rush gifts given at parties and letters given at parties which promise a bid do not reflect the true panhellenic spirit.

The 26 member groups of National Panhellenic Conference realized that rush was getting out of hand, and decided it was time for rush reforms which would allow the collegians to get back to the basics of rush. They saw a distinct need for cost cutting efforts, less "entertainment" (i.e. elaborate skits, decorations and food), a strong commitment to get away from "dirty" rushing and toward putting much more emphasis on

communication skills. These concerns resulted in the NPC rush recommendations.

Today's college woman is much more interested in who the rushee is and what her interests are than in how well she can be impressed with all the "fluff" of a rush party. Conversation skills will not only enable her to communicate with a rushee to get to know her in a short period of time, but these skills will enable her to communicate with others all through her lifetime, whether it is in the job market or on the social scene.

Rushees, too, are not interested in pledging a skit or a song, but want to know how membership in a social sorority can benefit them now and in the future.

Many campuses have embraced these recommendations, pleased that they do not have huge rush budgets to contend with and that they do not have to ask their alumni to donate items and cash because the budget (regardless of how large it may be) does not cover all that is needed for a competitive rush. However, at other schools there has been much resistance

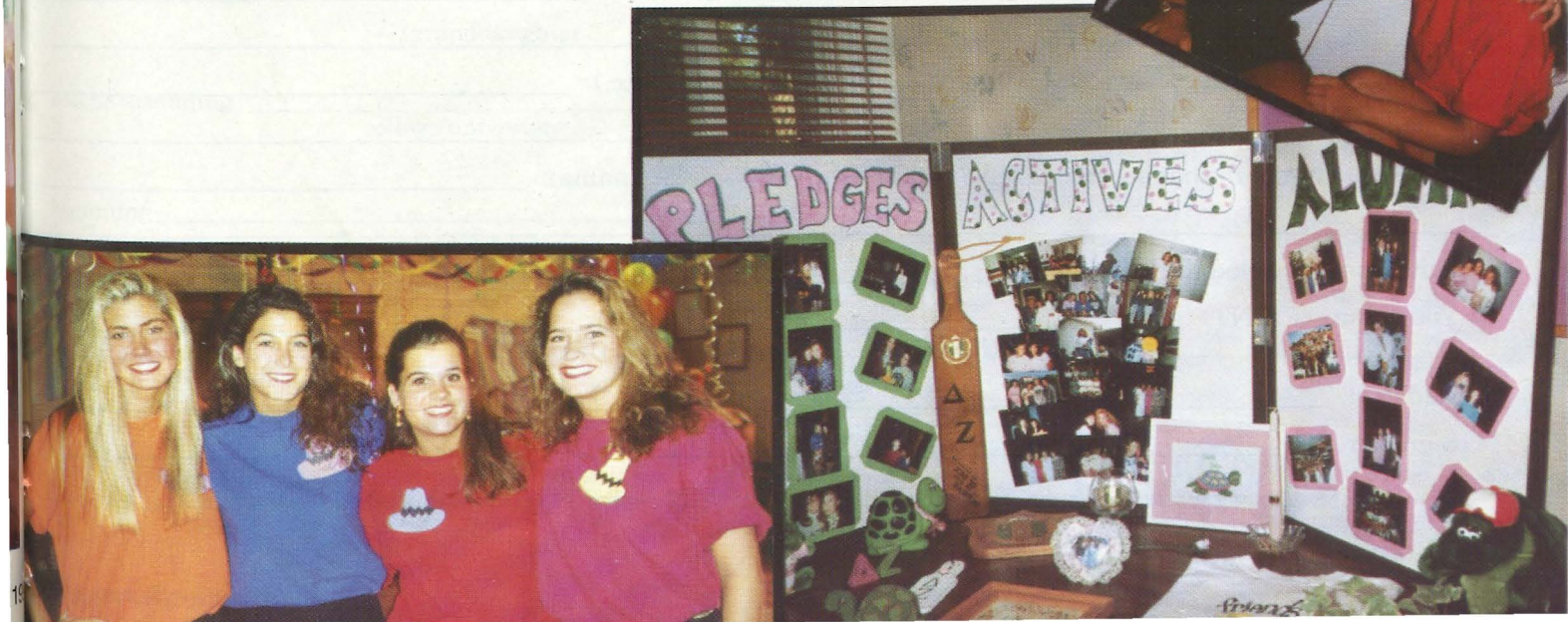


these changes because the rush on their campus is such an important tradition.

In many instances alumnae want to go back to the college chapter to find everything exactly the same so they may once again relive that special time in their lives. The alumnae must be educated regarding the changes that need to be made, and why they need to be made. When they understand the reasoning behind the resolutions it will be easier for them to accept and support.

Alumnae support is vital to the collegiate chapters. They should write references for potential members as well as serve the chapters as advisors and on house corporation boards. The collegians could have an alumnae rush party to make them aware of what the chapter is planning for rush, and how the alumnae can best help. Or, if a rush party is not possible, a newsletter to the alumnae of the chapter would be appropriate.

NPC has asked that the rush recommendations be completely implemented by 1994. Many college panhellenics have already adopted the recommendations as a whole. Other campuses have implemented some of the recommendations with plans to have them all in place by the 1994 deadline. Whatever the case at your school, we urge you to support the NPC recommendations. It will not only benefit your individual chapter, but will benefit the entire Greek community.





Recommend . . .

Sending personal references for young women who may be going through rush is both a privilege and a responsibility of all Delta Zetas. Both alumnae and collegians may introduce a potential pledge to a college chapter. These potential pledges might be family members, daughters of neighbors, friends or students.

In talking with the potential pledge, tell her of the opportunities for leadership development, academic support, personal growth, philanthropic and service activities and a lifetime of friendship and sisterhood that can be hers through Delta Zeta. The privileges and advantages of membership are endless and the opportunities are limited only by the interest and commitment of the individual.

Won't you fill out a personal reference form now for your special friend who will be rushing in the 1993-94 school year? Send the reference to the collegiate chapter where she will be attending school.

Introduce Your Legacy to ΔZ

A legacy is the granddaughter, daughter, or sister of a Delta Zeta and these women should certainly be given special consideration as rushees.

According to Delta Zeta's policy, all legacies will be invited back to at least one invitational party during formal rush. If, after that, a legacy is not invited back to a party, the chapter must notify the Province Collegiate Director of this decision immediately.

In order for a chapter to give special attention to a legacy, they must know a rushee IS a legacy. Many chapters do not have access to information on rushees, so it is imperative that this information be provided. Please inform the chapter where your legacy will be a rushee so that she does have that special Delta Zeta connection.

Being a legacy does not mean instant membership in Delta Zeta, just as being a legacy does not prevent a rushee from choosing another group to whom she will belong. Encourage all legacies to know that Delta Zeta is special; however, it is important for each legacy to look at all the Greek groups on campus and find the one where she will be happiest.

Chapter Editor Diane Skelton sent a clipping from the University of Southern Mississippi *Journalist*. It features a short profile on Evelyn Gandy, USM-EM. I bet most of you are unaware that

Evelyn served as the first female lieutenant governor in America in her home state of Mississippi. She also served as state treasurer.

A leader for women in politics, Evelyn was quoted as saying: "Women take for granted all the freedom they have today. Until 1920 women couldn't even vote; I am in the first generation of full-time women voters."

She also said that there's a sense of more equality in this generation and our society is finally seeing women get promoted on their qualifications. "I would love to see more women in politics, but it is hard for women to break in at the top, like many men are able to do. Women usually have to start at the bottom and work up."

Susan Hartline Barr, Bowling Green-IT, has been named to the "100 Women to Watch in 1993" list compiled by *Today's Chicago Woman*, a monthly news publication targeted to professional and business women.

Susan, who is Glenbard District 87 Board of Education President, was lauded as "an innovator in both science and education" by TCW, citing her "administration of Argonne National Laboratory's comprehensive user program for the Advanced Photon Source," and her Glenbard board presidency, where "she spearheaded a collaborative process for the development of a plan to carry the district into the 21st century."

Susan has been on the Glenbard board since 1985 and has served as president since 1989. Her leadership is credited with playing a primary role in the continuing success of the four Glenbard high schools which serve some 7,000 students from a 45-square mile area west of Chicago. During her tenure the district developed a computer education program selected as a model by the National Association of

School Boards.

Susan has been a member of the Chicago Farwest alumnae chapter

Remember Marcia Wallace, Parsons-ΔN, who played a psychologist's zany receptionist on the "Bob Newhart Show" back in the 1970s? Well, Marcia has just won her first Emmy as the voice of Bart's teacher, Mrs. Krabappel, of "The Simpsons."

On a Monday night last February, 80-year-old Dorothy Shekey Dosse, Wisconsin-T, received a special thank-you. She received the Outstanding Community Servant Award from the Greater Minneapolis Council Churches. The award, which has only been around three years, is given to people who do volunteer work to help the disadvantaged. It is given to people who are unsung heroes.

Dorothy Dosse is a worthy recipient. She is one who devoted her life to raising three children and doing good deeds. Long ago she was working for equal rights for blacks, Indians, migrant workers and women. Long ago she was working to improve the education of children in the city. She was working with her church, Mayflower Community Congregational Church, in all sorts of actions and causes.

"Always doing good for somebody," said her husband Frank in an article in the *Minneapolis Star Tribune*. "Always. It's just too bad this couldn't have happened 10 years ago when she was still active — when she still could have understood."

Dorothy has Alzheimer's, although the correct title is Alzheimer's or related diseases.

The ravages of her disease became noticeable more than five years ago and it has become steadily worse. Her life, once a

hectic texture of home, church, and community, has become isolated. Now her only regular activity is to attend church each Sunday.

So . . . on that Monday night in February, Dorothy's acceptance speech was short. "I will just say thank you," she said.

Theresa Black King, Baldwin-Wallace-BA '67 sent a brief hello from Mooloolah, Queensland, Australia. She is a rancher, raising beef cattle.

Jayne Moore Herrman, Miami-A, sent an article about her sister, Mary Louise Moore Donaldson, Ph.D., also a member of Alpha chapter. Lou Donaldson has just retired from the faculty of Vanderbilt University's School of Nursing. She had been on the faculty since 1956 and had received many honors through the years.

When she graduated from Vanderbilt in 1954 she received the Founder's Medal. Through the years she was awarded the VUSN Alumni Award for Excellence in Nursing, the S.K. Archer Award for Excellence in Graduate Teaching and the Julia Hereford Award for Greatest Contributions to Student-Faculty Relations. She is listed in *Who's Who in American Nursing*.

And to add to her list of accomplishments, Lou has been historian of the nursing school. She authored a book on the school's history for its 75th anniversary in 1984.

Married to her long-time boyfriend Hale within a week of her graduation, the Donaldsons raised three daughters, Kathleen, Lauren and Maureen.

Lou's husband is also retiring and the two plan to play golf and travel. She hopes she leaves behind a legacy of love at VUSN. "I hope I taught my students something they could always use and build on their own lives. I have loved nursing and I loved Vanderbilt. I hope I passed on those loves to my students."

Another interesting story is about Carole Gandy Pinches, University of Central Oklahoma-EY. What started out as a favor for a friend turned into a three-year labor of love.

The first time Carole became a volunteer at the Bert Nash Community Mental Health Center in Lawrence, Kansas, it was as a tour guide at their Showcase Home. She enjoyed it and asked if there was some other way she might be of service.

"Would she be interested in helping collect information about the center's history?" It seemed innocent enough. She might have to make a trip or two to the University of Kansas' Kansas Collection and a few trips to the Lawrence Public Library.

For the next 18 months she spent a good portion of every week on the research. One lead led to another. The center is the third oldest mental health center in Kansas and played a pivotal role in the creation of county-wide funding for Kansas mental health centers.

With other volunteers, Carole helped write a grant to the Kansas Committee for the Humanities which would have allowed the center to hire a historian to gather and write the center's history. Funding was denied. Carole was so disappointed after all her research that her husband George, who had been impressed with her findings, suggested that they underwrite the project.

Two volunteers, local historians, were given the researched material and actually wrote and edited the book which the Pinches have published.

"One of the things I have learned is that every organization and every agency needs someone to keep track of their records," Carole said in a newspaper article. "Someone had the vision or dream to build the organization and if records aren't kept, the people who are there now won't be around in 10 or 20 years to tell everyone about it."

Roberta (Robi) Crudale Blute, Rhode Island-BA '76 accompanied her newly-elected Congressman husband Peter from Massachusetts to Washington, but found it difficult to stand out in a picture with more than 200 people. As part of the freshman orientation for 110 new members of Congress, the new members and their spouses were in the House for photographs.

There were all those people and there were Robi and Peter in the back row. So Robi grabbed the Speaker's chair and stood on it. Peter was worried that her high heels would puncture the chair but she just stood there smiling. In the freshman class photo Peter, who stands 6'4", and Robi, a little taller than that when she's standing on a chair, are clearly visible atop the pyramid of people!

When Drexel University celebrated its 100th anniversary last year, 100 Drexel alumni were recipients of a special honor. They were chosen by fellow alumni and members of the administration and faculty. They are known as the "Drexel 100."

Well, only 13 of those 100 are women, but four of the women are Delta Zetas! Epsilon Zeta chapter is proud to claim as alumnae Susan Seidleman, Nina Henderson, Carole Stein Hochman, and Barbara Boyle Sullivan.

Nina Henderson, '72 was featured in a Lampwriter column recently. She is president of CPC Specialty Products, CPC International Inc.

Carole Hochman, '66 is the owner of Carole Hochman Designs, Inc. A graduate in applied art from the College of Home Economics, Carole received an Honorary Doctor of Letters in 1986.

Susan Seidelman, '73 who graduated in communications and design, received an honorary Doctor of Fine Arts in 1991. She is a film director.

Barbara Sullivan, '58 received her degree in business administration.

Chances are, she'll be in class or on a date or on spring break. The calls would be simple calls to answer simple questions. Instead of calling, I'll ask these simple questions; they're all questions I had when compiling these reports. A single keystroke would have answered almost every question.

Journalists love the term, "according to a reliable source," but the credibility of source comes into question while reading an **Arkansas** report. Is her name Tacy or Tracy? 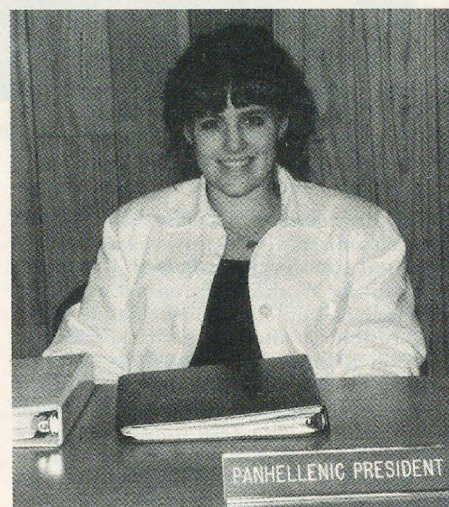

Ashland, Theta Psi — Province V's 50th State Day at Miami began with a parade of chapter flags. Following workshops, col-

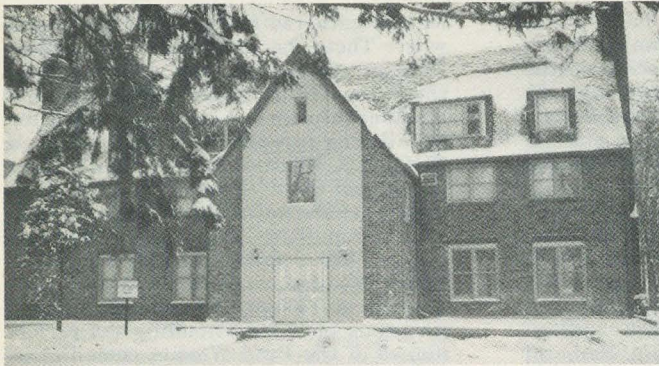

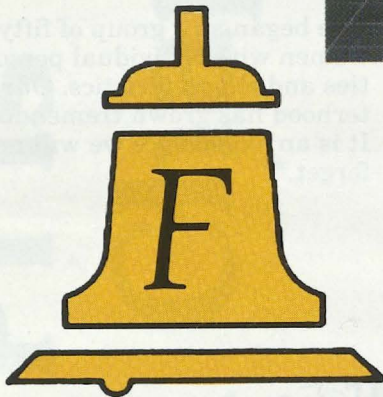


Ruth Towne served as Homecoming '92's Parade Grand Marshal.

or four decades Ruth Warner Towne ('39) has given her time and expertise to Northeast Missouri State University.

Now, the professor emeritus of history and dean emeritus of graduate studies has made a gesture that will continue giving to the campus community for years to come. Dr. Towne recently presented a gift to the University of four bronze bells and a carillon, turning the Pickler Memorial Library clock tower into a true campanile.

"It was kind of an inspiration from on high. It just hit me that that's the thing to do," Dr. Towne said. "I had a trust fund established at the University. And, I thought, 'That's dumb: Why don't you know what's being done with it while you're alive and able to enjoy it yourself?'"

After the completion of the clock tower last spring, Dr. Towne learned it would not have bells right away. She decided to fully fund the bells and to dedicate the gift in memory of her parents, Frank Warner Towne and Mary E.

Towne, whom she credits as the most important teachers she ever had.

"I have commented over and over that I learned more from them than I did in school, and I had mostly very good teachers all the way through. But, I just learned so much from them and so many things," Dr. Towne said. "They're with me all the time."

"I have tried to pattern my life after my parents'. I haven't done it as well as I wished. I feel I never quite lived up to what I ought to be in their terms. But, I'm still work-

ing at it," said Dr. Towne, who still teaches one class each semester and serves as advisor to Delta Zeta sorority.

It was Dr. Towne's parents who instilled a deep appreciation for discipline, organization and order, which her students know well.

"There are students who still think that I put them down. I don't want to discourage them. I wanted to be corrected if I was wrong because I didn't want to be wrong. I wanted to be right. I want them [my students] to have the advantages I had. I try to give it all to

them in bigger doses than they can handle, I suspect. But then, you can see where I am coming from — one is the product of his heritage,” Dr. Towne said.

Frank and Mary Towne were originally from Unionville, Missouri. They moved to Kirksville so that Frank could work in the Journal Printing Company. Both Frank and Mary liked the town immediately, and enjoyed the college and cultural activities. Mary was an avid supporter of Bulldog basketball, rarely missing a home game.

Dr. Towne hopes her gift will draw her university and the town her parents loved closer together.

“The more I think about it, the happier I am with the idea. The bells are going to be a linkage, so to speak, between Kirksville and the campus because for a good part of Kirksville, the bells will be heard as they ring the Westminster Chimes,” she said.

Her decision to fund the bells took her back to the days when she was working on her master’s and doctorate degrees in Columbia, Mo. She fondly remembers knowing when to get up each morning because of the chimes that started at 7 o’clock.

“I’ve always thought that’s what this campus needs,” she said.

She also recalls that at the time of University President Walter Ryle’s death, Blue Key members acquired a bell from the basement of Kirk Memorial and placed it on the building’s portico. As the funeral concluded, the bell tolled the 84 years he had lived.

“I thought this was marvelous. A great mark of respect. This is what we ought to do every time anyone important to the university dies,” Towne said.

The Towne Bells will also provide a signal when special celebrations, like commencement, are taking place on campus. The carillon is electronically programmed to play numerous songs and marches, including the school song.

The response Dr. Towne has received to her gift has been overwhelming. Students have thanked her. Kirksville residents have expressed their excitement. And,

while she served as honorary grand marshal of the 1992 Homecoming parade, spectators yelled to her, “We can’t wait to hear the bells.”

The Towne Bells were dedicated October 16, and the campus and Kirksville residents now hear the chimes at the quarter, half, and three-quarter hour, as well as on each hour.

Dr. Towne is reminded of something one of her mentors, former University of Missouri President Elmer Ellis, would tell her whenever she offered him thanks, “Do it for your students.”

“I think the same thing applies here. It’s part of my philosophy of life,” she said.

“Your immortality is in terms of what you learn from others and what you pass on to others — so there’s a continuing line somewhere. If you don’t have children or grandchildren, you have to do it through others,” Dr. Towne said.

Editor’s Note: Ruth Towne served as College Chapter Director for Delta Sigma chapter for 35 years. She is still the faculty advisor and continues to have a positive effect on the chapter. Although she has had three hip operations, she seldom misses a chapter meeting and attends all faculty advisor meetings.



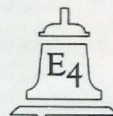
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Each bell is inscribed with the words:

A liberal mind equals an educated person.



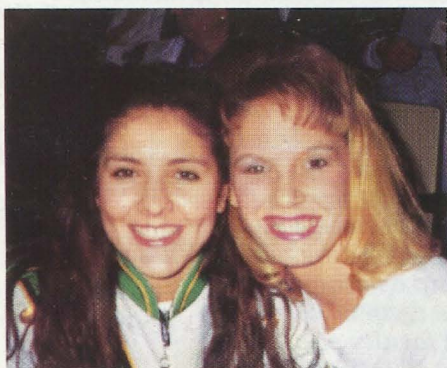
