
Dear Delta Zeta Sisters:

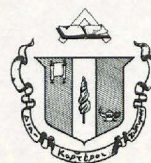

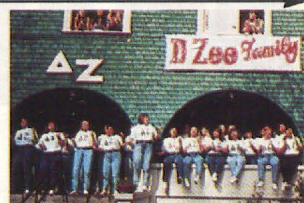

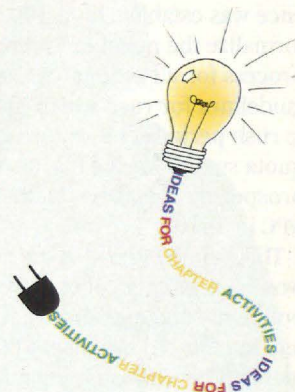

Rush — Yesterday



“Rush” was a well-established part of collegiate life in the later half of the 19th century before Delta Zeta was even founded. Sororities were being formed as a result of the admission of women to colleges and universities. Women’s fraternities offered close, supportive friendships as well as academic and leadership opportunities not readily found in a male-dominated environment. Sororities were small back then and the addition of just a few women each year was the norm.

In those early days, in addition to meeting and talking with the new arrivals, kidnapping likely candidates or hotboxing (where potential rushees were taken to someone’s home or dormitory until they promised to pledge) were also common practices. Meeting the trains as the women arrived on campus was another rushing method utilized by over-anxious sorority women. In response to these haphazard rushing efforts, the National Panhellenic Conference was established in 1902 to help formalize the membership recruitment process for all groups. NPC adopted guidelines for rush which included specific rush periods, a party structure, and a quota system for the fair distribution of prospective members. Delta Zeta joined NPC in 1910.

Through the years, as the number of women attending college increased, the popularity and need for what sororities had to offer did likewise. NPC grew to 26 national/international organizations and the competition between the groups began

to escalate. Elaborate party themes and decorations became the accepted practice. Entertaining skits with fancy costumes, exotic food, and line dances in the front yard of the sorority house all became a part of the tradition we know as rush. From the extravagances in rush through the 1980s to the “back to the basics,” more streamlined approach of today, rush continues to be an important part of the ever-changing collegiate experience.

With the declining college and, thus rush enrollments of the early 1990s, sorority memberships have reflected this decline. Quotas have dropped off dramatically and many campuses have lowered their ceiling or total number as a result. Today many sororities are having difficulty attaining maximum membership numbers.

While a structured fall formal rush continues to be the norm on most Delta Zeta campuses, some traditional schools, like Miami University, have switched to a deferred spring rush. Many campuses have begun to include a “structured” informal rush complete with bid-matching to total in the off-semester in an effort to attract more students through a concerted Panhellenic effort. Statisticians have predicted that college enrollments should increase beginning in 1996-97. Delta Zeta needs to continue to emphasize continuous open bidding techniques during these less productive years.

In an effort to best position ourselves in this competitive market of today, we need to ask — Who are the rushees of the '90s and what are they looking for in Greek life today? A study by UCLA’s Higher Education

Research Institute, “The American Freshmen,” answers these questions for us:

- More and more first-year students are interested in “helping others.”
- Friends and academics are the top two concerns.
- More and more students are coming from single-parent, dysfunctional families or latch-key situations.
- Many are first generation college students.
- Most are interested in getting a good job and making more money.
- They are consumer-oriented, with the majority on scholarships or receiving aid and they are working.
- 85 percent of these students will not graduate in four years.
- By the year 2000, one in four Americans will be African-American, Hispanic or Asian.

While the demographics today may be a bit different, the rushees of the '90s are still looking for the same kinds of benefits from Greek life as they did in those early years. It is, however, necessary to put a greater emphasis on philanthropic work, community service, scholarship opportunities, and the lifetime of networking possibilities. Delta Zeta offers all of this and more!

HOW CAN OUR ALUMNAE HELP?

The importance of alumnae participation and support has never been greater. Alumnae are often the first contact a rushee has with the Greek system. You should talk openly and honestly about your experiences and the benefits of membership in our sorority.

these young women and others around you in your community. Good public relations about the Greek experience can help to enhance the number and quality of women going through rush on our college campuses today. Sending voluntary references to our chapters prior to and during the school year is extremely helpful. Additionally, alumnae assistance during the rush process itself is always welcome and appreciated.

COLLEGIANS - YOU'RE THE KEY!

Enthusiasm and efficient and creative preparation are the ingredients for a successful rush. Know your sisters, your chapter activities, and the heritage provided by Delta Zeta. Practice conversation with an emphasis on chapter

activities, philanthropy, community service, scholastic achievements, and Delta Zeta's networking potential. Get to know the rushees and share with them how they may balance their academics, their work, and their sorority experience. Recognize that our legacies, upperclassmen and culturally diverse women all have something special to offer Delta Zeta. Wear your letters proudly and get involved on campus and in Panhellenic. Be seen in the community doing good

works and remember to publicize your activities. Keep open rushing throughout the year until maximum membership is reached.

With our alumnae and collegians working together 365 days a year to attract bright new members to our sorority, Delta Zeta's "tomorrow" can be assured.

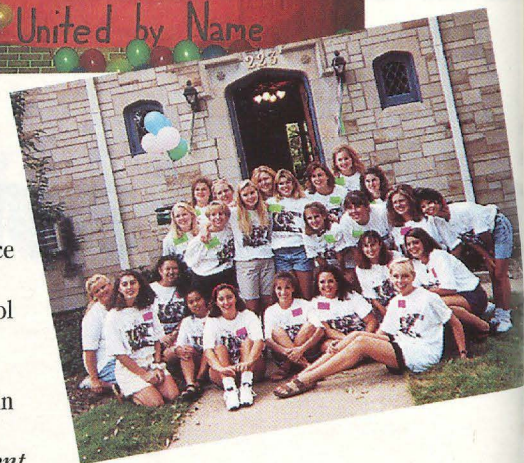
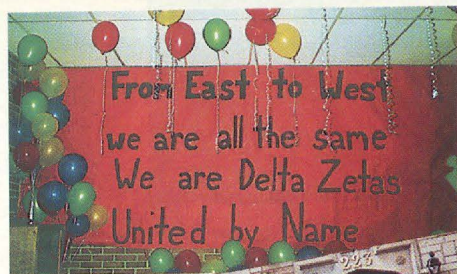

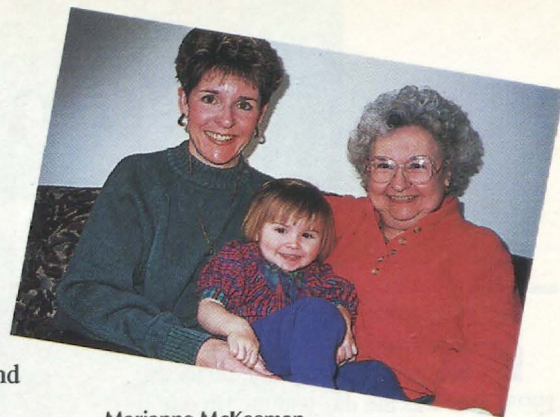
ΔZ Connections ...

Woman of the Year

There were tears and laughter, songs and speeches, and pride in being Delta Zetas on January 29, 1995. This was the day Jeannie Hirsch Blaylock was presented her medallion as Delta Zeta Sorority's 1994 Woman of the Year. The presentation was made by National President Sandra McAllister Nesbitt before 150 collegians and alumnae at the Marina Hotel & Conference Center in Jacksonville, Florida.

Prior to the official presentation, Bobbi de Cordova-Hanks, founder of Bosom Buddies (a support group for survivors of breast cancer), spoke to the audience on the impact Jeannie has had within the community as a result of her Buddy Check 12 program. She was followed by Gretchen Hewitt Trusty, Iowa-'85 (president, Jacksonville alumnae chapter) who compared Jeannie's many successes to the tenets of our creed.

Jeannie was then presented with an official Woman of the Year Medallion by Sandra Nesbitt. Following the presentation, Jeannie addressed the audience, using slides, and showed how, through her faith in God and her love of Delta Zeta, each stage of her life has enriched her and empowered her. She shared slides of her college days with her Delta Zeta sisters at William Jewell College, her trip to Viet Nam filming a documentary on the tunnels of Cu Chi, and finally concluded with slides of her newborn twins, Carson and Katie.

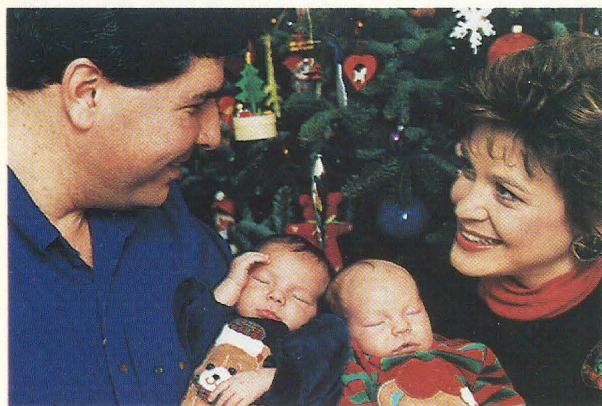


Sandra Nesbitt pins the Woman of the Year medallion on Jeannie Blaylock.

Epsilon Alpha Returns to Western Colorado

When Epsilon Alpha chapter was installed at Western State College in Gunnison, Colorado last October, it marked the realization of a very long term goal. Not only was it exciting for the 41 young women involved, but it was a pleasure for Delta Zeta to see the recolonization after an absence of 24 years. Epsilon Gamma had originally been installed in 1925.

It all began in the spring of 1993 when Ashley Haupt, a transfer student from Delta Xi chapter at the University of Northern Colorado decided to form an interest group of women with the ultimate goal of petitioning Delta Zeta for membership.

Ashley contacted Sandra Sebrell Bailey, then Extension Director, and persuaded Delta Zeta to come to Gunnison, Colorado, to meet the women and the administration of Western State. After meeting the campus officials and the "Delta Xi" interest group, Sandy recommended that the Epsilon Alpha chapter be recolonized. The Council agreed. In April 1993 Chapter Consultant Jennifer Yeagley was sent to begin working with the colony and to prepare them for formal fall rush.

On April 13, 35 women were pledged as the Epsilon Alpha colony by executive officers from the Delta Xi chapter at the University of Northern Colorado and from Rho at the University of Denver.

Fall 1993 brought new challenges for the women of the colony as they returned with

only 20 members. They found themselves further away from their goal of 50 members; however, fall rush proved successful as they pledged 20 new members. While continuing to rush, they participated in a variety of activities including new member retreat, officer elections and training, Homecoming, highway cleanup and other fun and exciting colony events. The fall term concluded with a semi-formal dance.

Colony members worked toward their membership goal during winter and spring terms while working to establish themselves on campus and to improve colony programming. Officers attended a province leadership conference where they had the opportunity to meet other Delta Zeta chapters and to learn more about the sorority. The officers were strongly motivated by this experience and returned to Gunnison ready to tackle the battle of fluctuating numbers. Formal rush brought 22 new members and brought the colony total to 48.

In early October Chapter Consultant Aimee Chadwick arrived in Colorado to be pleasantly surprised by the hard work and dedication of the young colony. After reporting this news to Extension Director Jamie Hammill Pyne, Aimee began organizing for initiation and installation. Past Chapter Consultant Jennifer Yeagley then arrived to work with Aimee and the colony in planning Lamplighting, initiation and installation activities.

Finally the weekend of October 28-29, 1994, arrived. After three days of Lamplighting ceremonies and special sisterhood activities, the initiation service was held on October 28 in the Aspinall-Wilson Conference Center on campus. Officers from Delta Xi at UNC and Rho at Denver University were assisted by National President Sandra McAlister Nesbitt and Province Collegiate Director Heather Brennan Dillon in the initiation ceremony.

The Installation Banquet was held in the WSC Union Ballroom on October 29 with Director of Extension Jamie Pyne as toast-mistress. National President Sandra Nesbitt was installing officer. Chapter Consultants Aimee Chadwick and Jennifer Yeagley assisted throughout the banquet.

The banquet started with a special welcome by College President Dr. Kaye Howe. The invocation was given by Province Alumnae Director Nancy Kishiyama Yokomizo, an alumna of Epsilon Alpha chapter. Assistant Dean of Students and Director of Campus Life Greg Anderson remarked that the college is excited to welcome Delta Zeta back and quoted sound advice to the women from *Life's Little Instruction Book*.

As Epsilon Alpha members were called forward to sign the chapter charter, they were presented with their certificates of membership. Sandra Nesbitt presented the chapter to Western State College Vice President of Public and Student Affairs, Sherryl Peterson, who speculated that this

installation was the beginning of the return of the Greek System at Western.

PCD Heather Dillon welcomed the chapter to the province and presented a gift of ritual paraphernalia. Chapter President Kristin Romoser responded on behalf of the chapter. Other special guests were former PCD Gail Persek Beets and Epsilon Alpha alumna Betty Sweet Eberhard.

The women of Epsilon Alpha are a welcomed asset to the sisterhood of Delta Zeta, bringing quality women and leaders into our circle of friendship.

Second Canadian Chapter Installed at Brock

The Omicron Tau chapter of Delta Zeta was installed on November 26, 1994, in the Sheraton Fallsview Hotel ballroom, across the street from the spectacular Canadian Niagara Falls. This installation was the realization of a year-long dream for the 31 women of Omicron Tau, Delta Zeta's second Canadian chapter.

The dream began in September 1993 when a few women at Brock University wanted to start the first sorority on campus. These visionary women had no fear of the obstacles they would face at a university opposed to Greeks, nor did they fear the intense work ahead of them. On September 28, 1993 the Kappa Alpha Beta local sorority was conceived. The founding women had

only their imaginations for guidance and only their dream for motivation.

The women made their initial contact with Delta Zeta with the help of the newly established colony of Phi Delta Theta Fraternity.

Chapter Consultant Shellie Littrel was in attendance at the fraternity's colonization and made a great impression on the women of Kappa Alpha Beta. Shellie's enthusiasm and friendly manner set the wheels in motion and the warmth and dedication of Extension Director Jamie Hammill Pyne kept them going.

In late April 1994, the women of Kappa Alpha Beta were pledged as Omicron Tau colony. As the colonization was held immediately following Delta Zeta's invitation,

Jamie Pyne flew up from Florida for the formal pledging ceremony. The selfless commitment evidenced by Mrs. Pyne's actions reaffirmed for these young women that Delta Zeta was truly a wonderful organization. Soon after, the women of Omicron Tau left for summer break with a goal of installation in the fall. They kept in touch through their newsletter, *The Omicron Tau Times*, and spent the summer months at executive meetings planning the rush program that would acquire the numbers needed to become a chapter.

Colony members returned to school after the summer eager to begin their first attempt at a formal rush. Greek letters are not understood at Brock and the university neither

recognized nor supported the colony. Needless to say, promoting a foreign concept like an international sorority was quite a challenge!

The task was made considerably lighter by the arrival of Chapter Consultant Spring Kreeger who provided the Delta Zeta experience that the women desperately needed. Spring was impressed by the advanced organization of the young colony and with her help, 20 women were pledging Omicron Tau within one month.

November 26, 1994, is a day the women of Omicron Tau will never forget. Within six months of colonizing, these determined Canadian women were making history at their university as the first Greek organization to be installed. After a month of intense preparation and three days of Lamplighting ceremonies, the women were ready to face the great unknown of initiation.

National President Sandra McAlister Nesbitt and Extension Director Jamie Pyne missed the Thanksgiving Holiday and braved the Canadian winter to attend the installation, but their presence made the day extremely special for Omicron Tau. Their accents proved entertaining and their knowledge of Delta Zeta was invaluable! Other special guests included the initiation teams from the Omicron Mu chapter at Windsor University and Epsilon Theta members from Clarion University in Pennsylvania.

The installation banquet brought a warm greeting from presiding Toast-

mistress Jamie Pyne and introductions from the assisting Chapter Consultants Spring Kreeger and Aimee Chadwick. As keynote speaker, the Rev. Bob Babcock led the 125 guests through an inspiring analysis of the Delta Zeta Creed and the history and symbolism of the rose. Founding President Laura Babcock followed her father with an account of the chapter's humble and often humorous beginning. Further reflections were made by women from each of the three rush periods, Pam MacLeod, Cynthia Zimmer and Jennifer Shipman. Their speeches provided the audience with a real sense of the diversity of the sorority experience.

Presiding as Installing Officer, National President Sandra Nesbitt presented a moving address, filled with words of encouragement and inspiration. Because

there was no participation from the University, the chapter was presented to Mr. Looby, a prominent businessman in the community.

Historical background was performed in the form of dramatic monologues by the six new executive board members and awards were presented. In attendance were members of the Phi Delta Theta colony, including President Jeff Gates who had been named Omicron Tau Man of the Year for his exceptional support. Making the long drive from Toronto to Niagara Falls

to join in the celebration were members of Delta Kappa Epsilon and Delta Upsilon fraternities. A reception followed the banquet and the celebration with family and friends continued with a dance.

The women of Omicron Tau bring with them an excitement and enthusiasm that will surely be an asset to the sisterhood of Delta Zeta. Just as they accomplished their goal of installation in record time, they are eagerly preparing for their next rush and are anxious to help start other Canadian colonies.

The women extend a warm welcome to any of their Delta Zeta sisters who might want to visit their scenic Canadian location and they are grateful for the dozens of letters of congratulations from their new American sisters.

Suncoast Chapter is proud of Golden Rose President

It's not everyone who's been the president of two alumnae chapters — 52 years apart! Charlyn Murray Pittman, DePauw-Delta '35 is the current president of the Suncoast, Florida, chapter. In 1941-43, she was president of the Indianapolis chapter, the youngest president that alumnae chapter had ever had.

Charlyn lived most of her life in her home town of Indianapolis. She became a Delta Zeta because of a family friend, Frances E. Westcott, National President, 1946-48. Frances was elected National Treasurer at the first convention Charlyn attended, in 1941 at French Lick, Indiana. Charlyn, who has attended eight conventions, especially remembers that one: "We all came down with food poisoning and doctors came from all over southern Indiana to minister to us. The illness ran its course in 12 to 15 hours and most of the meetings had to be postponed!"

Charlyn has a long history of service to Delta chapter. From 1943 to 1947 she served as Rush Advisor; and her help was often sought for fall formal rush in later years. The House Corporation Board elected her to office in 1939; she then served as its president for 20 years.

Jean Johnston Richardson wrote in *The LAMP* in 1958: "It was Charlyn who decided that a fitting way to celebrate Delta's fortieth year on the DePauw campus would be to burn the mortgage on the chapter house ... (She) saw it through to a successful conclusion in June of 1949."

"That was my greatest thrill, burning that mortgage," says Charlyn.

And as Board President she was instrumental in the construction of a new, modern chapter house. Ground breaking ceremonies in May 1959 were combined with the 50th anniversary observance of the chapter. The house was completed the following year and was featured in *Architectural Record*.

During its construction she and the builder, Henry Ostrom, a DePauw graduate some thirty years her senior, traveled twice

a week from Indianapolis to DePauw, 50 miles away. When it came time to close on the house Charlyn told Ostrom, "I don't have the money."

"How much do you need?"

"\$50,000."

"Don't worry; go to the closing."

"At the closing he wrote out a check for \$50,000, payable to me, no strings attached. Eventually he got his money back, but how much trust he put in me!"

The house was eventually purchased by the university for a media center, and Delta now occupies the former Sigma Nu house, which is considered the loveliest on the DePauw campus.

Also in 1958 Charlyn took on the job of National Endowment Fund Chairman, which she held until 1961. Evelyn Adams Costello, then National President, wrote Charlyn: "This is a position which we have needed to have filled for some time ... We preferred to leave it unfilled ... rather than to have the wrong person ... We feel that we are very lucky that you are now able to take this on."

These dual functions were a natural for Charlyn; at the time she was head accountant for an Indianapolis investment fund.

In 1960 Charlyn received the Indiana State Day award, "Our Choice—Woman of '60." And in 1989 she received the Province VII (Indiana) Lamplighter award, while serving as treasurer (1986-89) of the Indianapolis alumnae chapter — just prior to her retirement to Bradenton, Florida.

But Charlyn didn't retire from Delta Zeta; she had in fact joined the Suncoast alumnae chapter before her move. She was elected vice president in 1992 and is now president.

Summing up her many years of service Charlyn says: "I was an only child and was very withdrawn. ΔZ forced me to do things I never would have done on my own. As a result I became outgoing. I felt I owed ΔZ a debt that I was paying back by being an active alumna."

Greek Life Now Centers on Community Work

If you think of fraternities and sororities as the wild party places characterized in movies such as *Animal House*, think again.

As Greek Life hits its stride in the mid-90s, the focus is turning toward community service and philanthropy.

"I would say it's not a quick turnover toward service, but there are a lot of organizations on campus who are starting to realize that this is what we're here for," says Jennifer Taglia, president of UConn's 57-member chapter of Delta Zeta Sorority.

Earlier this year, members of the sorority, along with two campus fraternities—Delta Chi and Sigma Phi Epsilon—sponsored a 24-hour seesaw marathon that raised more than \$1,200 for organizations that support the hearing-impaired.

"We had a deejay playing music at the marathon—we've been trying to turn our philanthropy into a social event," Taglia explained. "It was a good time, and all the other groups pitched in to support us and to help."

And while Taglia acknowledges that the social aspects of being in a sorority were part of the attraction for her, she had underlying personal reasons for joining Delta Zeta several years ago: both of Taglia's parents are deaf, and she wanted to join an

organization committed to supporting institutions for the hearing impaired.

"Fraternities and sororities may have had a reputation in the past for just partying, but I don't think it's like that anymore," said Taglia, a junior majoring in accounting. "We are all coming together, and helping each other out with philanthropic events."

The trend toward community service and philanthropy is extending across the nation, and throughout the three major Greek organizations—the National Pan-Hellenic Conference (NPHC), which sponsors four fraternities and four sororities nationwide; the National Panhellenic Conference (NPC), which sponsors 26 sororities; and the National Interfraternity Conference (NIC), which sponsors 64 fraternities.

"There has always been a longstanding involvement in community service, but it was more of an involvement in specific events. A chapter might have one or two projects during the year that they would work on," said Jonathan Brant, executive vice president of the NIC. "What we're seeing today is a much more pervasive involvement in community service."

As an example, Brant cited an "adopt-a-school program" that has caught on nationally, in which Greek organizations

support specific schools in a variety of ways throughout the year.

"We've always felt fraternities provided a focus on scholarship, leadership development and friendship, but now they are striving for those things in a more organized manner," Brant said. "Young men and women are now coming to campus saying they really want to be involved in programs and activities that meet the needs of others, so when they're looking for organizations to join, they ask 'how can we be helpful?'"

Judith E. Preston, coordinator of Greek Life at UConn, agrees. She said that, by the time they enter UConn, between 60 and 70 percent of the 1,100 students (roughly eight percent of the undergraduate population) who join fraternities have already performed volunteer or charitable work through their high schools and communities, and view it as extremely important. It's one of the things they look for when seeking to join a sorority or fraternity.

And many of the events are highly successful. For example, a recent Jail and Bail event to benefit the American Cancer Society, co-sponsored by UConn's NPC sororities and the residential staff at Hilltop, raised more than \$21,000, making it the

second most successful college jail and bail in history, Preston said.

Training sessions for Greek society officers, both at UConn and nationally, reflect a desire to increase community service and services to members, as well as a growing commitment to break down gender and racial barriers.

At the Fifth Annual Greek Leadership Conference at UConn, held last November, seminar titles included "Motivate . . . Activate . . . Involve", "Gender Sensitivity", and "Leadership with a Flare". And, lest one forget that the organizations are also social in nature, the final session was called "Creating the Ultimate Party."

No one disputes that partying and socializing are still a major component in many Greek organizations, but there is no doubt that the partying aspects have been toned down, or at least are kept quiet. At UConn, as at many other colleges and universities, there is a strict "no hazing" policy during pledge times, designed to cut down on the outrageous acts that fraternity wannabees were sometimes required to perform in order to gain entrance to an organization.

"I doubt that men and women going to college are doing any less in the areas of social activities," Brant says, "but one of the things we are seeing is much more stringent following of risk reduction policies during initiations."

"Can I absolutely, unequivocally say there's no hazing on campus?" asked Preston. "No."

But, she said there has certainly been a dramatic reduction in the types of incidents — many spurred on by alcohol abuse — that historically resulted in student injuries or damage to the self-esteem of the pledges.

"It (the idea of hazing) bothers any of us who work with fraternal organizations," she explained, "because it's the exact antithesis of what brotherhood and sisterhood are all about."

Nationally, Brant said, an increasing number of fraternal organizations have adopted "dry rushes" . . . recruitment without use of alcohol.

"They have to, because virtually all of the people seeking membership are underage," he said. Although adopted, in part, to cut down on the fraternities' liability when students were injured during pledges, the dry rushes and other recruitment methods have had unexpected benefits.

"In the past, some fraternities may have relied heavily on alcohol to attract people. Now they have to rely on meeting the common goals of the students and serving others," Brant said.

He predicted philanthropy by Greek societies will continue to increase as the societies become more and more respon-

sive to the needs of an increasingly diverse student body.

"I think we'll see increased community service in the future," Brant said. "And what we like about it is that it does more than meet the needs of others; it meets the needs of the members of the fraternities as well, because it contributes to their self-esteem. There are generally two reasons people join fraternities, and when they come to campus, they typically have two questions on their mind. The number one question is 'Will I make the grade?' The number two concern is 'Will I make friends?' Fraternities really address both of those questions."

Brant said members of Greek societies have higher graduation rates than non-members.

"It makes sense, really, because if you have people on campus you get to know well, you're more likely to stay," he explained. "And you have a support group that can literally hold you more accountable."

He said with most colleges students, the peer influence, whether through a fraternity or not, can "go both ways. It can be very positive, or very negative. The key is to pick a group of friends that you know will be a positive influence on you."

How to Assemble a

Because most chapter and alumnae scrapbooks seem to end up at Delta Zeta Headquarters and the Historical Museum there need to be guidelines as to proper care. Newspaper and photographs will deteriorate in scrapbooks. They do not use paper which is acid free. So, when we receive these at the Museum, the newspaper clippings and photos must be retrieved and refilled. I am asking that you try to help by following this list of hints for

the sake of preservation:

1. Please use RUBBER CEMENT in only the corners. NO GLUE OR TAPE, please.
2. Please date every article, clipping, photo, etc. on *back*. Use label or felt pen. Do not use ball point or pencil.
3. Please do not put articles back to back. Skip the back of each page . . . use only one side of page.
4. Please use *full* names (first, maiden, last).
5. Give chapter and school.

A Follow-up Letter to All Phi Betas

A BIG THANKS to all who have written to the Historical Museum about Phi Beta! I have enjoyed hearing from all of you. I hope you all understand that I am unable to answer each one individually at this time due to the numerous replies.

Remember, too, that Phi Beta only refers to those initiated near where there was a merger chapter, but no Delta Zeta chapter on the same campus. So, the initiation had to take place other than on your original campus, if you are a Phi Beta.

Center for the Study of the College Fraternity

The Center for the Study of the College Fraternity was created in 1979 to encourage and support study and research of high quality and educational significance on the role of the fraternity and sorority in higher education. Based at Indiana University in Bloomington, the center was officially incorporated in 1981 as a not-for-profit, tax exempt corporation in the state of Indiana.

The Center produces publications providing fraternity and higher education leaders with reports of research for their use in implementing programs to benefit Greek organizations. The Center serves as a resource, both for those interested in conducting research involving fraternities and sororities and those who have an interest in the result of that research. As funds are available, the Center provides grants for relevant research projects. The Center also maintains a resource library of research results.

Currently, the Board of Directors for the Center is made up of 20 members, including three university presidents, three university faculty members, several at-large members, and representatives from university-based associations and every interfraternal association. It is the only such organization which collaboratively involves Greek leaders, faculty members, and university administrators in the study of the fraternity movement in North America. Greek associations or organizations designated as having representatives on the Board of Directors for the Center include the American College Personnel Association, Association of Fraternity Advisors,

College Fraternity Editors Association, Fraternity Executives Association, National Association of Student Personnel Administrators, National Association of Women in Education, National Interfraternity Conference, National Interfraternity Foundation, National Panhellenic Conference, National Pan-Hellenic Council, and Professional Fraternity Association.

In addition to its bibliography of research, the Center published *Update*, a research newsletter, and scholarly monographs. Recent monograph publications include "The Undergraduate Experiences of Alumni Who Support Their Alma Mater," "Student Development Applications to Greek Letter Organizations," and "Brotherhood and the Bottle."

The Center recently contacted its members and asked for topics of research interest. These include:

- What is the impact of membership in a Greek organization upon the personal development of individual members?
- What are the factors which are associated with or produce satisfaction with the Greek experience?
- What are the characteristics of individuals that selectively propel them toward Greek life in a particular setting?
- What is known on a given campus about the ways and the degree in which the Greek experience contributes to open mindedness, willingness to change and lifelong growth?
- How does the process of re-enforcement of values and ideals modeling desirable lifestyles and providing satisfying, rewarding individual behavior opportunities operate in various groups on a given campus?
- What is the image of the fraternity and sorority system in general?
- With what goals, values, attitudes and behaviors are new members of Greek organizations being socialized?
- How does membership in Greek organizations affect the freshman year experience?

On-going operational funding comes from membership fees from individuals, national fraternity and sorority organizations, college and university institutional memberships, and IFC and Panhellenic Association memberships. Individual and undergraduate chapter membership is \$25, IFC and Panhellenic membership is \$50, while national organizations may become members with a \$100 donation. Tax-deductible, patron membership is available for \$100 for individuals and \$500 for national organizations.

In 1982, the Center began a longitudinal study on the status of college fraternities and sororities, surveying institutional Greek systems on over 100 items of interest including size of membership, university support services, scholastic achievement, rush systems, and campus policies. The most recent status report provides information from 398 colleges and universities.

The center has offered significant contributions to higher education and Greek leaders for fifteen years. Never has there been a time when the work of the Center has been more important than it is today.

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F rom the Lampwriter

I was reminded of my first editorial position the other day when I met some classmates from my days at Northeastern State. I am rather reluctant to tell you just WHEN that was, but if I say I had to learn to read headlines backwards because the newspaper was hand-set type on a linotype machine, does that give you an idea? No, it wasn't that far back, but ... it was ancient equipment, even then!

I was editor of *The Northeastern*, our weekly campus newspaper, my senior year. I remember my frustrations in publishing the first issue. It seems the college president had given the print shop (and it was a one-man shop on the edge of campus) a rush job which naturally came ahead of the college newspaper. When the first issue finally rolled off the press, the date was mid-October and the headline read, "Homecoming Set for November 2." My first editorial was devoted to congratulating my fellow students on running fair campaigns for student body and class officers. Exciting, huh? Later in the year I wrote a story about "not all girls come to college to catch a man." Did I take flak over that one!

It was a fun year because I spent those college days in a time of prosperity and good will, with no major pressures. Between the newspaper, the yearbook (I was class editor of that), my sorority life and half a dozen other campus activities, my major concern was that because I had two Cs on my four year transcript, maybe I wouldn't win a scholarship bracelet at convention!

It was some years later, after a short working career, marriage, three children and 13 years on the national level of Delta Zeta, that I seriously entered the editorial world again when the Council asked me to assume the editorship of *The LAMP* of Delta Zeta.

These years have been rewarding and, I'll admit, sometimes frustrating as I deal with deadlines, printing problems, rising costs. Remember

what I said about the hand-set type? Well, today we have a world of high technology — faxes, modems, desktop publishing — and the magazine goes faster than a speeding bullet via disk. That, too, is not always without problems. The computer program could (and did) crash!

Some of my best friends are editors or former editors of sorority magazines. I was reminded of this at Christmastime when one card contained the picture shown here. It was taken last summer at the College Fraternity Editors Association annual meeting in Arizona. Besides our interfraternal friendship, the five of us have something else in common. We have each served as Chairman of the National Panhellenic Editors Conference.

The little notes and letters I get from you my readers, make this job fun. For instance, I get many Delta Zeta wedding pictures. It is impossible to run them, but now and again I get such an interesting story with the picture that I need to share.

For instance, the letter I received from Melinda Edmiston Redd, Stephen F. Austin-ZΨ '69. Melinda wrote:

"Enclosed is a photograph taken at the wedding of Patti Walsh Gillis. These women are Delta Zetas from Stephen F. Austin and include a pledge sister, my big sister, the little sister of a pledge sister, my pledge trainer (the bride) and an active. Not pictured are two other Delta Zetas who form the nucleus of a group of about 15 women.

"These women have met for dinner on the third Thursday of each month since 1970-71, when they graduated from SEA. They are school teachers, homemakers with volunteer interests and businesswomen. Two have remained very active, one working with the chapter at Texas A & M and the other with the alumnae chapter in Houston. All are active in their own communities and their churches. Physical activities vary from tennis to marathon running. They are concerned, vital citizens, some having worked in political and school board elections. They are thoughtful, intelligent women.

"All relationships, with time, go through the natural changes of life: marriages, births, divorces, children leaving for college, even some deaths. We joined hearts as young women and now we have begun to face the changes of our own womanhood. Each new stage of life and each change is supported with friendship and love, sometimes tears and, more often than not, laughter.

"When I pledged in the spring of 1969, I learned the Delta Zeta his-

tory and Creed, information about my own chapter and the beginnings of sisterhood. As the time-worn statement goes, 'SEA for four years, Delta Zeta for a lifetime.' Sisterhood looks so different going into it than in the middle of it!

"At dinner I look around the table with admiration ... at their wit, their concerns and most importantly, their integrity. The young women from not so long ago have evolved into strong, wonderful women I truly enjoy. If there could be a 'junior' woman of the year, I would nominate all of them. I am so proud to call them sisters. With the warmest of regards in Delta Zeta, Melinda Edmiston Redd."

It seems that about eight years ago Boyd Christenson was emceeing a radio show called "Viewpoint" and he asked his listeners to call in about things for which they were thankful.

Vivian called. She was thankful for radio shows like that, she said, "especially because I'm blind." Christenson said he was touched by the call. He dedicated a poem to her, taped the show and then took her the tape. He continues to visit occasionally and never misses her birthday.

One of the stories he mentioned in the article was about her days as a Moorhead State University student. She and other women formed a sorority, putting the first

letters of their last names together to name it, which resulted in the un-Greek-like name of Gamma Neche. They figured Gamma Nu was more appropriate. However, in time Gamma Nu became Theta Nu of Delta Zeta. Last Christmas 35 Delta Zetas came to visit Vivian; on her birthday, nine came to wish her a happy birthday. She was thrilled.

Just this past weekend my husband and I were exhibiting at an antique show in Springfield, Missouri. Drifting past our booth was a charming young lady sporting Delta Zeta letters on her jacket. Naturally, I had to inquire. During our conversation she mentioned the beautiful new chapter house on the campus at Southwest Missouri and invited us to at least drive by and admire. And, so we did. Naturally an editor carries a camera so here is a snapshot of the Epsilon Nu house on Elm Street. You can admire, too!

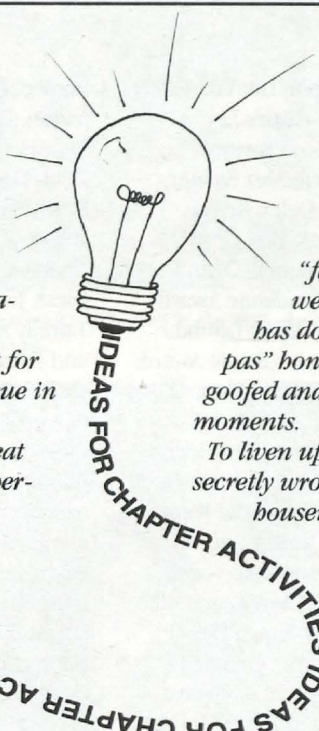
Excellent!

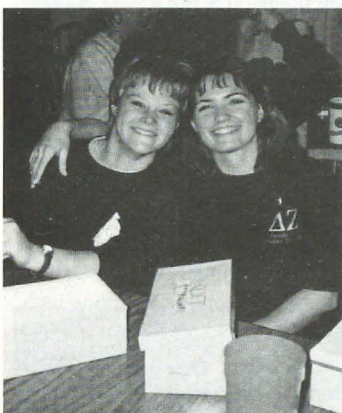

named to *Outstanding Young Women for Kanawhachen*.

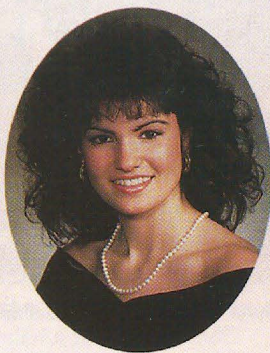

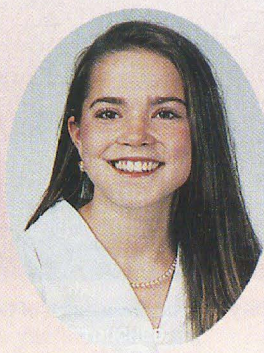

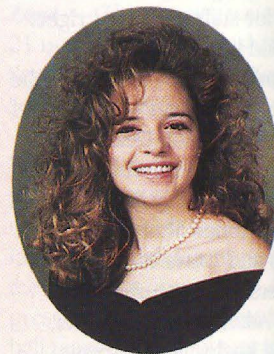
