

Delta Zetas Convene in Phoenix, Arizona for the 44th National Convention

The bright Phoenix sunshine streamed through the atrium of the Delta Zeta Convention registration area at the Squaw Peak Pointe Hilton in the late morning of Friday, July 7. Outside, amidst tall palms and stucco, a pink and green banner proclaimed, "Welcome Delta Zeta!" In twos and threes, Delta Zeta members in colorful summer clothes filtered into the atrium, their heels clicking on the terra cotta tile floor as they claimed registration packets and stopped at the Foundation table to make a donation in a sister's honor at the Rose Tree. Excited voices filled the air, and laughter came from a corner of the room where friends hugged each other in a heartwarming reunion.

The thrill of Delta Zeta's 44th Convention continued to build as visitors and delegates arrived. This year marked the third time Delta Zeta had convened in Arizona. Phoenix was home to our Convention in 1970; then Scottsdale hosted Delta Zeta in 1985. The Convention Committee worked closely with the Phoenix Alumnae Chapter in preparation for the Convention. Their tireless efforts and attention to detail created a Convention experience that no one would forget. Delta Zeta would like to thank the members of the Convention Committee and the Phoenix Alumnae Chapter for their work.

Focus on Our Philantropy

On Friday evening, an elegant opening banquet would begin with a processional of Delta Zeta's National Council and Chairmen. National President Karly Burns welcomed the delegates and visitors to Phoenix at this, our first Convention of the new century.

The evening focused on Delta Zeta's philanthropy for speech and hearing. Heather Whitestone McCallum, Miss America of 1995 and the first woman to be crowned as such with a disability, spoke of her experience as a speech and hearing impaired child, and how that challenge strengthened her as an adult. She also praised Delta Zeta for the Sorority's work for the speech and hearing impaired. "I am so impressed by Delta Zeta's work with the hearing impaired and in bringing awareness to the public about the hearing impaired community," she said. "This work is so important."

In keeping with that tradition, Karly Klemp Burns and Marjorie Klingensmith Lovewell, Delta Zeta Foundation President, presented a check in the amount of \$5,000 to the Phoenix Day School for the Deaf from the Delta Zeta Foundation. The donation was the result of a Convention philanthropic

campaign called "Dream Catcher," based on the Native American legend of the woven web that captures a sleeping person's dreams. The money helps the school purchase audio/video and computer equipment, giving speech and hearing-impaired children and young adults the opportunity to learn.

STATE OF THE SORORITY

A NEW BIENNIUM for Delta Zeta



National President Karly Klemp Burns began her State of the Sorority speech by praising the sisters who have given so unselfishly of their time and talents to Delta Zeta. "As we enter this new millennium and prepare to celebrate our Centennial, we remember the sisters who have gone before us to bring Delta Zeta to this position of strength as a Greek organization," she said. Here, in excerpts from her State of the Sorority speech, Mrs. Burns discusses the future of the Sorority, and what this new biennium means to Delta Zeta.

Recruitment is the lifeblood of Delta Zeta, and the quality of that recruitment effort is paramount.

As we move closer to 2002, our Centennial, optimum membership in all of our chapters is a national priority. With this in mind, National Council has directed that beginning in the coming academic year, all Delta Zetas shall be involved in at least one other campus activity in order to provide a positive and involved image of Delta Zeta on each campus. Leadership within those other groups will be encouraged. The National Program Development Committee has been directed to provide programming for the next biennium which will enhance membership recruitment including image, public relations, self-esteem and other related areas.

Additionally, there will be a National Recruitment School (held in mid to late winter of 2001), which will be a membership/retention focused weekend session and will be attended by Collegiate Vice Presidents of Membership, College Chapter Directors and Regional Collegiate Coordinators.

Delta Zeta is prepared to meet the challenges of recruitment on today's campus.

Recruitment of new members remains the key to the growth of Delta Zeta and the stability of each college chapter. During the last biennium, chapters reaching quota increased, and chapters obtaining the total membership allowed by their campuses also increased.

In this coming biennium there will be an increased emphasis on utilizing our talented College Chapter Directors and our Regional Collegiate Coordinators, the National Recruitment Committee and the Chapter Consultants to provide assistance and support to those chapters in their recruitment efforts.

Communicating with our members is crucial to maintaining membership, connecting our alumnae with Delta Zeta, and publicizing news outside of our organization. It is essential to utilize today's communications technology to keep our members informed and connected.

We are continually evaluating and upgrading our website, located at www.deltazeta.org, to reach high-caliber potential members and to keep our collegiate and alumnae members connected to each other and to the Sorority.

We have recently completed Phase I of our website redesign, and continue with additional phases of redesign for the future. The most recent upgrade, unveiled at Convention, includes "For Sisters Only"—Delta Zeta's private side for members only. Members access this private side using a password of their choosing, and can register their e-mail address in the directory and search to contact sisters. The website is and continues to be one of the crucial components of our overall communications plan. The LAMP is another important component of this plan. We continue to refine and redesign The LAMP to meet our membership's needs and keep them informed.

Communications programs are being designed to increase visibility for Delta Zeta outside of the Greek world, and just as importantly, increase communication between our Sorority and other Greek organizations.

Over the past biennium, Delta Zeta has demonstrated her support for the Greek affairs and student development officials whose work is invaluable to our collegiate chapters around the country. Our donation of \$25,000 to the Association of Fraternity Advisors (AFA) Foundation reaffirmed that commitment. Equally strong is our commitment to the National Panhellenic Conference.

Delta Zeta continues as a large and strong group in the National Panhellenic Conference. Our delegation serves on the College and Alumnae Committees in NPC. Our NPC Delegate, Jamie Pyne,

also serves on several additional committees and as a presenter at regional Panhellenic meetings. Our Past National President, Sandi Nesbitt, who will now serve as the NPC delegate, has also been appointed the NPC Housing Chairman, a major and visible position within NPC. We are also very proud of the women who hold officer positions and represent Delta Zeta well in alumnae and college Panhellenics.

This biennium has seen the establishment of a listserve for the NPC delegates and one for the NPC National Presidents. This communication tool has enabled the delegates and the National Presidents to communicate immediately with one another about any campus problem.

I have personally enjoyed the opportunity to know and work with the other twenty-five National Presidents. We are also pleased to announce that our Foundation President, Marge Lovewell, has been asked to serve on the Investment Committee of the NPC Foundation.

To ensure Delta Zeta's future growth, education is essential. Our training programs help our collegians and alumnae do the best possible job for Delta Zeta.

For the past several years Delta Zeta has had increased emphasis on training for the Official Family. Our National Secretary, Katie Semersheim, has served as our National Trainer and, in concert with the National Training Committee, has made impressive strides in providing quality training. The Norma Minch Andrisek Leadership Conference is held in nonconvention summers. Last summer, at the recommendation of our National Secretary, we held only one conference so that all resources, talent and personnel would be at one conference to allow for optimum success. And what a success it was! We had the highest number of chapters send representatives to the weekend at Purdue University than ever before in the history of the Conference. A resounding 100% of the participants said the conference met or exceeded their expectations.

The National Training Committee, working with the Vice President of College Chapter Operations, shifted their attention to Nicholls State University for the College Chapter Director Conference. Again, the evaluations reflected a positive experience for the attendees. An equally successful leadership session was held for the Area Alumnae Directors and the Area Development Chairmen in Oxford, Ohio.

The Delta Zeta Foundation has had a terrific biennium. The 1999-2000 Loyalty Fund reached an all-time high in the amount of donations received.

The Foundation continues to play a vital role in funding educational components of the Sorority, scholarships for our members, support of speech and hearing, and the National Historical Museum in Oxford, Ohio. It is gratifying and rewarding to see the positive results of our public relations programs, of the increased circulation of The LAMP, and of the superb work of our Area Alumnae Teams in reaching out to reconnect with all of our alumnae. These actions have directly impacted gifts to the Foundation from previous non-donors, which have increased dramatically.

Donations from recent graduates have also increased because of the newly developed undergraduate-only giving program, the 1902 Loyalty Circle. Delta Zeta has been very fortunate to have had a number of extremely generous gifts from several individual alumnae which have been designated for specific program areas. We are looking forward to another successful year, made possible by members and friends of Delta Zeta.

This is an exciting time for Delta Zeta, and the future is most promising.

We are in a new century, and on the brink of our Centennial. The opportunities for Delta Zeta to continue to grow are very exciting. Each of our members play a role in this growth. At the same time, we are highly respected both within and outside the Greek world. Our members are committed to the values of Delta Zeta, and to strengthening our organization as a whole. We have the opportunity to enrich the lives of the women who join our Sorority, and through our educational and leadership programs, lay the groundwork to allow these women to become leaders, not only within Delta Zeta, but in their respective communities as well. Our members are the responsible and caring citizens who make a difference in the world—today and in the tomorrows to come.



REACH (Raising Expectations And Creating Horizons) In The Year 2000

The REACH initiative was instituted at the 1996 Convention to provide for changes within the structure of the Sorority, resulting in new ways to connect with and reach our membership,

During the business meeting, Norma Minch Andrisek, Past National President and Chairman of the Structure Committee, reported on the REACH initiative.

"REACH is a resounding success, for it has become what we hoped—a catalyst for action and a springboard for change," Mrs. Andrisek said.

How has REACH made a difference? "In no area has REACH been more effective than in defining the need for training. The commitment to training as one of its major components has led to the development of an outstanding Delta Zeta program for educating volunteers, chapter officers, alumnae, coordinators and directors. Without exception, training has been exceptionally well received," Mrs. Andrisek continued.

The alumnae emphasis is working. Money is one way to measure success, and the records show that donations to the Delta Zeta Loyalty Fund have continued to increase since 1996. Through the national website and in utilizing updated postal services, we are identifying lost alumnae and making it possible for them to reconnect with the Sorority. Chapter Associations, composed of all initiated members of any given chapter, are a new and exciting way for alumnae to come back to Delta Zeta.

National Council has directed that all college chapters shall elect a member in the position of Alumnae Relations Chairman. Now all of our chapters will have an Alumnae Relations Chairman to serve as a contact for local alumnae and the Chapter Association, to publish a newsletter and to arrange Homecoming and reunion activities.

The decision to send The LAMP to every Delta Zeta has been a major step in implementing REACH and reconnecting with our alumnae. New communications programs are being designed to allow alumnae to connect in new and exciting ways. Mrs. Andrisek concluded her remarks by saying, "REACH needs to be dynamic, not static. Its implementation needs to be continually readjusted to meeting needs. We must allow for some trial and error, and we must be patient. The structure is sound, and it takes a tremendous effort to implement REACH. That effort has been made." REACH is a work in progress, and one in which all Delta Zeta members have an important part.




