The only contact Marlene "Tommy" Thompson Gilpin, Delta Nu, had with Delta Zeta for 25 years after her graduation was with the women in her chapter. That changed when another alumna was searching for women to help the Lambda Theta Chapter at Michigan Technological University. Tommy went to the meeting, accepted the position of CCD and has been serving for 9 years.

She enjoys working with the Lambda Theta Chapter because "it brings home what Delta Zeta is all about and it gives me new friends and sisters of a different era." Tommy's undergraduate Greek experience gave

Bridget Stepnoski Morton, Delta Sigma is another CCD working with her own collegiate chapter at Truman State University for 9 years. After graduation, Bridget kept in contact with the chapter and was approached by the Province Collegiate Director and Faculty Advisor to become the CCD.

Bridget's undergraduate Greek experience gave her the confidence that she could do things on her own and that she could succeed. She feels that Delta Zeta has "made me what I am today" and

Foundation focus

DELTA ZETA'S "State of the Sorority"

The State of the Sorority speech is a report to the Convention delegates on the accomplishments and challenges of the biennium and to make the delegates more fully aware of Delta Zeta in its broader sense. The following is an excerpt from the State of the Sorority address given at the opening business meeting during Convention by Sandra McAlister Nesbitt, National President.

"Change and progress have marked this biennium. Through the adoption of REACH, our new structure at the 1996 Convention, developing PRIDE, LOYALTY and COMMITMENT in every Delta Zeta has been a major focus. Through the leadership of many we are making progress implementing the changes geared to make the Sorority stronger and more in tune with today's women, both collegiate and alumnae.

Significant gains have been made in various areas of the Sorority program and operations to assure Delta Zeta the strongest possible position in the future. The Sorority and the Foundation have partnered their financial and human resources to advance the Sorority's educational and philanthropic purpose, thus creating more opportunities for leadership development and training.

In this last biennium, training programs for the Chapter Consultants, College Chapter Directors, Regional Collegiate Coordinators, Area Alumnae Directors and Area Teams were all funded in part or in whole by the Delta Zeta Foundation. Last summer, over 700 Delta Zeta collegians participated in the Norma Minch Andrisek Leadership Conferences which focused on leadership and values and was partially funded by the Foundation. These skills and insights have added meaning as Delta Zeta collegians prepare for their future.

Providing interpreters during the Leadership Conferences and during National Convention is another way the Foundation keeps the door to learning open for all participants.

The 1998 National Convention attendees experienced the educational and leadership programs the Foundation was able to underwrite because of the generous contributions made by Delta Zeta's individual members, college chapters and alumnae chapters.

Efforts to REACH our alumnae and better communicate with them about sorority programs, current events and alumnae activities encouraged a greater response to the annual Loyalty Fund campaign. The annual drive has shown that our Delta Zeta alumnae do care and, if informed and given an opportunity, they will participate.

The partnership between the Sorority and the Foundation has also flourished in the area of Philanthropy. A commitment to program planning, development and public relations was demonstrated through participation of the collegiate and alumnae philanthropy chairmen who attended the annual Foundation meeting in February, 1998. The National Philanthropy Chairmen, Collegiate Chairman Gail Persak Beets and Alumnae Chairman Linda Bruggemann Seymour have worked to develop the educational arm of the Foundation.


