Meet Dr. Helen Johnston Delta Zeta "Woman of the Year"

"A woman of great generosity and skill . . ."

OR many years Iowa Delta Zetas have known Dr. Helen Johnston's accomplishments at home and in the international scene. All Delta Zetas may now come to know her and take pride in her achievements because Delta Zeta judges from Illinois, Texas, and New York wish you to meet our Delta Zeta "Woman of the Year" for 1957, Dr. Helen Johnston of Des Moines, Iowa.

Iowa Delta Zetas honored Dr. Johnston at a lovely tea in the Gamma Epsilon Chapter house at Drake University. The collegiate Delta Zetas served as hostesses to the friends and sorority sisters of the honoree. In the receiving line with Dr. Johnston were Mrs. Edwin Hodges, President of Des Moines Alumnæ Chapter, Diane Wickhorst, President of Gamma Epsilon, and Mrs. George C. Havens, College Chapter Administrator.

The lovely "Delta Zeta Woman of the Year" medallion was presented to Dr. Johnston by Mrs. Havens.

Dr. Johnston has been a physician in Des Moines since 1920, specializing in Internal Medicine. The preparation for her profession came at a time when women were not readily accepted by their associates in the field of medicine.

Our honoree received her B.S. degree from Drake University in Des Moines in 1913, where she was a member of Mortar Board, and her first two years of medical training were received at the University of Iowa at Iowa City. She completed her work at Cornell University College of Medicine in New York City and interned at Memorial Hospital, Worcester, Massachusetts in 1919-1920.

She became a member of Delta Zeta at Iota Chapter, University of Iowa, and has continued her devotion to her sorority throughout the years. She assisted in the sponsoring of the Des Moines Alumnæ Chapter and Beta Kappa at Iowa State College at Ames and at Delta Zeta State Days. Her interest and support could be depended upon by all of the Iowa chapters, but Iota chapter has enjoyed her visits most frequently in recent years because her niece, Virginia Foss of Columbus Junction, is a senior and treasurer in the chapter. Her sister, Pauline Foss (Mrs. Lewis E.) of Columbus Junction, Iowa, is also a member of Iota chapter.

Because Delta Zeta has been one of Dr. Johnston's first interests, she served as national treas-

urer of our sorority from 1930 through 1936. However, another society of international importance as a women's service organization has shared her abilities. Dr. Johnston was elected to the presidency of Altrusa International in 1928 and again in 1929. She has retained her active role in Altrusa and is known to many people outside of the medical circle because of this interest.

Our Woman of the Year also retains membership in the PEO Sisterhood, Des Moines Professional Women's League, AAUW, Business and Professional Woman's Club, the Des Moines Chamber of Commerce, the Embassy Club, and the Des Moines Women's Club.

The range of Dr. Johnston's interests are amply exemplified by this listing. However, her profession has heaped honors upon her which few women doctors have achieved. Since 1947, she has been listed in "Who's Who in Medicine," "Who's Who in America," and "Who's Who in the Midwest." One of the most important honors came to Dr. Johnston last year when she was named "Iowa Medical Woman of the Year" for 1956.

Dr. Johnston's record of service in her profession reveals the reason for the honors she has

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"And the Flame Grows" At Bradley

ETA ALPHA, Delta Zeta's 121st chapter, made its bow on Bradley University campus when it was installed on May 19, 1957. The fifth national sorority at the "Hilltop" university in Peoria, Illinois, it joins the Panhellenic group which includes Chi Omega, Gamma Phi Beta, Pi Beta Phi and Sigma Kappa sororities.

Bradley, founded in 1897, is a fully accredited university. Enrollment figures include over 4,500 students with 200 staff members, of which more than a third have earned Doctor's degrees; more than a third of the remainder have earned at least one master's degree. The faculty is headed by the youthful and energetic Dr. Harold P. Rodes, who became president of Bradley University in 1954.

Dr. Rodes, speaking for the University said, "We are certainly proud to add Delta Zeta to the national sororities already on the Bradley campus. We feel this new chapter will play an

important part in the social and educational life of the University."

Bradley offers more than 50 major fields from which to select a course for a degree. Since World War II the campus has expanded with the addition of new buildings to form a modern quadrangle, and construction is ever increasing. Although Bradley is non-sectarian, the school provides at least 25 courses in religion and has 16 religious organizations to provide discussion and entertainment for the various religious groups. Extracurricular activities are many and varied: special interest clubs, departmental groups, honorary organizations, speech and debate, school paper, yearbook, plays, music, concert and marching bands, chorale, radio singers and chorus.

Through the zealous efforts of four Peoria alumnæ, comprising the advisory board, whose motto was "And the Flame Grows," Zeta Alpha chapter was pledged, trained and installed within five short months. received. Besides her devotion to the local patients to whom she administers, she has served as national president of the American Medical Women's Association in 1946-47. In 1934 she was a delegate to the Medical Women's International Association in Stockholm, Sweden, and in 1947 and in 1952 councilor for the same organization to meetings held in Amsterdam and in Vichy, France. She holds memberships in the Polk County Medical Society, Iowa State Medical Society, American Medical Association, American Geriatrics Society, and American Medical Women's Association.

The esteem in which Dr. Johnston is held was

exemplified in 1954 when she was chosen by Charles E. Wilson, then Secretary of Defense, to serve on the Defense Advisory Committee on Women in Services for a four-year term. This important committee of 50 outstanding women of the country meets at the Pentagon twice each year.

Friends marvel at her stamina when so many demands are made on her time by patients and activities. Perhaps her diversified activities and hobbies may account for this, as she is an avid fisherwoman plying her luck in recent years in the Gulf of Mexico, Pacific, Canadian and Minne-

Through her work in the journalistic field, evidenced in her year book sponsorship and her editorship of the LAMP, she was elected to an associate membership in Theta Sigma Phi in 1954. This was an honor earned through her work in this field after college graduation, since her undergraduate work was not in this area.

Many Delta Zetas have met Ellen at convention and she was the very capable editor of the 1954 and 1956 editions of the convention *Lampkin*.

What many Delta Zetas have not met is Ellen's

Joyce Ewald, Lynn LaFrombois Win "New" Scholarships

N A DSE tradition which Delta Zeta is proud to continue, Joyce Ewald of Cincinnati-Xi chapter has been awarded the Dean Harvey C Minnich Scholarship and Lynn La-Frombois of Wisconsin State-Epsilon Kappa is the 1957 winner of the Delta Sigma Epsilon Founders Scholarship.

Both awards are made annually to outstanding undergraduates. The Founders Award is named in honor of the seven DSE founders at Miami, and the Dean Harvey C Minnich award honors the man who helped them establish the sorority.

Lynn has maintained an impressive scholarship record ever since she graduated in the top four per cent of her Green Bay, Wisconsin, high school class and placed among the top five per cent in the state-wide scholastic aptitude tests given to some 30,000 high school seniors. A junior in business education, she has a 2.49 average (A = 3) and ranks at the top of her class.

Although working her way through college with jobs in the school cafeteria and dean of men's office, Lynn has still found time to serve her chapter as treasurer. She has also been active as vice

She has elected a broad and diversified program in addition to her field of concentration. . . . She is personally endowed with energy and enthusiasm."

Joyce is also helping her own way through school with summer jobs and work in the library, and has served Xi chapter as Panhellenic representative and philanthropic chairman. On campus she is president of the Classics Club and a member of Kappa Delta Pi education honorary.

Hoosier Jalene Joyce Felt at Home in Tokyo

A trip to the Orient was a never-to-be-forgotten thrill for Jalene Joyce, a senior at Ball State-Gamma Chi, who was one of ten western-swing entertainers chosen for a U.S.O. tour of the Far East last summer. Jalene plays the accordion and has been entertaining since junior high with her sisters, Janet, 20, who plays the steel guitar, and Joetta, 18, who plays the Spanish guitar. Their TV appearances on "Uncle Bob Hardy's Hayloft Frolic" in Bloomington, Indiana, led to Jalene's being asked to join the Bob Hardy band for the tour.

After six months of planning and rehearsals, the group headed for the East via the West, stopping off at Hawaii and at Wake Island where Jalene saw the ruins of a Japanese World War II battleship still marooned in the harbor. Their first "show" was a special request performance for the servicemen on the plane while at an altitude of 20,000 feet.

In Tokyo Jalene found the people friendly and quite willing to extend their warm hospi-

tality to American strangers.

"The Orient is altogether different from Indiana, and yet I felt at home," says Jalene. "The Japanese are hard-working people and try to put all available soil to good use."

The first thing Jalene saw as they landed in Kimpo, Korea, was a war-ravaged building

which still stands—partly as a reminder and partly because there are mine traps in it. The people of Korea live in mud, thatch and tin shacks, and oxen are used as they were thousands of years ago.

"Most of the houses weren't even as good as the shelter my father gives his livestock," said Jalene, who lives on a farm near Camden, Indiana. "I actually had the feeling that I had been put in a world some centuries earlier."

The group usually played two shows a day in Korea and sometimes traveled six hours a day. They entertained for the Army, Marines and Air Force in both Japan and Korea, and Jalene says she never had the satisfaction of really being of service as she did at those shows.

"Our servicemen are lonely and feel forgotten sometimes, and they genuinely appreciate some 'stateside music.' They thanked us over and over and told us we didn't realize how much it meant to them. Up on the front lines, I finally found out just how much it did mean. Those men are almost isolated from the rest of the world and felt that we were a heavenly gift!"




