# Distinguish ROBERTS

Warm, witty, intelligent, personable—these are a few of the many glowing adjectives one could use to describe Dr. Eunice Carmichael Roberts, the Delta Zeta "Woman of the Year" for 1958. Distinguished, attractive, fun-loving -the list could go on and on, but restrictions of time and

space are ever present and must be observed.

Dr. Roberts, first woman academic dean in the 137year history of the University of Indiana, was honored in October at the Founders' Day celebration of the Indianapolis alumnæ chapter, the group to submit her name for the award. At that time the traditional silver medallion was presented to Dr. Roberts on behalf of Delta Zeta. This medallion was designed and made by Eleanor Hansen Nichols, Wisconsin-Tau, of Wilmington, Delaware, es-

pecially for this national award.

A native of Alabama and the daughter of a Presbyterian minister who entered the field of education, Dr. Roberts received her Bachelor of Arts, Master of Arts, and Doctor of Philosophy degrees from the University of Illinois. She taught for a short time at Illinois College in Jacksonville and at the University of Illinois. For seven years, she served Eastern New Mexico University in Portales as dean of student personnel, director of summer school, and head of the modern language department. From 1948 to 1952, she was dean of Lindenwood College in St. Charles, Missouri-the first woman dean of that institution.

In 1952, she came to Indiana University to take the newly-created position of dean of the faculties and director of the women's educational program. Her task has been to establish new and better opportunities for women at Indiana University and through research and study assure them fuller preparation for life. She is internationally known for her work in the field of professional activities

Widowed in 1937 while her children were still young, Dr. Roberts continued her education and career. Today she is very proud of her five grandchildren. Her son, John Keith, married Elene La Liberte (Alpha Beta Chapter) and they have four children, ranging in age from one to eight years. They live in Columbus, Indiana, where Jack is director of the training for Cummins Diesel Engine Company. Daughter Roberta (also Alpha Beta) lives with her husband, Edward J. Harrison, and small daughter in Falls Church, Virginia. She and Mary Jeanne Smith Eberhardt were the first Alpha Beta Chapter legacies (Eunice was a charter member of the chapter). Roberta became ill during rush and was in the hospital where, by special permission of the dean of women's office, Grace Mason Lundy pinned the ribbons on her hospital coat. It's a real DZ family!

Honorary organizations to which Dr. Roberts belongs include Phi Beta Kappa, Mortar Board, Pi Delta Phi (French), Sigma Delta Pi (Spanish), Phi Kappa Epsilon (international scholastic), Alpha Psi Omega (dramatic), Alpha Lambda Delta (honorary member), and Delta Kappa Gamma (distinguished women educators).

Her most important extra-curricular work is the American Association of University Women. She is now chairman of the Committee on Higher Education and thus a

HEN Delta Zetas at the last biennial Convention knew that their much-loved president of the past four years, Evelyn Adams Costello, would not continue in her office, the quest for the ideal leader of this great and growing organization became a matter of first Convention consideration and interest. The answer was found, with a remarkable degree of unanimity and with a general feeling of happiness and great satisfaction. It resulted in the election of Helen Woodruff Nolop to the highest office and the greatest honor that Delta Zeta can give. There was no truer solemnity nor deeper sincerity during the whole Convention than that during which Delta Zetas pledged their greatest efforts and devoted loyalty to Helen's leadership.

Delta Zetas know Helen in many different capacities. There are many members of Gamma Chapter who remember her as one of their charter group, who gave unstintingly of her effort, ability and devotion to the building of this new chapter—the third on the now lengthy roll of Delta Zeta. Through the many years that have followed, her loyalty to her own chapter and her efforts in its behalf have never diminished. She was the first editor of the *Gammaphone*, the second oldest newsletter in Delta Zeta, and has served for many, many years on the house corporation board of Gamma Chapter, as well as in many different capacities in the Twin Cities Alumnæ Chapter.

Needless to say, Helen's ability and her great service to her own college and alumnæ chapters resulted in her increased activity for Delta Zeta as province director and finally in her election to the National Council in 1946 as National Treasurer. She gave skilled guidance and unstinting time

and effort to the direction of the financial affairs of the sorority during the six years that followed. In 1952 she resigned—for a short time previous to our Golden Jubilee Convention Helen had been married to Raymond J. Nolop of Dawson, Minnesota, and she quite understandably wanted time and relaxation for the enjoyment of her very

happy marriage.

Resignation from the National Council and its heavy responsibilities did not change in the least Helen's longtime habit of service to Delta Zeta. She undertook the highly important task of organization of the newly-formed Judiciary Committee. Much of the effectiveness of this committee, which removed such a great burden from the National President and Council, is due to Helen's organizational ability and rich background of Delta Zeta knowledge and experience. During the four years that she carried this responsibility, Ray, too, became Delta Zeta-minded to the extent that he was happy to see Helen return to her former office of National Treasurer at the 1956 Convention at Miami Beach.

In spite of all that she has given to Delta Zeta during these years, the sorority has shared Helen with her community. For twenty-five years she taught in the Minneapolis Business College and was principal of its Accounting Department. One has only to visit a short time in Minneapolis to know how greatly respected and loved she is. She is well known to hundreds of businessmen and women, now in responsible positions, who re-

ceived their training under her.

By those who attended the Mackinaw Convention in 1950, Helen will always be remembered for her inspirational report as National Treasurer (and it isn't easy to make a financial report inspirational!), when she assured the delegates that "Delta Zeta is becoming solider and solider!" She spoke more wisely than even she knew at that time.

More important than all of these contributions and accomplishments, however, is the fact that Helen Nolop is a true friend and counselor to the thousands of Delta Zetas throughout the country. No problem has been too small for her attention; no financial tangle has been too time-consuming or difficult for her to handle; no personal difficulty on the part of any member has received from her anything but the most complete sympathy and understanding. She has become a symbol of fairness, justice and devotion to the highest ideals of her sorority.

And so, Helen, Delta Zetas everywhere welcome you not only as a leader but as a friend. As a result, you, as National President and First Lady of Delta Zeta, may count without fail upon Delta Zetas as devoted followers and true friends. In the measure that you have given, you will receive. Under your guidance Delta Zeta will continue to march forward over new highways of growth and accomplishment, toward a consistently fuller realization of its aims, objectives and

ideals.

# Launched in Jexas' "Panhandle Empire"

ETA ZETA, Delta Zeta's 124th chapter (and Texas' 6th) made its debut November 1, 1958 at West Texas State College, Canyon. Four local groups became nationals as Delta Zeta Chi was installed Delta Zeta, and other local groups were installed by Chi Omega, Alpha Delta Pi and Zeta Tau Alpha. Zeta Zeta's local had been established in 1936, the second such organization on the West Texas State campus.

Initiation services were conducted by Alpha Psi's initiating team (from Southern Methodist University) at the First National Bank in Amarillo Saturday, November 1. At a formal banquet at the Amarillo Club that evening the sorority was presented to the college administration, with Mrs. T. J. Bianchi, National Director of Membership, representing National Council.

Alpha Psi's Pat Sage sang the Delta Zeta grace song preceding the banquet. Mrs. M. J. McKee of Dallas was toastmistress. Mrs. Howard Tuggey, Province Director, extended greetings from Delta Zetas everywhere and presented gifts to the new chapter. Welcomes were extended by Mrs. Kenneth Sloan, president of the Amarillo Alumnæ Association; Mrs. Kennis Gilbert, president of the

Lubbock Alumnæ Association; and Ann Hutchinson, president of Alpha Psi Chapter. A silver tea service, a gift from National Council, was presented by Mrs. Bianchi who also officially installed the chapter which was accepted by Miss Ruth Cross, dean of women at the college.

The college president, Dr. James P. Cornette, who is known for his enthusiastic championing of "The Panhandle Empire," chose that topic for his address, highlight of the banquet.

"In our study of national sororities as we were considering the nationalization program we learned a great deal. We were especially impressed with the growth, standards, goals and national organization of Delta Zeta," he said.

Dr. Cornette pointed out a parallel in the growth of Delta Zeta and the Panhandle, saying that at the time of Delta Zeta's founding, Amarillo and Canyon were cow pastures and grazing lands with a series of gates between the two cities (then mere turns in the road). Since 1902 both the sorority and the area have progressed until both stand high in their fields. The Panhandle population averages 13.7 years of schooling which places it very near the top nationally;

Delta Zeta's growth places this sorority also in

top ranking, he noted.

The banquet program closed with the traditional Delta Zeta rose ceremony during which Donnis Plunk, Zeta Zeta song leader, sang "Roses I Give to Thee." She was accompanied on the violin by Mrs. Royal Brandtley, Alpha Tau, pledge advisor to the new chapter.

Decorations of old rose and Vieux green were carried out in rose garlands and cut-outs of Delta

Zeta letters.

Mrs. Kenneth Sloan served as installation chairman: Mrs. J. N. Riggs handled banquet arrangements; Mrs. D. A. Ritter chairmanned floral arrangements and Mrs. J. D. Vick had charge of

housing.

On Sunday morning a model meeting, conducted by the Alpha Psi initiating team, and workshops on pledge training, rush, and scholarship were conducted by Vera Tuggey, assisted by Mrs. Bianchi and Mrs. McKee. The new initiates then attended church together. A formal tea was given on the campus in Randall Hall's red brick lounge. Alternating at the guest book were Mrs. W. R. Wilson and Mrs. J. O. Parker. Hostesses at the tea table were Mmes. C. C. Callerman, Robert Jarrett, Donald Briggs, and L. F. Sheffey, founding sponsor of the local group. Mrs. Will F. Graham was chairman of the tea, with Amarillo alumnæ assisting.

West Texas State College was established in Canyon in 1910 by an enactment of the Texas Legislature, Four bachelor's degrees and three master's degrees, with majors in 25 baccalaureate fields and in eight advanced fields, are offered. Earned doctor's degrees are held by more than 20 per cent of the faculty. The enrollment is ap-

proximately 2,000 students.

Delta Zeta Chi, local social group, was founded in 1936 for the purpose of "promoting fellowship, scholarship, and creating closer bonds of friendship among young women on campus." Within four years after founding the group began a regular program of providing books to the school library. To encourage personality development this group sponsored the campus' first women's forum. Just last Spring (1958) the girls inaugurated a campus Sing-Song and donated a traveling trophy. They help support foreign orphans and spread cheer among hospital patients in the area. Highlight of activities was culminated when Delta Zeta Chi presented \$964 to the "J. A. Hill Memorial Chapel Chimes" fund. The chapter is very activity-minded and enjoys singular success in all phases of campus projects.

Those who visited the West Texas campus were visibly impressed by the attractiveness and poise of the new initiates and by the great personal warmth of the college administration and townspeople. We find Dr. Cornette's "Panhandle Empire" a place of greatness, humbleness, and friendliness.

### Zeta Eta-Seven for Oklahoma

RYAN COUNTY, located in the southeastern part of Oklahoma, is primarily a lumbering, farming and ranching area, with two outstanding landmarks within its bounds. One of these is Lake Texoma, largest man-made lake in the world, which extends a portion of its area into the county.

Other major landmark is beautiful Southeastern State College, located on a 58-acre campus adjoining Durant, the county seat. Southeastern State College is especially lovely when magnolias are in bloom. The campus literally has row on row of these beautiful trees, whose blossoms present a lovely picture while permeating the air with their perfume.

Currently boasting some 1,700 students, Southeastern State College was opened for student enrollment on June 1, 1909 as a state normal school. In November, 1958—almost 50 years later—it welcomed Zeta Eta chapter of Delta Zeta onto its

campus.

In the closing weeks of the spring semester, 1958, the Delta Club was organized on the Southeastern State campus as a colony of Delta Zeta. Formation of the Delta Club came about through the interest of DZ alumnæ in Durant and Mrs. Ruby Cavenah,  $\Delta$  O, who has since moved to Arizona, and members of the local Tau Kappa Epsilon chapter.

All members of the Delta Club had an individual over-all scholarship average of above 2.5, and most of them had a 3.00 grade average (4.00 equals A). Many members of the group were outstanding debate team members and had received national recognition for their abilities. All were very active members of their churches and of honorary organizations on campus, and were in-

terested in belonging to a Greek group which encouraged scholarship along with campus activities and high personal living standards.

These were the girls who became charter members of Zeta Eta chapter—Delta Zeta's 125th chapter and its seventh chapter in the state of Oklahoma.

The two-day installation of Zeta Eta chapter began Saturday, November 8, with initiation services at 10 A.M. in Durant's First Christian church. Installation banquet was at 7 P.M. that same day in Southeastern College's student union. This was followed by a presentation tea on Sunday afternoon from 2 to 3:30 in the student union, at which members of all campus organizations were special guests.

Mrs. R. J. Nolop, Delta Zeta's National President presided over the installation ceremony at the banquet. Keynote speaker was Dr. A. E. Shearer, president of Southeastern State College. He talked on "Individual Responsibilities in a

Dynamic World."

Mrs. Nolop presented the chapter with its charter and its official gift from National Council, a silver tea service. Mrs. John R. Owens, dean of women at Southeastern State College, accepted

the chapter on behalf of the college.

Banquet guests from the college included Mrs. Shearer, Dr. and Mrs. J. T. Krattiger, Dr. and Mrs. J. D. Morrison, Mr. and Mrs. Sam O. Pool. Mrs. Mary Jane Gallaway was banquet toastmistress. All the Delta Zeta chapters of the state and representatives of state alumnæ extended a welcome to the new chapter to the Oklahoma Delta Zeta Friendship circle, with a candlelight-

N ENCYCLOPEDIA of Italian cookery and folklore" is the very apt description Wilma Reiva LaSasso has given of her book, "The All-Italian Cookbook," recently published by the Macmillan Company. It is that and more -For the language enthusiast, Italian terms are used throughout, always with pronunciation guide and English equivalents, and there is a double index, one in Italian and one in English. For the cook who enjoys experimenting, the recipes range from the very well known pizza and spaghetti dishes to detailed instructions for making cheese and sausage, as well as the many varieties of "pasta" (noodle dough). For the gourmet who intends to travel in Italy (and for the armchair traveler), this book is a "must," for it includes a map outlining the regions of Italy, and each recipe is identified as to the region of which it is characteristic.

Mrs. LaSasso is a native of Colorado, having been born in Central City, where her father was a gold miner. When she was five years old, the family moved to Denver where she now lives with her husband, Lawrence, and two children, Jim, 16 and Jacqueline, 14. She is a graduate of Colorado State College where she was a member (and president for two years) of Delta Sigma Epsilon sorority, which has since become Delta Epsilon Chapter of Delta Zeta. After graduation she taught physical education in the Greeley, Colorado, schools for five years. More recently, Mrs. LaSasso has been active in P-TA work, Red Cross, Community Chest and church work, and in the Denver Alumnæ Chapter of Delta Zeta. In

1957 she was Denver Chapter's nominee for  $\Delta$  Z Woman of the Year.

Mrs. LaSasso's interest in Italian cooking goes back to her childhood, when she learned about many Italian dishes from her mother, who was an excellent cook. She became even more interested when she discovered that other Italian women cooked differently from her mother, and she has spent a number of years contacting immigrants and exchange students from the various regions of Italy to get recipes which had come down through many generations and would have disappeared if Mrs. LaSasso had not per-suaded these wonderful cooks to divulge the secrets of their art. Many of the recipes had to be translated into terms and measurements which would be familiar to American cooks. This has been accomplished to the degree that there is no item in the recipes which cannot be purchased in any grocery store. The LaSasso family has enjoyed the results of this research, for Mrs. La-Sasso has prepared each recipe at least once, and some have become family favorites.

The book is dedicated to the memory of Mrs. LaSasso's father, Dominic P. Reiva, a native of Piemonte (Piedmont), Italy. Three months before his death, after many years of sampling his daughter's efforts, he said "Busybody! Someday you make a cookbook for Italy!" And so she has—a very remarkable one!

## A Little Lamp Glows a Long, Long Way

(Hazel Glesenkamp toured South America in 1951 with the Comparative Education Society. Asked to give the Founders' Day address that fall at Kent State, she hit upon the idea of looking up the Delta Zetas along her route and found that "Delta Zeta" is spelled "Friendship" wherever you may go:)

O SOONER had we started than one of our 43 touring Society members touched my badge and said, "I wear one of those, but I do not have it with me. I'm from Indiana University."

This was Lois Crayton (Mrs. Sherman Crayton), now of Buffalo, New York, who was very much interested in my letters to DZs in South America. The first reply was in Santiago, a lovely letter from Angeline Scources of the State Department, a charter member at Kent State. She had gone on to the U. S. Embassy in Tokyo, so we missed her.

Upon our arrival at our hotel in Lima, Peru, I was greeted with a great armful of beautiful yellow rosebuds and a card reading, "Colegio Gertrude Hanks." Certain it was a mistake, I examined the other side of the card and found the bouquet was from Carmen de Urtega, a Delta Zeta of Theta Chapter in Lima, Peru!

She called the next morning and later we went to the private school of which she is owner and principal. I learned she and a group of seniors, who brought the roses, had come to the airport to meet me the day before, but we had taken a later plane. Wouldn't we have shone? Reporters and cameras met our group at every stop!

Carmen de Urtego, neé Carmen Casro-Pozo, is a graduate of San Marcos University, the oldest college in either of the Americas. Winning a scholarship from the Institute of International Education (with the help of Gertrude Hanks, then the beloved principal of Lima High School), she studied at Smith College. With another scholarship from the Federation of Women's Clubs in Ohio, she transferred to Ohio State University, receiving her M.A. in 1944.

"I had to spend all my week ends speaking before women's clubs all over Ohio," laughed Carmen, "but it was worth it."

Colegio Gertrude Hanks opened in March of 1952. Today, after moving for the third time to larger quarters, it is housed in the old Chinese Embassy, and has 258 pupils and 26 teachers.

Carmen's father, Senor Hildebrando Castro-





The following tribute to a former National Council officer so beautifully expresses what every Delta Zeta has felt at the loss of a beloved sister that the Lamp presents it in loving memory of each cherished member whose devotion has nourished the continuing, living flame of Delta Zeta:

#### A Tribute to Helen Myer Craig, Former National Secretary and Vice-president

by Dorothy Porter Miller, delivered at Founders' Day Observance, October 20, 1958, Mu Chapter House

In August of 1915, at the installation of Mu Chapter of Delta Zeta, one of the very first to be initiated into Delta Zeta was a young girl, Helen Tonner Myer. With her initiation, a flame was lighted that has never faltered during the past forty-three years. This light is now part of the "Flame Eternal"; those of us left are the better for our contact with this sister in Delta Zeta, our own Helen Myer Craig.

Helen's life, outside of her beloved family, was dedicated to her great love of Delta Zeta and all that it stands for. She was a stalwart friend, helped everyone who needed her in Delta Zeta, at Mu and elsewhere. She sacrificed her time and strength to share the beauty and love she felt in the bonds of sisterhood. Both Gamma Lambda and our own Mu have been uppermost in her heart and mind.

To her, Delta Zeta was the greatest power for advancement in the experiences of life, love and friendship. She realized that ultimate perfection is never reached. Her dream of a greater Delta Zeta was shown in her handling of the mergers with other sororities, especially in her work with Helen Cunningham, national president of Phi Omega Pi.

I only hope that we who come after, can impart some of this great love and service for our sorority to the future Delta Zeta sisters. If so, Helen's flame will never be extinguished.

Helen had been the president of Enewah, the petitioning local, at the time of chartering and she went on to share her great abilities in finance and organization with Mu Chapter and later with National. It was a great disappointment that because of ill health she could not remain on National Council, having served as National Secretary, National First Vice-president, and chairman of the National Building Committee. The following telegram from Irene Boughton, Executive Secretary of Delta Zeta, expresses the feelings of our national officers:

"Delta Zetas who knew Helen Myer Craig are deeply saddened. No tribute could be too eloquent to express appreciation for her loyalty and the giving of herself in years of service to Delta Zeta. No task was too small and her devotion to our sorority was demonstrated in endless ways. The memory of Helen is enshrined with love forever in our hearts."

(CANDLE LIGHTED) Let us keep this flame ever eternal and carry out our dear Helen's wish for an even greater Delta Zeta.


