Financial Tips

Six (Plus One)

One

Start Contributing to Your 401(k) ASAP.

Starting your 401(k) is essential for long-term success, and if your job offers one, it's important to start taking advantage of it immediately! First, ask your human resources department if your job offers a 401(k) plan, then enroll and select a contribution percentage. You should aim for at least enough to get the full company match (often 3-6%). You can choose a target date retirement fund if you're unsure what to invest in. Thanks to compound interest, even small contributions can grow over time!

Two

Create a Monthly Budget You'll Actually Follow.

An important habit you can start early is tracking your spending. Using simple tools like Google Sheets, list your income and recurring expenses. There are even mobile apps like Mint or YNAB that make tracking purchases easy. Knowing where your money goes is key to building stability and confidence.

Three

Avoid Lifestyle Creep.

As your income grows, don't let your spending grow with it. Maintain a modest lifestyle, and use extra cash to save, invest, or pay off debt, not just on impulse buys or midnight Postmates (we've all been there). Start by committing a portion of new income to savings or investments. Don't be afraid to spend some of the rest of the money you don't save, but be intentional about "fun" purchases.

Four

Build an Emergency Fund (3-6 Months of Expenses).

Start with \$500-\$1,000, then build toward three to six months of living expenses. You never know when you'll need it for a rainy day (or year). Keep it in a high-yield savings account, so you're ready for life's curveballs without turning to credit cards to keep you afloat. And, if you don't end up using it for an emergency, you'll have extra money for a great vacation when you're retired.

Five

Start Building Credit Smartly.

like gas or groceries, but pay it off in full on time at the end of each month to avoid interest. Good credit equals better rates on loans, apartments and even job screenings. If you don't have one

yet, apply for a starter credit card, or ask to be an authorized user on a parent's card.

Six

Learn the Basics of Investing (Even If You Start Small).

Don't wait to be rich to invest! Consider opening a Roth IRA or using an app like Fidelity, Vanguard or Betterment to invest in index funds or ETFs. Time in the market beats timing the market. An easy way to get started is to set up autoinvesting monthly, because even \$50 a month builds wealth over time.

Plus One:

Don't be afraid to join financial groups or ask vour friends how they grow their income! Many people have threads on Facebook, Messenger, WhatsApp and LinkedIn that discuss recent updates and trending investment tips. 6

My Parents Are Deaf

elta Zeta's dedication to hearing and speech goes beyond the programs and philanthropies hosted at every level of the Sorority. Members and their families are often impacted by hearing and speech disabilities. Over the years, many have shared their experiences and advocated through The LAMP magazine, including Mabel Northern Finnel, Rho-Denver (CO).

Mabel was the daughter of two deaf parents, both of whom lost their hearing to meningitis. "My parents are deaf. To others this may mean my parents are different, but to me it means nothing more than if someone said their parents had red hair," Mabel began her story in the summer 1961 issue of The LAMP.

Mabel shared her story of learning to talk and fingerspell at a young age so her parents could understand her better, especially when she got to the point of talking too quickly.

"Did I ever take advantage of my parent's deafness? When I was six, I told a neighbor that I'd sing at the dinner table. Mother did not think this was good manners, so I'd sing when she was not looking at me. I do not believe it ever occurred to me, when I was older, to take advantage of

them — in fact, I think they were too smart to allow it."

Life as a hearing child with deaf parents didn't come without it's share of struggles.

"Unlike most children of deaf parents, I did not understand conversational sign language or rapid fingerspelling until I was in high school, and Dr. Long, fatherin-law of Dr. Stevenson, former superintendent of the California School at Berkeley, visited our home. He is an author of a book on the sign language. He explained to me the meanings and derivation of many signs. Other educators of the deaf came to our home, and I learned how to talk vocally and sign simultaneously and to interpret for the deaf — this was fun."

Mabel's experience with her parents both being deaf led her to teach the deaf herself. Mabel graduated from the University of Denver and taught at various schools in Colorado, Kansas and California.

Members today are sharing their stories about how deafness and speech complications are impacting their lives. Caylyn Turner, Beta Xi-Auburn (AL), shared her story with hearing loss on social media.

"Growing up, I thought having the TV at maximum volume was normal. I thought crippling pain after swimming was just because I was prone to swimmers' ear ... I was wrong. I let this pain go on until I was 17 years old because I convinced myself it was nothing, but one quick trip to the audiologist let us know something was seriously wrong, and I was going to need surgery. In December of 2024, I had

a double tympanoplasty so that the doctor could take skin grafts and build me new eardrums. When I woke up from surgery, I knew that I wanted to help people the same way I received care and so I declared my major as Speech Language and Hearing Sciences.

It wasn't until I got to Delta Zeta that I realized I could take my experience and use it for good! This Sorority supports helping people in the same way I aspired to, so I interviewed for the philanthropy assistant position, and I got it! Since I was blessed with this position, I have worked to promote our Houndz for Hearing event which allows us to give back to families who are also struggling with speech and hearing disorders. Through my major, I will be working in the Auburn University speech and hearing clinic with real patients. I'm happy that I can take my story and use it to help others, and I can't wait to see what else I can do for good to support this community!"

Since 1954, hearing and speech have been at the heart of Delta Zeta's philanthropy and in 2006, at the Sorority's National Convention, members voted to make the Starkey Hearing Foundation a philanthropic partner. Since then, Delta Zeta has raised more than \$7.6 million for Starkey, which helped provide hearing aids to more than 500,000 recipients around the world.

Take Note

Delta Zeta's Abroad

"You are going to a whole other country, and you do not know anyone else going?"

This was a comment that I heard over and over before Delta Zeta's inaugural trip to Spain. Yes, I was nervous about my first international trip, but I was not worried about who I'd be with. Why ... because we already had one thing in common. We are all Delta Zetas.

I felt as if I'd known these women my whole life, and we'd just met hours prior. The age ranges of the women didn't matter either. I bonded with women fresh out of college and just starting their careers to women well establish in their careers and killing it. We wandered the streets of Barcelona in a torrential rainstorm, watched a flamenco show that took my breath away and shopped for Christmas tree ornaments all over Spain, these women have become lifelong friends and mentors. We now share memories and stories that I'll cherish forever. I know that I can reach out to them anytime I have a question or just to chat.

I've always wanted to travel but I've always said, "when I get married" or "when I retire." So, when the Facebook post for this trip came across my feed, I immediately clicked the link to learn more.



I just knew this was the trip that I was meant to take. If I had not taken the trip to Spain, I would have always wondered "what if." Personally, I wanted to change my narrative to "guess what I did" and "remember when."

I felt as if I'd known these women my whole life, and we'd just met hours prior.

This adventure renewed my love for personal growth, both mentally and spiritually, and reignited my flame. "To my mind growth; to myself, faith that I may walk truly in the light of the flame."

I'm signed up already for Italy in 2026 and cannot wait to see my Spain sisters and meet new ones. I hope to see you there. Caio!

Meghan Reece Heritage, Zeta Nu-Ferris State (MI), began her career as a teacher in Las Vegas, Nevada. Due to a job shortage in Michigan, she was forced to look at other opportunities out of state. She, and her Delta Zeta sister, Kristie Poulson, also from the Zeta Nu Chapter, both got teaching jobs with the Clark County School District, which was one of the biggest districts in the nation at the time. After some time with Clark County School District, Meghan and Kristie were both nominated for the New Teacher of the Year award for the district, and Meghan won.

Not long after that, Meghan returned to school and gained her master's degree in education leadership from Grand Valley State University. Her plan was to go to law school and advocate for children, but an unexpected opportunity led to a decision that completely altered her career path — land development and brokering.

"I sort of fell into land development while I was waiting a table," Meghan said.

Her parents and grandparents had helped her through her undergraduate degree, so she decided she would put herself through her masters. Meghan had started a full-time job teaching alternative education in Allenville, Michigan. She would then run home and put on her tuxedo before buzzing over to the Chop House, a high-end steak house. Her weekends were then filled with classes at Grand Valley State.

The night that altered the course of Meghan's career was spent at the Chop House. Her coworker had a sick child at home with a babysitter, and she asked if Meghan would take a table for her. It was a late reservation consisting of a company president of a real estate company and a few others. Meghan accepted. This was just one decision that led to several others and ultimately a change in her career.

After presenting herself to the table, the president of the company looked up at her and asked her what she really did. She explained that she was a teacher. The man then offered her a 30% tip on their bill if she agreed to an interview with one of the other men at the table. At first, Meghan declined, saying she didn't want to be in real estate. The president said he didn't care. All she had to do is take the interview. Meghan accepted, again.

Meghan's interview went well to the point that she was offered the job. She refused it a couple of times, wanting to stick to teaching, especially with her students who were considered high-risk and felt needed her. Several of her students had problems going on outside of the halls of the school, and she wanted to take after-hours calls to help her students more but was receiving pushback from the administration. It was becoming apparent that teaching under this administration wasn't a good fit.

Despite refusing to take the full-time job, she began selling properties for this company on the weekends. By the time she had completed her master's degree, Meghan decided to alter her career path. She transitioned into land development and started selling land in seven states.

"Saying yes in that moment, and helping that other woman, created a double six figure income immediately," Meghan said.

Meghan went from the classroom to private planes shuttling her out of state to sell properties. It was quite the shift, but Meghan felt supported by

her new team who guided her through the transition. They taught her the ins and outs of real estate, which has led to more than 20 years of experience in the industry. Now, Meghan has opened her own real estate agency, BlueWest Properties, located in Grand Haven, Michigan. At her agency, Meghan is the founder and a broker, helping people find homes and properties that customers are happy with, while also impacting local communities.

Meghan carries a deep faith in Christ and loves to help others. Through her business, she and her customers are able to support local churches, charities and schools. According to their website, BlueWest Properties takes 5% of the brokerage's profits on every property sale or purchase and puts it back into the communities they work in. Customers are able to choose what nonprofit or charity they would like to see the money go towards by filling out a Charity of Choice Form after they purchase or sell a home with BlueWest Properties.

One of the multiple organizations, is Meghan's Be Event, a non-profit organization that holds conferences built around women empowerment, networking and more. Prior to its founding, Meghan had felt the desire, the gnawing of the Holy Spirit, to do more

for others, but when one of her best friends died in labor, the hole in her heart was needing to be filled.

"Elizabeth had a seizure, and it ended up that I was with the baby while they took her to a larger hospital to try to save her life, unsuccessfully," Meghan said. "I did skin on skin contact with somebody else's child and that, you know, was sort of a pivotal place in my life where I thought that I had security. I had the right husband, two sons, a lovely home, and was selling real estate for BlueWest, but also working for a building company at that point, one of the larger custom builders in our area. And I just sort of realized, I don't really have any security."

The loss of her friend made Meghan realize that nothing in this life is promised, and no matter how hard you try, there are just some things out of our control. She then re-evaluated her life, looking at what was truly meaningful and impacting her life in a positive way and what wasn't.

About a year later, Meghan decided she wanted to do something to honor Elizabeth, who was a dentist, wife and mother. She said she also wanted to honor the friendship they had, emphasizing they

lifted each other up rather than competed against one another. It was Elizabeth who really loved the idea of Meghan using the brokerage to create a philanthropy, so after the creation of the philanthropy through BlueWest, Meghan was able to take some of the funds to bring together six female speakers to give insight into six areas of people's lives: career, giving, spirituality & peace, health & wellness, finance and relationships.

Meghan expected about 50 women to attend her event, but to her shock, she sold out on the first day with 100 tickets sold. Over the course of 10 years, the event has grown exponentially. Last year, Meghan had more than 400 attendees at her last Be Event.

The Be Event is a non-profit that also acts as a 9II charity. The funds earned from ticket sales and sponsorships go to women in immediate need. The organization lacks an executive board, making cutting checks for women in need quick. The Be Event has created connections with various executive directors and other larger charities who will contact and the Be Event when someone in need comes to them for help, but maybe it is

random things but ultimately benefit the women the funds go to. One instance there was a woman who had insurance to cover her chemo treatments but couldn't afford to put new tires on her car to get her to the appointments. The Be Event helped her get new tires.

"Where do you go for something like that?" Meghan said. She said she wanted her organization to be able to fill in any holes that may not be covered by other charities and organizations.

Looking back, Meghan can see how God has been at work in her life, especially with the changes in her career and the Be Event.

"God's plan has always been better than mine, IOO% and I laugh all the time, you know, at the things where I just was so incredibly frustrated that it wasn't going in quotations my way when really something else opened up that was so much bigger," she said. "I always say, 'stay curious."

After the events she had been through, Meghan deeply wanted to grow and learn more about herself and how she could improve and, like any good teacher, she wanted to share newfound information so others could do the same.

Meghan's advice, that she often uses with her kids, is listen more, and ask questions. If her kids are saying something along the lines of, "it should be this way," or "this is what I believe," she will ask them to "say more words," and ask them why they feel the way they feel or why they believe something. She loves to ask questions and often used the Socratic method, a form of inquiry and discussion that uses crafted questions to stimulate

Fun Group or Individual Improvement Activities

What's your joy list? Put together your own joy list, and share it with your sisters at the next chapter meeting!

How do you "stay curious?" Is it reading? Do you take extra classes or watch the news? With your sisters, brainstorm different ways to stay curious. Put them somewhere, like a poster or a shared document in Google Drive, everyone can access and look back on.

What are your roots? Who are you at your core? Take a few minutes to think about and write down the things that make you you! Then take another few minutes to focus on the things that might not be improving your life. Is it a bad relationship? Is it alcohol or social media? Once you have made your list, set some SMART goals (specific, measurable, achievable, relevant and time-bound). If you are comfortable with it, share your goals with one friend, and meet with them regularly to make sure you are taking the right steps to achieve your goals!

critical thinking and deeper understanding while teaching.

With the Be Event, Meghan works to help women to discover who they truly are. She describes having different versions of herself: a broker, a realtor, a mom, a philanthropist. But who is Meghan really? Who are each of us at our core?

The Be Event gives women the opportunity to sit down and spend a few hours with themselves. This time of self-reflection, combined with collaborating with other women, allows for attendees to discover what areas of their lives are not whole and what can they do to change that?

"I also think that it allows a space for collaboration instead of competition — to just recognize that a candle loses nothing by lighting another flame," she said.

At the beginning of every Be Event, before Meghan takes the stage, her bio is read for the attendees. While listening to all of her

accomplishments, Meghan cringes, but steps out on stage with a smile. She often starts off with, "Yeah, yeah, yeah, but let me tell you about the time I was fired from a bowling alley."

Meghan was, indeed, fired from a bowling alley for refusing to serve jack and cokes to a pregnant woman. To her point, we often see people's accomplishment, and compare ourselves before getting to know people.

In today's world of social media, we often see people in what they display as a "perfect" life. They have nice things, maybe things that we want. They travel all over the world, or maybe they check all the boxes in health and wellness. That can sometimes create a sense of desire in us to want those same things, just like social media influencers using their platforms to compete for likes, follows and views. Meghan works to eliminate that.

Her mindset of it's not "you or me," it's "us," removes the barriers that competition can create. Without that element, women are more able to expand their minds, share ideas and create goals that are more attainable.

Meghan also uses accountability partners to keep her attendees on track with their goals. One thing she said she believes is that sometimes you are called for a purpose before you are qualified.

"It's just really important to be still in meditation and prayer, and get into alignment on, not only what am I qualified to do, but what do I feel called to do instead of just being in this, rat race of minutia and running around like crazy trying to please everyone," Meghan said.

Meghan does her best to focus on the things that matter to her and uses tools of her own to help her juggle the different aspects of her life. She often creates what she calls her joy list. She keeps a list of things that she finds joy in during times that may be stressful or if she just needs a break. Meghan finds walking in nature very grounding and makes sure she eats good healthy meals and gets her body moving.

These are all things that Meghan will also use to help other women. Sometimes, people will reach out to Meghan panicked by their situation. When she receives these phone calls, she asks them to look back in the last 72 hours and to think if they ate good meals. Have they exercised or drank alcohol? All of these things, or a lack of them, may influence the way someone is feeling, especially in a not-so-great situation.

Meghan emphasized the joy list and how this tool kit can really be impactful. She also recognizes that those joyful things may change over time. Looking back on your own life, your interests probably changed. It's okay to swap out items or activities on your own joy list!

When dealing with intense or unfortunate situations, these tools are of great importance. Meghan's husband shared with her a quote from former professional boxer, Mike Tyson. "Everybody's got a plan until you get punched in the face." At first, Meghan hadn't fully understood the quote, but then realized, that things go wrong. Sometimes she discovers water in the basement of a listing or maybe one of her friends got divorced, and they need to sell their house. In those situations, Meghan likes to take a moment to recognize if she needs to reflect and pray or take action. She emphasized the importance of being in a state to respond rather than react. She reminds herself that everything is temporary, including the situation she is in. It might seem wild and crazy, maybe even impossible in that moment, but if she just takes a beat to recognize that the situation is short-term, she can think through it properly and get herself to a point to respond, not react. Many of these things, Meghan

touches in her Be Events. Meghan is looking to

expand her events to provide a deeper dive into some of the topics discussed at the Be Event. Currently, her plan is to hold another event in November this year. This deeper dive would be more of a long-term program that women can participate in after the event takes place. The goal would be six months to focus on the six different areas she and other speakers discuss.

"I think sometimes we get all of these people in a room with 400 other people, and then everybody kind of runs away with all the conferences, right? So, you run away with all this data, and then you kind of scatter."

Meghan hopes that a six-month program with Zoom calls would create a sense of community and accountability. Having regular meetings would help women accomplish the goals they set and have others there who have been through the same experiences. Why I Lead with Empathy

My Journey with Hearing Loss

rowing up, Caylyn Turner, Beta Xi-Auburn (AL), didn't know her everyday experiences

weren't normal. Turning the TV on maximum volume, struggling to hear her teachers and enduring painful earaches after swimming were simply facts of life; until the pain became unbearable. At 17 years old, a diagnosis not only gave her clarity and healing but also sparked a lifelong calling: to help others find their voice and hear the world clearly.

"Growing up with hearing loss, I am reminded of the daily challenges and differences

that were happening in my life that others around me didn't have to deal with," Caylyn said. It wasn't until she found herself

in the fetal position begging for the pain to stop that she knew the pain was too intense to stay silent. The ENTs made her aware she had holes in her eardrums and referred her to a local audiologist. Her doctors gave her a small piece of life back that she felt like she was missing. She finally had answers.

The surgery to remedy her hearing loss was a double

tympanoplasty, which is the rebuilding of the eardrums using skin and fat grafts, depending on the severity. She had both a skin graft, using the skin behind her eardrums that was used on her left ear, and the fat graft was used on her right. For weeks, she was essentially bedbound.

It wasn't until this experience that she wanted to investigate the Speech Language and Hearing field further. "The innate connection I have to this field makes my dedication and understanding to my degree so much more valuable," Caylyn stated.

After realizing Delta Zeta's philanthropy focus was rooted in hearing and speech, she knew it was destiny. When interviewing for the philanthropy assistant chair position in her chapter at Auburn University, Caylyn focused on the importance of understanding the "why" behind it all. She didn't want her chapter to simply fundraise without meaning; she wanted to inspire empathy, education and a genuine connection to the

organizations their efforts support.

Delta Zeta has empowered Cavlvn to share her story with confidence. Surrounded by women who believe in her, she meets each day with faith and purpose. As she looks ahead to working in the AU Speech and Hearing Clinic, she knows the experience will prepare her like no other. Despite the unknowns, she's

driven to learn so she can one day help others the way she was helped.

"If I could speak advice to anyone silently struggling with a speech, language or hearing disorder: don't put it off. It is not weak or embarrassing to speak up for yourself. Lean on your sisters to give you strength to face the challenges," she says. Caylyn is incredibly grateful for what she has already learned being introduced into this field, and she can't wait to see all that her future holds.

Full Circle

HOW HAVING A HEART FOR HEARING AND SPEECH CHANGED AN ALUMNA'S LIFE

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onsistently, Delta Zeta's philanthropy has pulled at the heartstrings of women going through recruitment. Between all of our philanthropic partners, there is a story that our members connect to. It's the reason why I fell in love with

Delta Zeta. But for members like Payton Chronister, having a heart for hearing and speech has a deeper, more personal impact.

A member of the Rho Chapter at the University of Denver, Payton was on a time crunch for the 2018 Heart for Hearing fundraiser, having only heard about the contest a few hours before it closed. "I reached out to everyone in my family, asking if they could help me raise the minimum donation to get my name in the raffle and, together, we raised exactly that amount," she said. With just one entry, Payton was shocked when she was told she would be joining the Starkey Hearing Foundation in Honduras.

Her hard work clearly paid off, as she spent a week volunteering her time to help 1,265 individuals in Honduras. Payton helped people who had never heard before. She gave the gift of hearing back to individuals who lost their hearing, regaining their ability after years of silence. To

be a part of such an experience is incredibly emotional—smiles and tears from patients, families and volunteers are expected. Seeing eyes light up at the sound of a loved one's voice is always endearing, but Payton's favorite part was the genuine connection she made with everyone on the mission site. "What stood out to me most was the instant connection I witnessed — the connection with their family, with their surroundings and even with the volunteers — regardless of language barriers or the fact we had only met a few minutes prior," she said.

Payton left this trip knowing she needed to go on another trip with the Starkey Hearing Foundation. When the 2019 Heart for Hearing contest opened, she started fundraising immediately. Using her personal experience in Honduras, she was able to raise enough to have her name entered into the raffle multiple times. Her passion from her previous trip ensured her name got pulled for a second trip. Unfortunately, she would have to wait four years before her second mission. COVID-19 shut down all travel, and Delta Zeta did not join Starkey Hearing Foundation

for hearing mission trips.

Finally, Payton's time came.

November 2024 took Payton and eight collegiate Delta Zetas to El Salvador for the second trip since the pandemic shut down. She was ready — her confidence to fit people with hearing aids had only grown. It was her homecoming, reconnecting with several women from the Honduras trip and reconnecting with Delta Zeta as an alumna. Payton said, "It felt like coming home in a way. I reconnected with several people I had met in Honduras years before!"

With her previous expertise, it is no surprise that she was giving her all for the people in El Salvador. Little did she know that she would receive the same treatment from Starkey just a few months later. During a video interview on site, Payton shared that she has experienced consistent ear infections for her entire life, leading to hearing loss. After multiple major surgeries to try and fix this, her

hearing got worse. Hearing aids never seemed to be on her horizon. "Even though I knew I had hearing loss, I always thought about how other people had it worse — it felt like

I didn't need hearing aids when so many other people could benefit from them more," she said.

Inspired by her story, Starkey and Delta Zeta invited Payton to attend the Tani Austin Ignite the Flame Community and Philanthropy Summit in January of 2025 to test her hearing.

Suddenly, Payton found herself receiving the same gracious services that she had given to the people of Honduras and El Salvador. Determining that she would benefit from two hearing aids, Starkey fit her with the devices free of charge. "It felt like a full circle moment: after being able to share the gift of hearing with others on the Starkey trips, I was now receiving this incredible gift that I didn't even fully comprehend until that moment," Payton said. The moment the devices were fit and turned on, Payton burst into tears. It was a moment so incredibly similar to those that she had given to so many individuals. She was surrounded by women who attended the El Salvador trip, all expressing their excitement and support for her.

To go from volunteer to a patient herself was a shock. It is a large adjustment. Suddenly, everything was loud, and her own voice felt like it was booming. Small sounds stood out to Payton — has her bracelet always made that noise when she moved her wrist? But with the support of Starkey and her loved ones back home, she has had a smooth adjustment. Expressing just how grateful she is for the generosity, Payton said, "I'm so thankful to Starkey for making me see that if I had the chance to hear better, I should!"

Payton's journey — from volunteer to patient — epitomizes the heart of Delta Zeta's philanthropy and the transformative power of the Starkey Hearing Foundation's mission. Her experience serves as an inspiration, showing that through service, community and generosity, we are not only changing the lives of others, but also transforming our own in ways we never imagined. •
